VETS SCHOOLS ARE GROWING

Home Happenings

Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Dysart spent several days in Wellington last week, in the home of her sister, who is

George S. Gandy, co-ordinator of the 5 Wheeler county Veterans Vocational schools, said this week 100 ex-servicemen are presently enrolled in classes being held at Shamrock, Wheeler, Mobettie and Allison.

Instruction is being offered in farm training, distributive education, trades and industry. Gandy, who also serves as an instructor, is assisted by four other instructors: Fred S. Farmer at Shamrock; Samuel A. Thomas, Jr., at Mobettie; John R. Petersen at Allison and Frank O. Wofford and Al Thomas at Wheeler.

Between 20 and 25 veterans are enrolled in each class, and at least two additional classes are contemplated, Gandy said. Instruction will be offered in auto body and fender work in a class starting at Shamrock high school at 8:30 o'clock Tuesday night, July 20.

While about 15 enrollees have dropped out since the veterans vocational school started on June 1, 1947, there have been new students added and the overall attendance is growing, the co-ordinator said.

Farm training is the most popular class, with all enrollees assigned definite farm and home improvement projects on which they can work from day to day, such as home beautification, stock improvement, soil conservation, use of certified seeds, control of soil erosion by water and wind, control of insects.

Most students are working toward home ownership, Gandy said, and are growing fruits and vegetables; learning to preserve and can them and to process meats. The men are given explanations of state and federal farm organizations and of the various beneficial farm subsidy setups. Some are gradually working toward participation in the AAA program.

Instruction in administrative education includes courses in bookkeeping, accounting, secretarial work and salesmanship while the trades and industries class offers tractor mechanics and body and fender work at the present time.

Instruction is offered in any requested subject when enough students signify their desire to enroll in the class. Any veteran entitled to subsistence under the GI Bill of Rights may contact Gandy for information as to eligibility and the types of instruction open.

Employers Required To Deduct Security Taxes

Employers are required to deduct social security taxes on only the first \$3,000 of wages per year, J. R. Sanderson, manager of the social security office in Amarillo, said today. "Even at this late date," he said, "the Social Security Administration is still getting inquiries from employers and employees about these excess taxes."

The employer's quarterly tax returns should show the name, social security number, and amount of wages paid each employee. Sanderson pointed out, however, that after an employee has been paid \$3,000 in the course of a calendar year, the employer should no longer include his name on his reports.

Requests for refund of excess taxes paid on wages of more than \$3,000 should be made with the Collector of Internal Revenue and not to the social security field office, and must be made within a period of 2 calendar years after the year in which the wages were paid.

Near \$3,000 Taken From Four Stores Sunday Morning

One of the biggest robberies ever to occur in Wheeler was pulled off last Saturday night or Sunday morning by some leisurely crooks who were skilled at their profession and confident enough of themselves to take time out to eat a snack while they were in Clay's Food Store.

According to reports from the four firms burglarized the culprits escaped with approximately \$2,653.80 dollars in cash and checks and a small amount of merchandise.

It was reported that the burglarizing presumably took place some time after 5:00 o'clock Sunday morning after Bud Errington, city nightwatchman, went off duty because it was reported that as far as he could tell everything was in order when he went in.

The Southwestern Public Service Company was hit for \$1,330.00 of which approximately \$450.00 was in cash money. The money represented the last of the first of the month collections for the company. The robbery was first discovered by Raymond Sayre, manager of the Public Service Co., at approximately 7:45 o'clock Sunday morning when he came down to the office to change a voltage chart. The thieves worked the combination on the safe, it was reported.

The culprits entered the public service company building through a rear window after breaking down a bar, they left a couple of cartons of cigarettes laying outside the window. It was later discovered the cigarettes had been taken from the Clay Food Store.

The second largest haul made by the crooks was at the Cifers Smith Lumber Co. where they got \$1,287.80 in cash and checks with approximately \$30.00 of the total being in cash. A total of \$522.11 was in cash and small checks of which the lumber company had no record. Besides the cash there

JAMES PORTER FHA DIRECTOR

Appointment of James N. Porter, Wheeler, Texas, to a three-year term on the Farmers Home Administration County Committee for Wheeler County was announced today by L. J. Cappelman, State Director.

Mr. Porter succeeds Mr. John D. Baird, whose term expired June 30. Also on the committee are Mr. John E. Reeves of Shamrock, Texas and Mr. Clarence Zybach of Briscoe, Texas. A committee of three serves in each agricultural county through the nation in which the agency makes farm ownership and operating loans. Appointments are scheduled so that a committee always has two experienced members.

The Wheeler county committee has an important place in making supervised credit available to local farmers, according to Truman J. Jones, County Supervisor.

Before any money can be borrowed through the agency an applicant must have the approval of the county committee. In the case of farm ownership loans, the farm to be purchased, enlarged or improved must also be approved by the committee. The members know agricultural conditions in the county, are often familiar with the farm the applicant plans to operate," Mr. Jones explained.

In addition to approving loans the committee cooperates with the county supervisor in overall administration of the program in the county. Periodically they review the progress of borrowers to determine whether they have reached a financial position that would enable them to refinance their loans through private lenders. A farmer who is eligible for credit from regular lending sources is not eligible for a loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

"Using this system of operation, the agency has helped a number of families in Wheeler County toward better farming and better living with farm purchase and farm operating loans," Mr. Jones said. In the past 12 months eighty applicants have been received for this type of credit.

SHAMROCK WILL HOLD FREE FAIR

The new Community Building, 100 x 120 feet, in which the fair will be held has just been completed and will house the Agricultural, Community, Club and Class Exhibits, and the new Live Stock Exhibit Building, 32 x 100 feet is under construction. The X-Ray unit will be in Wheeler and Mobettie on preceding days. The unit is provided to take X-Ray photos of all people attending over fifteen years of age. This service is free and is available to residents of neighboring Oklahoma Counties as well as Texas. The primary purpose is to make chest pictures to determine whether or not the person photographed has an indication of Tuberculosis.

Interest Slight In Election Which Is Only Ten Days Off

With the Democratic Primary election only 10 days off, there does not seem to be any more interest in Wheeler County politics than there was a month ago before candidates lined up for official start of the vote-grabbing contest.

Seasoned observers had become accustomed to a slackened pace in political campaigns since the start of World War II when citizens had more personal problems than politics to think about, but were expecting to see a resumption of activity this year with several contested local races on the ticket.

Wheeler County Man Best Bet In Race For State Representative

"The Wheeler county candidate is our best bet this year." That seems to be the consensus of a growing number of voters in Gray and Collingsworth counties in the race for State Representative in the 132nd legislative district in which Grainger McIlhany, 30-year-old war vet and dry goods merchant of Wheeler, is pitting against Carl B. Morris, youthful Texas University law student whose home is at Clarendon.

The Wheeler county man who holds two degrees from the University of Texas (law and business administration) is favored in Pampa and Gray county because McIlhany was born and reared in Wheeler county and has at least a working knowledge of the oil and gas industry as well as agriculture, friends of the Wheeler man who have contacted a cross-section of Gray county voters, report.

Pampa, without a candidate in the state representative race, takes the view a Wheeler county man, within easy access to those needing his services, would be the next best thing to having a home man in the legislative post.

A party of Wheeler friends of McIlhany bring back less favorable reports from Collingsworth county; however, where several fellow townsmen of the young Clarendon law student, have been working in behalf of Morris. They say both McIlhany and Morris are unknown to most voters and that a substantial number of people are yet undecided whom to support for state representative.

McIlhany, native son of Wheeler, has the backing of the church people of his home town, the American Legion, and business people alike. He has been active in church and Legion work and just finished a year as president of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. Grainger is the son of the late M. McIlhany, pioneer merchant, and he and his mother now operate the dry goods store bearing his father's name.

The Wheeler county candidate is modest and quiet, and since this is his first try at politics, his friends who are assisting in his campaign are calling on local citizens to lend their assistance by recommending McIlhany to their friends. The candidate was an honor student at the University.

If McIlhany is able to get as solid backing at home as Judge Lewis Goodrich of Shamrock received in his 4-county judicial race two years ago, he will have a good chance. Goodrich got about 80 percent of the Wheeler county vote.

A group of Wheeler war veterans are going to form a motorcade and tour the district in McIlhany's behalf next week.

**MOSCOW GIVES US
EXTENSION OF TIME**

The theory in Moscow is: Give capital enough rope and it will fall into a panic. Marx worked out the theory and Moscow goes by a Marxian timetable. Moscow, ac-

cordingly, has been counting on our taking a nosedive. They said it would come quickly, the Kremlin prophets did. Now the Russian people are a little uneasy about the delay.

Faced with a situation like that, the Kremlin can do two things. It can assert that the panic is already here and that the people of the United States are starving in the streets. It could decide to do that at midnight and by supertime in most of Russia the peasants would be saying to each other: "Well, the panic has come to the Amerikan-skies." The other thing the Kremlin can do is to explain how it comes about that business is still good in the United States.

It is interesting that the second course is the one chosen by the Kremlin. Pravda, official Communist mouthpiece in Moscow, says:

"The new military credits on a par with the Marshall Plan are expected (besides their direct significance, the further strengthening of United States armaments) to create an artificial increase in 'business activity' and postpone the onset of the inevitable economic crisis."

That the Communist line at home is to print something near to the truth instead of depending on a downright lie is interesting because it indicates that the Iron Curtain has cracks in it. Whether by reason of foreign broadcasts, including our own, or otherwise, the Russian peasant has some access to world news, after all. What will happen to Russian policy when the Marshall Plan begins to take hold in Western Europe is probably puzzling the Russians even more than it is puzzling us.

But the Pravda account says the Americans have chosen guns instead of butter. Guns and butter, too, would be more than any European can bring himself to imagine. Guns and no panic may be enough to give Moscow occasion for pause.

Summertime turns every homemaker's mind toward thoughts of how she can make her home look cool and inviting while still keeping work at a minimum. A smart housewife knows that a cool-appearing room can go a long way toward making summer weather more bearable. One way to achieve this cool, comfortable look and eliminate extra work is to take down heavy curtains and the winter draperies. But the best trick is to follow this young lady's good example of pulling down the window shades before spending her leisure hours outdoors sunbathing or gardening. To keep the room cool, draw the window shades to the sill during the hot part of the day. Cloth shades insulate against excessive heat and will make the room as much as 10° cooler... a welcome relief on sultry days.

THRIPS CAUSE ROSE BUDS DIE BEFORE OPENING

If your rose buds dry before they open, it may not be the dry weather that is spoiling them. If fully opened roses dry before shattering and stay on the bush, look for thrips. Thrips take the sap out of your blooms and may cause your rose bushes to fill with dried flowers, warns Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. and M. College. As soon as one flower dries the thrips fly to another and take sap there.

Thrips are so small and so hard to see that many people do not notice them. It is easy to find them if you look. Take all the pedals of one bloom with one hand and pull them off. At once tap them gently on a piece of paper and you will see tiny insects run and fly away.

It is easier to see them if you shake them onto a piece of solid black cloth. Since they have wings and have quick movements, many of them fly away at the first disturbance. However, enough will be left for you to see them. You can part the pedals of the flower and see them running about inside the rose. They are flesh colored, very slender and are about the size of tiny black ants. These pests destroy many kinds of blooms, too. Sometimes they sap from leaves and cause them to dry up.

When a rose garden is infested with thrips, it is a good idea to pick all of the blooms and partly open buds into a paper sack. Burn them immediately. If left outside or in an open container the thrips will fly back to the rose garden. After burning the flowers dust or spray with nicotine sulphate or with 5 percent DDT mixture.

Another remedy is poisoned bait. Be sure to handle with care because this is poisonous to people as well as to thrips, cautions Miss Hatfield. Use six teaspoons of tartar emetic, two cups of granulated sugar and four gallons of water. Mix well and spray with a coarse nozzle at low pressure. Be sure that drops form on the blooms. The thrips like the sweet taste of sugar and many of them will be killed.

In planning menus, include at least three vegetables in the meals each day—one or more servings of potatoes, green or yellow vegetables and "other" vegetables. The "other" group are neither yellow nor green, such as eggplant, white squash, radishes, onions, celery, white corn, or half mature beans and peas.

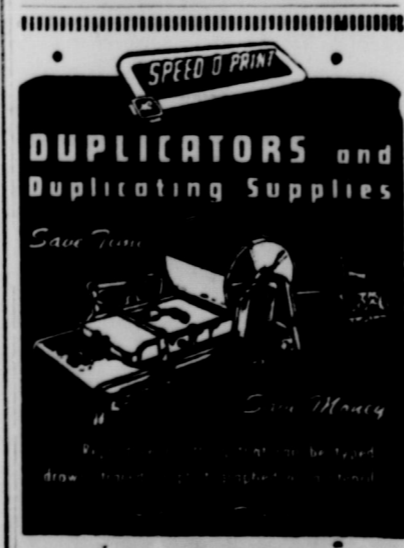

463 Cases Diphtheria Reported This Year

According to the morbidity report or the week ending July 3, more than 463 cases of diphtheria occurred throughout the state so far this year.

The morbidity report is released weekly by the Texas State Department of Health. It shows the prevalence of communicable disease by counties.

"In the light of our present knowledge regarding the control of diphtheria, it is unfortunate that the disease is allowed to flourish," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, said.

For the week June 26 to July 3, Nueces County reported 4 cases; Hopkins, Tarrant and Val Verde Counties reported one each. For

the year 1947, seventy-seven deaths from diphtheria were recorded.

"A life-time immunity may be established in 90 percent of the children receiving the diphtheria toxoid," the health officer said.

"If all parents of children over six months of age would have their children inoculated, the incidence rate of the disease would be rapidly reduced."

The administration of toxoid causes little or no discomfort in the child, Dr. Cox added, and a positive immunity can be determined by a Schick test conducted four to six months after the final dose of the toxoid has been given the child.

Leather Shoes Can Be Kept From Mildewing

In order to keep leather shoes in shipshape condition, Mary Routh, extension clothing specialist of Texas A. and M. College, advises protective measures during the hot summer months against mildew.

With a little humid weather to get a start, mildew can do quite a bit of damage to a good pair of shoes in the closet, especially if they are on the floor. That brings up the first mildew preventive measure: keep the shoes on high shelves or racks in the closet. Such places are drier and safer against mildew than on the floor or low shoe racks. Because the damp air is heavy, it settles along the floor and makes things easier for mildew.

The heat from an electric light bulb kept burning in the closet will keep the air dry enough to prevent mildew on clothes and shoes. And you can turn the electric fan into the closet to blow the stale, moist air out of the closet.

Chemicals are also handy for taking the moisture out of damp closets. The old stand-by is a jar of calcium chloride. However, calcium chloride can soon "drink" its fill and has to be replaced by another supply. Silica gel crystals, developed during the war, absorb moisture easily, and after a time, can be heated to drive off the moisture and reused again.

And, if you have tried these and find that mildew still gets on your leather shoes when stored in the closet, wash it off right away with a cloth dipped in mild, pure soapsuds or saddle soap, and wipe dry. When the leather is thoroughly dry, polish them with a good wax shoe polish, says Miss Routh.

Change In Insured Mortgage Set-Up Are Announced

Recent Congressional changes in the insured mortgage program of the Farmers Home Administration will broaden opportunities of farmers to obtain real estate credit, L. J. Cappelman, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration of Dallas, announced today.

An assured market for insured mortgages and an increase of one-half of one percent in the interest rate are provided in amendments to the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act, approved June 19, to encourage greater participation of private capital in the farm ownership program.

Lenders who extend credit to

eligible farmers for the purchase, enlargement or development of farms under the insured farm mortgage program may assign the mortgage to the Government and receive payment in full at the end of a specified period established by the Government. The loans will carry an interest rate of 3 percent and a 1 percent insured mortgage charge.

The credit is extended only to farmers who cannot obtain adequate financing from private or cooperative sources. Repayment of the loans is fully guaranteed by the Government. The loans are limited to 90 percent of the borrowers total investment in the farm and are repayable over a 40 year period.

County People Homes in 1948

Estimated \$231,000 will be expended in repairing and modernizing farm homes in Wheeler county in 1948, according to a report released by the Tile Council of America.

The report will be expended on painting, carpentry, plumbing repairs and plumbing work disclosed.

The availability of building materials will make possible a record of home improvement in the nation this year," said Malcolm Schwelker, chairman of the Council's residential committee.

Of every 100 homes in the county, 17 were repaired or replaced, according to the report. Seven will have plumbing overhead, bathrooms tiled or showers installed and six will have carpentry work done, the report revealed.

"To meet demands for materials for both new homes and home repairs, production has been stepped up in practically every type of material," said Mr. Schwelker. The output of ceramic tile for bathrooms and kitchens, for instance, is now at the highest rate in history, government reports show.

Throughout the nation between \$2,600,000,000 and \$3,300,000,000 will be spent this year on home repair, according to the Tile Council report. This is believed the largest amount ever expended for such work.

Housewives Seek More Quality in Potatoes

A recent USDA survey shows that with housewives who know potatoes best, it's quality 12 to 1, says Myrtle Murray, extension home marketing specialist of Texas A. and M. College.

The survey, conducted by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics under the Research and Marketing Act, took a cross-section sample of housewives in towns of 2,500 population and over. Texas was one of the 26 states covered in this survey and Texas women from Shamrock, San Antonio, Lubbock and Galveston made up part of the 3,500 women in the nation that were interviewed. These homemakers were asked about their preference in potatoes. Their answers showed that 12 to 1, they considered quality more important than either size or price.

And when it came to size and price, they placed size above price three to one. Southern housewives were just a little more interested in price than those of the North. No matter what the income level, the women thought quality and size were more important than the price. As the income level went up, however, interest in quality and size increased, while that in price decreased, says Miss Murray.

The elders of a nearby village of Otetela-speaking natives recently decided to initiate Mr. Lovell into their unique honorary order, "Khumi y' Ekunda," meaning King of the Woods. This is an historic group of village elders, and before the coming of the white man they exerted a great power in the country. They still act as judges among the people, often stopping fights by sticking spears in the ground between enemies and forcing them to arbitrate. At the initiation of Mr. Lovell he was presented the symbols of his authority: two spears, a gong, a belt of antelope skin, and a stool. They gave him the name, "Khumi Manyi," meaning "the one who understands everything." All members are required to be honest and truthful, and (strange thing in Africa) not to beat their wives.

NEWS IN THE WORLD OF RELIGION

by W.W. REID

The acting chaplain of Columbia University, who was in charge of religious observances in connection with that school's mammoth commencement observances in June, is the Rev. Shunji Forrest Nishi, an American-born Japanese, graduate of the Episcopal Theological School in Cambridge, Mass., and an ordained clergyman of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

Seventy-five bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States are now in England where they have been in attendance at the Lambeth Conference of the Church of England—the mother church of the Anglican communion. This is the first meeting of the conference since 1930, and the eighth in the history of the church. Some 330 bishops are

in attendance, and more than 200 of these are from outside the British Isles. The Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Geoffrey Fisher, presides over the conference which, he says, "meets at a time of extraordinary confusion in the world."

"Christianity is not a beautiful dream; it is not merely a hauntingly lovely poem of a far-off age," said Francis B. Sayre, president of the Trusteeship Council of the United Nations and former Assistant Secretary of State of the U. S., in a recent address at Princeton Theological Seminary. "It is not a way of escape. It is an intensely practical way of life for here and now. It is a unique and God-given revelation of the only possible foundation upon which a human society can be built that will satisfy the eternal demands of the human heart and thus prove stable and permanent. . . . The choice between the pagan way of war or a peace built upon justice and Christian brotherhood will in all probability determine within the next decade or two the fate of western civilization."

A group of Japanese alumni of Aoyama Gakuin, the Christian college which was maintained by the Methodist Church in Tokyo before World War II and whose buildings were badly damaged by American bombs, have recently organized a unique body known as "Aoyama Gakuin Business Men's Club." The purpose of the organization is to promote understanding between American and Japanese; to sell information on business, journalism, religion, and education in Japan to American interests needing such knowledge, photos, etc., and to use all the profits of the enterprise in the reconstruction of the buildings of Aoyama Gakuin. The promoters were engaged in business with the United States before the war, and have already established new business, educational, and journalistic connections with American firms. Takeo Fujiwara is the executive of the Club, and he has the assurance of leading Japanese and Americans, including: Dr. E. T. Iglehart, missionary; Prof. Eiju Matsuba of Nihon University; Dr. Yoshimune Abe, former Methodist bishop; Dr. Minoru Toyoda, educator; and Bunshiro Suzuki, editor.
