

Well, scientists at the University of California have now found a way to make a uranium explosion look like molasses in January. The new speed record is millions of times faster. According to a report to the American Chemical Society, the trick is turned with an old household remedy, bismuth. It seems that explode. But bismuth atoms take only a billionth of a second.
