

MUSTANGS LOSE CLARENDON BRONCHOS FRI.

The brilliant Mustangs lost tonight 31 to 6 decision to the Bronchos in a district encounter which was held on Mustang Field last night. The contest was a large crowd of home-owners.

The Bronchos scored once each in the first and second periods and led the game 12 to 0 at the end of the first quarter and Mayo carried the 2 for the second quarter.

After sustained drives had the ball in scoring position. In the third period Bulman carried the yard to Whitsett for the extra point and the score 19 to 0. At this point Robertson re-entered the game after having been out earlier because of an injury to his passing arm and he conducted Wheeler's touchdown drive as the game rang up 4 first downs in the fourth quarter.

COUNTY IS FAR BEHIND IN USO FUND CAMPAIGN

With Thursday, October 31, marking the end of the current USO drive, Wheeler County is far behind her quota of \$880, Harry Wofford, co-chairman of the drive reported Wednesday.

Tuesday afternoon, only \$465.50 had been contributed throughout the county, with most of that amount being turned in on the south side, Wofford said.

FORMER COUNTY MAN SUCCUMBS

Amos Joe Parson, 54-year-old former Wheeler County resident, passed away in the Veterans hospital in Tucson, Ariz., at 11 o'clock Sunday morning, October 13.

Although he had been in ill health for several years, Mr. Parson had been seriously ill for only seven days.

Funeral services were conducted from the Mortuary Memorial Chapel in Tucson on October 16, and the body was laid to rest with thousands of other ex-service men in the veterans cemetery. The American Legion was in charge of the committal rites.

Service men served as pall bearers and service women as flower attendants.

Mr. Parson was born in Denton County, Texas, on August 1, 1892. He came to Wheeler County while still in his young manhood. He served overseas in France and Germany during World War I, and upon his return was married to Miss Fannie Buster at Ada, Okla.

He had been in Arizona for his health for several years. Survivors include the widow and four children; Stella Lee, J. W. Billie and Annie, all of Tucson; one granddaughter, Sherron Ann; three sisters, three brothers and several nieces and nephews.

Mr. Parson was a member of the First Baptist Church of Tucson.

CATTLE PRICES HIGH AT SALE

Cattle traders who frequent the Mobeetie Sales Company barns are of the opinion that, with the return of the free market in cattle, prices will settle down to normal within a few days.

Runs here are expected to be heavy until frost, as there is a good demand for anything that will go out on wheat and make a gain.

About 950 cattle were sold last Saturday at the Mobeetie auction. Most of the offerings were stockers. Good and choice fat cattle brought a record price.

J. M. Brannon bought eight fat steer calves that weighed around 640 pounds for \$129 per head. Ted Cunningham bought one of the highest cows ever to go through the ring, at \$189.

Walter Jones of Laketon bought a string of fat heifer calves at \$88 per head. L. A. Decker bought a string of stocker heifer calves at \$82.50 per head. Mr. McKnight of south of Pampa bought a large string of mixed red and roan stockers at from \$40 to \$60 per head to go on wheat range.

CANNING SUGAR STAMP IS VALID THROUGH NOV. 30

Housewives will have another 30 days to use their canning sugar stamps, the OPA announced tonight.

Instead of expiring at the end of this month, spare stamps No. 9 and 10 will continue valid through Nov. 30. Each is good for five pounds.

The action completes a series of moves designed to offset local and regional sugar shortages, resulting from the maritime strike. Earlier this week arrangements were made to ship Western beet sugar to the East.

The OPA announcement said tonight it had been agreed to movement of "Western beet sugar into Eastern deficit areas in order to permit housewives to receive their fair share of sugar."

It added that extension of the valid date of the stamps "will permit housewives who have been unable to obtain home canning sugar to finish putting up the last fruits of the canning season."

The regular table sugar stamp, spare No. 51 in ration books, remains good for five pounds until the end of this year.

Sugar is the only food still rationed at consumer levels. Each ration book holder has allotted 25 pounds this year, on the basis of three stamps, each valid for four months, and the two canning stamps.

Although the day usually does not create a great deal of excitement in a county so strongly dominated by Democrats as Wheeler County, a large vote is expected this year because of the interest in three proposed amendments to the state constitution.

All qualified voters are urged to go to the polls Tuesday and cast their sentiments on the candidates for office and the proposed amendments.

The ballot boxes in Wheeler will be located as follows: Stanley box at the court house; Wheeler box at the American Legion Hut; and McBee box at the home of Leonard Rathjen.

LIONS WIN FROM MOBEETIE SIX

DAIRY RECORDS BEAT GUESSING

Any kind of record that is kept in feeding dairy cows is better than none at all, Hubert Martin, Wheeler County Agricultural Agent, declared this week.

"The dairyman that keeps no feeding and production records at all will usually feed all his cows the same amount, which means that the high producing cows are underfed and the low-producing cows are overfed," the county agent said.

The Dairy Herd Improvement Association will furnish dairymen with information necessary to do the right job of feeding cows according to production, Martin said, and this method of feeding means more pounds of milk for each pound of grain fed.

If cows are on pasture and getting all the roughage they can clean up each day, grain can be used most economically by feeding one pound to Jersey and Guernseys for each three pounds of milk they produce, and one pound to Holsteins for each four pounds of milk produced.

Accurate milk weight and butterfat tests are the only true measure of a cow's production, Martin said. Production and feed records will show the dairyman just what part he has played in his cows' production. Improved feeding practices have made many dairy association herds develop into higher producing and more profitable businesses.

tion of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on certain county and road district bonds or warrants; providing that one-fourth of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School fund; providing a minimum limit of revenue that each county shall derive from motor registration fees; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the state's credit for any purpose."

Absentee balloting began Wednesday, October 16, and will continue until Midnight of November 1.

Requirements for absentee voting are the same as at other elections, and qualified voters who expect to be out of the county on the date of election may cast their ballot during the period authorized.

The Republican party convention has nominated a full slate of candidates for State offices, but only one Democrat candidate will be opposed for election in district races, and none in the county.

Frank T. O'Brien has been nominated by the Republicans as candidate for Congress from the 18th Congressional district, and will oppose Congressman Eugene Worley.

Republican candidates have been nominated for all State offices with the single exception of Commissioner of Agriculture, where the Democratic nominee, J. E. McDonald, will be unopposed.

In other races, Tom Connally (D) opposes Murray C. Sells, Republican nominee, for U. S. Senator; Beauford H. Jester (D) and Eugene Nolte Jr. (R) are candidates for Governor, Allan Shivers (D) and John A. Donaldson (R) for Lieutenant Governor; Price Daniel (D) and H. L. Ratliff (R) for Attorney General; John H. Sharp (D) and Howell Ward (R) for Associate Justice of State Supreme Court, Place 1; Graham B. Smedley (D) and S. D. Bennett (R) for Supreme Court Place 2; J. E. Hickman (D) and Andrew Longaker (R) for Supreme Court Place 3; Tom L. Beauchamp (D) and H. L. McCune (R) for Judge of Court of Criminal Appeals;

FARM FACTS

WORTH KNOWING

Q. Do yearling steers need as much vitamin A in the fattening ration as steer calves do?

A. No. Indications are that yearling steers do not lose their vitamin A reserves as quickly as calves do. Because steer calves become depleted of vitamin A reserves more quickly than older cattle, they may need larger amounts of carotene and vitamin A in fattening periods.

Q. Considering all factors, what is the best type of fuel to use in a chick brooder?

A. The Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company made simultaneous tests for 7 hatches on brooders heated with wood, coal, gas, oil, and electricity. At the end of the tests, the average weight per chick at six weeks and the pounds of feed per pound of gain were relatively constant for the five different types of brooding equipment. There was considerable variation in fuel costs, but wood and coal, though cheaper, required much more attention and skill on the part of the attendant. The most important factors in selection of a brooding fuel are the dependability of a constant source and the relative cost of the fuel. In some areas wood and coal may be more expensive as well as requiring more labor.

Q. How much difference can be made in pastures by following a pasture improvement program for the dairy herd?

A. An intelligent program of fertilization along with rotational grazing pays big dividends. Many reports show that yields increased two to three times when necessary liming and fertilizing were done.

Q. Would you give me the names of some popular squab-producing breeds of pigeons?

A. Some popular breeds are King, Carneaux, Swiss Mondain, French Mondain, and Giant Homer.

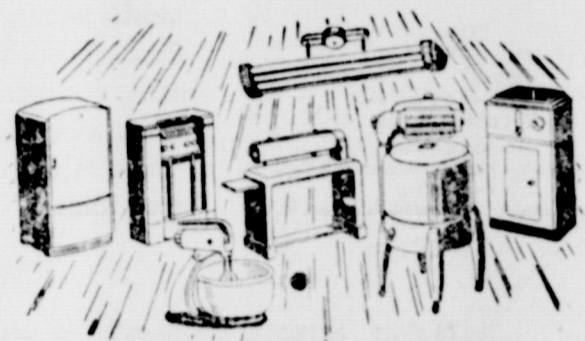
