The resolution and order are as follows:

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said City to submit to the resident property taxpaying qualified voters of said City the proposition for the issuance of bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WHEELER, TEXAS:

That an election be held in the

City of Wheeler, Texas, on the 9th day of September, 1947, which date is not less than 15 nor more than 30 days from the date of this Order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified property taxpaying voters of said City, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

PROPOSITION

"Shall the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the City of Wheeler, in the sum of \$15,000.00, payable serially not to exceed 30 years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 5% per annum, payable semi-annually and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds, and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the waterworks system of this City, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas."

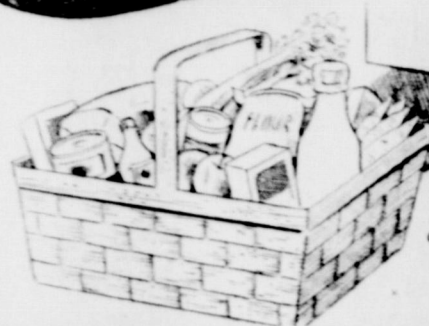

Veterans' News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—How does a veteran apply for readjustment allowance?

A—A veteran must present his original service discharge or separation paper, or if that has been lost or destroyed, a certificate in lieu of or a properly authenticated copy of such paper. He must file an application on Veterans Administration Form 4-1382. An initial claim is usually filed at the same time the application is made. This claim indicates whether the veteran is unemployed, partially employed or self-employed.

Q—Does Veterans Administration help the disabled veteran get a job after he finishes his training?

A—Yes.

Q—What is the maximum length of training a disabled veteran can get under Public Law 16?

A—The maximum is four years; however, Veterans Administration may extend the time if factors in any case warrant an additional period for rehabilitation.

Q—Must a disabled veteran go to a vocational school or may he go to a liberal arts college, a high school, or similar institution under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act?

A—He may enroll in any VA-approved educational institution or training establishment offering the course of training which VA has found he needs to insure his proper rehabilitation in line with his own desires.

Automatic increases will be effective September 1 in the minimum allowances received by the more seriously disabled veterans enrolled in educational and training courses under Government sponsorship, Veterans Administration announced today.

The increased rates, which will be reflected in September checks received on or after October 1, were voted by the last session of Congress and signed into law by the President.

VA said the law requires no action by disabled trainees entitled to the higher rates because of the automatic nature of the increases.

The new law provides that a veteran enrolled in a course under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16), whose disability is rated at 30 per cent or higher, will receive \$115 a month if he has no dependents, and \$135 if he has one dependent.

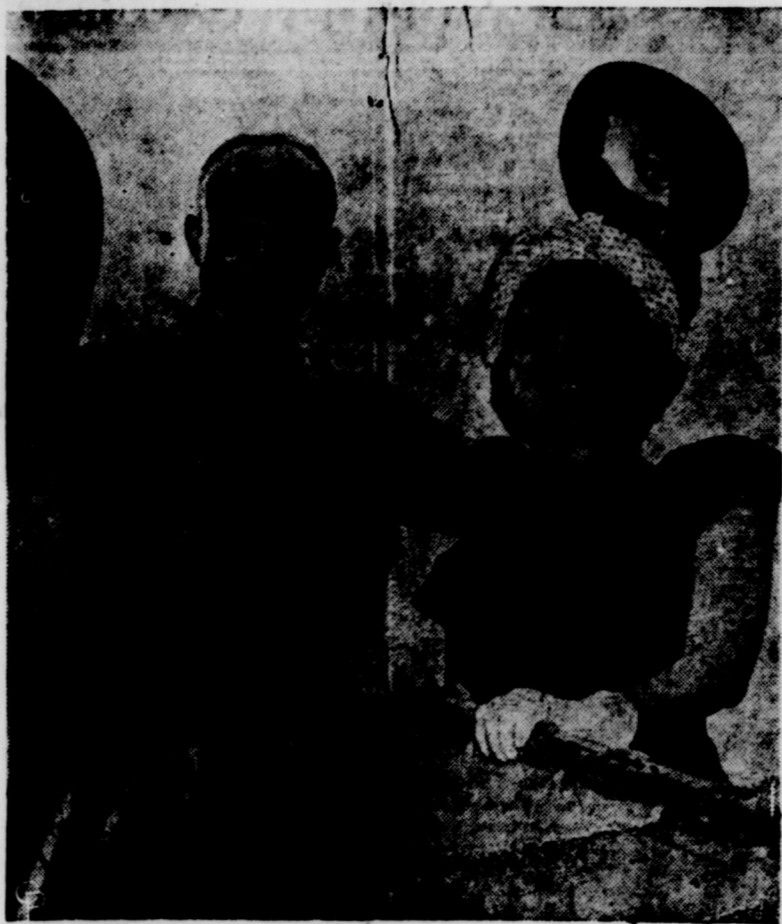
The old law allowed \$105 and \$115 for the same two categories; but, while these rates are superseded by the new schedules for the more seriously disabled, they will continue to apply to veterans with disabilities rated at less than 30 per cent.

The new law also raises the amount for additional dependents of veterans with disabilities of 30 per cent or more. The additional allowance for one child is increased from \$10 a month to \$20, and the previous allowance of \$7 a month for each additional child is raised to \$15. No change is made in the \$14 monthly allowance for a dependent parent.

The new law does not change the basic provisions for awarding payments to disabled veterans pursuing a course of training under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act. These provisions are:

While a veteran is in training, and for two months after his employability is determined, he receives a subsistence allowance of \$65 a month if he has no dependents, or \$90 a month if he has one or more dependents, in addition

to his disability compensation. In case the compensation plus the allowance do not total \$105 or \$115 for those with disabilities of less than 30 per cent, or \$115 or \$135 for those with disabilities of 30 per cent or more, an additional sum is paid to make up the difference. The sum is further increased if there is more than one dependent.

The veteran in job training may retain whatever wages are paid him, but if his salary plus his subsistence allowance exceeds the wage of a beginning trained journeyman, VA will reduce his subsistence allowance proportionately.

If the veteran-trainee is enrolled in school, his tuition and fees are paid by VA, and his books and supplies are provided by VA. If he is enrolled in on-the-job training, VA provides the necessary tools.

Abilene Jersey Cow Qualified Tested Dam

COLLEGE STATION—A registered Jersey cow owned by I. B. Duck, Abilene, has qualified as a Tested Dam under the requirements of the American Jersey Cattle Club.

Extension dairymen at Texas A. and M. College were informed by the club headquarters in Columbus, Ohio, that the dam, Gamboe Jap Noblesse of E. V. 1169437, now has three offsprings with official production records which more than double the production of the average dairy cow in the United States. The records make the cow a Tested Dam, in the books of the American Jersey Cattle Club.

Production records of Noblesse's offsprings average 7.794

pounds of milk and 403 pounds of butterfat per cow, with the milk testing out on an average of 5.14 per cent butterfat.

The dam's own record gives her a rating of Good Plus under the Jersey club's type classification program. That rating is equal to a score of 80 on a score card that allots 100 points to a perfect animal.

Duck has been congratulated by the cattle club's officials, who stated that the Tested Dam, through her offsprings, can be a definite boost to Taylor County dairying.

Garbage Ordinance

Will Be Enforced Beginning September 1

GARBAGE CANS \$2.00

For the convenience of the people of Wheeler, the City has purchased 200 garbage cans which may be had by the individual for just what they cost the City or a total of \$2.00 each. These cans were purchased in a sufficient quantity to allow us a much cheaper rate than if they were bought in smaller numbers. If you purchase a similar can from a retailer it would cost at least \$4.00.

The above mentioned cans are of corrugated steel construction with lid and are 10 gallon capacity.

No one is required to buy these cans but garbage must be kept in a suitable container.

COLLECTION

Garbage will be picked up in the business district once each day and in the residential section once each week.

SELECT SITE FOR ORCHARD

COLLEGE STATION—Letters of inquiry from Texas fruit growers have prompted Extension horticulturists at Texas A. and M. College to offer a few pointers on selecting a site for planting a new orchard this fall, winter or early spring.

Big point to remember, say the horticulturists, is getting the soil in good shape early enough that late summer and fall rains can put the finishing touches on the ground so that it will be ready when planting time comes around.

Drainage and soil type are two things to watch in selecting that orchard location now. Since fruit trees don't like "wet feet", both top and subsoil must have good drainage. Land with a slight slope protects the trees from prevailing winds and still offers thorough drainage.

Growers have found that good orchard soil has these qualities: moderately rich (over-rich soil may cause too fast a vegetative growth); high in organic matter; a pH, or acidity rating, of 6.5 to 7; completely free of such trouble makers as nematodes, cotton root rot, oak root rot, crown gall or Bermuda grass. Most fruit trees produce on many different soil types if drainage and ailing is good. However, the horticulturists like to see orchards on 12 to 18-inch deep sandy or sandy loam soil, with well-drained sandy clay soil underneath.

They tell growers never to plant fruit trees on old orchard sites, which may be diseased and insect infested. Newly cleared land also may have termites left from decaying wood.

The smart orchardist, when he selects a new site, goes ahead to terrace the land, pulverize the soil, plant an adapted winter legume, fertilize and set stakes where the trees are to go.



When the main dish of a meal can be cooked by merely clicking on the flame of the broiler, that means more leisure for the busy housewife. Here's a Hawaiian Grill that's simple, nourishing and tasty. After preheating broiling compartment and pan 5 minutes to broiling temperature (about 550°), put on broiler grid about 3" from tip of gas flame 4 lamb shoulder steaks (2 lbs.) seasoned with salt and pepper, broil 8 min., turn. Cut up 6 pineapple strips and cover with 1/2 cup brown sugar and 3 tsp. melted butter blended together; cut in half 4 small tomatoes which have been marinated in French dressing; top them with 1 tsp. minced onion and 1/2 cup buttered bread crumbs; place on broiler grid with steaks and pineapple. Broil 8 min. longer. Yield: 4 servings.

Because of their high protein content, eggs tend to toughen when overcooked. They should be cooked slowly over the simmer flame on top of the gas range or with low flame if broiled or baked.

It helps to keep down gas bills if gas range parts are always spotlessly clean. Top burners, trays and grates can be washed easily with warm soap and water, then rinsed in clear water. All parts should be dried thoroughly before replacing. An easy simple habit to keep the porcelain top shining-clean is to wash it off after each dishwashing. A quick wipe with warm water and soap does it.

A light accompaniment to cool summer drinks are potato chips sprinkled with grated Parmesan or American cheese. Turn the gas flame to moderate heat, leave cheese and chips in the oven until cheese is slightly "runny." Serve while hot.

ventive measure. Wherever immunizing treatment has been extensively used diphtheria has steadily decreased.

"The most forceful weapon in

the control of diphtheria is prevention through immunization, rather than cure of the disease after it has developed. Children can be protected against diphtheria by the use of what is known as toxoid. Young children are particularly susceptible to the disease. Accordingly, as soon as a baby is six months old, the parents are advised to take it to the family physician and have it immunized—protected, by the use of toxoid. Older children in the family who have not had the protective treatment, should be immunized also, and this should be attended to now before the school season begins. This immunizing agent is absolutely safe to administer; there is only a slight local reaction, and practically no constitutional or troublesome after effects. It confers a life time immunity in the majority of cases. To be certain that immunization is complete, however, the child should be taken back to the physician six months after the toxoid was administered, and given the Schick Test.

"It is within the power of the parents of this State, cooperating with their physicians and public health departments, to eliminate diphtheria from Texas."

The U. S. Department of Agriculture forecasts that the final count on the nation's wheat crop will be 1.4 billion bushels, the largest crop on record. That record would be 61 per cent above average production, and 24 per cent above last year's production.

1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin	1/2 cup hot Fat Milk
1/2 cup cold water	2 chopped, hard-cooked eggs
1 cup tomato juice	1/2 cup pickle relish
4 teaspoons vinegar	1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 teaspoon sugar	
1/2 teaspoon salt	
1 teaspoon grated onion	

Soften gelatin in cold water. Heat to boiling mixture of tomato juice, vinegar, sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, onion and pepper. Take out 1 tablespoon softened gelatin; keep at room temperature. Stir remaining gelatin into hot tomato mixture. Chill until syrupy. Rinse a 1 1/2-pint loaf pan with cold water. Pour chilled tomato mixture into pan. Continue chilling until firm. Stir hot milk into remaining gelatin. Add eggs, pickle relish, remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt and the mustard. Put at once on top of firm tomato layer. Chill until firm. Unmold and garnish, if desired, with hard-cooked egg slices and spinach leaves or other salad greens. Serves 4. *Chopped dill or sour pickle can also be used.

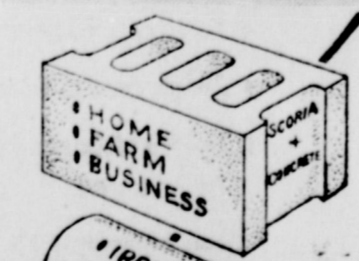

Scientific research financed by March of Dimes funds has shown that when laboratory animals exposed to the polio virus were suddenly chilled, twice as many developed acute and paralyzing attacks of the disease as did a control group which had been protected from sudden temperature changes.

Therefore, take no chances. To be on the safe side avoid sudden chilling, the National Foundation advises.
