**What About Nightwatchman?**

For almost a year now the merchants of the City of Wheeler have dug down in their pockets and paid the greater portion of a nightwatchman's salary . . . the time has come, again, to raise the money with

which to pay OUR nightwatchman for another six months, and at the beginning of the other two periods it was just like pulling teeth to get some of the firms to "kick-in" and a few even refused entirely.

We believe the City of Wheeler needs a nightwatchman, if for no reason other than as a fire guard, but we also believe that a nightwatchman can and does keep down much petty thievery and will either scare off or catch many more experienced crooks. True, we have had robberies here while the nightwatchman was on duty, but other cities which have several officers on duty at night also experience occasional robberies.

Perhaps we have been raising the money for the nightwatchman's salary in the wrong way, but at the time the City of Wheeler did not have enough money coming in in taxes to pay a man's salary . . . and the City of Wheeler still doesn't have enough money coming in in taxes to pay the salary of a nightwatchman, but some members of the city council believe that the fairest way for the city to employ a nightwatchman is to either increase the tax rate enough to bring in the needed revenue or raise the valuation of city property and leave the tax rate the same as it now stands.

The Times would like to know what the opinion of some of the people of Wheeler is regarding the above mentioned issue and would welcome letters regarding same.

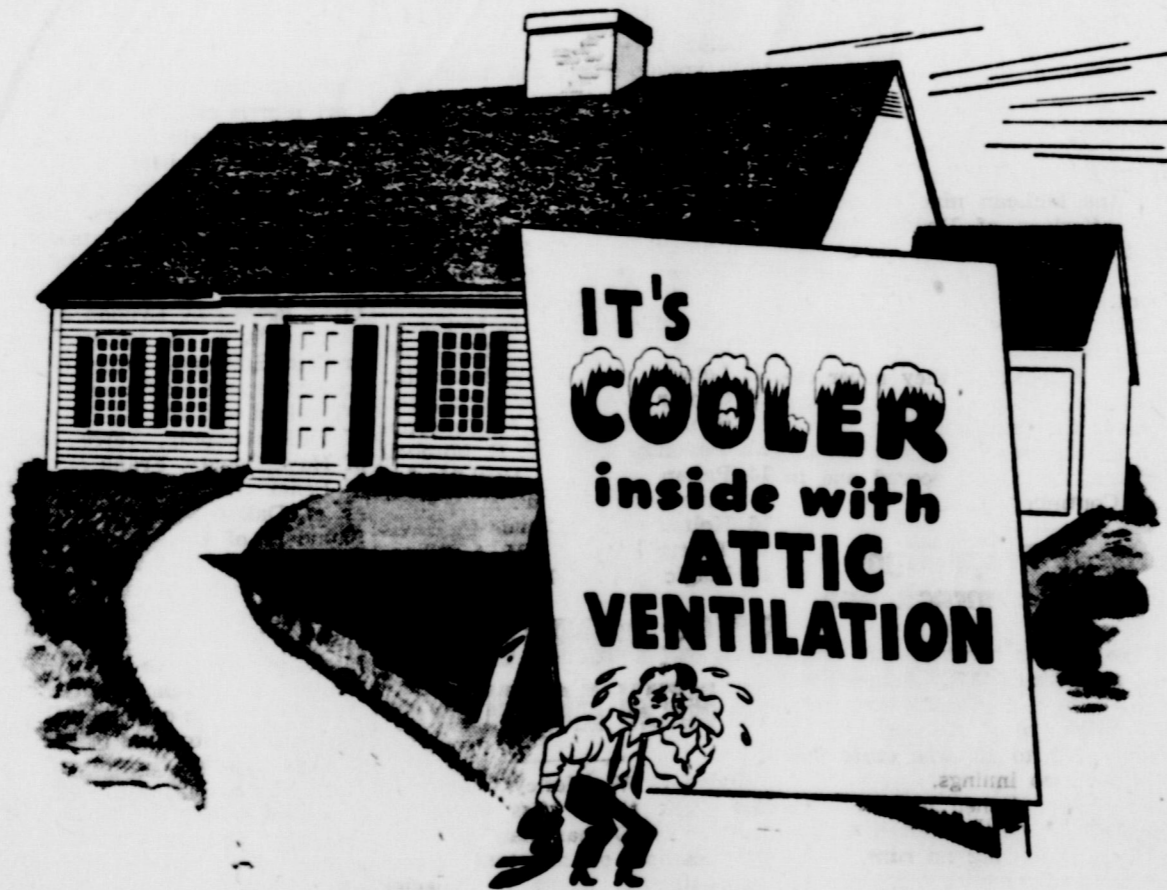
**Air Parcel Post**

The innovation of parcel post by air will go into effect on September 1 by reason of authorization signed by President Truman. Packages weighing from eight ounces to 70 pounds will be carried by mail plane, and rates will range from 55 cents to 80 cents for the first pound, dependent on the zone for delivery.

Parcel post by rail has about preempted the small package business, and now aviation may make inroads upon that business of the railroads. Speed of delivery will be an appeal for air parcel post, which should develop in time to a large-scale undertaking. Cargo liners would be a windfall for the aircraft industry, so vital to national defense, and to defense itself. Air parcel post is another milestone in the amazing progress of American aviation, which obviously will need more, larger airports rather than fewer of them.

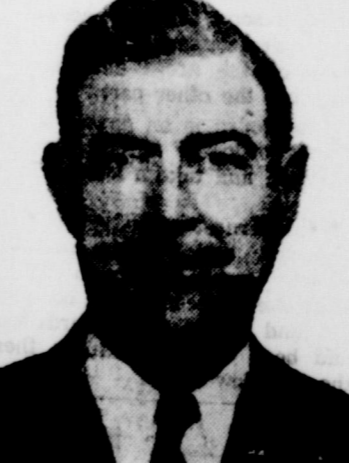

School, Riverdale-on-Hudson, New York; and in August they sail for Japan from San Francisco. These young educators are going largely to teach English in Japanese schools, but some will also be related to existing missionary schools and will teach Bible and ethics and related subjects as well as English. Some will serve under the United Church of Japan, and in interdenominational schools. A minister who comes from a Japanese American family, the Rev. Morse T. Saito, of Chicago, is also in the group. Because of the food shortage in Japan, each member will take along six month's food supply. And to help in the housing situation, four prefabricated houses are being taken. One will be set up in Nagasaki, one in Nagoya, and two in Tokyo—at Aoyama Gakuin, the Methodist College, and at the Wesley Foundation.

Recorded May 9, 1945, in 188 S.W. nationals and sixteen national agencies, sponsors the Conference. Principally it will consider the Christian church and personal commitment of life to Christ as the answers to what is wrong in the world today; it will consider also methods of teaching, Bible study, etc.

"Though the motive of Quaker service is religious and spiritual as a matter of experience his success is often due to such secular seeming qualities as persistence, imagination and resourcefulness," says Dr. Henry J. Cadbury, chairman of the American Friends Service Committee, Philadelphia, Pa. "If he followed some ready made pattern, if he applied merely some technique of approved social practice, he would despair of mankind more easily. His faith in man's capability to persuasion enables him to experiment and to venture in where diplomats fear to tread. He regards neither war nor injustice as inevitable. Without denying that 'man is prone to evil as the sparks fly upward,' he believes that there is also a divine spark, 'something of God,' in every man. To this he appeals by patience, by reason, by example, and if necessary by his own suffering for the right. If he does not always succeed, his average success is not much behind that of those who use what they choose to call the 'practical' methods of fighting for their rights though the heavens fall."

### Are You A Collector Of Kitchen Gadgets?

Are you a collector of gadgets for your kitchen? Are there many utensils on your shelves that you seldom use? Then maybe the study and recommendations of the extension home management specialist for Texas A. and M. College, Mrs. Bernice Claytor, will help you.

She says in selecting kitchen utensils and small equipment the homemaker should guard against too many gadgets which do not have real value. Those utensils never used should be discarded and the ones seldom used stored in the less convenient places.

In thinking through the utensils used in cooking on top of the stove, the homemaker can select the frying pans, double boilers, large pans with lids and sauce pans varying in size to suit the amount of cooking done. A double boiler of 1 1/2 quart size, 3 frying pans, an 8 quart kettle with a lid, and three sauce pans holding 1 quart, 3 quarts and 4 quarts will suit the needs of the average size Texas farm and ranch family.

The utensils used for baking will include a 10 by 14 inch baking pan with a trivet, at least 1 baking sheet, several bread pans if bread is baked at home, cake pans of desired size and shape, casserole with a lid, cooling rack, custard cups or molds, pudding pan, muffin pan, and several pie pans.

Checking the utensils used at the sink the average family will find use for the dish draining rack and a pan to fit, dish pan, sink strainer and vegetable brush.

The mixing center will need the pint, quart, and cup measuring peaces, with mixing bowls from 1 to 4 pint sizes. If bread is made at

home, the bread mixing pan and lid will be a larger piece than other mixing equipment.

There will be other equipment needed according to individual family requirements. There are many small things which may be accumulated too fast if the homemaker does not ask herself if she will actually use the article and if it will be satisfactory for her needs.

Sunstroke, which results from being out in the sun too long, may be avoided by keeping the head covered with a broad-brimmed hat and by covering the body with loose-fitting comfortable clothing.

### WANT A NEW GARDEN NOW

Gardeners should take advantage of mid-summer moisture. If vegetables have not been planted from the garden, it's high time to do so, says J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist of A. and M. College. The old garden can be used for the new plants in the next few days. The old vegetables have been moved—roots and all—apparently three pounds of 5-10-5 special fertilizer for every 100 row space, stirring the soil to a depth of four or five inches. Fertilizer thoroughly with so that there will not be possibility of damage to the growing seed. It is a good time to get collards in the ground. The Georgia is an old standby which does best in the east and south-western parts of Texas. Sow seed in rows of six to eight per foot and water them with about an inch of water. By placing a few old

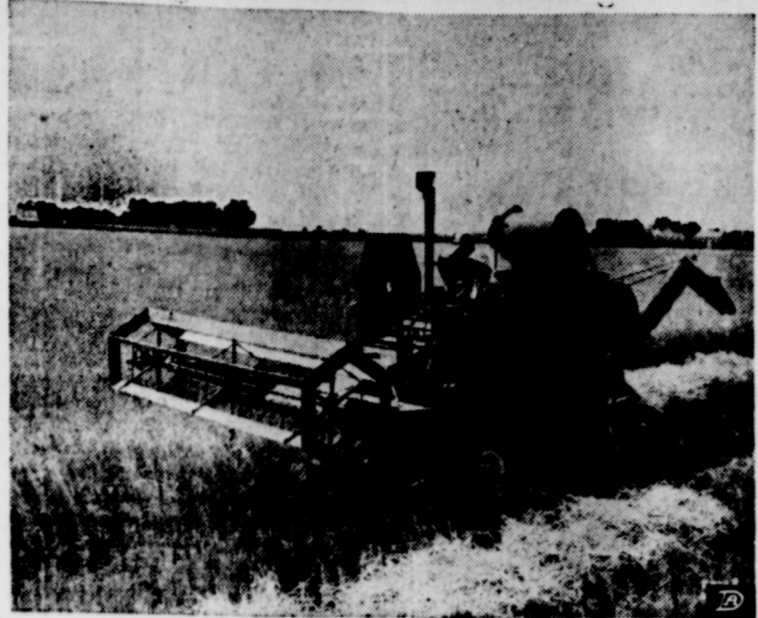
boards over the planted area, says Rosborough, the soil will be kept cool and the loss of moisture reduced. The seed will sprout sooner, too.

When the young plants begin to show up, remove the planks. Should the weather become dry and hot during late July, it will be necessary to give the young plants a good watering every week or ten days. By late August the collard plants will be large enough to be thinned to two feet apart in the row—and plants that are removed may be transplanted to adjacent rows.

Now is a good time to plant seed for fall tomatoes, Rosborough says. The Stokesdale variety for large slices or the Porter variety for small fruit are recommended. Plant the seed in single rows, care for them as in a small plant bed, and thin them in 30 or 40 days to a spacing of three feet apart. Additional rows may be set from the plants which are removed from the original rows.

The alert gardener should take advantage of favorable moisture in the soil, and prepare rows for planting of Irish potatoes, turnips,

### Combines Meet Threat of Storm Damage



WICHITA, KAN.—Recent heavy rains, which caused flash floods over wide areas, have seriously threatened the wheat harvest in Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Nebraska. Kansas was hardest hit with estimated damage of \$100,000 here when a tornado dipped to the ground. The self-propelled combine, above, a one-man machine, is a big factor in cutting losses by the rains, because it works faster, thus taking full advantage of breaks in the weather and because it is designed to skim the ground, thus saving grain which has been beaten down and tangled by storms.

The self-propelled combine, since its mass demonstration in the Massey-Harris harvest brigade during the critical harvest years of 1944-45, is the rule today wherever wheat is grown. It can harvest 50 acres of wheat in a 10-hour day.

now, it can be kept in a loose, workable condition so that with the coming of fall showers, planting can be done immediately.

A few hours in the early morning or late evening given over to the garden at this time of year will mean plenty of early fall vegetables and make you the garden leader in your neighborhood or community says Rosborough.

### Classification and Market News Service Available To Farmers

Texas cotton farmers who want to receive classification and market news service on their 1948 crop should get their group applications in within a few days.

Deadline date for the eastern part of the state is August 1 and for the western part, August 15, John L. McCollum, manager, southwest area cotton branch, USDA's Production and Marketing Administration, Dallas, announced.

August 1 deadline takes in all counties lying entirely or for the most part east of the 100th Meridian and the August 15 closing date all counties lying entirely or for the most part west of the 100th Meridian.

Both services are provided without charge under the Smith-Doxey Act to organized cotton improvement groups.

Group applications may be filed at the Dallas cotton office, 1104 South Ervay, or at PMA's classification offices located in Austin, Abilene, Galveston, Lubbock and El Paso.

Texas had more than 1,000 organized improvement groups last year consisting of nearly 100,000 farmers who had over a million and a half bales classed. This represents about one-half of the 1947 crop, McCollum explained.

### KITCHEN MEMO

Hot weather is no time to fuss about meals. Introduce cool King Neptune Salad with a hot soup, supplement salad and soup with nourishing wheat toast wafers, add iced tea and ice cream and you have a simple evening supper. For the salad, combine one 12-oz. can flaked tuna fish (1 1/2 cups), 1/2 cup diced celery, 1 cup diced cucumber and 1 1/2 tsp. grated onion. Mix 1 tbsp. lemon juice, 1 1/2 tsp. catsup, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, add to tuna fish mixture, season with salt and pepper, toss lightly, chill. Wash 6 tomatoes, remove stem, chill. Cut tomatoes into fourths, petal fashion, only about two-thirds, enough to spread petals. Stuff with fish mixture. Serve on crisp salad greens. Serves 6.

Your automatic washer uses up from 20 to 30 gals. of hot water while you are washing for a half hour to an hour. Because of its "quick recovery" an automatic gas water heater keeps well ahead of such increased hot water demands in the home.

Leftover sandwiches can be well wrapped in wax paper and damp towel and put in the refrigerator. Next day take them out, spread with melted butter or margarine and toast under the broiler flame.

Corduroy play clothes and towels need not be ironed when dried in an automatic gas dryer. Just take them out when faintly damp, and smooth with the hands.

The button holes of wool sweaters often stretch during washing. Sew them up before laundering to keep them in their original shape.

## 400,000 LESS BEEF CATTLE

Agricultural economists estimate that today there are some four hundred thousand less beef cattle in the United States than on hand at the close of World War I in 1918. Dairy bulls are included in the beef cattle total because separate figures aren't available, says T. R. Timm, extension economist in farm management of Texas A. and M. College. But when total figures are used in this case, the real story is covered.

Although total beef numbers are lower between the two periods, cow numbers are up. There are nearly 50 thousand more cows in two years and over, and about four hundred thousand more heifers one to two years old. Calves and steers, in about equal numbers, account mainly for the general decrease. Estimates are made as of the first of the year, says Timm.

"Compared to World War I, we now have in supply fewer beef cattle but we can increase beef production quicker in view of a higher percentage of cows and heifers," Timm points out.

Right after the first World War, there were 400 head of cattle for every 1,000 persons in America. Today this picture is a little different. At the present count there are only 284 head for the same number of people. Even the number of beef cows and heifers, when related to population, lost ground instead of gaining, as did the total number of cows and heifers.

Another interesting fact about the beef cattle trends, says Timm, is that the number of pounds of beef hasn't gone down as much as the cattle number. All in all, it looks as if the cowmen have a pretty good outlook "price-wise".

## HEART DISEASE NO. 1 KILLER

Heart disease continued in the top spot as the number one killer of Texans, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health.

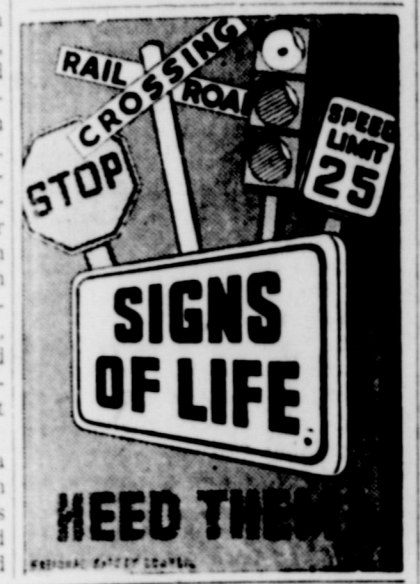
Mortality rate figures show an increase of 255 deaths from April, 1946 figures of 1,099, as compared to the total of 1,354. This represents an increase of more than 10.5% for the comparative period.

"So-called functional heart disease is usually traceable to nervousness, infections from other parts of the body such as teeth and tonsils, a disturbed function of the thyroid gland, and to influenza," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, said. "And the excessive use of tobacco, coffee, tea, or other heavy stimulant is often contributing cause."

Malfunction of the heart is a correctable condition, the health officer said, insofar as the sources of infection may be located and eliminated, as in the case of bad

teeth or tonsils. Incurable organic heart ailments exist only too frequent.

Strict adherence to competent medical advice will eliminate much worry about either functional or organic heart conditions, Dr. Cox said. He added that such adherence would unquestionably reduce deaths from heart disease materially.

### Tractor Safety Depends on Easy Ride Seat

LAFAYETTE, IND. — Relief from the "rough-riding" discomforts farmers suffer while driving a tractor over bumpy fields every day is essential not only to more efficient farming, but is also a major factor in reducing farm accidents, according to a recent statement by Donald M. Kinch, assistant professor of Agricultural Engineering at Purdue University.

Basing his opinion on a recent tractor operators comfort survey conducted by the Society of Automotive Engineers which revealed that the percentage of time tractor drivers sit on the seats of their machines ranged from a high of 99 per cent on one make of tractor to a low of 55 per cent on another model, Mr. Kinch declared:

"Standing on tractors while driving is extremely hazardous. Recent reports show that a majority of farm accidents involve falls from machinery, particularly tractors. While in some cases a farmer is forced to stand because of the need for better vision, generally this practice can be traced to the fact that the tractor is not

equipped with a comfortable seat and the constant jolting and vibration are too much for his endurance.

"The average farmer sits on his tractor seat for longer periods than he does in the seat of his automobile. Certainly it is far more essential that he be comfortable while doing his field work than when he is merely driving for pleasure," Mr. Kinch stated.

Pointing out that considerable progress toward providing comfort for tractor drivers has been made, Mr. Kinch said that he was "greatly impressed with a new type tractor seat which was installed on a tractor used on the university's experimental farms, by a Michigan manufacturing firm nearly two years ago. This tractor seat consists of a variable rate coil spring, which makes adjustments unnecessary regardless of the weight of the driver, a double action hydraulic shock absorber to smooth the jolts, and a rubber-mounted stabilizer bar to reduce sidesway. The popularity of this seat is indicated by the fact that it is now being used as standard equipment on four well-known makes of tractors.

### BEANS BEST FOR CANNING NOW

Beans are at their best right now. Logan and Blue Lake may be strange names as far as bean varieties go, but these varieties are free from fiber stringiness and are tops for canning and freezing.

If you are harvesting green beans, especially for quick freezing, J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A. and M. College advises to select only those beans which have very small seed and a dark green color. When the seeds have begun to develop to a point in green beans where there are slight bulges in the beans, there is enough wood fiber in the hull to give the canned or frozen product a low eating quality and poor flavor.

Corn may be another of your crops that is ready for harvesting and canning. If so, here is a point to remember: pick the ears early in the morning, and get the corn in the can or freezer as quickly as possible. Sweet corn begins to lose its sweetness and quality in a very short while after the ears are taken from the stalk. The same goes for fresh roasting ears on the table. For best taste and quality, harvest the corn at 11 o'clock for a meal at 12 o'clock.

As for tomatoes, Rosborough suggests that they be pulled from the vine as soon as they turn pink. Bring them into the house and put them in a cool, shady place where they will ripen to a deep red color. You will find that the inside of the tomatoes are juicy and mealy instead of fibrous. This is for fresh tomatoes.

Now, if you want tomatoes for canning, pick them pink and let them ripen in the house, or leave them on the vine until they are

fully ripe. A little mental arithmetic will give you an estimate on your tomato crop. (A bushel of tomatoes will give you about 25 No. 2 cans. On a larger scale, 150 bushels to the acre is a good estimate. This gives about 3,750 No. 2 cans of tomatoes from an acre.)

Careful handling of the crop will mean less loss on the yield, says Rosborough, so handle with care and keep your profits up.

### SAFETY CAN BE BUILT IN HOME

Safety can be built right into the home to help reduce accidents. New homes can and should be made far safer than houses built in the past because better materials and more advanced ideas are always being developed for greater home safety.

This built-in safety business is really two angles in one, says W. S. Allen, extension agricultural building engineer of Texas A. and M. College. It deals with the dangers of fire as well as the personal injury angle.

Builders and architects are giving quite a bit of thought to ways and means of getting rid of home accident causes in both the new and old structures.

Safety studies show that most accidents in the home occur on the stairs, so architects are recommending a certain step height, width and steepness that will still be the safest. Handrails should be provided every place there are more than two steps. Also lights at the top and bottom steps are recommended.

Basements are often dangerous places when there are overhead water pipes, air ducts and low objects. Where it is not possible to remove them, they should be painted brightly so they will be easily seen. Windows are now on the market which can be cleaned from the inside of the house. More and more of this kind are being built into the new homes.

Toys, tools, brooms and mops make dangerous enemies if left laying around. Keep them in a special place so they won't be tripped over. Kitchen hazards are reduced by sliding cabinet doors or the narrow hinged type which do not swing far out into the room. Rounded corners on kitchen equipment along with more built-in facilities also lower your chances of being injured right in your own home.

Flat bottomed tubs and grab bars to assist in getting in and out of the tub match nicely with any bathroom design. Non-slip flooring is not only available, but a little healthier, too. And there is the old story of bathtub electrocutions. Keep light switches and radio controls if you have a radio in the bathroom—out of tub or shower reach.

None of these safety measures are costly. In fact, many times it has proved to be more costly not to have them. If the homeowner gives as much attention to safety in his home as he does to some of the other things, advises Allen, his chances of becoming a hospital patient will be much less.

### Cabbage is a General Favorite

By ALICE DENROFF

If there is one thing that is favorite fare it is the cabbage clan. Red, green or white; slaw or kraut; June or January, members of the cabbage family are always at hand, ready for table duty.

The cabbage clan traces its ancestry to the early days of Europe when it grew wild along sea coasts, and thus gained the name "sea-cabbage." Brussels sprouts are first cousins to the cabbage, and cauliflower, which came by way of Cyprus, long ago, is a near relative. Broccoli, brocoli sprouts and kohlrabi are uncles and aunts—so the cabbage family is a pretty big clan.

In Many Lands No wonder the cabbage family is a staple of many lands! Swedes roll cabbage leaves around meat filling, as do the Hungarians. Hollanders pickle cabbage; and just about every country has a variation of kraut or slaw.

For a good quickie, fill large cabbage leaves with your favorite meat-loaf mixture, skewer with toothpick and bake until tender. A good emergency dish!

When you have more time, try Danish cabbage. For 4 portions slowly saute 1 1/2 c. diced onions in 2 tbs. bacon fat until yellow. Add 4 oz. fried beef, cut in pieces; saute

until browned. Add 1/2 c. diced green pepper and 4 c. coarsely shredded cabbage; saute 10 min. longer, stirring frequently. Add 3 tbs. chili sauce; mix well. Should be served immediately, good and hot.

### Smothered Cabbage

Smothered cabbage goes well with chops, steaks or good old hamburgers. Wash medium head of cabbage well, removing outer leaves if too tough or damaged. Cut crosswise in slices one inch thick. Place slices in heavy skillet; sprinkle generously with cooking oil, and lightly with soy sauce. Cover skillet tightly; steam over low heat for 12 to 15 min., depending on age of cabbage.

For a change from broccoli prepared the usual way, try a broccoli soufflé. To serve 6, cream well 4 tbs. table fat and 3 tbs. flour. Add 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. pepper. Scald one c. milk; add gradually to butter mixture stirring to prevent lumps. Cook in double boiler until mixture thickens. Beat 2 egg yolks until thick. Cool white sauce slightly, then stir in egg yolks. Add 2 tsp. phosphate-type baking powder; mix well. Add one c. finely chopped cooked broccoli, and lastly fold in 2 egg whites stiffly beaten. Pour into greased casserole (8 inch diameter) and place in pan of hot water. Bake at 350 F. for 80 min.

### Fertilizer Supply To Be Boosted Ten Percent

Three developments have taken place recently following Congressional action of the International Emergency Food Committee. These changes will boost the nitrogen fertilizer supply of the next 12 months up ten percent over last year's total, says M. K. Thornton, extension agricultural chemist of Texas A. and M. College.

The expected increase will make available over 900 thousand tons of nitrogen fertilizer, or around 85 thousand tons more than was had last year. Even though there has been an improvement in the supplies of world fertilizer nitrogen as compared with last year, the expected supply from now until next July will still fall short of world demand.

The first of these three developments that will bring more nitrogen fertilizer is the increase of smaller country imports and the private production. The amount the United States will get from private production added to the imports from the small countries such as Chile, Canada and Norway will amount to something like 28,500 tons of the ten percent increase.

The other two developments deal with army production at the U.S. government plants. One provides that ten percent of the anhydrous ammonia that is produced at these plants will be turned over to commercial plants to be changed into fertilizer for farm use. In numbers, this will amount to around 28 thousand tons.

The other development is that half of the coming year's exports of nitrogen fertilizer shall be made up of army production.
