REPORT SHOWS DOWNS BODY DID CONTAIN POISON

The body of A. M. Downs, found last month in a cane-patch near Wheeler, contained "definite traces" of strychnine, a report from the Department of Public Safety, Austin, revealed late last week.

Homer Moss, Wheeler County attorney, said the report indicated that the viscera contained strychnine, which places cause of death on poisoning. However, Mr. Moss said the case is not closed "by any means."

Whether the Downs case is suicide or murder has yet to be determined, Mr. Moss declared. He expressed the belief it would be an unusual case of murder if anyone had poisoned Downs, since the strychnine apparently came from bottles found near the body. The bottles, according to the report from Austin, also contained the powerful poison.

Mr. Moss stated today in an interview with a Times reporter that he and Sheriff Swink had checked again with Mr. Pounds of the Potter County sheriff's department who had been checking with bus drivers trying to determine whether or not Downs rode to Wheeler with any of them but none of them could give any information on the subject.

Moss also stated that the Iowa State Veterinary Department has reported that they know of no veterinarian by the name of Towner or Townsend whom Mr. Downs mentioned in correspondence. Every Iowa point mentioned has been checked but so far no light has been thrown on the case from that corner. Moss pointed out.

However, Moss stated that the case was still not closed and he was not entirely satisfied that it was a case of suicide until some other points have been cleared up.

N. F. L. A. HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING

The Wheeler County National Farm Loan Association recently held its annual stockholders meeting for the purpose of electing three directors and attending to other business coming before it.

A business session preceded the entertainment which was in the form of a picture show at the Regue Theatre at Wheeler, Texas. During the business session the stockholders elected Robert Terry of the Lela Community for a three-year term as director; Raymond Moore of the Kelton Community as director for a two-year term; and C. F. Waters of the Wheeler Community as director for a two-year term.

Vet Start Testing Dairy Herds Mon.

State and City health inspectors have notified some of the larger milk companies that dairymen producing for them must have T. B. and Bangs tests made on their herds. This affects Wheeler County dairymen whose milk is going to the large pasteurizing plants.

The Wheeler County Agent's office has been asked to assist in starting a testing program here. County Agent Frey contacted the Bureau of Animal Industries relative to obtaining the service of Federal Veterinarians or State Veterinarians in this testing program. Due to the large number of government Veterinarians working on the hoof and mouth program in Mexico, no government Veterinarians are available for this work here.

ALL ANIMALS OVER SIX MONTHS OLD SHOULD BE TESTED. All animals over 6 months of age should be tested to eliminate carriers of the diseases from endangering others in the herd, and all heifers 4 to 8 months of age should be vaccinated against Bangs.

County Agent Frey points out that calfhood vaccination of all heifers 4 to 8 months of age is something dairy men should be doing. This should become a common practice in vaccinating for blackleg. Coupled with sanitation and blood testing, vaccination of heifer calves will give control of the disease in time.

SPECIAL PRICE ON TESTING. Dr. J. T. Westbrook, who is working with Dr. Raymond Hand, of the Childress Veterinary hospital, has agreed to come and do the testing work here at a reduced price. Normally, the charge is \$1 per head for Bangs test, and \$1.00 per head for T. B. test. Dr. Hand has agreed to do both.

JOY WILLIAMS SELECTED FOR HIGH HONOR

Joy Williams, 19-year old 4-H club girl of Wheeler County, has been selected as one of four Texas nominees to the International Farm Youth Exchange Project, according to Lorene Stevens, state girls' 4-H club leader of Texas A. and M. College. Her records have been submitted to the federal Extension Service for consideration.

At least 10 and not more than 25 farm youths from the United States will make the European trip in 1948, for a stay of from three to six months. The plan is for delegates to live, work and play in farm homes and communities of the country visited, with the emphasis placed on home and community experiences in order to bring about better understanding of the problems of world peace.

The nominees were selected on the basis of their all-around leadership ability, a background of farm life and work, general attitude, health, family and nationality background, language facility and personality integrity.

Miss Williams is in her second year at Texas Tech., and has been in 4-H club work nine years. She has twice been winner of the Talent Club award, was awarded the Danforth Foundation Scholarship in 1946, and as a result spent two weeks at Camp Miniwanca, Michigan. She was a delegate to the 1946 National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

She is active in church and school activities, Girl Scouts, Future Homemakers of America, and has held all positions of leadership in her 4-H club.

She has had demonstrations in gardens, cotton, beef cattle and clothing. She estimates her garden has been worth \$990 to the family food supply in canned foods.

She likes outdoor work on the farm. During the war years, she took her brother's place in the fields of small grain, hoed and pulled cotton, fed and worked cattle and helped her father with repairing the fences. In 1947, she traveled with her brother and wife, following the wheat harvest through Kansas, Nebraska and South Dakota.

The other Texas nominees to the International Farm Youth Exchange Project are Patsy Jo DeLevan, of Medina county; Roy Hranicky of Jim Wells county; and Billy Preston Hancock of Hall county. The project is sponsored by the Extension Service 4-H Club, affiliated organizations of Rural Youth of the U. S. A., the State Department and Office of Foreign Agricultural Relations and recognized governmental agencies and youth serving organizations of the countries concerned as well as private and commercial concerns interested in international relations.

Precinct 1, the Wheeler area.
Precinct 3, the Pakan, Heald and Kellerville area.
Precinct 5, the Allison area.

Cantrell and Scribner ask that landowners of each of the above areas be thinking about a good farmer to nominate and elect as a supervisor to represent them in the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District.

County Agent Frey stated that much of the success of the district's operation depends upon getting good men who have had considerable farming experience and are soil conservation minded to act as supervisors of the district.

Editorial

Mother's Day 1948, Sunday May 9. Everyone has a Mother whether she be living or dead and it is entirely befitting that we should set aside at least one day each year to pay tribute to the dearest person in all the world, our own Mothers.

Everyone knows it makes a Mother happy to have her children gather at her

home on Mother's Day, shower her with gifts or remembrances and treat her. If it is impossible for one to be with Mother on that special day, the next best thing is to send messages of love and gratitude and let them know you are thinking of them especially on that day.

Your Mother deserves everything that you can possibly do for her because she suffered for you and did without things in order that you might have what you desired as you grew up, your troubles were always her troubles and, in many instances, she probably worried more about your troubles and misfortunes than you did yourself.

Befitting as it is to set aside one day on which to honor our Mothers, we believe that it is not necessary that we should save all our honor and appreciation for one certain day in the year, but should tell them of our appreciation for what they have done for us more often by writing letters if they are far away or visiting with them probably more often than we do if they are close enough to us to where it is possible for us to do so.

ISLAND WEALTH

United States scientists and engineers have been prowling over the former Japanese-held islands of the western Pacific since the end of the war, evaluating their mineral wealth. The findings are far from discouraging.

On the largest of the Palau island group an estimated 8,000,000 tons of bauxite (aluminum ore) has been found, and geologists place the bauxite potential for the whole group at 50,000,000 tons. Lt. Cmdr. Woodrow Clevenger, USNR, one of the experts who made the study, figures the 8,000,000 tons of bauxite on Babelthau Island would produce 2,000,000 tons of aluminum—enough for more than two years of normal U. S. consumption.

Development of these and similar deposits in the island would go a long way toward defraying this country's expense in governing the trust territories, and at the same time provide a welcome supplement to our supply of vital industrial ores.

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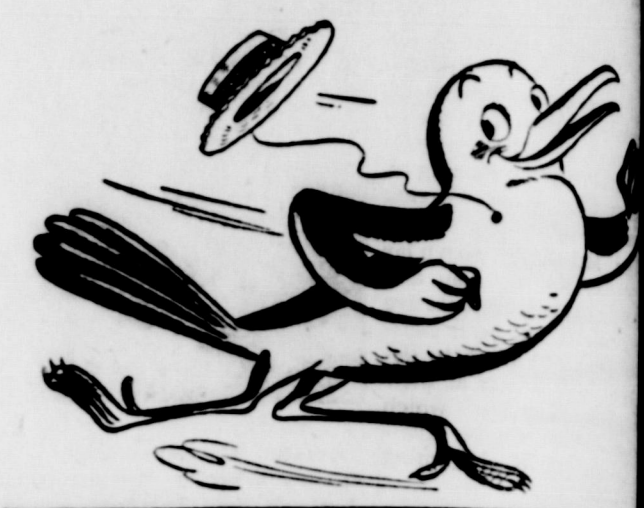

were not charged a cent for the fish. Applications for fish may be made during the year to the headquarters source of the hatchery serving that particular county. All applications received up to August 1 of any year are usually processed after that time, and at a time when the small fish are about fingerling size.

Many Texas pondowners are now thinking of producing pounds of fish in acres of water in a like manner to the production of beef on acres of land. An acre pond, properly managed, will furnish the average family with an adequate supply of fish meat the year around. There is lots of fun and recreation connected with the harvest of the fish crop, too.

Fish require plenty of food, and the best source of food is to raise it right in the pond where the fish live. Tiny plants and animals in the pond, commonly referred to as "the bloom" or the plankton, make up the main diet of fish. Therefore, the amount of plankton in the water will determine the number of fish present; likewise, the amount of plankton is dependent on the fertilization program of the lake. A good fertilizer program should be carried on each year, and three months is all the time needed for this program. Make up a mixture of 400 pounds of cottonseed meal and 200 pounds of 20 per cent acid phosphate for each acre of pond area. Broadcast 300 pounds of this fertilizer mixture around the edge of the pond in the early spring, and at 30 day intervals apply 100 pounds until all of the fertilizer has been applied.

A well managed pond also means a well fished pond. One of the greatest troubles in farm pond management is overstocking. Balanced stocking should be practiced in order to help maintain the balance through the years. Your hatchery will assist by sending the proper kinds and numbers for your particular pond, and the county agent can help you in prop-

erly stocking and managing your fish pond. With a good farm pond, the farmer can practice conservation of fish, and at the same time, says Callender, provide himself and the family with recreation.

Half of the annual egg crop in the U. S. is produced from March to June, and the lowest production occurs from September to December.

Milk should be kept in a cool part of the refrigerator, and should never be left on the table for long periods of time while cooking or eating.

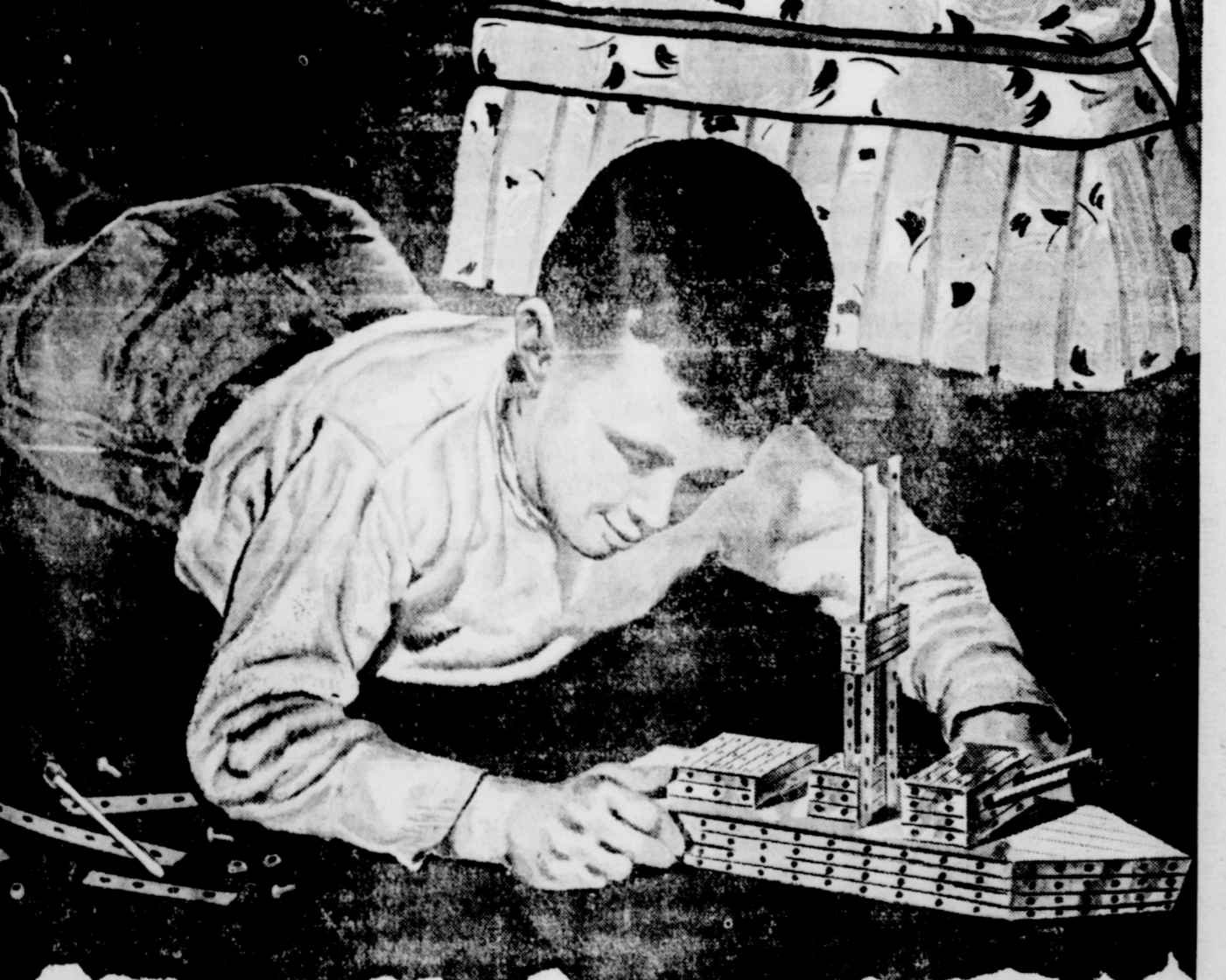
HERE'S HOW YOU CAN RAISE FISH

Ever go fishing and wonder if there were really any fish in the lake or if you were just going on a boat ride with a fishing pole in your hand? Here is a chance to make sure there are fish in the pond. Raise your own, says R. E. Callender, extension wildlife conservation specialist of Texas A. and M. College.

Ten state fish hatcheries under the direction of the Texas Fish, Game and Oyster Commission of Austin, and nine federal hatcheries produce fingerling fish for lake and pond owners throughout the state.

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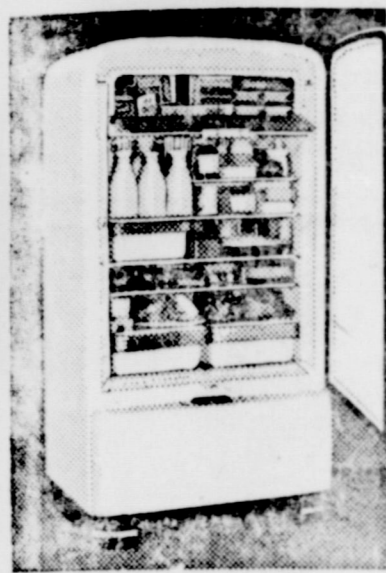

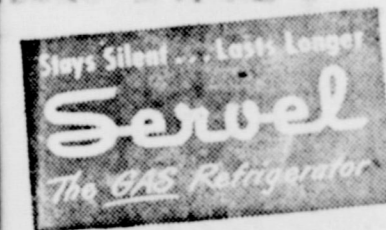

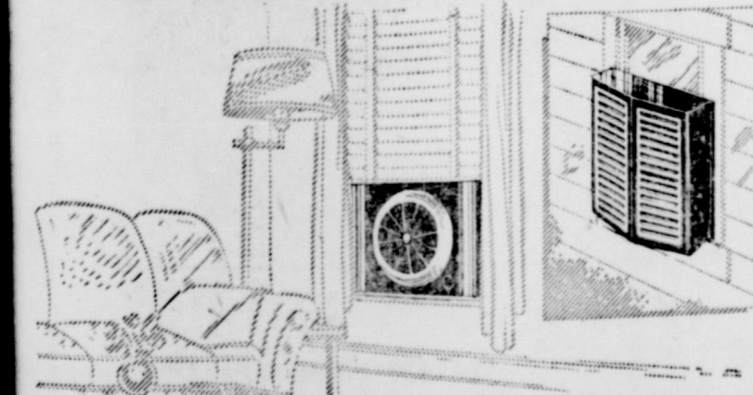

Wheeler Co. H. D. Club History Given

Quoted from Mrs. J. M. Porter's history Claps.
"Three rural women were talking together one day and each confessed they were not satisfied with the social life of their community, or the use they were making of their little spare time they had. They were not helpful or neighborly enough, just because they had not been able to do big things, they had not been doing anything. They decided to form a club and to call it the Good Cheer Neighbors Club. These women lived south of the river, rather new town of Wheeler, Texas. They were Mrs. H. Flanagan, Mrs. W. L. Williams and Mrs. Edou Smith. Dates and details seem to have slipped from their minds but, as they can piece facts together, they are as follows:
Charter members, including the above three, are Mesdames J. G. Gooden, R. L. Wheeler, W. H. Williams, C. R. Flynt, Preston Leavie, J. F. Whit, J. R. Badley, S. T. Rogers, J. W. Williams and J. A. Bryant. For a while they did not formally organize but when they did, Mrs. Flanagan was the first president and Mrs. Edou (Toy) Smith, Sec. and Treas.
At least one member was taking the Oklahoma Farmer Stockman, from which they got ideas about organization, name and how to get suggestions. They wrote first to the Oklahoma A. and M. College for program material, then to Texas A. and M. This went on for two or three years.
There was a crippled child in their community for whom they, by pooling their money, bought a wheel chair, bringing comfort and joy to more than one. They found many ways for helping others and improving themselves, thus living up to their name.
When they wrote to Texas A. and M. they aroused the curiosity of the Extension Department, and they soon received a letter wanting to know "what are you up to up there in Wheeler Co.?" Followed by a District Home Demonstration Agent to encourage them to request a County Home Demonstration Agent. Thus Extension Service came to Wheeler County.
That District Agent who came was Miss Bess Edwards, later Assistant State H. D. Agent and the first County H. D. Agent was Miss Lucille Arnett. The women were a little disappointed in that she liked to work with girls and paid no attention to the women, when they had looked forward to getting a little advice now and then. Then the agents worked during the summer months and laid out during the winter.
Miss Arnett came in 1919. Miss Hays in 1920. From 1921 to 1926 Miss Ollie Terry was agent. Miss Viola Jones was agent from 1927 to 1937.
There are fewer farm families in the county now than in 1940

Due to consolidation of schools and shifting of population from some communities there are only 12 home demonstration clubs and 14 4-H clubs now.

In 1927 there were 6 girl's 4-H clubs with 56 members and 7 women's clubs with 139 members. Eleven people from Wheeler County attended the short course in 1927, and two girls, Edith Reneau and Leona Crossland, attended the Dallas Fair.

In 1928 Miss Viola Jones, H. D. Agent, accompanied Edith Reneau to Washington, D. C. There were 12 4-H clubs with 164 members and 11 H. D. clubs with 208 members. 35 people from Wheeler County attended the short course in 1929, 30 in 1930 and 60 in 1933.

By 1930 there were 16 H. D. clubs and this number contained until about 1939.

County Fairs were held each year, and numerous prizes were won at the Amarillo Tri-State Fair.

District Agents on visiting Wheeler County praised the Home Demonstration work done.

In 1930 Mrs. John McCarroll of Wheeler County was chosen one of five Master Farm Homemakers of the state, and honored at a special ceremony at the A. and M. College short course. Her daughter lives on the place she won on, and is a club member.

In 1932 the Wheeler H. D. club sponsored the courtyard planting. Dividing into four groups with each group responsible for one side of the building. The shrubs at present are a real monument to this work.

The present Briscoe club is the result of the consolidation of groups formerly called Wagner, Zybach, and Dixon. The Dixon Club was organized in 1926 with nine members. Two of their members Mrs. Rimmer and Miss Tamsey Riley won trips to the short course. Miss Riley also won 1st in yard and living room contests, and 2nd in kitchen contest. In 1934 she was written up as a pioneer teacher and artist whose greatest hobby was horticulture. Miss Riley is still an active H. D. Club woman.

China Flat club was organized in 1932. In 1933 two of their members won trips to the short course. Mrs. J. T. Reynolds of that club was elected vice-president of the District H. D. A. China Flat has 23 members at present.

Davis club at one time had 16 to 20 members. At present there are only 4 families in the Davis community, and the 4 women are faithful club workers.

Good Neighbors Club made up of women in Jowett community (at the electric power plant) was organized about 19... At present they have 21 members, and the council chairman and T. H. D. A. Chairman are members of their club.

Some of the members of the Lela club were formerly in the Pakan club Pakan club helped to organize their own club several years ago. There are 10 interested workers in Lela club.

Mobeetie had a good club when Miss Jones was agent which later disbanded for several years. June 1947 some Mobeetie women asked the agent to organize another club. They have 10 members and are working to enroll others.

Myrtle community has a very active club of 10 members. Their goal for this year is not to miss a single meeting. The women have gotten to all of them so far even through the snow when some went on tractors. I do not have the organization date for Myrtle club.

Pakan club was organized in 1922 with Mrs. J. W. Stauffer, still active (Home improvement demonstrator now) the 1st secretary. Miss Louise Risian of Pakan club has served on the state marketing committee of T. H. D. A. Pakan club recently sponsored reorganization of the community Agriculture association and their entry into the Farmer Stockman Neighborhood improvement contest. Watch Pakan win.

Wheeler started the work in Wheeler County. There are 12 members at present. The club is trying to enroll the young homemakers of the community. Mrs. J. M. Porter has been a very active member from an early date and she is still sold on home demonstration work 100%. Since Twitty club disbanded Mrs. Hester Dodson a former all-farm demonstration, has joined the Wheeler club. Shamrock has a very active club made up of young homemakers. Mrs. Tommy O'Gorman (Amy Sue Beckett, formerly assistant H. D. Agent) was their first president. They organized in 1946 calling themselves the Young Matrons club. They have 16 members.

Kellerville and Magic City, oil field communities, have had clubs but do not at present. Heald organized a club in 1922 with Mrs. Nida Green president. Bethel organized in 1928 with 17 members. Mrs. C. C. Collingsworth of that club won first prize on the living room contest. Due to shifting population these places no longer have clubs.

3-Leaf club of Shamrock was organized in 1927 under Viola Jones with 13 members, and Mrs. Milt Williams the first president. Mrs. John Harvey was a charter member. Three present members who have been active workers since 1928 are: C. G. Cantrell, Mrs. S. P. Beasley, and Mrs. Green Burkhalter. After 10 years this group had 35 members. In 1940 they made 160 mattresses. At present they have 14 members and

have some good times together. The first meeting in the month is always a covered dish luncheon.

Wheeler county had its first assistant home demonstration agent in 1939, Miss Rose Erisman. The following have served as assistant agents: Sybil Gidden; Evelyn Plummer; Betty Sue Bownds; Amy Sue Beckett, and Louise Hicks who left October 1, 1947.

Since Viola Jones left in 1937 the following agents have been in Wheeler County: Dalton Burleson, Lucille Chance, Murle Scales, Betty Sue Bownds, and Mary Kate Zymran. The present agent, Mrs.

Emma May Hastings came in February 1946.

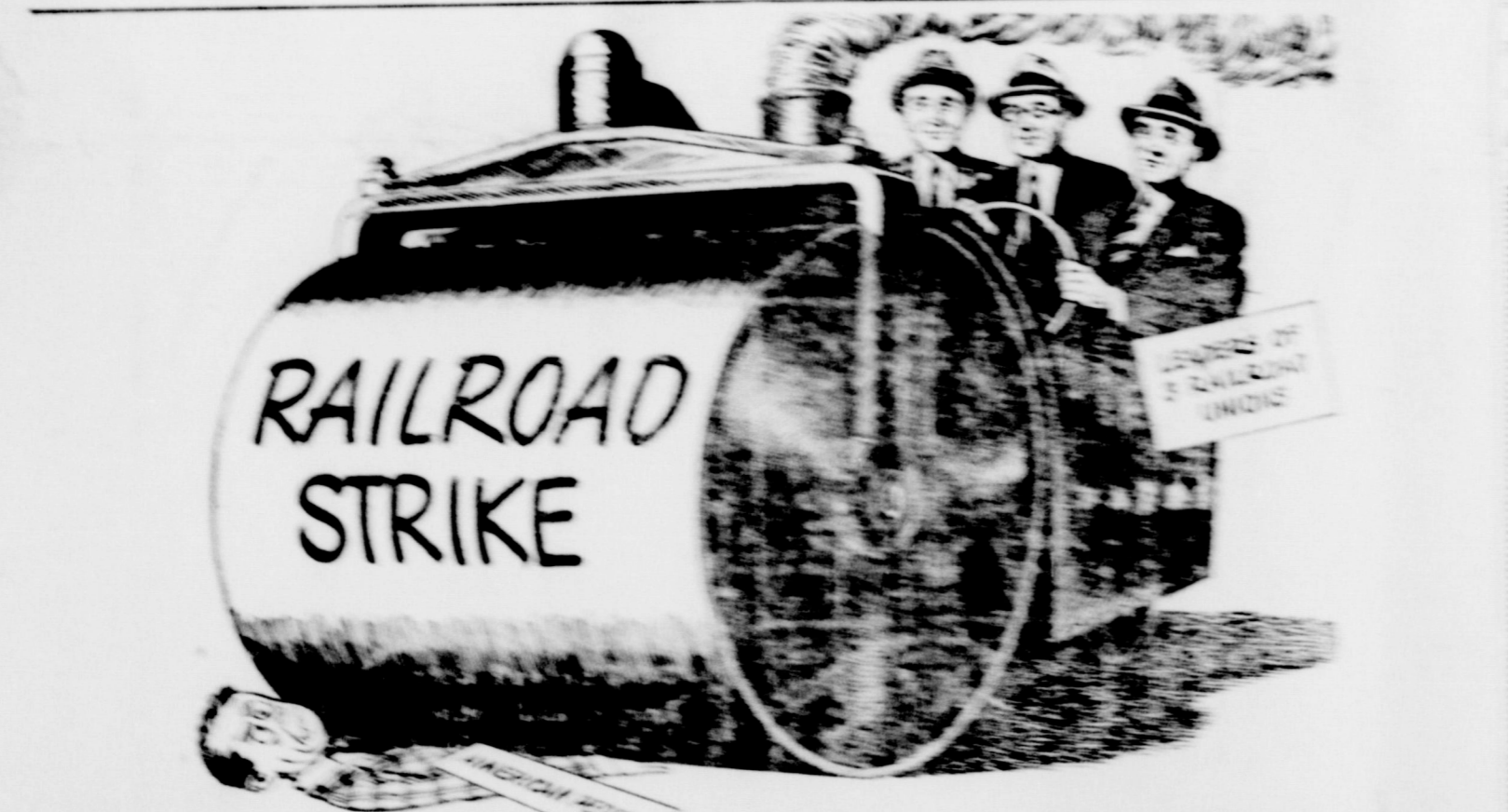

1 1/2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup sugar
1 unbeaten egg
1/4 cup soft shortening
1/4 cup Pet Milk
1/2 cup orange juice

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Grease 16 two-inch muffin tins, then dust lightly with flour. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Child With Chickenpox Should Be Kept Home Says Health Officer

With the incidence of Chickenpox one hundred percent higher than records indicate for a seven year median, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, issued a statement declaring, "It is a great mistake to treat even light cases of childhood diseases such as chickenpox, measles, mumps, scarlet fever or whooping cough as though they did not amount to much. That sort of treatment makes it possible for these diseases to spread and cause serious outbreaks among children and their resulting impaired resistance makes them easy victims to other forms of infection."

"Some of the most serious outbreaks of chickenpox have been traced to mild cases—that is, cases so light that the doctor was not called. In some instances the children have continued to go to school and to associate and play with other children. In others, after they have been kept at home for a few days, they have returned to school and have scattered these germs among their schoolmates. Strict isolation of chickenpox patients is the only means by which the spread can be controlled, and parents should cooperate fully in isolating a child as long as the doctor thinks it advisable."

The State Health Officer said that the family doctor is the best judge of the seriousness of such childhood diseases, and suffering and anxiety will be avoided if the doctor's advice is sought and followed throughout the course of the illness.

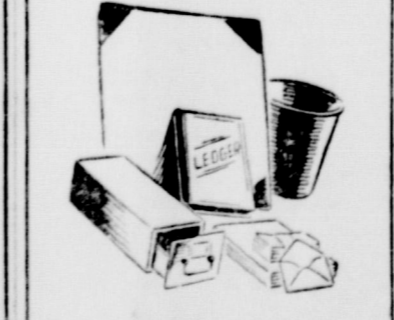

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Q. How often does the litter in the brooder house need to be changed?
A. As long as the litter remains clean and dry it does not need changing, unless there should be an outbreak of disease. How long the litter remains dry depends upon the kind and depth of the litter used, on how often it is stirred, on the ventilation of the brooder room and on the care used in preventing water being spilled around the fountains. Should there be an outbreak of disease, it is always advisable to remove all litter and thoroughly clean and disinfect.

Q. What percentage of his pigs should the hog raiser expect to market?
A. The average number of pigs raised to market age in the U. S. is 56%, but the hog raiser should be able to market many more pigs. At the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company where a program of good breeding, sound management, careful sanitation and good feeding is followed, the average number of pigs raised to market is 78.7%.

Q. What qualities should be considered in buying broiler chicks?
A. Some important things to look for in broiler chicks are:
1. Vigorous stock, free from disease.
2. Fast, uniform growth.
3. Rapid and complete feathering.
4. Well proportioned body.
5. Good fleshing quality.

Q. How much pasture should there be per cow?
A. In most cases there should be at least one acre of pasture per cow. However, this may be more than necessary in some areas and is only a rough estimate.

CONSERVATION PRACTICES NEED BE CARRIED OUT

It's not the planning but the actual carrying out of practices that gets the conservation job done. Cecil Martin, member of the Wheeler County Agricultural Conservation Committee, reminded farmers this week he said that now that most farmers have made their plans for the season it's time to start putting the plans into practice.

He pointed out that every year there are some excellent conservation plans made that would save millions of tons of soil and thousands of acres of cropland, but for one reason or another the plans are not carried out and the land loses top soil and fertility. With an increasing population and a limited cropland we can't maintain our present standard of living and continue this loss.

Everything that every farmer can do—with or without assistance of the Agricultural Conservation Program or other conservation programs—will not be too much. Although people in the United States are eating better now than they have in the past, it is not impossible that we may be at the turning point where production cannot keep up with population increases.

Certainly we are speeding up the day when we will come to that turning point if we allow our land to get away from us, the county chairman said. Every farmer has a responsibility to the country to do his part in saving the soil. Because this problem is so serious, the Agricultural Conservation Program has been provided to help farmers get this job done. Farmers using this assistance are cooperating in a national fight to save the land to keep our production the abundance needed to keep the nation well fed.

That's why it's so important that farmers who have made farm plans for carrying out conservation practices follow through on these plans and actually carry out the conservation practices.

Side-stepping only gets you farther away from where you hope you are going.

test for \$1.50 where there are 5 or more cows in the herd and calves will be vaccinated for 75c per head where there are 5 or more calves, instead of the regular \$1.25 per calf.

NOW IS THE TIME TO GET IN ON THIS TESTING

Frequently there are individuals calling the County Agent's office to find out how and when they can get their cows tested for Bangs and T. B. Licensed veterinarians who can give a testing certificate are not available to Wheeler County Farmers except when approximately a hundred head of animals are to be tested, therefore this is an opportunity for those who have only a few head of cows to get those cows tested.

DAIRY HERDS WILL BE TESTED FIRST

On Monday, May 10, Dr. Westbrook will begin testing herds in the vicinity of Twitty. Next he will go to herds around Kelton, then around Wheeler, then Mobeetie, then Briscoe, and to herds in Hemphill County.

When the dairy herds are taken care of, those who have just a family milk cow, or two or three cows will be taken care of.

The Veterinarian's Vocational Agriculture classes of Wheeler County have volunteered to assist in this program in any way possible, and all persons who want to get in on this testing should immediately

fill out and mail to the Wheeler County Agent the blank below so they can be included in the schedule.
