## Annual Christmas Seal Sale Begins Monday, Nov. 22

The Annual Christmas Seal Sale to raise money to combat tuberculosis will be launched in Wheeler county this weekend, Dr. H. E. Nicholson of Wheeler, founder and president of the Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association, said Wednesday.

And as has been the custom for the past three years the entire Christmas Seal Sale will be handled by the Wheeler county organization, thereby retaining 80 cents of every \$1.00 in our home county.

Two sheets of seals worth \$1.00 each are being mailed this weekend to every poll tax holder in the county, accompanied by a letter asking the recipient to forward payment to G. W. Hefley of Wheeler, treasurer of the county association. The letters and Christmas Seals are being prepared for mailing by the Wheeler Boy Scouts as a public service.

No personal solicitation will be made if the extensive mail campaign brings the results expected.

One and two dollar contributions are expected from the rank and file to whom mail solicitations are being made but directors of the county association are hopeful of many \$10 to \$25 contributions.

## Free tuberculosis skin tests of school children will be made again this year. Association directors pointed out that the recent countywide tuberculosis X-ray was confined to persons 15 years of age and older. Proceeds from the Seal Sale which closes on December 25, will make possible the skin tests and other TB prevention and control work of the county association.

Christmas Seals funds have fought tuberculosis for 40 years. One of the many achievements of these donated dollars has been to keep the public informed about TB—how TB can be fought early, why patients need prompt, thorough treatment, what must be done to rehabilitate the sick and protect the healthy. Preventing the disease makes better sense than curing it.

Until three years ago the state association handled the sale of seals in Wheeler county. Dr. Nicholson launched the county organization so more money could remain at home to combat the dreaded disease locally. More than \$1,000 has been raised annually since the sale has been handled locally.

Boiled potatoes turn out crisp and brown when peeled raw, sliced quarter inch thick, dipped in oil and placed on pre-heated broiler pan under medium flame. About 6 to 8 minutes on one side and 5 on the other make them just right for a quick-broiled dinner.

When the gas flame is turned down to simmer point after bringing vegetables to the boil, you save about 75 per cent in fuel.

If you are buying a new automatic gas water heater, be sure that it is adequately sized. Your utility company or dealer will tell you, for example, that some automatic appliances use more hot water than the manual types.

## It's Easy to Make a Pie

By ALICE DENHOFF

IT really is as "easy as pie" to make pie these days, what with all the mixes, short-cuts and those favorite bran and cracker crumb pastry shells. Good work, for it makes it possible to concentrate on luscious fillings, so that pie gets the eye as it comes to the table, cool and beautiful.

Pies may have started their careers as plain meat, game or vegetable "pasties" in England, but now we have given them glamour and glitter. Try a Georgia peach pie with pecans. Try a lemon pie in the style of old Virginia. Try a rhubarb pie, available almost any time of year now that we have quick-frozen pie-plant.

**Bran Pastry Shell**  
And, if you haven't done so before, try a bran pastry shell. It's nutritious and delicious. First the crust, then the fillings.

Roll 1/4 c. all-bran until fine; combine with 1 1/2 c. flour and 1/2 tsp. salt. Add about 5 tsp. cold water, a little at a time, until dough is moist enough to hold together. Roll out on lightly floured board to about 1/4 inch in thickness. Place rolled pastry loosely in pan. Trim edge, leaving about 1/2 inch of pastry beyond rim of pan. Fold extended edge under and flute. Prick pastry shell with a fork; bake at 450 F. 10 to 15

min. Yield: one 2-crust pie or 2 8-inch pastry shells.

For the pecan pie, prepare bran shell, brushing unbaked shell with small portion of slightly beaten egg white, taken from eggs used in filling. Beat remainder of 3 eggs until light. Combine 1/2 cup flour and 2 tsp. sugar; add to eggs, and mix well. Add 2 c. light corn syrup, tsp. vanilla extract and 1/4 tsp. salt. Sprinkle one c. whole pecan nut meats in unbaked pastry shell; add filling. Bake in 375 F. oven about 45 min.

### Luscious Lemon Pie

For the luscious lemon pie, sift together 1/2 c. sugar, 3 tsp. corn-meal and 1/4 tsp. salt; add 1/2 cup lemon rind and 1/4 c. lemon juice. Separate 3 eggs, beat yolks well and add with 1/2 c. melted table fat to first mixture. Beat 3 egg whites until stiff; fold in last. Pour into bran pastry shell which has been baked for 10 min. at 450 F. Bake at 375 F. for about 30 min.

For the rhubarb pie, line 8-inch pie pan with bran pastry. Cut 4 c. rhubarb in 1/2-inch lengths; scald. Drain and arrange in unbaked pastry shell. Beat one egg until light; 1/2 tsp. salt together; add gradually 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tsp. flour and 1/4 cup water. Put strips of pastry across top. Bake in moderately hot oven (425 F.) about 10 min., then reduce heat to 375 F. and bake about 40 min. longer.




