Mrs. Othella Burson, about 60, Haskell. Death claimed its fourth and fifth victims when James Charles Flynt, 9, died at 9:22 p. m. Monday, and Doris Burson, 17, passed away at 4:50 Wednesday morning.

## DDT IS VERY SIMILAR TO DDT, ARTICLE READS

We wish to correct a mistake in the story we carried last week concerning a cattle spraying demonstration which was given the preceding Monday by County Agent Frey and Assistant County Agent Jones.

The second sentence of the second paragraph should have read:

"Thirty animals were sprayed with 50% wettable DDD powder at the rate of 8 pounds to 100 gallons of water, this product is relatively new and is very similar to DDT, but it is said to be less harmful to livestock."

Many happy returns of the day!  
Every American joins in extending  
birthday greetings to his country as it celebrates  
its 172nd anniversary on the Fourth of July.  
And wishing many happy returns

of the day is one way to express that sentiment.

We would like to extend the same greeting to the Fourth of July celebrants themselves, and wish that all of them have a happy—and safe—return from their holiday celebration.

Unfortunately, they will not. As the fresh page of July turns up on the calendar, the National Safety Council can predict with grim certainty that 8,000 persons will be killed by accidents during the month. Thousands more will be injured, some of them disabled for life. Many of these deaths and maimings will occur during that annual jamboree of carelessness—the glorious Fourth.

The tragic fact is that this carnage need not happen. Accidents are not acts of God; they are acts of men and women and children who foolishly bet their lives for dubious rewards.

The driver who speeds to his destination before dark—what does it matter whether he arrives 10 or 20 minutes later?

The youth who attempts to swim across the lake—what is gained by trying to show off in front of a crowd?

The father who refuses to deny his children the "pleasure" of fireworks—what pleasure will the child derive from sightless eyes?

These people and the remainder of the 8,000 marked for accidental death in July are not a strange and nameless breed. They may be the people in your church, in your office, in your block—one may even be you if—

It has been said that accidents are no respecter of persons. But there is one person who is respected by accidents. So says Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, in a recent press release. Dr. Cox explains that athlete's foot is due to a small, mold-like growth or fungus which thrives on moist, warm parts of the body such as the feet.

"The infection of athlete's foot is usually gotten directly or indirectly from someone else," Dr. Cox says, cautioning that the most likely places to contract the infection are around bath houses, locker rooms, and other public places where people go barefoot.

"It is probable that at least one-half of all adults suffer from the infection at some time."

In suggesting some effective measures to be taken to prevent initial cases and avoid recurrent attacks of the disease, Dr. Cox emphasized drying carefully between the toes; use of a mild alcoholic solution on these areas after drying; liberal applications of talcum powder in the socks and shoes; and wearing socks that are absorbent but not coarse.

"Ill fitting shoes are often the source of athlete's foot, Dr. Cox warns. 'Shoes that rub and chafe should be corrected or discarded.'"

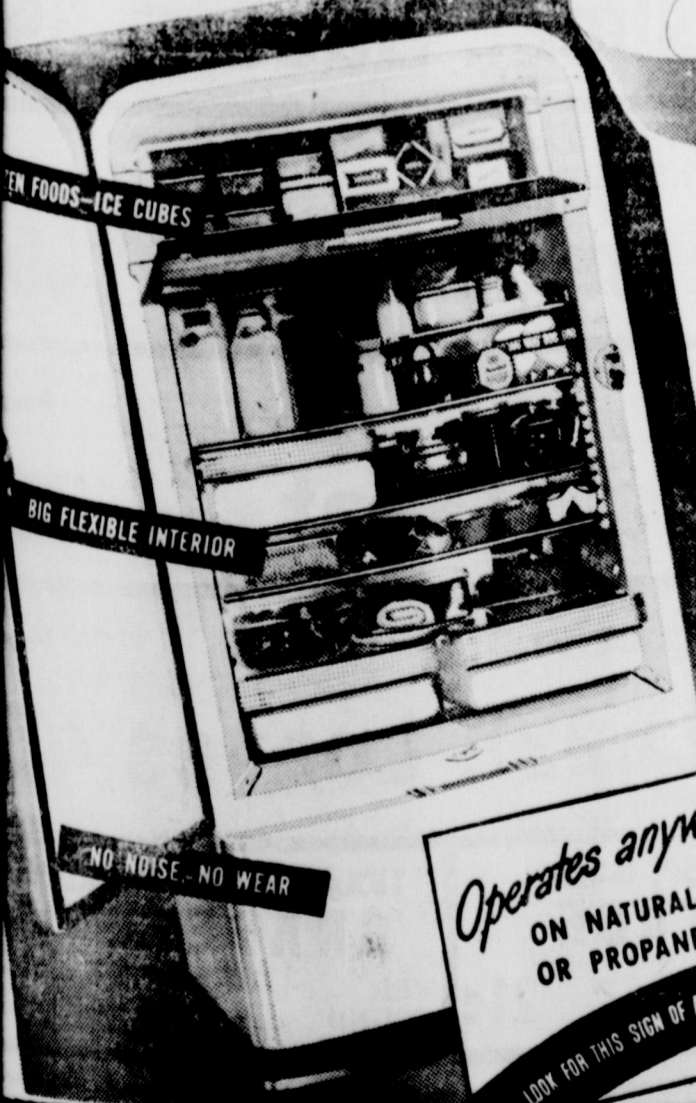

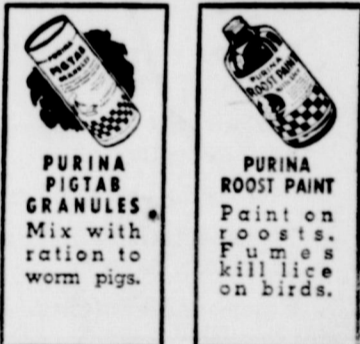

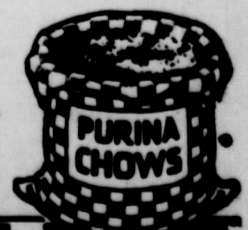

### Traffic Accidents Are Menace To The Lives Of Thousands Of Texans

Calling attention again to the deaths, injuries, and property damage caused by traffic accidents in Texas, Governor Beauford H. Jester announced Saturday that if necessary he would declare a state of emergency in Texas and mobilize the full forces of State government in collaboration with local officials, to meet adequately and quickly "this menace to the lives of people of this state."

The Governor's statement in full is as follows:  
 "In the State of Texas last year a total of 1997 persons lost their lives in traffic accidents with 65,000 more being injured. Property damage reached fantastic figures, the latest estimate being \$81,483,000. Through the cooperation of the Texas Department of Public Safety, the State Highway Department, and the Texas Safety Association, we organized during the year and presented in March the Governor's Highway Safety Conference. ### IRONING CAN BE MADE EASIER

Ironing day comes around once or twice a week in most homes... and there are a few suggestions that might make the job a little easier for the housewife.

Gladys Darden, assistant extension home management specialist of Texas A. and M. College, says that the job of ironing can start when the clothes are hung out on the line. If the clothes are shaken well and hung neatly on the line, there will be fewer wrinkles in them to iron out later.

Some of the clothes, of course, don't have to be ironed at all, so they can be folded out in the clothes yard. In this "no-iron" list are the sheets, bath towels, diapers, knitted underwear, cup-towels, and so on. Seersucker and some of the materials that don't need ironing are good for work dresses and play suits.

You can't expect to do your best ironing with an iron that's too heavy, a rickety board and an ironing board cover and pad that doesn't fit right. The best board to use is one adjustable to the height most comfortable for you. It's the standing up to iron that makes it such a tough job. It is possible to sit down and iron, and much easier on you, too.

Sleeve boards, pressing cloths, and a gadget for holding the cord back out of the way are handy things that will save time and

help turn out a better job. Also a drying rack near the ironing board will be convenient for the things you have finished.

A little organization in the process will help, too. Keep together all the pieces that are alike, and stack them in the order you'll be ironing them. Put the linens at the bottom, cottons next and rayons on top.

And here is some wondering about. It is the job of the iron or the heat, says Miss Darden, so you yourself out by pressing you iron the clothes.

1. Rats begin to breed at two to three months of age, and the period of gestation is about 21 days. The average litter is probably ten, and one female may have from three to four litters a year. That is why it is so important to guard against this rodent and why rat control requires constant attention.

2. Yes. At the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company pullets are grown out each month in the year on all types of feeding programs. These tests show that it is possible to grow out pullets for replacements any time during the year and by so doing have ready-to-day pullets at any season to replace hens which are culled or die.

3. The following should be culled out and slaughtered — never sold for breeding purposes:

1. All buck kids except those from registered, high-producing ancestry.
2. Under-sized doe kids. Cull out the poorest ones and save their feed to do a better job on the rest.
3. Old, unprofitable does who have passed their prime.
4. Milking or dry does with one or both halves of the udder unsound.

**NEWS IN THE WORLD  
OF RELIGION  
By W.W. REID**

"A Positive Program for Peace", outlined by the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America and recently presented to President Truman and other government officials, affirms that the American people and the people called Christians "should not tolerate any complacency about war... should combat a mood of hysteria or blind fear... should reject fatalism about war... should press for positive programs which have immediate possibilities for peace and justice... ought each to contribute to a change of mood so as to increase the chance of averting war without compromise of basic convictions"; and the churches "ought to testify with renewed vigor to God's righteous love for all men and the reality of the Christian world fellowship." A positive program that would aid peace and justice, it is stated, "could quickly move toward greater economic well-being throughout the world; greater emphasis on increasing social welfare, greater observance of human rights to check terrorism, and greater use of processes of international conversation and negotiation."

Under the leadership of Dr. Alfred D. Moore, and with the cooperation of Dr. Frank C. Laubach, world-renowned "apostle of literacy", the Committee on World Literacy and Christian Literature, of the Foreign Missions Conference of North America, is launched on a program to produce, print, and distribute large quantities of Christian books and pamphlets for the peoples of Africa, Burma, China, Korea, Latin America, the Near East and the Philippines, all in the native tongues of those lands, and mostly written by nationals. Dr. John W. Decker, of the International Missionary Council, recently returned from Asia, says that a "cold

battle is being waged across Asia for the control of men's minds—the contestants being Christians and communists.

When Henry Metzker, a member of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church in Sutherlin Oregon, found himself in the U. S. Navy and assigned to duty in Guam, he looked around for fellow religionists, but found none. So he gathered together a few interested natives and together they studied the Bible. After a while this "unofficial missionary" was able to organize a church with twelve baptized members, and today another group is studying for baptism and membership.

Spearheaded by the Foreign Missions Conference of North America, and participated in by mission agencies of more than sixty Protestant groups in the United States and Canada, a continent-wide "Program of Advance in Foreign Missions" will be pressed this coming autumn "to face the churches with their responsibility and obligation for the missionary cause" and to enlist their financial support in a far greater measure than ever before. The first step will be a "Foreign Missions Assembly" in Columbus, Ohio, in October, with 3,500 lay and ministerial delegates, leaders of their various denominations. These leaders are to be "set on fire" for the missionary cause, and sent back to their churches to lead congregations, synods, and conferences in the enterprise. Then, from October 19 to November 19, there will be 32 mass meetings in the United States and four in Canada, all in leading cities, to take the message to the people, and focus the entire communities upon the cause. Coupled with the interdenominational meetings in the cities, will be denominational gatherings in the same centers. At the denominational meetings plans will be inaugurated to raise and advance missionary budgets for the next few years—"to something commensurate with the needs of the world and the opportunities facing the Christian people." No figure has been set as a financial goal, but someone has estimated that a minimum of the churches in the Foreign Missions Conference should give \$500,000,000 for foreign missions in the next three to four years. The cities in which the central interdenominational mass meetings are to be held are: Bos-

ton, Albany, Montreal, Rochester, Harrisburg, Toronto, Washington, Pittsburg, Cleveland, Indianapolis, Louisville, Detroit, Chicago, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Winnipeg, Des Moines, Denver, Lincoln, Kansas City, St. Louis, Charlotte, Richmond, Jackson, Nashville, Birmingham, Oklahoma City, Dallas, Houston, Atlanta, Vancouver, Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, Fresno, Los Angeles.

Since Independence Day, July 4, comes on a Sunday this year, the American Heritage Foundation, of which Thomas D. Brophy is president, is asking churches of all creeds and denominations to observe the day as one of "rededication to our American heritage of freedom" by the ringing of church bells and by special sermons and prayers throughout the land. It urges the ringing of all bells from 9:55 to 10 a. m. as a "special anniversary chiming commemorating the ringing of the Liberty Bell in 1776."
