Passons stated that the funeral home did not give the exact date when the body was returned to the United States, but stated that a memorial service will be held when it did arrive.

## Soil Conservation District Supervisors To Be Elected May 29

The election of supervisors for the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District has been changed from Saturday May 15 as announced in last week's issue of the Times to Saturday, May 29, according to word from Billy Cantrell and Albert Scribner, duly appointed supervisors of precincts number two and four, Shamrock and Mobeetie.

Cantrell and Scribner stated that this change was to keep it legal, since they have been informed by the State Soil Conservation Board that two weeks public notice is necessary prior to holding an election of supervisors.

The place and time of the election has been announced as follows:

- Precinct one (Wheeler Area) At Wheeler County Courthouse at 1:30 p. m. May 29.
- Precinct three (Pakan, Heald, Kellerville Area) At Pakan school at 1:30 p. m. May 29.
- Precinct five (Allison Area) Jones Implement Co., Allison at 1:30 p. m. May 29.

## GRASS HELPS TO HOLD MOISTURE

Range management begins at the grass roots — the vegetation cover on the range says Tom Laman, vice-chairman of the Wheeler County Agricultural Conservation Committee. Conservation practices stressed under the agricultural conservation program, he points out, means production of the land and water resources resulting in a sustained production of meat and wool.

In the first place, the vice-chairman points out, vegetative cover—grass and shrubs—helps hold moisture. The vegetation breaks the force of falling rain and the top-soil is not bombarded as it would be without cover. Old growth that has been allowed to die down and accumulate as litter on the ground between plants, helps soak up the moisture. The soil doesn't puddle so that it becomes waterlogged. Roots of the plants keep the soil during rains and spring run-offs means more water for livestock later on the season from springs and seeps. It also means more water for irrigation and household uses on the farms and in the towns depending on the watershed.

More grass through the season and a dependable water supply means greater livestock production, the vice-chairman states.

Where about 50 percent of the growth is allowed to die back each fall livestock do better and there is enough reserve stored in the roots for a good growth the next year. Where too much of the live plant is eaten off by overgrazing is continued the more palatable plants die out and the poorer feed the soil is left unprotected erosion flood damage increases.

The Agricultural Conservation Program, the chairman points out, provides and effective means for ranchers and the public to cooperate in carrying out conservation practices which bring about the desired balance of vegetation on the range land. "It doesn't mean misuse, but sensible use, for continued production," the vice-chairman states.

Millard Murphey, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Tucumcari, N. M., in charge of the services. Margaret Orenda Pettit was born August 21, 1884 and passed away May 12, 1948 at the age of 63 years, 8 months and 21 days. Interment will be in the Llano Cemetery in Amarillo.

## CITY TO OFFER SPECIAL RATE

As an inducement to the residents of the City of Wheeler to grow more beautiful flowers and lawns and for those who wish to water gardens, the city council is offering a special summer rate on water.

Under the special summer rate, residents of Wheeler will be allowed a minimum of 7,000 gallons of water for a minimum fee of \$3.00 per month and all over that amount will be billed at 20c per 1,000 gallons, while under the regular rate the minimum is 3,000 gallons for a minimum fee of \$2.00 per month with the next 2,000 gallons going at 40c per thousand and all over that at 25c per thousand gallons.

## GINNINGS SHOW GAIN IN 1947

Preliminary figures show the 1947 cotton production in Wheeler County as 7,125 running bales as compared with 6,303 bales ginned in 1946. Ray L. Miller, Dallas Regional Director of the Department of Commerce Field Service has announced. The figures were compiled by the Census Bureau of the Department of Commerce and final statistics will be released later, Mr. Miller stated.

The 1947 cotton production in Texas was 3,306,882 running bales as compared with 1,635,178 bales ginned in 1946. Lubbock County produced 180,935 bales which was more than three times the county's 1946 production.

The Census figures revealed that Lamb County was in second place in 1947 with 115,162 bales. In third place was Cameron County with 111,188 bales compared with 87,794 bales in 1946.

If you have never had a number and intend to go to work, apply for one. Ask at the post office for the form to apply for an original or a duplicate number and mail it to the Social Security Administration, Amarillo. Be ready with your card as your employer will not put you to work without one.

## FARM AND HOME TIED TOGETHER

The farm home and the farm land are closely tied together when it comes to this matter of conservation of the soil and water, said Gene Shaffer, chairman of the Wheeler County Agricultural Conservation Committee, in commenting on the values of programs and projects to improve farm homes.

When the farm family begins to fix up and clean up around the farmstead it's usually an indication they intend to stay and make the farm their home. And now that electricity is making it possible for farm families to have refrigerators, deep freezers, electric stoves, radios and other conveniences which have been considered available only to their city cousins, there is a greater desire to make a home on the farm. Farm women can have some of the conveniences they've wanted for a long time.

The chairman believes that the bringing of electricity to the farm along with the conveniences that go with it lends itself to greater permanency on the farm. Stability of farm occupancy makes possible the crop rotations and other practices which aid present and future production on the farm.

Because of this, the chairman believes, the work of the Rural Electrification Administration with its program of bringing electricity to the farm is aiding in conserving the nation's soil. REA is especially important in the chairman's opinion because it is pioneering in this field.

## LOAN COTTON BE POOLED AUG. 1

Cotton farmers of Wheeler County who have government loans on their 1947 crop cotton are being reminded that all 1947 crop loan cotton still under loan on August 1, 1948, will be pooled by Commodity Credit Corporation for the producers' accounts. This includes American-Egyptian as well as upland cotton.

Gene Shaffer, Chairman of the Wheeler County Agricultural Conservation Committee, said that 1947 crop loan cotton still under CCC loan that is not redeemed by August 1, 1948, will be placed in pools and sold in an orderly manner by CCC. After July 31, 1948, producers will not be entitled to order the sale of the cotton. The loans mature on that date.

He explained that when all the cotton in the pools has been sold the net proceeds, if any, after deductions of all advances, interest and accrued costs will be distributed among the producers whose cotton was placed in the pools. Distribution will be made on the basis of the amount of the loans on the cotton placed in the pools. No payment will be made to pro-

Warmer spring days call for lighter foods to tempt winter-laced appetites and Salmon Parsley Souffle is a simple, satisfying dish. Drain a 1-lb. can salmon (about 2 cups), reserving liquid. Flake fish into 1-qt. casserole. Melt 3 tbsp. margarine in sauce pan, blend in 1/2 cup melted butter and cook about one minute over low flame. Add 1 cup milk and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Then blend in 1 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper. Combine half this sauce with salmon liquid. Pour over salmon in casserole. Stir remaining sauce into 3 slightly-beaten egg yolks. Fold in the stiffly-beaten egg whites and 1 cup chopped parsley or watercress. Pour over salmon. Bake at low temperature of 325° for 30 mins. Serves 6.

The thermostat of an automatic gas water heater is usually set at 120°. It wastes gas to use hot water at a higher temperature than ordinarily needed. But for the hot water necessary for such jobs as laundering and household cleaning, a turn of the dial will give you hotter water quickly. Later, to save gas, it can be turned back.

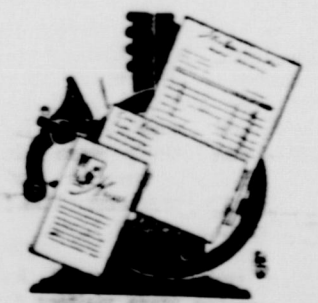

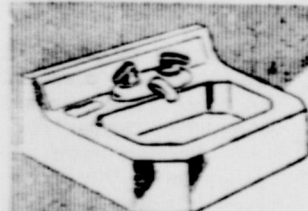

**Shelterbelts Should Not Be Plowed Under**

Plowing up trees in the shelterbelt area of Texas isn't good ranching, but the present high prices of farm products have caused some farmers to plow up their windbreaks, and put the land back into soil-eroding crops, reports James M. Carpenter, Knox county agent.

Sodie Sanders of Knox City has different ideas on the windbreak situation. He has seen what his shelterbelt is doing to save his farm land. Recent dust storms have shown Sanders that he was on the right tract in his belief that more shelterbelts are needed.

This year, instead of plowing up his trees, he planted 1,000 more—500 red cedars and 500 desert willows. And if he thinks he will need more later on, he will plant additional seedlings.

Windbreaks are not a cure-all for the dust storms in the Plains area, but they will help. In the many shelterbelt plantings made from Canada to Texas, a few defects are showing up. Some of these trees were planted too close, which prevented cultivation of the land over a long enough period. And often there was a poor choice of species. Some of these belts were poorly located. A good windbreak is only two or three rows wide, made up of two tree rows and a shrub row outside.

Many foresters believe there were not enough plantings on suitable soils for all-purpose uses. Narrow protection belts are needed along some of the river and creek banks. Some of the most valuable woodlots are found in these locations on the plains.

Interest in gaining in planting windbreaks in the Plains states, says C. W. Simmons, extension forester of Texas A. and M. College. "It is good to know at this time that more people like County Agent Carpenter and Sodie Sanders are putting on their thinking caps now to do the future job right."

Inside that shell is found high quality protein, iron, vitamin A, two of the B vitamins and some vitamin D.

An egg is one of the top quality grades—AA or A—has a large amount of firm white and a round

upstanding yolk. Eggs of these grades are preferred for poaching, frying and boiling in the shell. Grade B eggs have thinner whites and somewhat flatter yolks, but are just as good for scrambling, baking and other cooking purposes.

Many families find it pays to buy grade B eggs for general cooking because they offer the same food value, yet may cost 10 to 12 cents a dozen less than grade A quality eggs of the same weight.

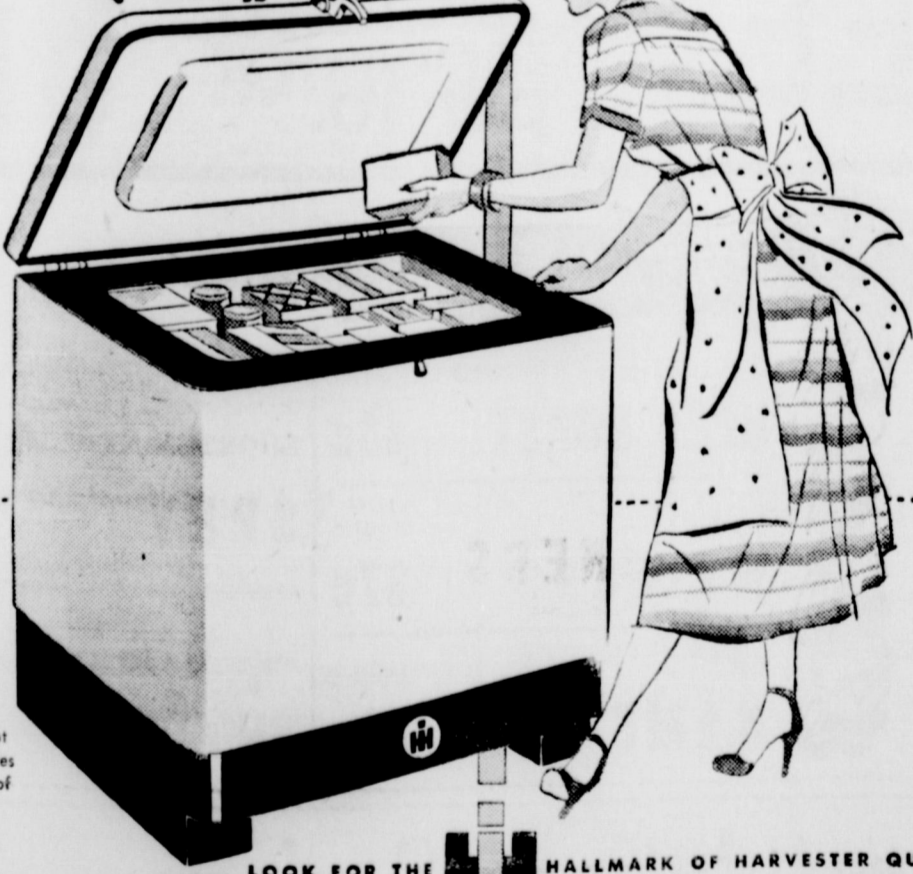

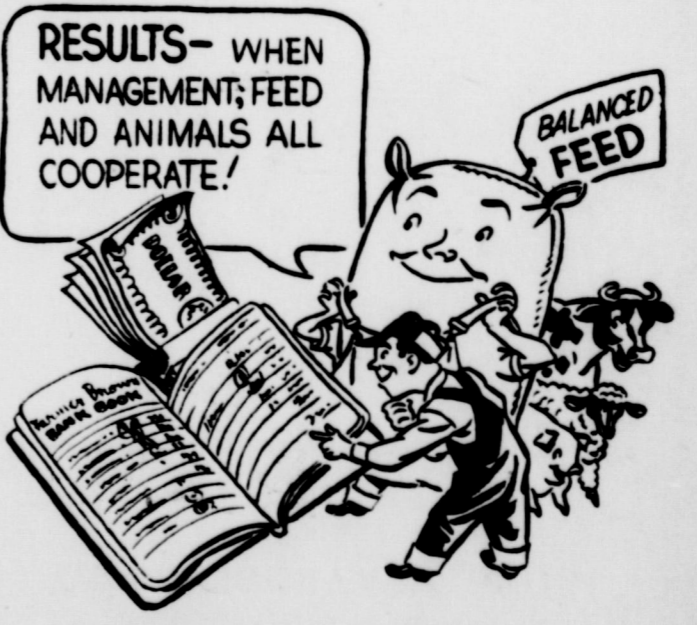

Then we see, looking stunning

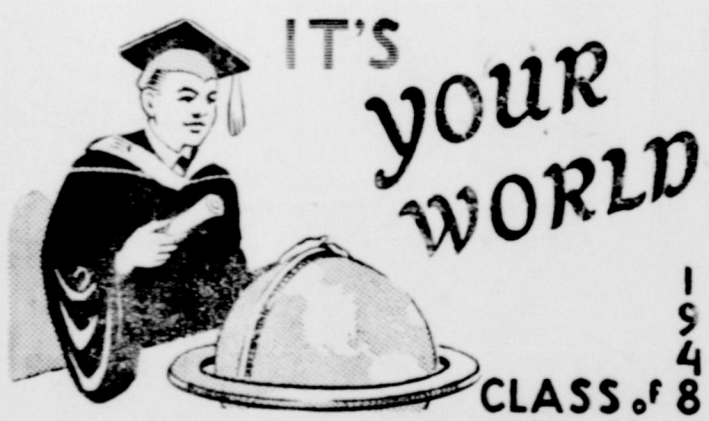

About the most discouraging person we've ever seen was the fellow who had written a long overdue letter, and then lost it before getting it mailed.

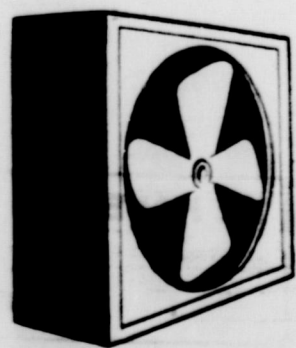

**FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING**

Q. How much floor space do broilers need?

A. There should be one square foot of floor space per chick when no outside yards are used. When outside yards are available, slightly less house space will be necessary. Broiler raisers have found that it pays to give the birds plenty of room. Where the chicks are crowded, mortality and vices increase, and growth decreases.

Q. How important is pasture in raising hogs?

A. Although fine hogs can be raised without pasture, authorities are agreed on the advantages and great economic value of good hog pastures. Green pasture is one of the best and cheapest sources of vitamin A as well as other essential nutrients and is a big factor in maintaining the health and breeding efficiency of the hog herd and in producing rapid and economical gains. The use of good pasture results, too, in an important saving of grain.

Q. Do dairy goats need browse?

A. No. An experiment at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company clearly indicates that browse does not supply any factor or factors necessary for milking goats that may not be supplied by alfalfa hay and grasses fed with a properly balanced grain ration. Dairy goats relish browse but do not require it.

Q. How much range do turkeys need?

A. It is generally recommended that 100 turkeys up to 16 weeks of age have one-half acre of land, with an additional half acre from 16 weeks to market. The requirements will vary, however, with the type of soil, topography, crop grown, weather conditions, presence or absence of disease, etc.

**Now Is The Time To Control Grasshoppers**

With the exception of South Texas where young hoppers have been reported feeding on young grain sorghum, no grasshopper damage has taken place so far this year. Grasshoppers have just about finished hatching out, and haven't had time to do any damage to the crops.

Paul Gregg, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. and M. College, says the best time to control the hoppers is right now while they are young. It costs less to control the young hoppers in or near their hatching beds, and it is easier to kill the young ones than the large, full grown ones. Gregg suggests that each farmer examine the areas where the grasshoppers hatch out on his farm and apply control measures now while the hoppers are small. Get them before they have a

chance to damage the crops. In those counties where the hoppers are a problem the local county agent has bait material on hand for mixing poison bait. For those farmers that want to control grasshoppers with one of the new organic dusts, contact the county agent first. He can give you the information on the use of the new materials.

Gregg gives the following list of new insecticides for grasshopper control: BHC (benzene hexachloride), 12 pounds of 3 percent gamma per acre; toxaphene, 10 pounds of 20 percent dust per acre; and chlordane or 1068, 15 pounds of 10 percent chlordane per acre.
