have been attempted, by the but-
 ter industry, are no less ridiculous
 Margarine—healthful, sanitary,
 nourishing and good to taste, is
 discriminated against through the
 most outrageous methods direct-
 ed against any wholesale Ameri-
 can commodity.

There is a federal tax of one-
 quarter cent a pound on uncolored
 margarine and ten cents a pound
 on colored margarine. Each manu-
 facturer pays a \$600 license fee
 annually. Wholesalers must pay
 \$200 a year, retailers \$6.00 a year,
 for the uncolored product. If they
 sell it colored, the fees are \$480
 and \$48.

Then many states tack on fur-
 ther taxes and license fees, re-
 strictive regulations and hamper-
 ing requirements. Legislators in
 one state even tried to require
 that margarine be dyed brown!

The industry has certainly made
 things tough for the housewife.
 She has to pay far more for mar-
 garine than it should cost—and
 she has to color it herself, or eat
 it white.

She colors it with the very same
 harmless, odorless, tasteless stuff
 that butter makers put in butter
 —although she may not realize
 that almost all butter sold has to
 be artificially colored, too, to give
 it that golden gleam.

If every housewife in the land
 knew the truth about the mar-
 garine outrage, there would be a
 women's uproar heard even from
 the butter states. Some of these
 day, enough women will awaken
 to the robbery, and legislators—
 state and federal—will know
 what a woman's wrath can do.

**Q. What may cause liver abscesses
 in beef cattle?**
 A. After two years' experiments on
 the causes and conditions of liver
 abscesses in beef animals at the Col-
 orado A. & M. College, Fort Collins,
 the conclusion reached was that de-
 ficiency of vitamin A in the diet of
 beef cattle was a factor which pre-
 disposed the liver tissues to ab-
 scesses.

**Q. At what age should pigs be
 weaned in order to have the sow
 bred in time to raise two litters in
 one year?**
 A. At the Research Farm of the
 Ralston Purina Company where the
 two litter a year program is followed,
 all pigs are weaned at 9 weeks of
 age. In weaning the pigs, remove
 the sow from the litter allowing the
 pigs to remain in the same lot un-
 til they are completely weaned. The
 sow should be fasted for 24 hours
 after she is removed from the litter.
 Then feed her lightly for the next
 two or three days. The pigs may be
 allowed to suckle the sow once a
 day after weaning is started by re-
 turning the sow to the pigs for an
 hour.

**Q. What causes blackhead in tur-
 keys?**
 A. This is caused by a small proto-
 zoan parasite, and there is no
 known cure for the disease. As pre-
 ventive measures, keep turkeys away
 from chickens, raise them on clean
 range, move the feeders, waterers,
 and roosts often, and keep things
 clean by following a definite pro-
 gram of sanitation.

**Q. Is there any way to tell how
 old a dog is?**
 A. It is difficult to tell the exact
 age of a dog, particularly after he
 has reached three years of age. The
 condition of the teeth does most to
 help determine the age of a dog,
 but even the experts cannot tell ac-
 curately by examining an old dog
 just how old he is.

**Q. What is the incubation period
 for duck eggs?**
 A. 28 days for the more common
 breeds. 33 days for the Muscovy
 duck.

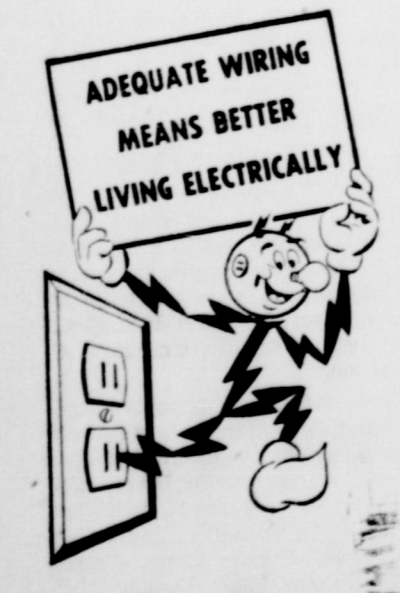

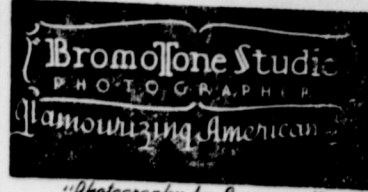

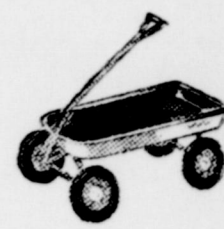

1. Have the battery case examined for cracks and leaks at the top where the cells are sealed. Test the battery for charge — if necessary, have the battery brought up to full charge— (Even a full charged battery has only 40 per cent of its energy available at zero temperature.)
2. Make sure that the battery cables are not corroded or frayed and the insulation is not eaten away. Cables should be tightened solidly on the battery posts and the battery firmly fastened in the hanger.
3. Have the generator inspected to be sure that the brushes are seating properly and not cutting into the armature so that the generator will be able to furnish sufficient current to keep the battery fully charged.
4. To reduce the battery current required to start the car, have the spark plugs cleaned and the gaps set to specifications. The spark plugs' wires should be inspected—if the rubber insulation is oil soaked and spongy, some of the current that should be going to the spark plugs will be lost.
5. Distributor points that are pitted and burned will use more battery energy also. They

should be filed or replaced and adjusted to the proper setting.

Remove excessive drag in the engine and transmission by changing the oil and grease to winter grade. (Two and one-half times as much energy is required to turn the engine over at zero temperature than at 80 degrees with S. A. E. 20 oil.)

7. Practice starting the car with the clutch disengaged so that the battery won't have to turn the gears in the transmission as well as the engine.

8. When starting the car make sure the headlights are off as they draw between 35 to 40 watts of energy which the battery must furnish in addition to the energy required to start the car.

9. Finally, it is important at all times to keep the battery filled with water to the proper level. Only the approved battery electrolyte or approved water should be used. (In freezing weather the car should be used immediately after the water is added to the battery to insure its mixture with the electrolyte and thus eliminating the possibility of freezing.)

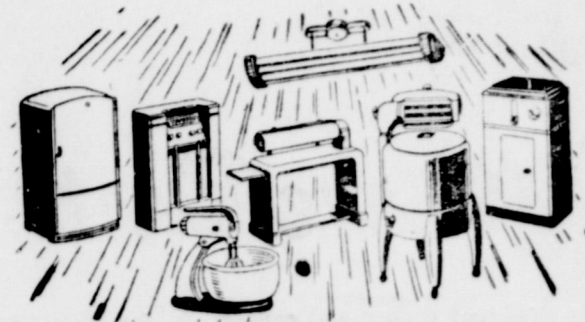
