MUSTANGS WIN GROOM, DEDICATED

Wheeler Mustangs defeated Groom Tigers by a count of 35 to 27 in a rather loosely played conference contest on Wednesday here last Friday night.

A large crowd of local spectators was in attendance to see the contest of the Mustangs in the 1948 season.

Half of the Groom-Tigers contest was dedicated and in honor of Dr. H. E. Smith in recognition of his faithful service to the system and to Wheeler County.

Approximately 150 sports fans and citizens of Wheeler and surrounding communities gathered at the Wheeler School Cafeteria Monday night at a banquet honoring the Wheeler Mustang football players and their coach, Bernie Smith.

Rev. M. B. Smith, pastor of the Baptist Church here, was the principal speaker of the evening and delivered an interesting oration on sportsmanship and the value of good clean conduct on the field.

The banquet honoring the Mustangs was sponsored by the West-Passion Post of the American Legion in an attempt to bring a better feeling between the athletes and the sporting public.

Allen Kavanaugh, county school superintendent, acted as master of ceremonies. Harry Wofford pronounced the invocation. Coach Bernie Smith introduced the Mustang players and gave a short in-sight on the abilities or inabilities of each player as he introduced him.

Sports writer Frank A. Godsoe, Jr. and Jerry Kolander of the Amarillo Daily News were guests at the affair and each made a short talk with both of them getting over quite well with the crowd in attendance.

FEED HONORS MUSTANG TEAM

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NOW IS TIME TO FIX SILAGE FOR WINTER FEEDING

Now is the time to make that silage so badly needed by dairymen.

The Wheeler County ACA is now in a position to get potatoes to be used by dairymen and cattlemen as stock feed.

450 sacks per carload at 30c per sack is the least shipment that will be made.

This is the cheapest stock feed you can buy.

Potatoes contain 21% dry matter, and are more watery than most people realize.

Using 1,600 pounds potatoes and 400 pounds sorghum bundles, the cost would be \$4.80 for potatoes and \$2.50 for bundles.

Wages and employment under the taxing provisions of the Social Security Act are identical with those covered by the benefit-paying section of the Act.

The regular quarterly social security tax returns and wage reports for the calendar quarter ending September 30 are due in the office of the Collector of Internal Revenue, Dallas, by the end of October.

Both officials strongly recommend to employers that the name and account number of each new worker be copied from his social security card when he starts to work.

The statement by L. P. Herndon and J. R. Sanderson concluded that "a great majority of employers have done an excellent job of reporting. The few who have not done so are now expected to comply fully with the requirements."

Clarence Zybach, secretary-treasurer of the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District, was re-elected last Tuesday to the Board of Supervision of the district.

The election was held at Allison, in subdivision number five of the Wheeler County District.

Each year on October 5, one of the five members of Boards of Supervisors of all soil conservation districts in Texas is replaced or re-elected.

Only resident landowners can vote and only resident land owners can be elected to the supervisory posts.

Clarence Zybach, Briscoe dairyman, is to be commended for the unselfish interest and time he has devoted to the work thus far.

County agents have contributed considerable to the job of helping to conserve our soil and water.

Now, through this organization, operated by farmers, all agencies, local, state and federal can be coordinated and utilized more effectively through the efforts of boards of supervisors of soil conservation districts.

J. M. DILL IS KILLED BY HIT-RUN DRIVER

Before the horrified gaze of his wife and two of his seven children, J. M. Dill, 38, of 1207 Mondego Courts, Channel Heights, San Pedro, Calif., a former Wheeler County resident, was instantly killed, Friday, September 24, at approximately 8:00 p. m. by a hit and run driver.

A witness chased the fleeing car and obtained the license number. An hour later 22-year-old Wallace W. Southward was arrested at his home and booked on a charge of manslaughter and hit and run driving.

Mr. Dill had parked his car containing his family and was returning from purchasing ice cream for the children when he was struck by the automobile traveling at a high rate of speed, police said.

Until that moment, Mrs. Dill had been recovering rapidly from a major operation. She is now back in the hospital in critical condition after a second operation made necessary by the shock of what she saw.

Funeral services for Mr. Dill were conducted on Tuesday, September 28 at the Cleveland Funeral Chapel in San Pedro. Burial was in the Pacific Crest Cemetery of that city.

J. M. Dill, son of Mrs. and the late John T. Dill, was born in Arkansas on May 27, 1910 and died on September 24, 1948 at San Pedro, Calif. Mr. Dill was married to Mrs. Grace Campbell in 1934. They were the parents of eight children.

Survivors include his wife, Grace; one son, Phillip; six daughters, Betty, Jean, Patsy, Barbara, Phyllis and Shirley; his mother, Mrs. Lema Dill of Amarillo; two brothers, C. C. Dill of Salinas, Calif., and G. C. Dill of Havana, Arkansas; four sisters, Mrs. Louis Jennings of Duncan, Okla., Mrs. Ned Layton of Guymon, Okla., Mrs. Clara Jean Boyd of Amarillo and Mrs. Max Wiley of Wheeler. He was preceded in death by an infant son and his father.

Mother Of Mrs. Porter Buried At Farmersville

Mrs. Mary Ethel Glass, 59, mother of Mrs. Glen Porter of Wheeler, died recently in a Pampa hospital. Mrs. Glass' home for the past three years had been on the Mazda Oil Company lease southwest of Lefors.

Editorial

NOW IS NO TIME FOR APPEASEMENT

There are two different and successive propositions in the officially expressed Russian position on consideration of the present situation in Germany by the United

Nations. But one proposition is stated in the formal note by Molotov as Soviet Foreign Minister, the other by Marshal Sokolovsky in Berlin. The first puts the United Nations on notice that it must take a certain course of action. The second presumably outlines the Soviet intention if the action is taken and says Russia will not be bound by the decision. Is the Soviet getting ready to get out of U. N.?

The answer to that question depends on both propositions one and two. If the Security Council refuses to accept the Russian contention that the Berlin situation is a four-power matter, not for U. N. at all, and if the council and assembly then reach a decision unacceptable to the Soviet, Russia will have to show clearly whether proposition two as proclaimed by Sokolovsky is bluff or policy. It is bluff, the fact that the statement has been made by the Berlin Commander, not by the official spokesmen for the Soviet Government, leaves a clear way out. Russia simply does not have to live up to the Sokolovsky warning. But if the Red commander is announcing what is in fact a Moscow intent, the Soviet would be in open defiance of U. N.

The strong probability is that Russia is bluffing in Berlin in an effort to cow U. N. into seeing things Russia's way. Whether this is true or not, the council and the assembly can not provide safely another Munich. Appeasement would not be helpful but fatal. There is no way to settle the Berlin problem except on the basis of right and fact. There is no way to preserve peace except by making clear that the world will not be pushed around by a bully. Russia must come into the society of nations as a working member or accept outlawry.

In the first place, clearly Russia can not be permitted to decide what U. N. can and can not do. The Soviet has a right to argue a legal position but, if overruled, it has no right to refuse to abide by a decision. It is this that must be made clear to Moscow. —From Dallas News

"Plan for disarmament—a military secret."


THE SHADES OF NIGHT

880 Bales Cotton Have Been Ginned in County

A survey made by The Wheeler Times last week revealed that 880 bales of cotton from the 1948 crop had been ginned at the six gins of Shamrock, Wheeler and Twitty up to that time.

Reports were not received from gins at Kelton, Allison and Briscoe. Of the 880 bale total, 750 had been handled by the four gins in Shamrock and Twitty, while 130 bales had gone through the two Wheeler plants.

Although the cotton is beginning to come in at a fairly rapid pace, it will be about 10 days before the season is in full swing, the ginner report.

Early-season production estimates for the county range from 11,000 to 14,000 bales.
