**GERMAN SCRAP STEEL
BEGINS TO COME IN**

Eastern ports of the United States announce the arrival over the weekend of the first of a series of freighters carrying German scrap steel for American mills. Car-

goes totaling \$2,250,000 worth of junked railway locomotives, cars, bridges and structural steel are coming in from the ports of Rotterdam, Antwerp and Bremen.

There is an enormous amount of scrap steel in Germany and in European coastal waters, due to military destruction during the war. Vast quantities of it could be made available to steel mills, and the current price of scrap at American mills would more than pay for bringing it over. The obstruction which has prevented its coming is partly bureaucratic ineffectiveness, perhaps. But it appears that there is a policy delay also at high administrative levels.

It would be foolish to strip Germany of scrap metal at the same time that a desperate effort is being made to build up steel production in Germany for European reconstruction. But the conclusion is unavoidable that there is so much of purely military steel in sunken and half-sunken ships, in old tanks and like heavy steel objects, that a great amount of scrap cargo could come to America and ought to take here.

It might take special equipment to clear harbours and shallow coastal waters of naval scrap but it would be a fishing job which ought to pay expert handling. Some of the steel is not convenient to land transport, of course, but the fact remains that steel, not only from Germany, but from much of the rest of Europe would come this way, if Washington set its mind to bringing it here. —From Dallas News

NEW SPEED RECORD

Ah, these speed-crazy Americans! So the rate at which atoms of uranium can be split is not fast enough for you? Well, scientists at the University of California have now found a way to make a uranium explosion look like molasses in January. The new speed record is millions of times faster. According to a report to the American Chemical Society, the trick is turned with an old household remedy, bismuth. It seems that atoms in the bomb dropped at Hiroshima took a fraction of a millionth of a second to explode. But bismuth atoms take only a billionth of a second. This is called fast fission, to distinguish it from the lazy, tortoise-like explosion in uranium.

Bad news for Soviet spies: You can't use bismuth in an atom bomb because its atom is not a self-starter. It takes an atom smasher as big as a battleship to set it off. —From Dallas News

**414 Cases Influenza
Reported Last Week**

The 414 cases of influenza reported in Texas last week, bringing the incidence of this disease up to forty percent more than the seven year medium, as shown from the figures submitted by the 181 counties sending in reports to the State Health Department.

Influenza without complications may be a fairly mild ailment, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, but he pointed out, complications can turn this disease into a dangerous condition very quickly.

"Many cases of influenza are mild," Dr. Cox said. "Often they help themselves to treatment readily. However, two important factors enter into the treatment of influenza, and they are, calling the family physician as soon as the first symptoms appear, and taking life very easy for a reasonable length of time after the acute stage has subsided."

Dr. Cox declared that influenza is not mass-controllable. He emphasized that maintaining the highest possible health level at all times affords an individual the best protection from contracting this disease.

"Getting plenty of rest, daily exercise in the open, nourishing foods, and strict personal hygiene are our best known defenses against influenza," Dr. Cox said. "This applies to all respiratory diseases. A person who avoids all habits and practices detrimental

to a maximum well-being and thus builds up a strong resistance to disease, is much less likely to contract influenza than an individual who does not health in this manner.

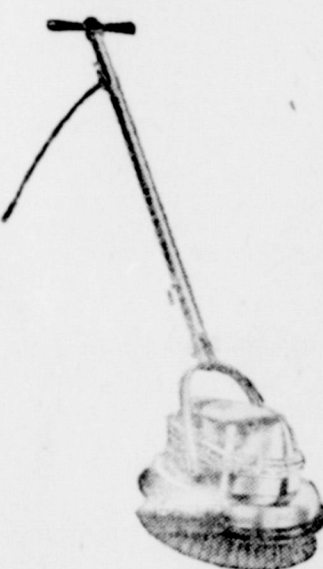

Lady Golden Glow Cake



Here's a marble cake that has the pleasant contrast of a tart orange marmalade filling and a smooth seven-minute icing.

"Golden Glow" is an odd name for a chocolate and white cake. It's so called because its layers are separated by a filling of orange marmalade. Your taste will tell you that the glowing filling is a good flavor foil for the cake and its smooth frosting.

There's no trick to obtaining the marbled effect of the cake. The smooth batter is divided in half just before baking, with melted chocolate folded into one half. Fill the layer cake pans by dropping in alternate spoonfuls of light and dark batter.

A cake like this is an instant success, especially when the pieces are generously cut and seconds are available.

LADY GOLDEN GLOW CAKE

1/2 cup butter or margarine
2 cups sugar
4 eggs, separated
1/2 cup rind of one orange
3 cups sifted enriched flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups milk
2 squares chocolate

Cream butter or margarine with sugar until light. Add well beaten egg yolks and the orange rind. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Add with milk alternately to creamed mixture. Fold in beaten whites. Mix into smooth batter. Divide the batter equally. To one half, add the melted chocolate and mix well. Drop light and dark batters alternately from spoons into greased layer cake pans. Bake 40 minutes in moderate oven (350 degrees F.). Put layers together with orange marmalade and frost with seven minute icing.

Yield: Two nine-inch layers.

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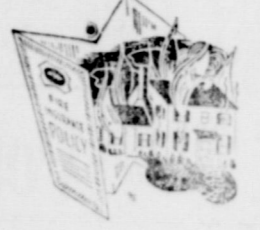

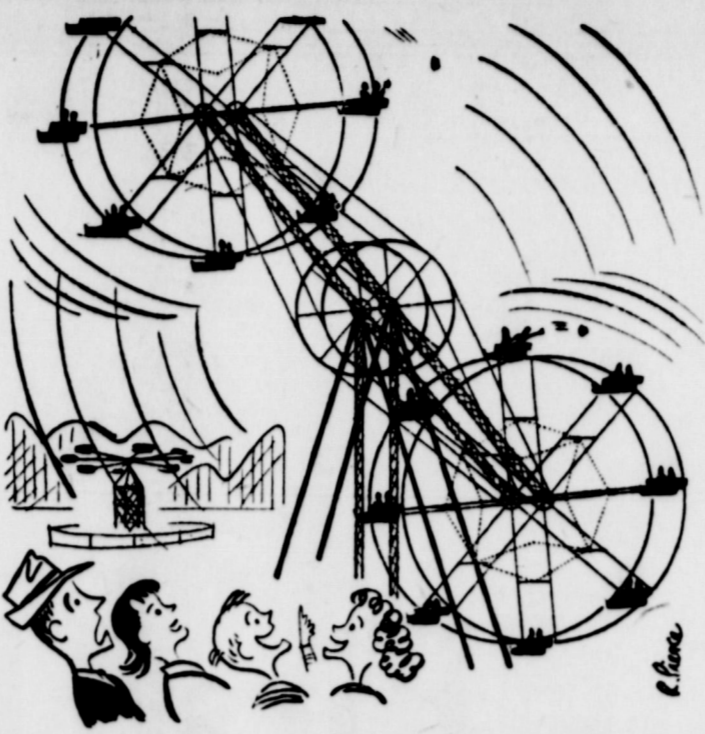
SENIORS NEWS

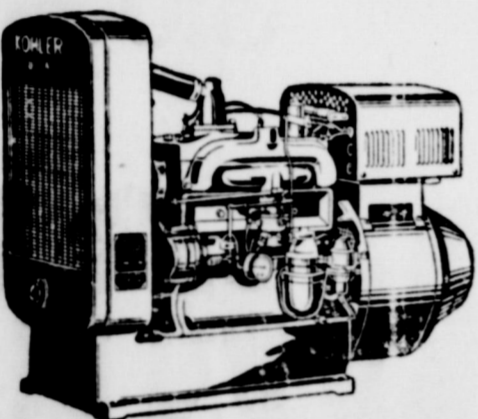



Comparison Of Morbidity Rates Shows Value Of County Health Officer

Comparing morbidity reports from ten Texas Counties where there are no full-time local health units, with those from ten other counties where these units afford efficient health protection, reveals a startling difference in the incidence of communicable diseases, according to a survey released by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Using as a basis of comparison the common childhood disease of Whooping cough, Dr. Cox said that this survey showed that the counties where local health units availed themselves of biologics from the State Health Department were able to hold this communicable disease to a desirable minimum.

"For instance," Dr. Cox said, "take these figures for comparison. In these counties where there are no health units and therefore where no biologics from the State Health Department were used, the following rates of incidence apply, per 100,000 population: Gaines and Floyd, above 1000; Hale, Dallam, Castro and Cottle above 300; Carson above 488; Bailey and Hartley above 600; and Lipscomb above 750 cases."

By way of contrast to these high rates of incidence, Dr. Cox pointed out that in a representative group of counties where full-time health units made use of the biologics available from the State Health Department, the following much lower rates prevailed: Bell, Wichita, Bastrop and Hidalgo, less than 300; Travis less than 200; Smith and El Paso less than 150; Bexar, Dallas and Tarrant less than 100 cases per 100,000 population.

"It is plain to be seen," Dr. Cox said, "that the counties receiving the benefit of a full-time health protection, enjoy a much lower incidence of disease and the resulting lessened danger of death. Public health protection can be had for every citizen of Texas, but only when sufficient funds are appropriated to make possible a full-time local health unit in every one of our 254 counties," Dr. Cox declared.

The new "soapless suds"—many of which were developed during the war—are fine for washing greases off pots and pans, but are not recommended for linoleum, paint or furniture. These "soapless suds" draw out the oils in woods and wood finishes, thus causing their drying out.
