
Directors elected for a threeyear term were Ira Passons, Chester Hampton and Floyd Davidson.







> Fruit Icebox Pie

Broadcast: August 7, 1948 1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup Pet Milk
1 cup graham
cracker crumbs
1/4 cup soft butter

9-oz. can crushed pineapple 1 package strawberry gelatin 11/4 cups powdered

Drain pineapple, saving juice. Add mough water to juice to make 3/4 cup. dissolved. Add pineapple, ¼ cup pow-dered sugar, the salt and lemon juice. Chill until thoroughly cold; then stir in milk. Chill until syrupy. Meanwhile, grease a deep 9-in. pie pan. With back of spoon, press 3/4 cup crumbs on bot-tom and sides of pan. Put butter into bowl; work remaining 1 cup of pow-dered sugar into butter. Beat in egg yolks. Spread carefully over crumbs in pan. Chill. Fold stiffly beaten egg whites into syrupy gelatin mixture.
Pour into prepared pan. Sprinkle remaining 1/4° cup crumbs over top.
Chill until firm.







Since most of us will take a trip this summer study these tips on-Clothes For Travel

Clothes can do so much to make or mar a vacation that it pays to choose a travel wardrobe with great care, says Clarice Scott, clothing specialist of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Choose right and you can "travel light" yet be well and comfortably dressed with the minimum of washing and ironing, Miss Scott says.

The mainstay of a travel wardrobe usually is a suit, preferably of dark or mixed colors which do not show easily. Faille is a good suit fabric because it resists wrinkles-rayon faille, or for cool weather wool faille. For hot weather seersucker has the advantage of being cool, crease resistant, easy to wash, needing no ironing. The new sheer one-denier rayons are cool and can be ironed dry. The new ginghams in practical colors designed for "tour suits" also are good choices.

For children cotton knitwear is comfortable, easily washed, needs no ironing.

For semi-dressy wear consider a silk or rayon print. Prints show soil and wrinkles less than plain colors. Nylon slips are recommended because they do not wrinkle, dry quickly after washing and need no pressing.

Even though frills are prominent in fashions this year, fussy styles are poor choices for travel. Miss Scott suggests, because they

Washing and ironing are hard on seams. Seams need to be strong but not thick so that it is difficult to get them dry in ironing. 


