

Rig Being Put Up For Important Oil Test To Be Made 2 Miles North

The eyes of Wheeler and vicinity are centered on a spot two miles north of town on the farm of Mrs. Sallie Higgins McCorrigan, better known as the "Deer" Wright place, where a rig is being put up to make an important oil test.

A block of 5,500 acres has been leased and an independent company, headed by J. E. Trigg, M. D. Fidler and W. N. Hays of Oklahoma City, has contracted to drill to a depth of not less than 5,000 feet and possibly 7,000.

Location of the test is the N.W. corner of section 25, Block 14, H&G Ry. survey. It is one mile north of a test made on the S. T. Morgan place in July, 1937, which was abandoned at a depth of 4,014 feet.

Acres for the test was worked up by R. D. Holt, Harry Wofford and S. D. Conwell.

Aubrey Caudell Is First Veteran In Region To Buy Farm With FSA Loan

Aubrey S. Caudell of Wheeler county who left a family of six children to volunteer in the U. S. Navy on April 14, 1942, is the first veteran in region 12, comprising 40 counties, to get a loan through Farm Security Administration with which to buy a farm.

Rated as a medalist, first class, Caudell was discharged on August 11, 1944. On Friday, Nov. 23, past, he secured the Spencer Davis farm, three and one-half miles of Briscoe, where he and his family plan to spend their future years and repay their loan which the government granted them.



Back home after serving nearly five years in the army is Cpl. Johnnie D. Taylor of Pampa, husband of the former Marion Cooper of Wheeler, and brother of Mrs. Wayne Morris of Wheeler and Mrs. Jim Thurmond of Pampa. Taylor and his wife and three-year-old son, Rickey, plan to make their home in Pampa. He reached the States the first week of November after serving two and a half years in the Pacific theatre. He was with the famous Sixth Division all the way through, seeing plenty of action and helping to liberate thousands of prisoners in the Philippines. As decorations and citations he holds the Asiatic Pacific Theatre Ribbon, Philippine Liberation Ribbon, with three battle stars and the Bronze Arrowhead.

The average person must feel it is one thing right after another at this time of the year in the way of appeals for various funds, and there have been an unusually large number of requests for donations recently but there is a campaign in progress deserving the support of every family in Wheeler county.

We refer to the Christmas Seal sale of the Wheeler County Tuberculosis association which is seeking funds with which to fight the spread of TB at home and over the nation. Sheets of the Seals sell for \$1.00 (or more if you care to give it) and 80 per cent of the funds remain in Wheeler county. There are few, if any, families in the county which could not afford to spend one dollar, knowing it might help save the life of a child.

Christmas Seal Bonds are also being issued to individuals or firms wishing to buy \$5, \$10 or \$20 worth of Seals. Checks may be mailed to the Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association, Wheeler, Texas, and the Seals in whatever amount you specify will be mailed you. Dr. H. E. Nicholson is president of the association, County Judge Geo. W. Hefley is treasurer and Harry Wofford is secretary. Flake George of Shamrock is vice president and there are directors scattered all over the county.

Wheeler people had bought \$227 worth of Seals up to Wednesday, most of that coming from business firms buying large amounts. Briscoe had sent in \$70, Kelton \$60 and Allison \$11.50. No report was available on the sale at Shamrock or other communities.

The county association has set its minimum quota at \$1,200 and hopes to sell twice that amount.

CAPPER'S USES COUNTY STORY

The highly effective regrassing program being carried out by I. T. Goodnight on his place near Mobeetie in Wheeler county, is described in a story in the December issue of Capper's Farmer entitled "Bermuda 8 Times as Good."

"One acre of Bermuda grass has been producing as much pasture as 8 acres of native grasses on the Goodnight sandy soils," says the story in the nationally circulated farm magazine, "so he has a regrassing program under way." "He lists land on the contour so it will save all the moisture and soil, then drops shaken-out roots in the furrows and covers them enough to give the plants a start. Ten acres of land sodded to Bermuda are sandbars on Sweetwater creek. This grass gets more moisture in dry times than upland grass, and supplies grazing when other pasture is dried up.

"Part of the sloping land listed was planted to Bermuda and the other permitted to go back to wild grass. Bermuda stands trampling, which damages native grass badly on Goodnight's sandy soil," the article continues.

Wheeler county farmers and ranchmen will elect community ACA committeemen and delegates to a county convention during the first week of December, V. B. Hardcastle of Wheeler, administrative officer of the Wheeler County ACA, has announced.

"More responsibility is placed on local, county and community committeemen in 1946 than ever before," he said. "This group, assisted by other agricultural workers, will determine how the county allotment will be spent, select the practices suitable to the county, issue the prior approvals for use of the practices on individual farms and ranches, and will check the practices to see that the specifications set up have been met."

All polling places will open at 9 a. m., and close at 5 p. m. and ballots may be cast any time between those hours as tickets will be available for voting as in any other election.

In each community, farmers will elect three regular committeemen and two alternates. Elected at the same time will be delegates to a county convention, to be held later, where a county committee will be elected for the coming year.

Hardcastle said approximately 1200 farmers are eligible to cast ballots in community elections. This number includes all farmers who are cooperating in the agricultural conservation or crop insurance programs.

Discussing the role of community committeemen, Hardcastle pointed out that soil and water conservation will continue to loom large among AAA program objectives. Under next year's program, funds will be allocated to each county, and committeemen will have more responsibility in helping their neighbors to round out soil-building plans for individual farms within the scope of approved practices. This is only one of the programs for which committeemen have a great responsibility.

He was awarded the American Defense Service Medal, European-African-Middle Eastern campaign ribbons with five bronze stars, good conduct medal, distinguished unit badge and bronze arrowhead.

It can scarcely be denied, in a
day when the press agent has
practically inherited the earth,
that even the church could use a
little more spectacular promotion
than it has been getting. At least
the Church of England seems to
be convinced of that fact when it
decides to spend \$4,000,000 on an
advertising program.

Some may think that "spectacular
promotion" is an ill-chosen,
irrelevant phrase to apply to the
church. But it should not be
forgotten that the spectacular had its
part in winning many early
converts to Christianity.

Today it is the scientists, not
the saints, who are performing the
miracles. Theirs seldom have any
such emotional impart as did the
miracles of the saints. But for the
type that can be explained though
seldom understood, the scientists'
miracles are wonderful. They can
kill or cure us, save us time and
labor, make us more comfortable,

provide us with more and more
leisure of a more and more
luxurious type.

But they can't make us better
men and women. Christian ethics
can. However, the church's gently
persuasive message to that effect
keeps getting drowned out. It is
just too quiet to be heard above
all the shouts of praise about the
wonderful, push-button, vitamin-
enriched, postwar world into
which we have emerged.

So the Church of England is
going to get right into the arena
and battle it out, slogan for slogan.
What techniques the church
will use remain to be seen, but
they have made known their
intention of using radio and motion
pictures as well as periodicals and
newspapers.

We sincerely hope that the
campaign will be so well done and
successful that the idea will
spread. Perhaps over here the
advertisers of more mundane things
might even pitch in and help, just
as they helped the government in
its various war drives.

Certainly something has got to
be done to make the human race
slow up and let its behavior catch
up with its material progress.
Four million dollars spent by the
Church of England won't put on
the brakes but it might be a start.

If the church could trumpet
through Christendom and beyond
the indisputable fact that men
must mend their ways and develop
some genuine charity and
humility and good will if they want
to survive on this planet, and if the
church could trumpet it loudly
enough to make all men listen,
maybe the push-button world
ahead would be as pleasant as is
promised.
