DRILLING SETS FAST PACE IN WHEELER AREA

Drilling operations are on the uptrend in the Wheeler County area locations being made or wells being drilled as far north as Twitty.

Perhaps holding the spotlight in activity is the Tecl-Warren operations on the O'Gorman and Bell land north of Red River. Interest switched to that vicinity several weeks ago when Tecl-Warren No. 1 O'Gorman was drilled in for what at first looked like a 75 to 100 barrel producer but finally leveled off to between 30 and 40 barrels.

Next came the Tecl-Warren No. 1 Bell, an offset to the east of the O'Gorman No. 1, which is producing about 75 barrels, according to unofficial reports. The Tecl-Warren No. 2 Bell, an offset to the north of the No. 1 Bell, is past 2-200 feet.

All of these wells are in section 98 and 99 of block 17, extending the east Shamrock field two miles or more to the north and west.

The Texas Company No. 1 Douglas, eight miles west of Shamrock is holding the interest of all oil men and landowners, too. The well was drilled in last week and swabbed 30 barrels per day after it was acidized. It was to have been "shot" Wednesday in an effort to increase the flow, and the results have not been released.

The well is on the Bob Douglas land, in the northwest quarter of section 36, block 13. It is a direct offset to the south of the Texas Company No. 1 Bills which is one of the better producers in the east field.

The Tecl No. 1 Mitchell, about nine miles northeast of Shamrock, is drilling past 2,000 feet. The location is 330 feet from the south and west lines of the west half of the southwest quarter of section 90, block 13.

Colvin and Colvin, contractors, spudded in the S. D. Johnson No. 1 Wischkaemper last week. The well is nine miles south of Shamrock in the northeast corner of the southeast quarter of section 57, block 16, Collingsworth County. It is on the Edgar Wischkaemper land, and is one mile south of a dry hole drilled a few years ago. A Wichita Falls concern holds the lease.

Another location is the Sinclair-Prairie No. 1 Wattenbarger, about eight miles southeast of Shamrock in Collingsworth County. The location, drilling contract for which has not been let, is on a 7,500-acre block assembled for the Sinclair-Prairie by E. K. Caperton a year ago. Official location is section 74, block 12, Collingsworth County.

Two new gas wells have been drilled in southwest Wheeler County. The latest and biggest is the Texwell Oil Corp. No. 1 Mabel C. Hawk, section 65, block 17. The well gauged 5,900,000 cubic feet of gas when put on test on July 19. The well is 660 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west of section 65, block 17. It was bottomed at 1,973 feet.

The other gasser, drilled in a few weeks ago, is the Texwell Oil Corp. No. 1 C. A. Morgan, which was completed for 900,000 cubic feet. The well is in the southeast quarter of section 68, block 17.

COUNTY HIGH IN BANK DEPOSITS OF PANHANDLE

Wheeler county ranks high in bank deposits among Panhandle counties, according to figures compiled by the Ochiltree County Herald at Perryton. Deposits are given by towns instead of counties because in most Panhandle counties only one town boasts of a bank while in Wheeler county three towns have banking institutions.

Combined deposits of Wheeler county's four banks were \$5,865,747 placing us well among the top 10 counties. By towns Wheeler ranks 25th, Mobeetie 29th and Shamrock 13th.

This information was obtained from a story in last week's Ochiltree County Herald which pointed out that only three towns, Amarillo, Pampa and Borger, have more money than Perryton.

Total bank deposits in 30 towns of the Panhandle were more than two hundred million dollars on June 30. The June 30 statements show little of the tremendous cash income of the 1947 wheat crop, which is expected to add another hundred million dollars to bank deposits in the area.

Amarillo, of course, far outdistances all other Panhandle towns in money, with \$92,000,000 plus on deposit June 30. Pampa ranks next with \$10,000,000 plus Borger, Perryton and Dalhart follow next in the order named.

Sunday's win left Mobeetie in second place in the standings with a record of 11 wins and 3 losses in 14 starts and entitled them to meet the third place team in the 2-out-of-3 play-off series under the Shaughnessy play-off system. The third and fourth teams in the standings, Childress and Memphis, were tied necessitating a flip of the coin to determine which team would occupy third place and the right to meet Mobeetie.

As result of the flip of a coin, Childress and Mobeetie will meet in their first play-off contest on the Mobeetie diamond Sunday afternoon beginning at 3:00 o'clock. Encouragement for home town life encourages people to provide entertainments and activities and leisure that make the home town interesting and attractive.

Advertising has played a wonderful part in national development, in getting people interested in new things, in that they were willing to work hard to earn the money to buy these things.

HIGH STANDARD TOWNS

It is a characteristic of progressive towns that they have certain standards they try to live up to. If the condition of some street or public property is not up to their ideas of what a town like theirs should have, they try to interest people in the idea of improving that feature. They talk about it to their friends, they may even try to get before some local organization.

In a progressive community such as this a group is getting new ideas, and means for improving that condition are discussed. If the idea is practical, there is a good chance that people will be willing in the time to give whatever of time, effort, and money is needed to make that improvement.

HOME CARE STANDARDS

It is a great help in the development of a community if people have a high standard as to the way their homes should be kept. FIXING UP THE HOME

Hand Hint for Housewives
Want to clean the kitchen? Don't forget to clean the garbage can. It will keep it from getting so full that it will overflow. Wash the can out with soap and water. Dry it out with a clean cloth. Then it will be ready to use again.

Household work is often considered the most tedious. The fact is, however, that it can be made much more interesting. Wash windows with hot water and try to get rid of the grease. Use the hot water from the garbage can to wash the windows. It will keep it from getting so full that it will overflow. Wash the can out with soap and water. Dry it out with a clean cloth. Then it will be ready to use again.

A small piece of chain, dropped in a soap solution in your glass coffee maker, will aid in taking off coffee stains. Just swirl it around. Have a "rag bag" in a handy closet. Laundry discarded clothing and cut into handy pieces with a pair of shears. Roll each piece up and it will be easier to select the right one for each job.

Save your old power ruffs. They are the best for absorbing the oil, grease, and dirt from washing machines with small, heated rollers. A small cotton rag, stretched to the bottom, surrounding makes a handy place for bills, notes and general reminders. Have a special one for instructions to the children. If you are away.

If you must potpourri in an aluminum kettle, put a cloth or rubber mat under it on the stove and it will not leave marks.

If you have a fireplace and no handy place nearby for coal, save your paper bags. Fill them with coal and put on the fire as needed. Don't have to coal out or litter around the living room.

Keep cans of paint inside down on a shelf. Turn them rightside up a day before you want to use them and the paint will be well mixed.



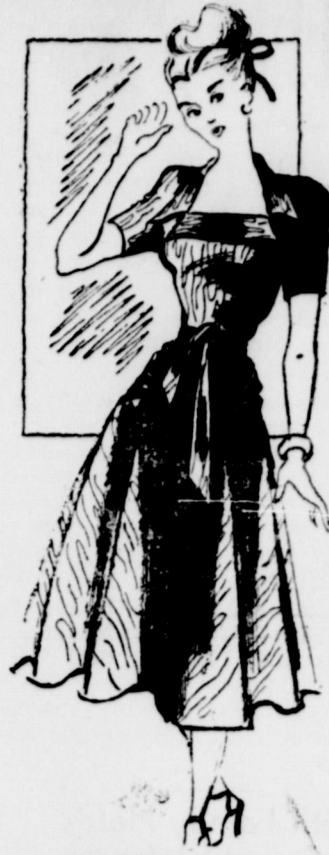

HOME TOWN THOUGHTS

Enthusiasm for the home town is a grand quality. It encourages people to do many things for the development of the home town.

Enthusiasm for home town life encourages people to provide entertainments and activities and features that make the home town interesting and attractive.

Advertising has played a wonderful part in national development, by getting people interested in new things, so that they were willing to work hard to earn the money to buy these things.

HIGH STANDARD TOWNS

It is a characteristic of progressive towns that they have certain standards they try to live up to. If the condition of some street or public property is not up to their ideas of what a town likes theirs should have, they try to interest people in the idea of improving that feature. They talk about it to their friends, they may bring it up before some local organization.

In a progressive community such an idea is likely to get many adherents, and means for improving that condition are discussed. If the idea is practical, there is a good chance that people will be willing in due time to give whatever of time, effort, and money is needed to make that improvement.

HOME CARE STANDARDS

It is a great help in the development of a community, if people have a high standard as to the way their homes should be kept. If they have a strong feeling that their dwelling places should look neat and in good order, they are usually willing and able to devote considerable effort to maintain that appearance, or to spend money to get that result in so



FIXING UP the HOME

Handy Hints for Housewives

WANT TO CLEAN artificial flowers? Dip them up and down in naphtha or a good cleaning fluid. Keep naphtha and gasoline away from open flame and don't rub.

Household wax has many uses around the house. Wax the feet of furniture and it will slide easier. Dust leaves a waxed dustpan much quicker and easier. Waxed window sills look better and they shed water. Wax or paraffin in the bottom of the garbage pail will keep it from rusting and make it easier to clean. Well waxed floors and furniture are easier to wipe up or dust.

A small piece of chain, dropped in a soap solution in your glass coffee maker, will aid in taking off interior stains. Just swish it around.

Have a "rag bag" in a handy closet. Launder discarded clothing and cut into handy pieces with a pair of shears. Roll each piece up and it will be easier to select the right one for each job.

Save your old powder puffs. They are fine for applying shoe polish, cleaning silver and for washing windows with small, leaded panes. A snap clothes pin screwed to the kitchen moulding makes a handy place for bills, notes and general reminders. Have a special one for instructions to the children if you are away.

If you mash potatoes in an aluminum kettle, put a cloth or rubber mat under it on the sink and it will not leave marks.

If you have a fireplace and no handy place nearby for coal, save your paper bags. Fill them with coal and put on the fire as needed. You'll have no coal dust or litter around the living room.

Keep cans of paint upside down on a shelf. Turn them rightside up a day before you want to use them and the paint will be well mixed.

As far as they are able. Every home that is kept up to that high standard is an encouragement to the rest of the people to develop high standards for their own dwellings.

Outing Can Be Dangerous To Softer City Residents

This is the time of the year when most of us—after being more or less house-bound during the winter months just "itch" to get out in the country, picnic on creek banks, gather wild flowers, and take a real hot sun bath. No doubt about it, that is a wonderful program and one to which we are certainly entitled after the often unpleasant weather of winter and early spring. Unfortunately however, there are many who really do itch and burn miserably for days or even weeks because of a few hours spent in the country—all as a result of personal contact with that beautiful but treacherous plant poison ivy, or because they have spent a little too long a time in attempting to acquire a suntan.

Health authorities state that approximately two out of every three persons are susceptible to poison ivy. Remedies and preventives have been the object of extensive search for literally hundreds of years. Methods of treatment have been improved from time to time, but in spite of all the progress made and the introduction of dozens of new remedies, we can but repeat the old statement that the surest prevention for poison ivy infection is to stay away from the plant.

One of the best ways for avoiding poison ivy is to be completely familiar with the appearance of the plant so that we can instantly recognize it. The poison ivy plant has three leaves grouped, two on short stems and the center one on a larger stem. The leaves are a

beautiful dark green and usually notched along the edges, though sometimes they are plain. The leaves are green all summer and in the fall they turn a bright red and yellow. The coloring is so vivid and decorative that many persons not realizing the nature of the plant and the infection it conveys gather the bright leaves to enliven their homes—and in these cases, ignorance cannot be called bliss. The person who gathers the plant will almost invariably find himself a victim of poison ivy infection, resulting in days or weeks of intense discomfort.

Poison ivy grows plentifully all over the United States, from Canada southward down into Mexico. It appears as a low shrub or vine, ranging over fences or trees and sometimes it even appears concentrated into heavy thickets.

The plant bears fruit—little smooth berries about the size of peas. These berries are of a pale green color when unripe, but when they ripen they are ivory white in color, and remembering this will help you to identify the poison ivy plant.

While it is true some persons are more susceptible to the poison than others, it is doubtful that anyone can resist infection from the cream colored juice which exudes from a poison ivy plant when broken. You have no doubt heard lots of people say that they are susceptible to poison ivy without actual contact with the plant but merely by being near it. This is not probable, but it could be possible because of the pollen in the air.

As stated a moment ago, the most

successful method for the prevention of ivy poisoning is to stay away from it. But it is important that that everyone should know of preventive measures that may be successfully used if contact with the plant must occur. It is well worthwhile to attempt to avoid the painful eruptions which spread so easily over large surfaces of the body. In avoiding these eruptions, it is suggested that after contact with the ivy the exposed body surfaces be washed immediately with hot water and soap several times. After drying thoroughly, sponge the places of contact with grain alcohol and water in equal parts. The soapy water will remove most of the poisonous matter and the alcohol will dissolve the remainder. If alcohol is not available, use a tablespoonful of baking soda dissolved in one quart of hot water. This soda wash is also useful after the inflammation has appeared. It is very soothing and will help in relieving the discomfort.

If you happen to touch poison ivy while out in the country where hot water and soap are not available, gasoline will be found useful in dissolving the resinous poison.

The symptoms of ivy poisoning vary from a slight redness of the skin to exaggerated swelling, and extensive blisters, and in mild cases, the skin is covered with tiny blisters which form close together and which burn and itch almost constantly.

Nowadays, physicians can do much to alleviate the discomfort of ivy poisoning. Treatment is effective in relieving the itching, drying the blisters, and preventing the spread of the rash and secondary infections. Many years ago, ointments and oils were used, but today doctors recommend the use of preparations which are drying. It is always advisable to consult the family physician and follow his directions.

If the poison ivy plant makes its appearance on your home grounds, it should be destroyed as quickly as possible. The sap of the poison ivy flows the year around making it necessary for those who attempt to eradicate this plant to use every precaution against infection. This is much more difficult than it sounds, since gardening tools may be contaminated and when handled spread the poison. After tools are used to cut down poison ivy, they should be washed in strong soap suds and the cleaning rags burned. Clothing and shoes that have come in contact with the plant should also be thoroughly washed.

Agriculture recommends the destruction of the poison ivy plant by means of a salt spray using a solution of three pounds of salt to one gallon of water. It may be necessary to use the spray repeatedly to kill out any shoots as they appear. If the vine is growing on fences and trees, it is best to cut it below the ground and saturate the roots with brine. This should be followed with a second brine solution two weeks later. The Department of Agriculture also recommends kerosene oil as an effective spray if one or two thorough applications are made.

When spraying salt solution or kerosene oil, care should be taken not to spray cultivated plants nearby, else they, too, will be destroyed. Calcium chloride—Not calcium chloride, which is sometimes bought by mistake—is often found effective in destroying poison ivy and it, too, should be used as a spray with a solution of one pound to one or two gallons of water. The safest time to destroy poison ivy is in the fall or winter when it can be burned. However, be sure to keep out of the way of the smoke. The thick heavy smoke and ash particles

which float in the air when poison ivy plants are burned sometimes carry and spread the infection.

Let me emphasize again the wisdom of learning to recognize the poison ivy plant—by its three beautiful green leaves in the summer, and in winter by the yellowish white berries. STAY AWAY FROM IT. If outdoor work necessarily brings you near poison ivy, protect yourself in every way possible. With poison ivy, as with communicable diseases, prevention is best accomplished by staying away from it.

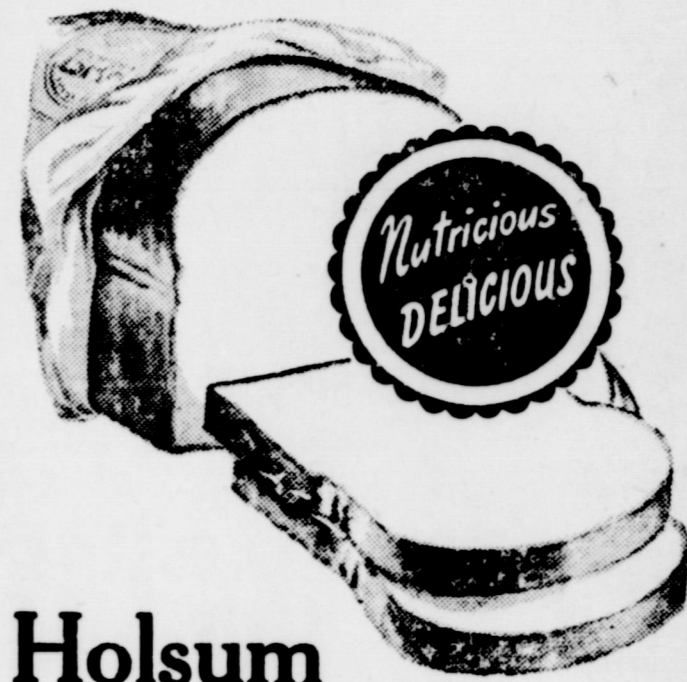
The same principle of prevention will apply to another one of the summer's most common discomforts, sunburn. Many vacationists discover that they cannot acquire a coat of tan. There are certain individuals who do not tan, never did, and never will. This type of person will find that in spite of his exposure to sunlight, his skin will only redden, blister burn, and peel but never tan. If you discover by experience that your skin is unable to manufacture the pigment which imparts a tan or brown appearance, you will do well to save yourself

unnecessary exposure to strong sunlight.

Prolonged exposure to the sun's rays may cause any one of three conditions—sunstroke, sunburn, or suntan. These three conditions are entirely different in their effect on the human body. Sunburn is often very painful and sometimes quite dangerous. If one-half, or more of the body surface is sunburned to the extent of forming blisters, serious illness and even death may result. Even a mild sunburn which causes only a slight redness of the skin without forming blisters is extremely dangerous if it affects the entire skin surface.

Sunstroke is not a rare occurrence in the temperate zone. There were 90 deaths caused by sunstroke in one year in New York City alone. Medical authorities agree that sunstroke is very likely to affect those who have been drinking alcoholic beverages. It has been said that alcohol and gasoline do not mix. That same thing applies to alcohol and sunlight.

An attack of so-called beach sickness is not always due to indigestion or over indulgence in hastily prepared picnic foods. The headache, lizziness, and nausea are symptoms which often precede the sunstroke. (Continued on next Page)

When these symptoms occur, their warning should be heeded. Withdraw from the sunlight and cool off the body with whatever means there may be readily available.

The ultra-violet light in the sun's rays is most intense from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. standard time. If you wish to avoid severe sunburn, protect yourself from the sunlight between these hours. The safest way to obtain a suntan is to begin with a five minute exposure before 10:00 a.m. and increase the time of exposure to ten minutes each day. At the end of ten days, a light tan is achieved without any burning of the skin and one may now safely indulge in longer exposures. It can readily be understood that a two-week vacation period is too short a time in which to hope for the deep mahogany tan of a lifeguard who may have taken ten years to acquire it.

When sunburn is of the first degree, it simply causes a redness of the skin without blister formation. For this mild type of sunburn, there are several remedies which afford relief. The application of boric acid ointment or a mixture of equal parts of linseed oil and lime water will soothe and heal the inflamed skin. If, however, the burn is of

second degree, with blisters appearing, it is not advisable to attempt self-treatment. This condition is very serious and requires the attention of a physician in order to avert dangerous complications.

Here is a set of five rules which will prove beneficial to those who wish to avoid the dangers of sunburn and helpful to those who desire to acquire a suntan.

1. Acquire a coat of tan, if possible, by means of repeated short exposures.
2. If your skin will not tan, you should not expose yourself since every new exposure means a new burn.
3. Do not sleep on the beach in the direct rays of the sun.
4. When fishing or sailing, remember that the water reflects the ultra-violet light which may burn you.
5. During August protect yourself from the direct rays of the sun, especially when the body is wet, for a severe case of sunburn may cause serious illness and even death.

By the way, in passing, I might remind you that it is a great mistake to sprinkle perfume or toilet water on the skin before exposure to the sunlight as it may produce a severe inflammation of the skin, called perfume dermatitis. This condition consists of redness and swelling of the skin, accompanied by

smarting and stinging pain. It may persist for several weeks and even finally require the attention of a doctor.

There are several of the dangers that may result from exposure to the summer sun, and I have dwelt on them rather than the benefits, because I realize that it is not necessary for me to dwell on the benefits derived from the hours spent out in the open. The fact that the sun's ultra-violet rays possess valuable health-giving properties is doubtless what makes so many persons over-expose themselves to strong sunlight. It is very foolish to believe that because small quantities of sunlight may be beneficial, too much sunlight can not be equally harmful. Such an idea is as imprudent as to think that because small quantities of

certain drugs are beneficial in some diseases, you can take large quantities of them without being fatally poisoned.

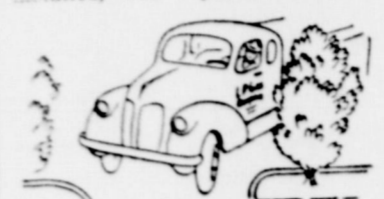

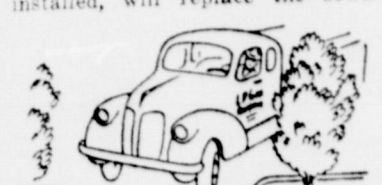

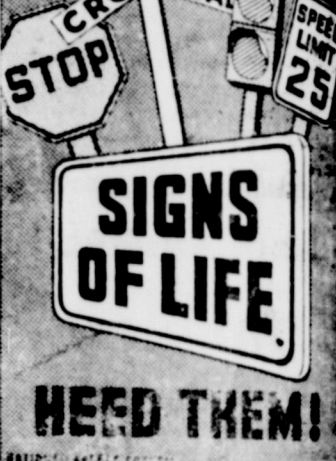

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Q. Shouldn't calves vaccinated for Starg's disease stop reacting to the test? A. About 1% of the calves vaccinated do not stop reacting. These should not be bred, and if they continue to react until they are 24 months of age, they should be culled. Q. Just how effective is D-D as a weed killer? Does it increase the yield per acre to any appreciable extent? A. According to a carefully conducted experiment made at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company recently, there was an increase of 2 1/2 tons of grain per acre in seven weeks as a result of pasture weed control with D-D spray. Before the test, samples of weeds and grasses were taken from all pasture plots. Weeds and grasses which weighed separately averaged 67% weeds and 33% grasses on all plots. Seven weeks after the treatment of some of the plots with Purina Weed Killer, samples were taken again with the result that untreated plots averaged 32% weeds and 68% grasses while plots treated with D-D Weed Killer averaged 87% grasses and only 13% weeds. The weeds included very troublesome weeds, such as cockle, dock and plantain. The grasses were timothy, red top, blue grass and lespedeza. Q. If sheep are sprayed with DDT, will the lice have to be sprayed again in the warehouse to keep the mites out? A. No, Dr. Leonard Haseman of the University of Missouri has advised against the use of DDT on sheep. Dr. Haseman says that the DDT is not only poisonous against mites but also to the sheep. Q. When breed of chickens holds the record for egg production in maintaining egg laying systems? A. The all time record was made in 1943 by a Rhode Island Red which laid 311 eggs.

Veterans' News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS Q-I am an honorably discharged World War II veteran and would like to know where I can secure specific information concerning readjustment allowances while I am unemployed? A-You should inquire at the public employment office or at the office of the unemployment compensation agency in the state or territory in which you reside. Q-Are there any penalties in case the veteran accepts readjustment allowance to which he is entitled? A-Any veteran who knowingly accepts an allowance to which he is not entitled shall be ineligible to receive further readjustment allowances. Furthermore anyone who receives money check or allowance under the readjustment allowance provisions of the law, to which he is not entitled and with intent to defraud the U. S., shall be punished by fine of not more than \$1,000 or one year in prison or both. Q-What interest rates are lenders permitted to charge on G. I. loans? A-In most cases, 4 per cent is the maximum. However, the interest rate may be slightly higher for certain types of insured business loans. Q-In order to get a business loan under the G. I. Bill, will I have to operate the business myself? A-Yes, the veteran must devote his personal labor or supervision to the enterprise, or to the practice of a profession, on a full or part time basis. Military personnel being separated from the armed forces may get their terminal leave orders as a basis for obtaining a temporary six-month certificate of eligibility for education or training under the G. I. Bill, the Veterans Administration has announced. Under the new plan, if the applicant's orders reflect at least eight days of terminal leave, it will not be necessary for VA to check his service records to determine eligibility before authorizing matriculation in an educational institution or training establishment. However, these applicants are not eligible for subsistence allowance until they have been discharged formally, VA said. The temporary certificates of eligibility will be replaced by the regular forms after the veteran's exact period of entitlement has been determined. About two out of every three of the 1,821,000 veterans recently enrolled in educational institutions under the G. I. Bill are taking

courses leading to definite job objectives, VA reports. VA arrived at this conclusion from a sampling of the records of veterans who were enrolled in schools, colleges, universities and other institutions on May 1. Engineering ranked first with 229,000 students, and crafts and trades was second with 208,300 students. Third in popularity were commercial courses with 154,000 students. Business administration was fourth with 146,400 students. Those courses which VA considers as not generally falling within a definite job objective classification include liberal arts, physical and natural science, elementary school courses, and others. Liberal arts courses accounted for the largest number of enrollees—392,500—in the latter group. Veterans enrolled in other courses included: agriculture, 518; art, 42,000; education, 33,233; medicine, 59,316; the arts, 8,979; journalism, 10,514; 22,338; natural science, 22,338; social studies, 35,124.

Older and displaced persons seem to be more certain of welcome in Australia and New Zealand than in America at present moment. . . . In Vietnam the Anglicans, Presbyterians, Methodists, Congregationalists, Church of Christ, and the Salvation Army have jointly formed an "Inter-Church Migration Committee" to assist newly-arrived immigrants in Australia. . . . Work with the Minister of Immigration. First to be aided are 3,000 refugees from Holland including 2,000 Polish and 1,000 Jews. In New Zealand, one of the synods of the Anglican (Episcopal) Church recently voted that a few immigrants are to be selected from Great Britain and displaced persons from other parts of the world should be welcomed and "encouragement given them likely to be completely met in our population."

Over one half million people were working on farms in the United States on July 1. Farm wages average \$114 per month on the board.

The special election will determine the adoption or rejection of the following amendment to the constitution:

Proposing an amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding Sections 17 and 18 providing for the levying of a state ad valorem tax on property in lieu of the present state ad valorem tax of Seven (7c) Cents for Confederate pensions in order to create special funds necessary for the payment of Confederate pensions and for the financing of the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning, in the amounts of Two (2c) Cents and Five (5c) Cents respectively; providing for a Five Cent reduction of the maximum allowable state tax on property, making such tax not to exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation, providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of improvements and buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas.
