Co. Appraisal Shows 7.28% Loss

The Wheeler County Appraisal office released the figures for the 1988 tax year. The appraisals are down as a whole over the county as expected. Only four of the 12 county taxing entities showed an increase in property evaluation. The county lost 7.28% with Shamrock ISD losing the most evaluation with a 24.34% loss.

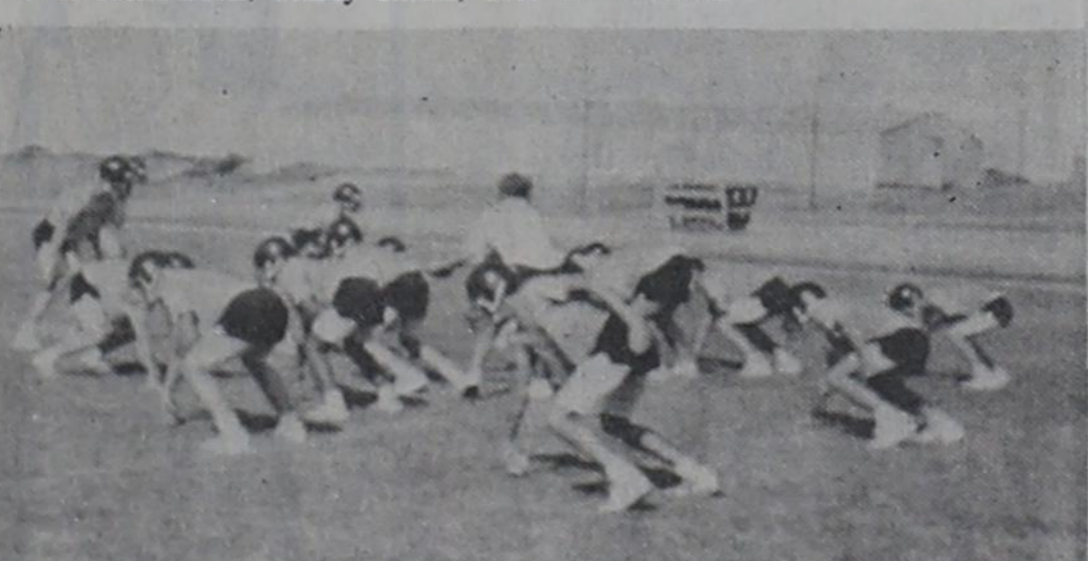
the Super Destroyer, along with the other matches, will round out the program.

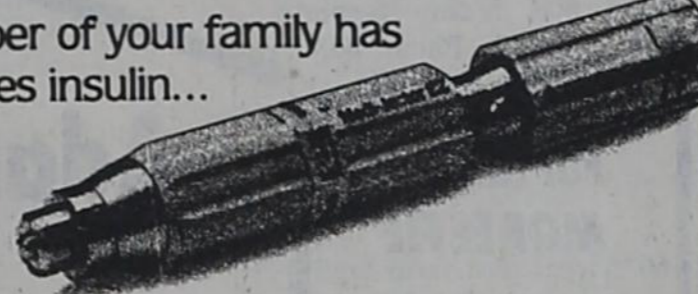

From The Minister's Desk:

The movie, *Gone With The Wind*, was released in 1939 and it shocked this nation when it concluded with a statement that contained one word of profanity.

In 1939, the motion picture production code barred complete nudity (even in silhouette), bedroom scenes (except in tasteful domestic situations), and the use of profanity. As a result the censors first refused to release the movie. But the producers of the movie appealed to the head of the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America, Will H. Hayes. After a lengthy discussion on the definition of profanity, Hays finally relented and the movie was released with the now famous statement.

But now - almost fifty years later - Universal Studios has announced that it will soon release a movie that is entitled, *The Last Temptation of Jesus*. According to some early reviews of this movie, it is blasphemous to the name and person of Jesus Christ.

For example, Jesus is depicted as having a sexual relationship with Mary Magdelene. He is also depicted as confused, bedeviled by nightmares and hallucinations, not able to answer basic questions about his identity, and shocked by his own miraculous powers.

In less than fifty years, has this nation's moral and spiritual fiber become so weak that it will not vigorously protest against such unrighteousness? If it has, the future of this nation may be endangered. History is filled with the examples of nations whose decline can be directly attributed to

their moral and spiritual deterioration. While recognizing this danger, many conscientious people will say:

"But what can I do? I am just one person. And my protest and my objection will not make a difference." Again history is filled with examples where one person did make a difference. For example----

One person's vote saved President Andrew Johnson from impeachment.

One person's vote was the deciding factor in the admission of Texas and California into the Union.

One person's vote decided the Rutherford Hays - Samuel Tilden presidential election.

And one person's protest and objection can help to prevent the release of this blasphemous movie.

If you would like to protest or object to the release of this movie, write a letter to Mr. Lew Wasserman, the Chairman of the Board of Universal Studios, at Universal Studios, at Universal City, California. Tell him respectfully, but strongly that you object to the release of the movie, *The Last Temptation of Christ*, in any media format because it is blasphemous to Jesus Christ and because it is detrimental to the morality of this nation.

Do not underestimate the influence of one person. Perhaps this blasphemous movie would have never been made if one person - Will H. Hayes - had refused to allow profanity to be included in the movie, *Gone With The Wind*.

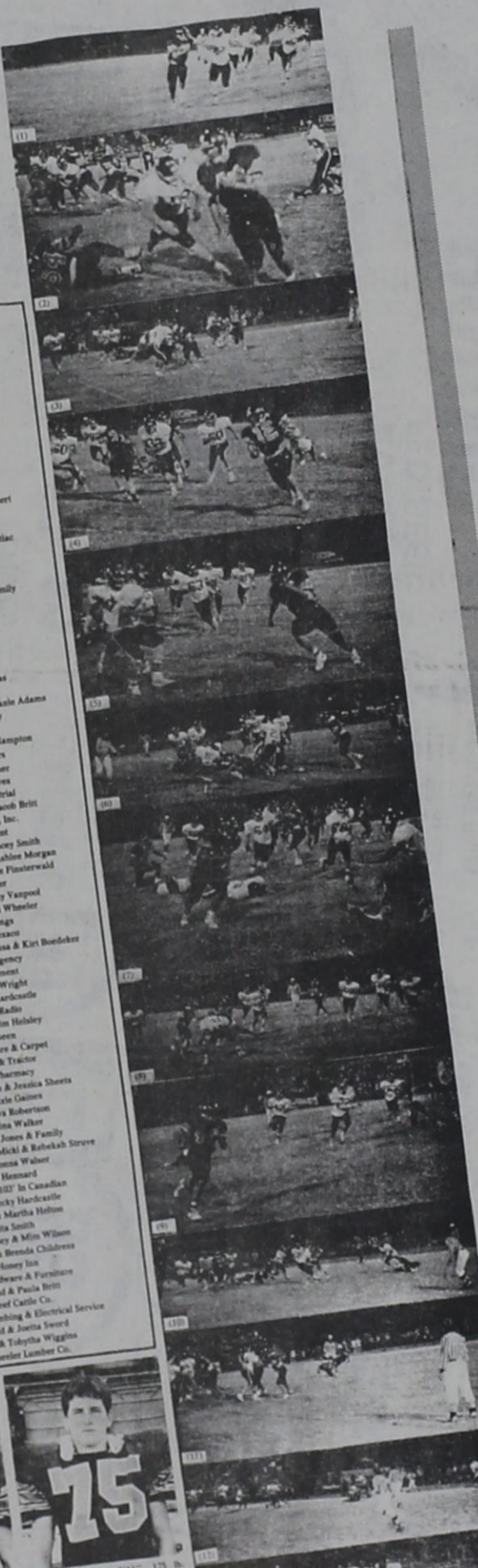

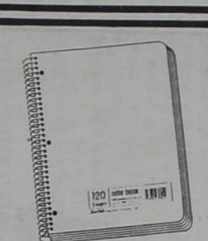

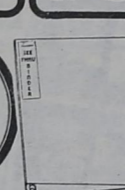
