THE CHOICE IS CLEAR
 REIMPOSITION of price con-
 trols on many lines, and particu-
 larly on meats, has caused many to
 predict resurgence of the black
 markets that were so active early
 in the summer but subsided when
 ceilings went off.

Such an unfortunate develop-
 ment is entirely possible, though
 not at all necessary. If it trans-
 pires, it will be because of public
 selfishness or apathy. If it is pre-

vented, it will not be principally
 by law enforcement but rather
 through the alertness of consum-
 ers.

There is little question that
 quantities of meat, and other of
 the scarcer consumer goods, will
 find their way into illegitimate
 hands, where they will be offered
 at exorbitant prices to those who
 insist upon gratifying their lust
 at whatever price, and those
 hands so long as an appreciable
 market exists.

The consuming public as a
 whole is going to be faced with a
 difficult but important choice—
 temporarily to go without, or
 restrict its use of, things it wants
 and can pay for, in order to force
 the return of legitimate opera-
 tions; or to gratify its immedi-
 ate desires, at great cost to its
 pocketbook and at the risk of up-
 setting the whole economic apple-
 cart.

Meat, or any other desirable
 commodity, will go into the black
 market only so long as a foolish
 public is willing to buy it under
 the counter at unnecessarily high
 prices.

When price controls went off,
 high prices and in quantities
 and meat appeared in stores at
 enough to allay the almost fran-
 tic public feeling of deprivation,
 a modified buyers' strike began to
 develop which, if it had been
 given time to spread and strength-
 en, would have brought prices
 down.

The great danger of a black
 market now is that, when meat
 begins to disappear from legiti-
 mate shelves and to be found
 principally under the counter,
 housewives will forget that they
 found it entirely possible to re-
 sist high prices during the hiatus,
 and will begin scrambling desper-
 ately for anything from any-
 body at any price.

The choice is clear. We can buy
 on the black market, which no
 government enforcement agency
 can do more than harass, and
 thereby delay the return of nor-
 mal economy. Or we can tempo-
 rarily go without, or restrict our
 use of scarce commodities to
 what is available from legitimate
 dealers, and thereby break the
 black market.

It ought not to be too difficult
 to decide on which side our bread
 will be buttered in the long run.

 KNOWING**

**Q. What causes enlarged hocks in
 my 16-week old turkeys?**

**A. This is probably due to an in-
 fection which produces a disease
 known as synovitis. It is more com-
 mon in toms than in hens. The
 swelling may extend down the
 shanks and into the foot. Diseased
 birds should be isolated quickly for
 two reasons: (1) to minimize the
 possibility of transmission, and (2)
 to give the affected birds a chance
 to recover and survive. The healthy
 ones should be moved to clean range.
 Separate the sexes if possible.**

**Q. Why are proteins and minerals
 particularly important in the feed-
 ing of bred ewes?**

**A. Ewes often produce 10% or
 more of their body weight in grease
 wool and from 8% to 16% of their
 body weight in the form of lamb
 during gestation. Since both of these
 products are high in protein and
 minerals, these two nutrients are
 highly important in sheep feeding.**

**Q. Should dairy heifers be bred
 according to age or according to
 body size?**

**A. Experiments at the Ralston
 Purina Company's Research Farm
 show that body size should deter-
 mine when heifers should be bred.
 After many years of work on this,
 the Ralston Purina recommenda-
 tions, by breeds, are as follows:**

Jerseys500 lbs.
 Guernseys550 lbs.
 Holsteins750 lbs.
 Brown Swiss750 lbs.
 Ayrshires850 lbs.

**Q. How much water is used in
 producing 100 pounds of pork?**

**A. Water for hogs is essential and
 should be available at all times. In
 producing 100 pounds of pork, about
 550 pounds of water are consumed.
 The brood sow, particularly, needs
 an abundance of water.**

**Q. What is the cause of "spotted
 livers" in rabbits?**

**A. "Spotted livers" indicate that
 the rabbits have or have had coc-
 cidiosis.**

Veterans' News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. What amount of guaranty may be issued on behalf of any one eligible veteran?

A. Up to \$4,000 on real estate or up to \$2,000 on personal property or business loans, and not more than 50 per cent of any loan may be guaranteed.

Q. If part of the guaranty has been used, how is the remaining guaranty computed?

A. To compute the used guaranty, subtract the amount of realty loan from \$4,000. The sum remaining is the amount of realty guaranty available, or half that amount is the sum of personal property or business loan guaranty available.

Q. Are there any circumstances under which the guaranty may exceed 50 per cent of the loan?

A. Where a Federal Agency has made or is to make a guaranteed or insured loan for any of the eligible purposes, and the veteran needs a fully guaranteed second loan. This second loan may be fully guaranteed if—

(a) the amount involved is not in excess of the veteran's available guarantee, and
(b) the loan is not in excess of 20 per cent of the purchase price or cost.

Q. May several veterans use the guaranty to acquire property jointly?

A. Yes, but the total amount guaranteed may not exceed 50 per cent of the loan or the total entitlement for a guaranty of the veterans, whichever is lesser. No loan may be guaranteed to exceed 50 per cent except a loan secondary to one made, guaranteed or insured by a Federal Agency.

Q. May a lender require security, in addition to the property being purchased, if the lender is not satisfied with the loan without additional security?

A. This is a matter between the veteran and the lender. The VA does not object to its being given if the veteran is willing to give it.

Q. Is the guaranty or insurance privilege of a veteran restored to its original amount when the indebtedness is repaid.

A. No.

Officials in the Dallas Branch Office of the Veterans Administration are making strenuous efforts to help every disabled veteran seeking education to get into the crowded schools of the Southwest this fall.

All schools in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi have been contacted within recent days and urged by VA to give preference to disabled ex-soldiers when classes are enrolled late in September.

General Bradley, Veteran Administrator, has taken a personal interest in helping disabled veterans to finish their schooling and has directed that every resource to this end be used.

A list of schools in the Southwest which have indicated they are able to give preference to disabled veterans is now being compiled by VA.

Nearly 10,000 disabled veterans of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi were in training or enrolled in schools at the beginning of August. This is more than seven times the total number—1,252—enrolled a year ago.

VA's loan guarantee officers had some words of advice this week for veterans who want to start small businesses on a GI loan. One experienced loan officer

summed it up this way—

"If you are thinking about going into business for yourself, Mr. Veteran, walk—don't run—to your bank or lending agency for that GI loan. And before that—think things out carefully.

"The G. I. Bill made it relatively easy for them to get capital. But it takes more than capital to make a success of a small business. It takes experience, good judgement, and a lot of hard work.

"There is always an element of risk. A large percentage of small businesses fail within a year. In most cases, that is due to lack of preparation on the part of the new owners.

"Veterans should get the advice of trusted and experienced business men before such a venture. That may give you valuable advice.



War Surplus Property Sale Be At Amarillo

Amarillo Army Air Field is announced as one of six sites at which sales of surplus used motor vehicles will be conducted by War Assets Administration's Fort Worth regional office during the week starting Monday, Sept. 23. The sales include "set aside" items offered exclusively to veterans of World War II and all veterans holding certificates for the vehicles being offered are eligible to participate in any or all of the sales.

The sale at Amarillo Army Air Field which will include vehicles of the Pantex Ordnance Plant which have been declared surplus, is scheduled for Tuesday, September 24 from 9 to 5. Inspection of the vehicles may be made both Monday as well as the day of sale

from 8:30 A. M. to 4:00 P. M.

Included in the offering are listed command and reconnaissance cars, carryalls, ambulances, weapon carriers, pickup trucks, scooters and a wide variety of various makes and models of trucks.

Other sales listed for the same week include: Sept. 23, Big Spring AAF; Sept. 24, Abilene AAF; Sept. 24, Goodfellow Field at San Angelo; Sept. 26, Sheppard Field at Wichita Falls; Sept. 26 and 27, Camp Hood, which is a two day sale of some 461 vehicles, the largest sale of the six included.

Coffee Ice Cream



Serve with shredded chocolate.

A new recipe for Coffee Caramel Ice Cream does not require heavy cream, but depends upon bottled milk and eggs for its richness. The combination of coffee and caramel flavors is delicious.

Coffee Caramel Ice Cream
(4-6 servings)

- 2 cups bottled milk
- 1/2 cup vacuum-packed ground coffee
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup bottled corn syrup (light)
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 4 eggs
- 1/4 cup cream (from top of milk)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Heat milk with coffee over hot water. Meanwhile, melt half the sugar in heavy frying pan, stirring until melted. Remove from heat and stir in remaining sugar and corn syrup. Strain coffee milk mixture through a double thickness of cheesecloth. Return milk to top of double boiler, add caramel syrup and salt and stir over hot water until the caramel is dissolved.

Beat eggs slightly with fork and stir in slowly a small quantity of caramel mixture until smoothly blended with eggs. Return to the remaining mixture in double boiler. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly, until custard coats spoon. Remove from heat, add light cream and vanilla. Chill quickly.

Turn into freezing tray of an automatic refrigerator. When mixture has congealed on sides and bottom, remove from freezing unit and beat or stir until smooth. Return and freeze until firm. Serve with shredded chocolate.





taught at home to obey traffic signals. The next greatest number will be third-grade youngsters; the fourth grade holds the greatest probability to lead in bicycle-motor vehicle deaths.

Last year in Texas 883 school children were killed by accidents of all kinds, and many more were injured, some of them disfigured and crippled for life. In the traffic accident category, they were struck down going to and from school, for the most part; 12 were killed in school bus accidents. These deaths and those occurring on the school grounds and in the school buildings accounted for 450; 433 children were killed in home accidents and in accidents away from home and school.

This year traffic accidents generally have shown a sharp increase over 1945. From January through July, 1946, 1,024 people were killed—a total 49 per cent greater than that for the same period last year. Old cars, and tires, deteriorated highways, and inadequate policing have teamed up with the most important factor—carelessness—to reap a red harvest that is only slightly below the record toll of 1941.

cent of their waking hours, and the hours of housework varied with individuals all the way from 54 to 120 hours. Those who spent the most time with household tasks had large families and young children, while those who spent the least time had hired help or family aid.

Three jobs—preparing meals, house cleaning, and dish washing—required the lion's share of housework hours. Preparing meals required a fourth of the total time, house cleaning almost another fourth, and dishwashing about a sixth. Other household jobs included: Care of children and the sick, nine per cent of the time; laundry, cleaning, mending and sewing, nine per cent; canning and preserving, six per cent; marketing and household business, three per cent.

Since preparing meals, house cleaning and dish washing not only required most of the homemakers' time but also were described as "most tiring" and "most disliked." Mrs. Low advises Texas homemakers to study these three jobs for short cuts. Greater efficiency, sometimes easily achieved, cuts down on drudgery and will leave more time for recreation and pleasure, she points out.


