## Wheeler Can Help Elect A Native Son To Represent Dist.

Wheeler's candidate for State Representative, Grainger McIlhany, has an excellent chance to be elected if voters of his home town will go to bat for him in the remaining two weeks of the campaign. The primary election is July 24.

Recent withdrawal of Vincent Kersey of Pampa, leaves the Wheeler county candidate opposed only by Carl B. Morris, likeable young college student of Clarendon. McIlhany holds the advantage of being older (he is 30), of having a broader formal education (holds 2 degrees from the University of Texas) and of having had business experience (the former worked for a major oil company in Pampa and is presently associated with his mother in the dry goods store here).

The Wheeler man has geographic advantages, too, in the 4-county legislative race. Heaviest voting counties in the order named are: Gray, Wheeler, Collingsworth and Donley, placing McIlhany in the middle of the heaviest balloting while his opponent resides at the south end of the district.

The fact that Gray and Wheeler counties have much in common as regards legislative control of oil and gas industries would indicate the Wheeler county man would have a stronger appeal in Gray county than his younger opponent who has been reared in an exclusive farm and ranch area. McIlhany, in fact, had a year's experience as an accountant for the Magnolia company in the Pampa office before the war and is not unfamiliar with the oil and gas industry.

McIlhany hopes to break even with his Donley county opponent in Collingsworth county. The Wheeler man comes from a pioneer family and there are many farmers and ranchers in the Collingsworth area who knew his parents in the early days. Then the Wheeler candidate knows a sprinkling of young men who were students at Texas University when he was there.

Four years war service as a non-commissioned officer should help McIlhany some although he is soft-peddling this angle. The Wheeler American Legion Post members, however, are among his strongest backers as he has been active in the post of his home town.

### Churches Of Christ To Hold Bible School Encampment At Lake

Churches of Christ in this area are planning a Bible school encampment to be held at Lake McClellan the last two weeks of this month. B. M. Litton announced this week. The first week is for girls and the second is for boys.

There is to be one class each morning on a Bible subject and one on singing and there is to be an evangelistic service with a different minister speaking each time. There will be more than half of each day for recreation, swimming, fishing, boating, soft ball and other games.

Age limits for those who attend is from 9 up. The cost of the camp is \$2.50 and a specified list of groceries or \$5.50 complete for each person.

All boys and girls who wish to attend the camp are asked to register at the Church of Christ as soon as possible. Parents consent is necessary, of course.

## HOLDEMAN IS STAR OF WEST WIN IN TILT

Bob Holdeman, Wheeler's regular third baseman, was one of the stars of the West's team which took a 15 to 2 victory from the East team here Sunday in the West Texas-Oklahoma League's annual all-star contest.

Holdeman knocked out three hits in four times at bat and scored two runs during the six innings service he saw in the contest. Holdeman got one double and two singles.

Burton, Wheeler's regular second baseman, played the entire contest and got two hits in five trips and scored two runs. The only other Wheeler player to see action in the contest was Chester Bowles, the regular centerfielder, who went in in the sixth and got on base on an error and scored a run in his only time up.

The first six men up for the West team in the first inning hit safely with five runs crossing the plate before the Easterners could put out the fire. The Westerners scored three more in the third, four in the fifth, one in the eighth and two in the ninth. The Easterners scored one run each in the sixth and seventh innings.

The West team was made up of players from Wheeler, Miami, Shamrock and McLean while the east team was made up of players from Briscoe, Allison, Kelton and Sweetwater.

## Absentee Balloting For First Primary Under Way, Will End July 21

County Clerk Harry Wofford pointed out the fact that absentee balloting for the first primary election is now under way and persons who contemplate being out of the county on election day, July 24, and wish to vote should do so right away.

Absentee balloting began July 4 and will end July 21, and the clerk stated that it is imperative that all absentee ballots be in his office by that date.

Anyone who plans to be out of the county on July 24 should make application to the County Clerk for absentee ballot and come to the clerk's office and cast their ballot. Anyone who is out of the county but this is still their legal residence can apply to the clerk for absentee ballot which will be mailed to them and they can go before a notary public and vote but the ballot must be back in the clerk's office by July 21.

Anyone who is incapacitated and will not be able to go to the polls on election day can cast an absentee ballot by making application to the clerk who can take the ballot to them and let them vote or he can mail ballot to them and they can go before a notary public and cast their vote.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Thomas Daughtry estimated this week that the voting strength of Wheeler County this year would be approximately 3,500 with 3,031 paid poll taxes, 50 exemptions and the remainder made up of people over 60 years of age who were not required to secure exemption.

## CPL. WILLIAMS BODY RETURNED

Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Williams of Mobeetie received word late last week that the remains of their son, Rual H. Williams had arrived in the United States from Italy where he was buried after being killed in action in 1944.

Corporal Rual H. Williams entered service in March 1943, was sent overseas in September of the same year and was killed in action on February 8, 1944 while serving in Company G, 30th Infantry under General Mark Clark.

Cpl. Williams was awarded the Purple Heart posthumously.

Williams was buried near Neuton, Italy which is some 30 miles from Rome.

The Williams will conduct a memorial service in honor of their son upon his arrival in Mobeetie. Full military honors will be conveyed. The memorial service will be conducted at the Mobeetie Methodist Church and burial will be in the Mobeetie cemetery.

The two north Wheeler county banks show by their statements of financial condition as printed in this week's times that the people of this section of the county have more money on deposit now than they have ever had before at this particular time of the year.

Deposits at the Citizens State Bank of Wheeler show them to be up a little over two hundred thousand dollars while the First State Bank of Mobeetie is down about fifteen thousand dollars which can probably be explained by the fact that the wheat crop was off to a certain extent this year and was also a little later this year than last.

Deposits at this time are approximately two hundred thousand dollars less than they were at the end of September 1947.

With deposits up two hundred thousand dollars over this same time last year and the season and prospects of row crops which the north part of Wheeler County now has this fall and winter should see more money on deposit and in the hands of the people than ever before in history.

A fifty year old woman giving the name of Grace Spratt has been booked on a vagrancy charge and lodged in the Wheeler County jail. She was picked up by Deputy Sheriff Glen Cantrell on Highway 66 5 miles east of Shamrock Thursday afternoon of last week after Sheriff Jess Swink and Deputy Cantrell had received several reports of a strange woman wandering aimlessly along the countryside for several days.

Checking through the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Sheriff Swink learned the woman was an inmate of a mental institution, The Eastern State Hospital, Medical Lake, Washington in 1943. She has volunteered little information of her past life and county authorities are conducting an official investigation before making a decision in the case.

**Editorial**

**ELECTION TIME**

Every other year is election year in Texas and every four years we of the United States of America hold a national election to see who will be top man in our government for the following four years.

Many people don't pay much attention to politics as far as going to the polls and helping to elect the men and women they wish to help mould the laws which we are governed by, but instead put in the greater portion of their time griping and complaining about some politician living off the fat of the land and trying to keep them from making a dime or if they make money taking it away from them in the form of taxes.

One term in some office of importance in the city, county, state or federal government would cure the gripes of many of the worst complainers we have, but we are wondering just what would happen to the government while these chronic gripers were getting cured.

Therefore, it behoves every man and woman of voting age to read the newspapers, listen to the radios, talk with the candidates and try diligently to decide which candidate they think is best qualified to fill the particular office for which he is running, then go to the polls on Saturday, July 24 and help select the men and women they want to run their government.

**MACHINE BUT NOT BRAINS**

A gigantic calculating machine, known as the Selective Sequence Electronic Calculator, is expected to aid science because it can handle mathematical problems that might otherwise involve the entire lifetime of a scientist.

While some enthusiastic writers refer to the machine as a "mechanical brain" and speak of its "memory" and "central nervous system," no one should get the idea that the machine actually thinks. Its operation is entirely mechanical but its scope may be comprehended when one reads that it contains 12,500 electronic tubes, 21,400 relays and 40,000 plugable connections. It has a capacity of 400,000 digits in tubes, relays and punch tapes and can utilize the figures on punch tapes at 140,000 digits a minute.

The International Business Machine Corporation, which developed the powerful mathematical machine, says that it is fitted to serve the fields of physical science, both pure and applied, and some social science, as well.

### Can Save Steps By Working

is its purpose; where should it be done, how can it be done more easily, more quickly or better?

After these questions have been answered, the specialists point out, quite often the homemaker has found that she can eliminate a number of unnecessary steps. Rearrangement of work centers are often the results of such studies of housework.

"Leave out any part of a task you can," the specialists advise. "Use the best tool for that particular job. Sit to work wherever you can. Keep everything in easy reach. Make one job out of two or more, and finally, make both hands work. You'll be surprised at the time and energy that you will save."

Most of us find that it is a much easier job to talk ourselves into trouble than out of it.

### THIRTY MILLION FARM HAZARDS

"The goal of the 1948 Farm Safety program is the elimination of 30,000,000 farm hazards."

"Agriculture ranks third among industries in the number of people per thousand workers killed each year by accident."

"Farm people of the 25 to 44 age-group—the most productive group—are most often killed in farm accidents."

"Motor vehicles are the cause of the largest number of accidents on the farm."

These statements were made recently at a meeting of the Texas State Farm Safety Committee when it met on the campus of Texas A. and M. College to make plans for Farm Safety Week, July 25-31, and to formulate a year-round farm safety campaign.

"With a record like this," E. C. Martin, chairman, told the group, "It's imperative that farm safety be emphasized 52 weeks of the year. It's not a one-week job." Mr. Martin is assistant state agent of the Texas Extension Service.

Accidental deaths on farms are caused by falls, machinery, animals, motor vehicles, burns or shocks, improper handling of equipment, and falling objects, the committee pointed out. Most of these could be eliminated through "safety consciousness" on the part of every member of the family.

Representatives of the Texas Extension Service, Production and Marketing Administration, Farmers Home Administration, State Board for Vocational Education, Texas Agricultural Experimental Station, Soil Conservation Service, Texas A. and M. College engineering department, Texas Forest Service, Farmer-Stockman Magazine, Progressive Farmer, and Farm and Ranch attended the meeting.

### State Health Officer Gives Polio Symptoms

Reported cases of polio in sixty-five Texas counties reached the alarming total of 580 during the first six months of the year, according to Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. For the same period in 1946, the total number of cases reported in sixty-six counties of the state was only 292.

"This staggering increase in polio in a brief two year period evidences a need for drastic measures in all communities to combat the disease," Dr. Cox asserted. "It is the responsibility of the people of the state to report themselves to their doctor whenever they recognize symptoms of polio. It is also their duty to give whole-hearted co-operation to clean-up drives in their communities."

Dr. Cox urged immediate medical attention, especially at this time of year, for such things as headaches, fever, stiff neck, pain in the legs, irritability and drowsiness. These, the health officer stated, are symptoms of polio.

"It is well to guard against panic in polio cases," he said, "for complete recovery is not impossible. Even in the more severe cases, when the germ has penetrated the nervous system causing paralysis of one or more groups of muscles, some remarkable recoveries have been made."

Dr. Cox indicated his belief that the first line of defense against polio is a carefully conceived and thoroughly executed clean-up campaign in all communities.

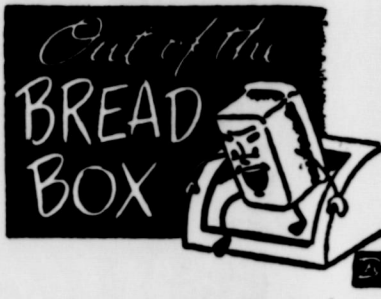

### INSECT DAMAGE GRAIN IN BINS

The insects in the farm grain bins may be small but the amount of damage they do is tremendous, according to the USDA Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine. The place to start in getting rid of these insects is right in the grain bin.

By doing a good job of bin cleaning and afterwards spraying with 5 percent DDT before the newly harvested grain has been put in, you can kill out the holder infestation, and give the new

grain a chance to escape damage. C. A. King, associated extension entomologist of Texas A. and M. College, says that these tiny insects get out of every eight bushels of farm stored grain in Texas. Further north, it's not that bad. Missouri loses one in ten, and the national average is one in twenty. So, you can see Texas is at the top of the "high loss" list.

Entomologists point out that grain losses can be lowered greatly by harvesting grain as soon as it is dry enough for safe storage and by storing it in weather-tight bins that have been made insect-free by a thorough cleaning and spraying. After the grain is stored, check it now and then to see if

### SUMMER IS TIME TO REPAIR YOUR BUILDINGS

W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer of Texas A. and M. College, says summer time is a good time to check the outside of the home and make repairs. It may save a big repair bill later on.

Quite often, Mr. Allen says, the repairs can be made by the home owner.

"There are five main spots to check," he points out. "A good starting point is the foundation, then cornices, window frames and trim. Take a good look at the roof and be sure to check the gutters and downspouts."

Small cracks in the foundation or masonry wall can be repaired by filling with asphaltic cement, while large cracks should be chipped out to about half an inch or more and filled with cement mortar. Use caulking compound in cracks between walls and window frames or where the chimney joins the house, or other joints.

Replace badly warped boards and shingles, whether wall or roof. Split badly warped wood shingles on the roof and re nail them perfectly flat. Seal clapboard wall joints with paint and doubtful joints in composition roofing with pitch.

Replace rotted wood around

wooden cornices, window frames and trim. If re nailing is all that is needed, set and putty each nail.

Check metal flashing on dormers and chimneys for looseness, corrosion or lack of paint. Resolder or all broken joints on gutters and downspouts and repaint the inside of gutters with metallic paint. Replace loose nails and straps holding gutters and downspouts.

Such minor repairs may bring major results, Mr. Allen concludes, by preventing large repair bills later on.

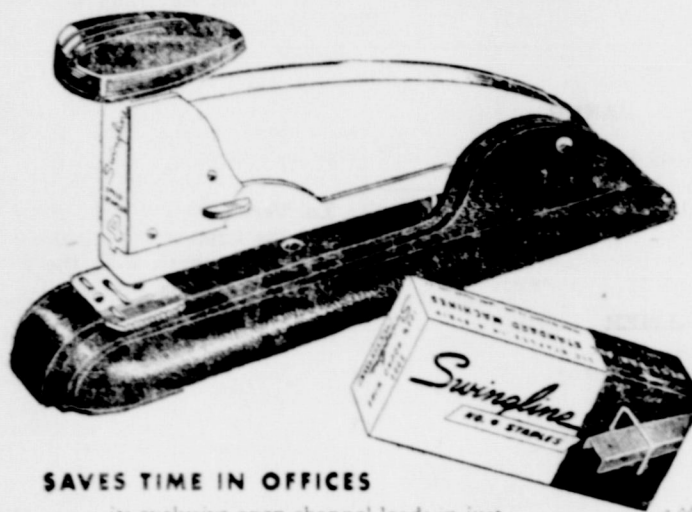

... church aid has recently credited with the saving eyesight of some thirty going blind from malnutrition in a clinic for underprivileged children at mission-support China Union University, China. Adding eggs and oil to the soybean cakes fed by the Nutrition Aid Dr. J. Claude Thompson,

of the University Staff, devised a formula giving the young patients a Vitamin A dietary supplement. The fortified cakes halted near-sight and removed other symptoms of malnutrition. The China NAC is using the formula in scores of other clinics and orphanages which it helps maintain in all parts of China.

A former pastor of the interdenominational American Church in Berlin, Germany, Harrisburg-born Dr. Stewart W. Herman, has been named executive secretary of the newly-formed Lutheran World Federation Immigration Service which is designed to assist in the resettlement of Lutheran refugees

and DP's from Europe in the United States, Canada, and Australia. Dr. Herman's headquarters will be in Geneva, Switzerland, where he has already served in similar work under the church World Council of Churches. He is a minister of the United Lutheran Church in America, and a graduate of Gettysburg College.

Under the leadership of Dr. Earl R. Brown, of its Board of Missions and Church Extension, the Methodist Church is beginning to provide new church buildings for newly-formed congregations in the United States and its possessions, and specialized buildings for many other church enterprises; together with new leaders, men and women. In the year ending in May 1947, it was reported that over 600 new churches were organized," says Dr. Brown. "Many of these received aid from the general church funds. Indications are that the denomination's goal must be

set at one new church a day for the next four years, possibly the next ten, if we move with our people. We also face critical demands for aid in Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and Alaska where new churches and parsonages are needed and where much rebuilding is necessary. The need for new churches is most acute among communities on the West Coast and in the Southwestern sections of the United States where populations have increased more rapidly than in any other part of the United States. A number of racial groups have organized substantial congregations, but are unable to obtain meeting places. A long-range program of building needs for churches and parsonages to serve Negro congregations must continue. Building improvements are imperative, too, among American Indian tribes and our Spanish-speaking congregations. We face the challenge of building
