This raise, it is estimated, will bring into the school treasury an additional \$3,674.01 annually. This tax, if authorized, will in no manner effect the amount of state aid coming into the school for the coming term or any subsequent terms, and will not effect the valuations of property, such valuations remaining the same despite the tax raise.



Q. Does it pay to feed a supplement to beef cattle when the grass gets dry in late summer?

A. Results at the U.S. Southern Great Plains Field Station showed that yearling steers produced an increased gain of 71 lbs. per head more when fed two lbs. of supplement on late summer range, and 51 lbs. more gain when fed one lb. of supplement, as compared to the check lot fed no supplement. On the basis of beef produced, the steers fed two lbs. of supplement showed a net return of \$490 more and those fed 1 lb. showed a net return of \$300 more than the steers fed no supplement.

Q. How can I keep turkey poults from eating the litter?

A. Cover litter with rough paper or burlap sacks for the first four days. A smooth cover such as slick newspaper should not be used, as it has a tendency to contribute to slipped tendons.

Q. Is browse required for dairy goats?

A. No. According to an experiment conducted over a two year period at the Ralston Purina Company's Research Farm, browse does not supply any nutritive factors that may not be supplied by alfalfa hay

Q. In feeding lambs, how can critically scarce grains and concen-Harvey Wright of Canyon spent trates be conserved in these times
