Call Election On Water Plan

A bond election has been called by the City of Wheeler for September 9 to vote on a proposal to issue \$15,000 worth of bonds to improve and enlarge the water system.

A detailed notice of the election appears on another page of The Times and property owners and citizens are advised to read this notice together with the following information which has been prepared to acquaint you with the water situation now confronting the city.

During the fall of 1946 when the water supply began to show a weakening in the 50,000 gallon elevated tank the city council asked an engineer to make a report on the facilities and a recommendation for the improvement of those facilities. Such preliminary survey was filed with the city council shortly after February 1 of this year. The recommendations made were adopted, in part by the council, and a more de-



Make Most of Shelves

SMALL kitchens should be designed as carefully as the galley on a small yacht, where space at a premium. Every little part of your cupboards should be fully utilized, every nook and cranny developed into a place for a particular object or tool of your kitchen work. A set of dishes, for instance, is

usually spread out over the largest shelf or the different sizes are stacked one on top another, making it necessary to lift one stack to get at another. That is inefficient. Dishes and glassware, spices and other small objects can be properly stored by putting in special shelves which can be built by anyone who can use a saw and hammer. Nest



Spices will take up a lot of room if you are a spice user. Little racks hung on the inside of the cupboard doors will take care of this problem and leave the shelf open for other, bigger things. Notice the cup rack the back of the shelves above It has a few small pieces of quarter inch dowelling nailed along the shelf near the front. This keeps the cups from sitting down flat, allowing air to circulate around them. Cups will not "sweat" when turned upside down on this shelf

Q. At what age should calves be vaccinated for the control of Bang's disease?

KNOWING

A. It is recommended that calves be inoculated between the age of 4 and 6 months.

Q. What is the best time of the year for culling sows? And what should be the basis for culling? A According to the Research

Farm of the Ralston Purina Company, the best time of year to make an accounting with the sows is just after they have weaned their pigs. They have just finished a test of performance which offers the most practical basis for selection of future breeding stock. Discard those sows which:

Raised less than 8 large, uniform pigs to weaning time. Had difficulty at farrowing time. Were cross or nervous at farrow-

ing time. 4. Have less than 12 good teats Produced small pigs.

6. Were late or irregular in breeding. Were poor milkers or whose pig failed to gain rapidly during the suckling period.

8. Are off type or produced off type 9. Transmitted heritable defects

Q. Should just one wing or be wings of chickens be clipped?

A. Only one wing should be clipped to prevent chickens from flying. This means that one wing will be longer than the other and thus throw the chicks off balance when they attempt to fly. If both wings are clipped so that they are balanced, chicks can fly almost as well as

Q. What is the best duck to raise on a commercial duck farm?

A. The Pekin duck has proved it self on commercial duck farms and seems to best meet market requirements. This duck is hardy, does not fly, lays well and matures rapidly in confinement. In addition it has white feathers which bring a premium on the market. This return from the sale of feathers represents an important part of the income from a duck farm,





A-A veteran must present his been lost or destroyed, a certificate in lieu of or a properly authenticated copy of such paper. He must file an application Veterans Administration Form 4-1382. An initial claim is usually filed at the same time the application is made. This claim indicates whether the veteran is unemployed, partially employed or self-employed.

Q-Does Veterans Administration help the disabled veteran get a job after he finishes his train-A-Yes.

If you purchase a similar can from a retailer it would cost at least \$4.00.

The above mentioned cans are of corrugated steel construction with lid and are 10 gallon capacity.

No one is required to buy these cans but garbage must be kept in a suitable container.

SELECT SITE FOR ORCHARD

COLLEGE STATION-Letters of inquiry from Texas fruit growers have prompted Extension horticulturists at Texas A. and M. College to offer a few pointers on selecting a site for planting a new orchard this fall, winter or early spring.

Big point to remember, say the horticulturists, is getting the soil in good shape early enough that late summer and fall rains can put the finishing touches on the ground so that it will be ready when planting time comes around.

Drainage and soil type are two trees don't like "wet feet" drainage. Land with a slight slope protects the trees from prevailing winds and still offers thorough deainage.

Growers have found that good orchard soil has these qualities: moderately rich (over-rich soil may cause too fast a vegetative growth); high in organic matter; a pH, or acidity rating, of 6.5 to 7: completely free of such troub makers as nematodes, cotton ro rot, oak root rot, crown gall o Bermuda grass. Most fruit tree produce on many different soil types if drainage and airing is good. However, the horticul turists like to see orchards on 12 to 18-inch deep sandy or sandy loam soil, with well-drained sandy clay soil underneath.




