For Judge of Court of Criminal Appeals, Graves received 842 to Myres' 833; Railroad Commissioner (reg. term), Ernest Thompson 1,435, Tom Blakey 580; Railroad Commissioner (unex. term) Austin 712, Murray 509, Moore 364; Treasurer, James 1,021, Lloyd 659; State Comptroller, Sheppard 1,608, Butler 341; Land Commissioner, Giles 1,211, Smith 302, Mayfield 188, Robison 93.

Editorial

CHEAPER MEAT NOT IN SIGHT

Nearly every housewife, finding it difficult to get the desired quantity of beef, pork and other meats, knows that there is a relation between the corn crop and the available supply of meat.

Despite the prospective record corn crop, that is estimated to be forty percent above the yield of 1947, there is no reason to expect immediate benefits in terms of meat and prices. While the large supply of corn will be encouraging, in the long run, early declines in prices are expected to be seasonal.

In addition, the experts point out that farmers will probably hold back large numbers of hogs that would normally go to slaughter. In other words, with ample feed supplies, the farmer will hold back his animals for additional fattening. The same reasoning applies to cattle. It should be noted, however, that the fattening process of hogs and cattle will increase the supply of meat for next year.

Housewives should also understand that officials of the meat-packing companies say that the final arbiter of prices of meat is the buying public. Their function, as sellers of meat, is to get rid of supplies at the best price the public will pay. If the public stops paying the high prices, the price of meat will inevitably decline.

A CRIME TO LISTEN

In Hungary, it is a crime to listen to the "Voice of America" broadcast, or at least repeat to others what one has heard over the radio, according to a report from Budapest sent to the New York Times by its correspondent, John McCormac.

While such repressive tactics may prevent some Hungarians from listening to the information sent out by the United States Government, it is very doubtful whether the Hungarian public can be prevented from listening.

The edict reminds us of the efforts, made some centuries ago, to prevent the common people from reading the Bible. Even the death penalty did not stop the translation of the Holy Scripture into the vernacular or prevent the people from reading what they considered the Word of God.

HINTS TO GIRLS

The fact that Carole Landis, unusually successful film actress, recently took her life, may serve as something of a warning to thousands of young girls, throughout the United States who think that they have a future in Hollywood.

Certainly, it would not be fair to judge all actresses by the unfortunate demise of Miss Landis, but it is obvious that she had enjoyed a successful film career and that she had received sufficient money to enable her to "get what she wanted."

LEGAL NOTICE

H. J. R. No. 30
JOINT RESOLUTION
 BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 60" to read as follows: "Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.
 Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Farm Facts



1. Ropy milk should not be confused with stringy, clotted, gargety milk from mastitis infected cows. Ropy milk may look normal as it comes from the cow and usually the ropery condition is not apparent until it has stood for several hours during which time the type of bacteria responsible for this condition have had a chance to multiply. Bacteria causing this condition are usually found in stagnant water, and the trouble is apt to occur when cows get out on pasture and wallow in ponds or swampy places. Improper sterilization of rinsing milking utensils with impure water may cause contamination. This trouble can easily be overcome by improved sanitation practices.

2. Yes. At the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company it was found that ducks can be successfully raised on dry ground. When it is convenient, however, a small concrete pool should be provided so the ducks may wash themselves and keep clean and comfortable.

3. Ridding pigs of worms at 12 weeks of age may save up to two bushels of corn per pig, thus increasing the hog raiser's profit and at the same time making an important saving in grain.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 1-b and 1-c be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:
 "Section 1-b. Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes."

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State taxes," and
 "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State taxes."
 Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties and other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.
 Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

ened by the high cost of living.
The cost of machineless perma-
nent waves will go up unless
Helene Curtis Industries, Inc., of
Chicago, wins a battle to reverse
a lower court decision. The firm
has announced it is carrying the
fight to the United States Circuit
Court of Appeals. The decision
affects millions of customers of
the nation's 300,000 beauticians.
A lower court has ruled in favor
of Sales Affiliates, Inc., on two of
four patents on materials for
machineless permanents in an in-
fringement suit against Helene
Curtis. Court records show that
Sales Affiliates has licensed the
Toni Company and Halgar, Inc.,
to manufacture and sell pads for
machineless permanents. Toni now
sells only home cold wave sets.
Willard Gidwitz, executive vice-

president of Helene Curtis, said
his firm was continuing the fight
in the interests of the beauticians
and the public. The additional cost
would have to be passed on to the
public by beauty shops, he said.
"Materials for machineless
waves represent only a few items
among the hundreds in our lines,"
Gidwitz said, "and it would cost

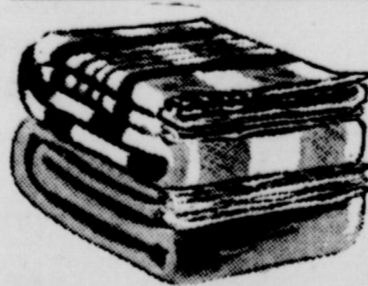

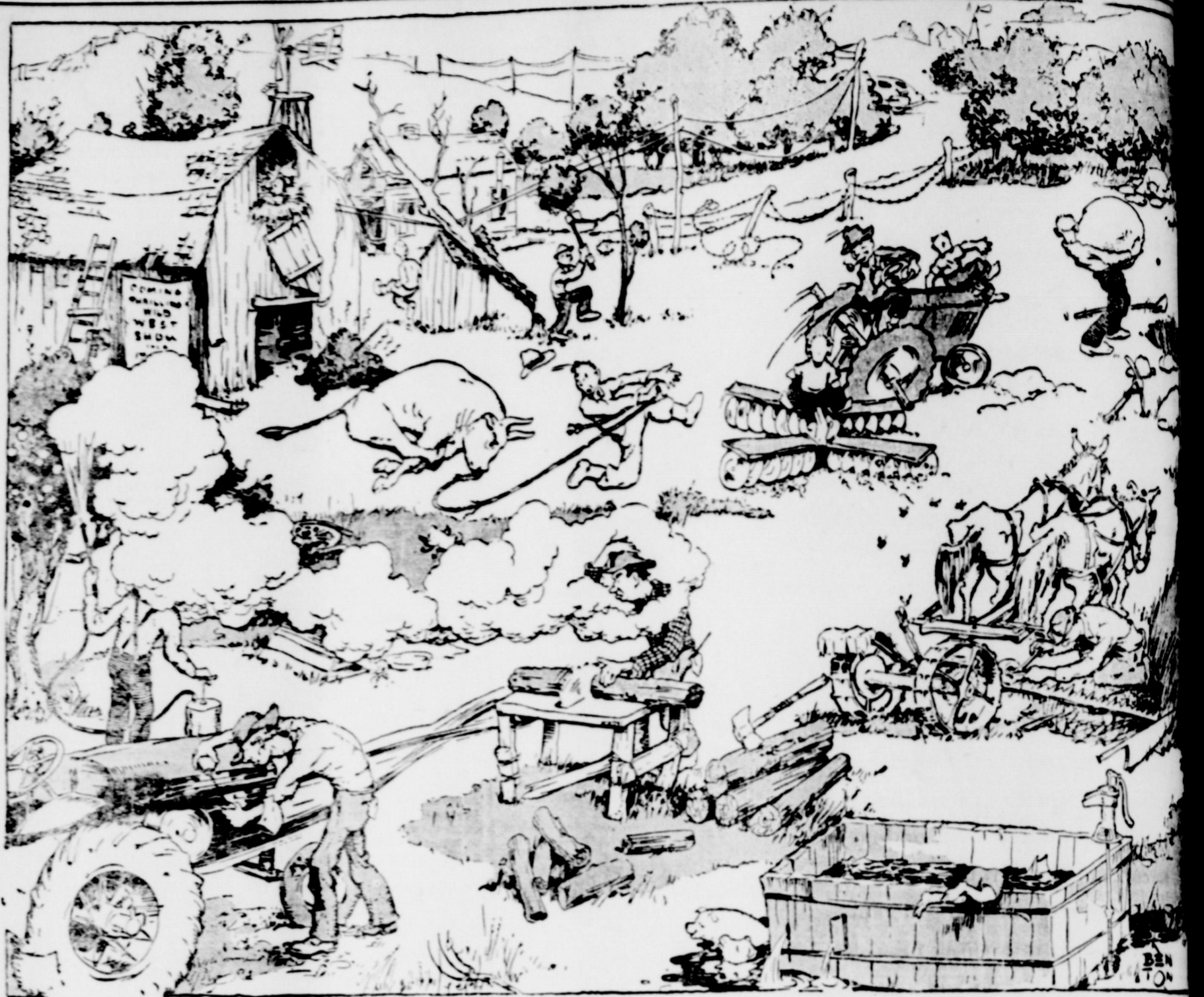

**Hearty Egg Dishes That Are
Good for Luncheon or Supper**

By **ALICE DENBOFF**

WITH the price of eggs what
it has been, they have assumed
new importance. It is not enough
just a couple of eggs, sunnyside
up or scrambled or a plain
omelette. Now the egg becomes
the star performer in some won-
derful dishes, good luncheon or
supper items, a few of which are
offered here.

Eggs baked in tomatoes adds up
to an excellent and nourishing
dish. The centers are removed
from large, ripe tomatoes, and
enough of the pulp is removed to
allow an egg to be poured in. The
cavity is sprinkled with salt, pep-
per, onion salt and a smidgen of
celery salt before the egg is
added. After the egg is broken
into the tomato, it is covered with
tomato pulp chopped and a dab
of prepared mustard. The tomatoes
are then placed in a pan which
is put in another pan partially
filled with water. On the top of
each tomato is placed a piece of
brown paper heavily spread with
table fat.

A Moderate Oven
The tomatoes are baked in a
moderate oven for about 1/4 hour.
Fifteen min., before removing
from the oven, the brown paper is
replaced by strips of bacon.

For those that really like to
cook, here is a cheese soufflé that
takes a bit of patience, much beat-
ing, and an oven not too hot. But
when skillfully done, it makes a
marvelous soufflé.

Deep Saucepan
To make, boil 1/2 pint milk in a
deep saucepan. When it comes to
a boil add 2 tbs. flour mixed
with a little cold water, stirring
until it makes a white sauce. Add

1/2 tsp. butter, 2 tsp. chopped
American cheese, a little paprika,
pinch of salt and black pepper, and
a pinch of soda. Cook 5 min.,
stirring continuously. Take from
fire; cool for half hour. Do not
put in refrigerator.

When cold, add the yolks of 4
eggs that have already been
beaten spongy light, beating into
the mixture. Then add the whites,
beaten until stiff but not dry.
Blend together for 2 min. Turn
into a heatproof oven glass baking
dish, and bake at 350 degrees F.
for 10 min. or until it rises high
and is a fluffy golden brown.
Serve at once before the soufflé
gets a chance to collapse.

Two-Story Omelet
Here is a heavy omelet, a
two-story production that is im-
posing to gaze upon, and mighty
good fare, too. For this omelet
which serves 4 to 6, beat 1/2 cup
table spread in a skillet, add 2
minced green peppers, 4 minced
scallions and one c. fresh or canned
tomatoes; let simmer for 15 min.
Separate 5 eggs, beat yolks with
1/2 tsp. salt, dash of pepper and
1/2 tsp. scant tsp. dry mustard, 1/4
tsp. each thyme, tarragon, ma-
joram and sage. Add first mix-
ture, turn into a casserole, place
in pan of hot water, cover and
bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.
for 20 min.)

Whip 5 egg whites on a platter
with a wire whisk until stiff
enough to stand. Sprinkle 3 cant
tsp. mustard over them and add
1/2 tsp. ketchup, a few drops at a
time, whipping until blended.
Spread over baked yolk mixture;
return to oven, uncovered. Re-
duce heat to slow (300 degrees F.)
and bake 15 mins., longer or until
raised and brown.

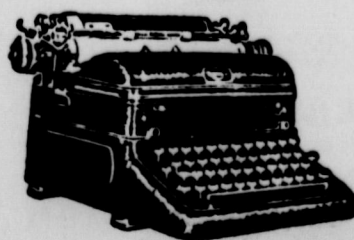

H. J. R. No. 36
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an Amendment to Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers, including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, and precinct deputy enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis in all counties in this State beginning January 1, 1949, providing for submission of this Amendment

to the vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

Section 1. That Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all constables, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers, including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949, and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Court shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis."

Sharnock man has been invited to join the firm of Needles Tammen and Bergendoff, Consulting Engineers and Architects, New York and Kansas City. He will devote his time to the general activities of the office and field.

Exum is a graduate of the University of Texas. He took up bridge engineering in the Kansas City office of Harrington, Howard and Ash and continued with the successor firm, Ash-Howard-Needles and Tammen, until he returned to Texas with the Bridge Division of the Texas Highway Department.

Powers, as he is known to his many friends here, has made a notable record in the design of important bridges for the State of Texas. His departure for New York has been hastened by the recent successful sale of \$40,000,000 revenue bonds for the Delaware Memorial Bridge over the Delaware River below Wilmington for the State of Delaware, construction of which is now starting. Truly a pastry for a party is this apricot cottage cheese pie. Each serving is topped with whipped cream nests crowned with an apricot half.

Want an extra-smooth dessert to make a debut at a special dinner? An apricot cottage cheese pie may take a little more fuss than some, but the reward is pure pleasure. As the guest bites into a generous wedge of this luscious pie he will discover that beneath the whipped cream and apricot garnish lies a creamy layer of cottage cheese custard—and beneath that, a richly flavored apricot layer over flaky crust.

An important point to remember in making this pie is that the cheese custard must be baked at a rather low temperature to keep the milk and cheese proteins tender. Since the pie crust should be started in a very hot oven, only the apricot layer is placed in the shell for the initial baking. After ten minutes, take the pie from the oven and pour the cottage cheese custard over the apricot layer. Return the pie to the oven and finish baking in a slow (325 degrees F.) oven.

APRICOT COTTAGE CHEESE PIE

Apricot Layer

2 cups mashed cooked apricots
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
Mix ingredients well.

Cottage Cheese Custard

1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 eggs, beaten
Add sugar and salt to eggs. Mix well. Add milk, vanilla extract and cheese. Blend ingredients thoroughly.

Pastry

1 cup sifted enriched flour
1/2 teaspoon salt

Sift together flour and salt. Cut or rub in shortening until mixture is crumbly. Sprinkle water over flour mixture and mix to a dry crumbly dough. Turn out on lightly floured pastry cloth. Press dough together. Roll out about one-eighth inch thick. Line deep nine-inch pie pan. Trim and flute edge of pastry. Frick with fork.

Spread apricot layer evenly into pie shell. Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) 10 minutes. Pour cottage cheese custard over apricots in pie shell. Reduce heat to slow (325 degrees F.) and continue baking 50 minutes. Garnish with whipped cream and cooked apricot halves, if desired.
Yield: one nine-inch pie.

Wheeler County parents are reminded again this week by County School Superintendent Allen Kavanaugh that July is the month in which all transfers of school children from one district to another should be made.

These transfers are becoming more important each year, Kavanaugh said, as the per capita apportionment from the state increases. When parents transfer their children to another school district, they owe it to that district to see they receive this apportionment. It is possible for a school board to deny admission of students who have not been properly transferred.

Transfers include not only regular transfers from one district to another but children whose grades are not taught in their home districts must also be transferred, the superintendent said.

Kavanaugh urges that all parents assist in seeing that their children are properly transferred.
