4 MILLION LIVES SAVED

The 75 per cent reduction in
the TB death rate since the National
Tuberculosis Association was
organized in 1904 and inaugu-
rated its nationwide cam-
paign against the disease rep-
resents a saving of 4,000,000 lives.

This model is a small-scale reproduction of a mobile X-ray unit of the type used by tuberculosis associations in mass case-finding programs. These fully equipped units can be driven from place to place for speedy chest X-rays of large groups of people. Christmas Seal funds support mass case-finding work of tuberculosis associations.

In other words, if deaths from TB had continued at the 1904 rate, 4,000,000 more people would have died of this disease in the intervening years than actually did. Yet tuberculosis still takes the lives of nearly 55,000 Americans a year.

The generally downward trend in the death rate for the past 25 years was broken by slight increases in 1926 and 1936. It is too soon to predict what the 1946 rate will be. Reports for the first three months of the year show an increase of nearly four points over the same period in 1945, possibly due to a wave of respiratory disease at that time.

Tuberculosis associations hope the death rate for the latter part of 1946 will be sufficiently low to offset the rise early in the year. Their work is directed at effecting that decline.

Veterans Administration cleared over 84,000 requests for physical examinations during September for pensions or compensations, the highest total to date.

Approximately 85 per cent of the veterans receiving self-employment allowances from Veterans Administration are farmers.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—If a disabled veteran completed his on-the-job training and is unemployed can he draw unemployment compensation?

A—Yes. Under Public Law 346 (G. I. Bill), he may be entitled to readjustment allowance up to a maximum of 52 weeks provided he is able to, and available for, work at the time. Any prior periods used for such purpose would be deducted from his maximum eligibility.

Q—May the wife or child of a veteran be granted hospital or domiciliary care by Veterans Administration because of the relationship to the veteran?

A—No. Admission to a Veterans Administration hospital or home is based on the service of a person in the armed forces and may be granted only to the persons who served.

Q—Is Veterans Administration issuing prosthetic service cards to amputee veterans?

A—Yes. Veterans wearing artificial limbs and who are entitled to repairs at Government expense may obtain a prosthetic service card. The card enables the veteran to obtain immediate repair service up to a limit of \$35 without prior approval from Veterans Administration.

Q—Is it possible for a disabled veteran taking vocational training under Public Law 16 to make a small loan from the Government?

A—Yes, but loans cannot exceed \$100 and they are made only to veterans approved for vocational rehabilitation when the need is shown.

Q—Am I entitled to an increase in compensation if my service-connected disability has increased since compensation was allowed?

A—Probably. The rate of increase of compensation depends upon the increase in disability as shown by proper examination by a VA physician and evaluation under the rating schedule.

Schools and colleges that must provide additional facilities to train disabled veterans may ask Veterans Administration to pay more than the usual tuition charges for these veterans, VA announced this week.

The adjusted rate, VA said, must not total more than the school's teaching and supply costs.

New regulations providing for adjustments in tuition payments for disabled veterans enrolled under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act apply only to non-profit, tax-supported institutions, VA said.

VA has provided for the adjustment because it recognizes that many schools do not have a flexible income from taxes, endowment and other sources to cover additional expenses incurred during the present rush of thousands of veterans to college.

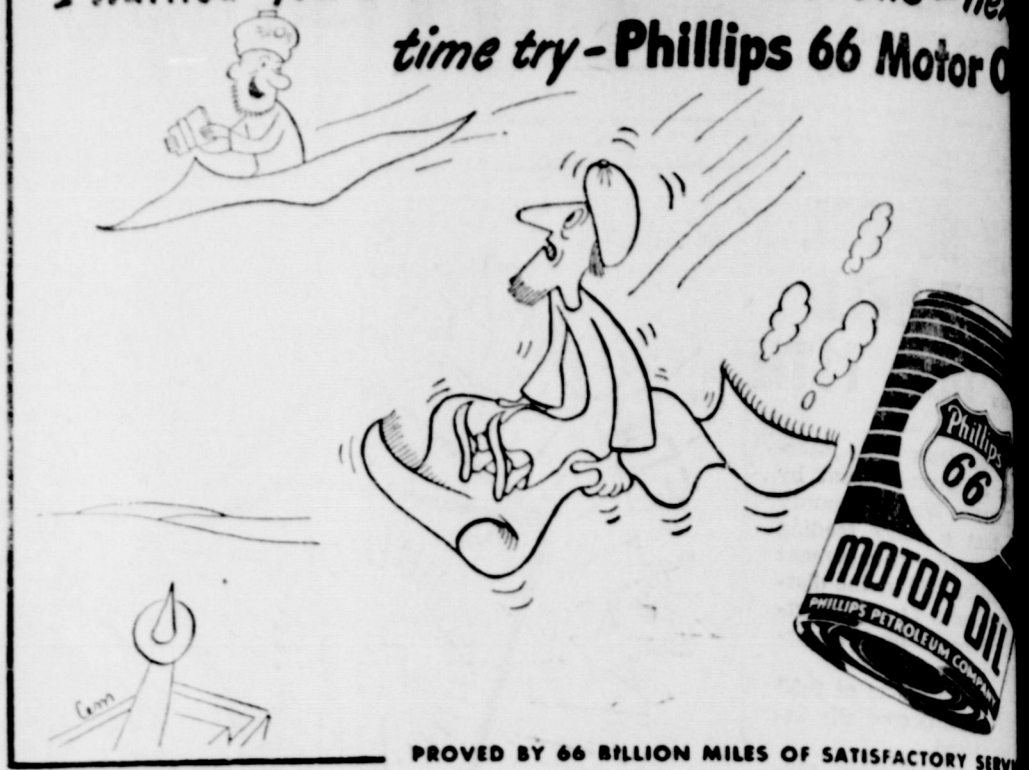

for adjustments in tuition of students enrolled under the GI Bill. Application for adjustment in the rate must be made to the VA regional office having jurisdiction before the beginning of the semester for which the adjustment is asked.

VA is allowing all schools until December 3, however, to submit their requests for adjustments for the present semester if the term began on or after September 1.

GI Bill jobless pay is "so much money in the bank" and should not be consumed indiscriminately, General Omar Bradley told veterans this week.

The Veterans Administration who has always cautioned veterans to use their various benefits efficiently, was referring to Readjustment Allowances of \$20 per week allowed unemployed veterans up to a maximum of 52 weeks.

General Bradley, at a conference of state directors for veterans affairs, also warned that many veterans buying houses on today's market will lose them "when the boom ends."

"We feel many of the loans just won't pan out," he stated. Veterans are very much in need of counsel which can be given to them only in their own communities."

Less than one-half of one per cent of all veterans' loans approved for guaranty by Veterans Administration were in default by the end of September.

Veterans Administration mated the veteran nearly 17,900,000 an increase of more over September 30.

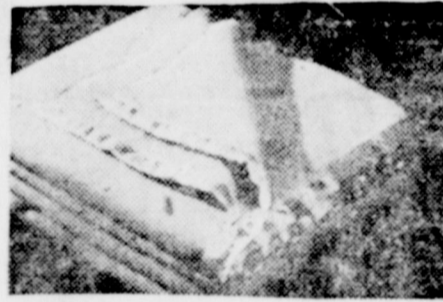

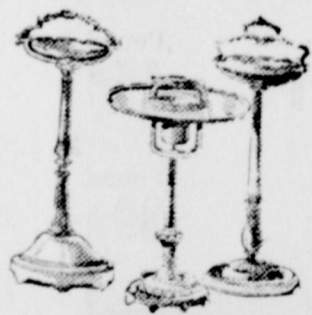

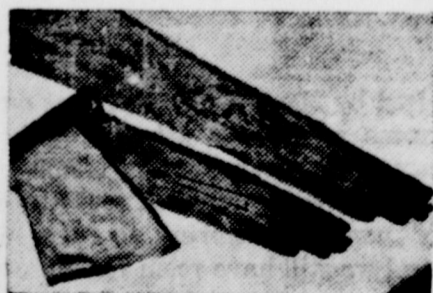

Q. How soon after birth should a dairy calf be removed from the mother?

A. A calf may be removed immediately, but many prefer to have the calf nurse the mother for the first three days, because the first milk, called colostrum, is especially needed by the calf. It is laxative and supplies essential vitamins and factors which build up disease resistance. After the third day, the calf can be started on a dry feed, with limited quantities of milk for the first month.

Q. Is there any way to prevent turkeys flying from the roosts at night and injuring themselves?

A. Stomping at night may be partially controlled by placing lights about the roosting area. Auto truck flares, kerosene lanterns, or electric lights may be used. Only enough light to make a dim glow need be used. The premises should not be brightly illuminated. Moving shadows should be avoided.

Q. How can we get rid of red mites in our pullet house?

A. The Ralston Purina Company puts out an insect oil which when thoroughly painted or sprayed over the roosts, floors, and walls of pullet shelters should eliminate the red mites and keep them down for about a year.

Q. Should mineral supplement be fed to range cattle during the fall and winter months?

A. The New Mexico Experiment Station has found that it is better to feed minerals all year round. Cattle which were fed minerals continuously produced an average of 41 pounds more calf from each cow than those which were fed minerals during the fall and winter only. Moreover, range cattle will consume almost as much minerals during the fall and winter season as when it is supplied the year round. This rapid seasonal use is not as efficient as year round consumption, and, therefore, continuous feeding of mineral supplements will result in a greater net profit at the end of the year.

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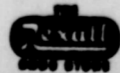
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
