## 80 Pct. Wheeler Co. Voters Cast Democratic Ballot

Wheeler county voters turned out 2461 strong Tuesday to give President Harry Truman an 80-plus percent of all ballots cast. Democratic Senatorial Nominee Lyndon Johnson was presented a resounding 4 to 1 victory over the lately turned Republican, Jack Porter.

Balloting was only 200 votes short of the July Democratic Primary. Seven of the 8 proposed state constitutional amendments carried by majorities ranging from 2 to 6; only the proposal for judges retirement failing to get Wheeler county support. That amendment lost, 497 for approval and 605 against.

The Democratic majorities in this county were well above the state average which upset G. O. P. and Dixiecrat predictions by landslide proportions. President Truman polled 2010, Dewey 370, Dixiecrat Thurmond 67, Wallace 2 and Socialist Thomas 1.

Lyndon Johnson received 1856 to Jack Porter's 459 and Progressive Morris' 45.

President Truman's vote pushed over the 21,000,000 mark late Wednesday on the swelling Democratic tide.

When a little over 80 percent of the country's 135,858 voting units had reported on Thursday's Presidential balloting, the President had 21,593,356 votes. This compared with 19,877,162 for Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, 998,847 for Henry A. Wallace and 826,846 for J. Strom Thurmond.

Mr. Truman had clinched—er was leading in—28 states with 304 electoral votes. Sixteen with 189 electoral votes appeared to be winding up with Dewey. Thurmond was claiming four with 38 electoral votes.

With 218 needed for House control and 49 for Senate dominance, the Democrats elected 21 senators and 252 representatives and were leading in other races. They had 30 Senate seats as holdovers.

All their gains except one, an American Labor Party seat held in the present Congress by Leo Isacson of New York, were at the expense of the GOP.

### Advertisement Of Local TB Association Gets National Publicity

The Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association of which Dr. H. E. Nicholson of Wheeler is president, received national publicity this week when a full page advertisement of The Wheeler Times and The Shamrock Texan in November, 1947, was reproduced by Publishers Idea Exchange in its November, 1948 edition.

Publishers Idea Exchange circulates among newspaper men and advertising workers throughout the United States. Each month the service reproduces outstanding advertisements which have previously appeared in weekly and daily newspapers in all 48 states.

The full page advertisement by the Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association was conceived by Dr. Nicholson three years ago as an educational promotion and is written annually by staff members of Wheeler and Shamrock newspapers. The nationally circulated advertising service printed the Wheeler County page advertisement in its current number so tuberculosis associations and advertising men everywhere might benefit from the unusual newspaper promotion.

The Wheeler County Tuberculosis association annually handles the sale of Christmas seals to raise funds to combat the dreaded disease. Dr. Nicholson pioneered in the organization of separate county associations to sell the Christmas seals rather than have state associations sell the seals, in order that a larger percentage of funds contributed could stay in the county treasury to combat the disease at home.

### Farmers Can Store Cotton On Own Farms And Still Obtain Loans

For the farmers who wish to obtain the loan on cotton this fall but have been unable to find adequate warehouse storage, the Commodity Credit Corporation has added a provision providing loans to be obtained on farm stored cotton. The loan rate will be the same as warehouse stored cotton at 30.51 for middling white or extra white 15/16 inch staple. Service fees will be \$1.00 per bale with a minimum fee of \$3.00 per loan. The cotton will be classed by the Board of Cotton Examiners. Those interested in this program should contact their local ACA office.

Handling school, as was segregated by the State Department in Texas and throughout the nation, brought to Wheeler County two weeks beginning the February. The week of the school will be Monday through North Ward Auditorium morning classes being 30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. 4 p. m. to 6 p. m. in the afternoon. These classes are so for the convenience of the larger cafeterias who shifts and which will be school available for both the past two years more 500 Texas Food Handlers provided these classes in the preparation, storage and of food, with about 75 completing the courses receiving their certificates. To quite a few injuries resulting from some local people, this again is being brought into immunity and it is hoped the school will be as well at the last one held here in 1947. The courses in food handling have been simplified for ready understanding, and the classes are more informative and more interesting by lecturers, and use motion picture films and slides. More than 25 dangerous diseases enter the human body through food handling, Dr. Geo. explains. "It can be seen why the food handlers are an important one. He can spread of such diseases as typhoid, diphtheria, septic throat, scarlet fever, common measles, and many other diseases including poultry observing the sanitary principles taught in these food classes." ### Editorial

#### ECONOMY IN EDUCATION

Preliminary calculations by the Gilmer-Aikin committee, which will report on needs of education to the next Legislature, anticipate that \$30,000,000 more in state revenues per year will be required for the

public schools. Such a recommendation is to be expected since a more adequate educational provision will cost the people more.

Yet it is hoped that the final report of the state education commission will propose economics other than district consolidations, which are feasible and advisable only in certain sections of the state. Any public organization that has mushroomed as steadily, rapidly and substantially as the public school system reasonably has been subject to the human processes of waste, extravagance and pyramiding of agencies and functions. Education would suffer from bureaucracy and over-spending as much as other phases of government-directed effort.

The extraordinarily high level of all taxation—federal, state and local—advises the spirit of sound economy in education without sacrifice or impairment of essential functions. The critical spirits is an inseparable part of education, and should be applied to the schools. An impartial inventory is overdue lest public education be threatened by its own overweight, and although not realized in an inflationary boom, there is a ceiling upon spending by government, however desirable and salutary the results.

The Gilmer-Aikin committee commendably plans to recommend that local support of the schools shall be mandatory as a prerequisite to receiving state aid. Federal and state assistance invite this evasion of responsibility by the local community or district. The burden of financing education should be spread equitably.

The final report will embrace a wide variety of proposals to the Legislature, and voluminousness will mean confusion or failure. If feasible to divide or present the complete survey in "broken doses," both the public and the Legislature would be better informed or "educated" as to the need for betterment of the schools.

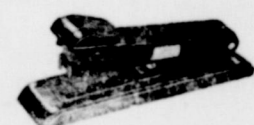

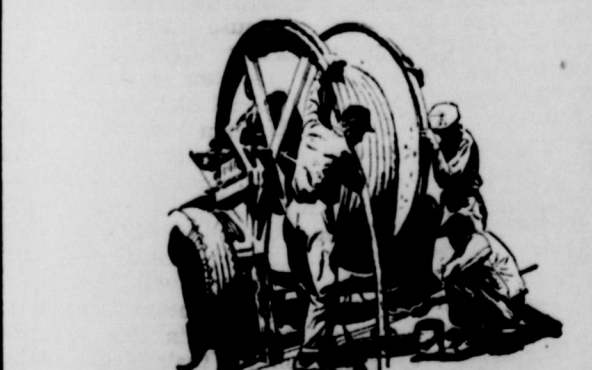

**EMPLOYMENT IS AT HIGH LEVEL**  
During the month of October,  
up to the present date of 11-3-  
48, only eleven people have filed  
an employment compensation  
claims against Texas Employers,  
according to L. P. Fort, local man-  
ager of Texas Employment Com-  
mission. Of this number five were  
men—one man is seriously handi-  
capped and advanced in age—one  
lives at Canadian—one at Wheel-  
er—one in Hutchinson County. Of  
the six women who filed—two are  
very advanced in age—one lives  
far out on a rural route—two  
lives in Pampa and are unskilled—  
one has been disqualified accord-  
ing to the Compensation Law.  
Placements of applicants have  
been unusually high for this sea-  
son of the year. Two hundred and  
sixty people have been placed on  
jobs in non-agricultural jobs.

Three hundred have been placed  
as seasonal and regular farm jobs.  
During October a total of 1996  
people contacted the local office  
for information and aid of all  
kinds. 196 visits were made by  
Texas Employment Commission  
personnel to employers in develop-  
ing job openings. 145 telephone  
calls were also made in job devel-  
opment efforts.

Turnover in local employment is  
very low at the time and a large  
number of the people who apply  
for jobs are transients.  
Of 1986 people who contacted  
the office, many were seeking in-  
formation of various kinds and  
not all were applying for work.

Jobs now open at the local office  
consist of poultry man in chick  
hatchery, farm labor, trainee for  
generator repair shop, stock clerk,  
trainee accountant, machinery  
salesman, pipe line laborers, cen-  
sus taker, draftsman, window  
trimmer, domestic workers and  
auto service station porters.

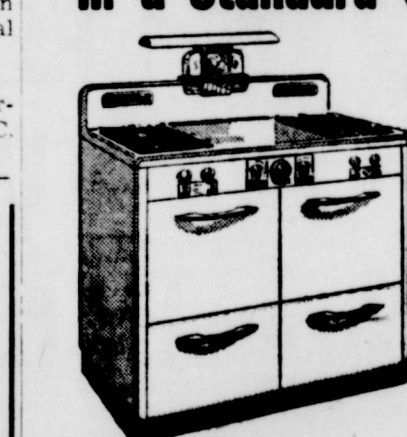

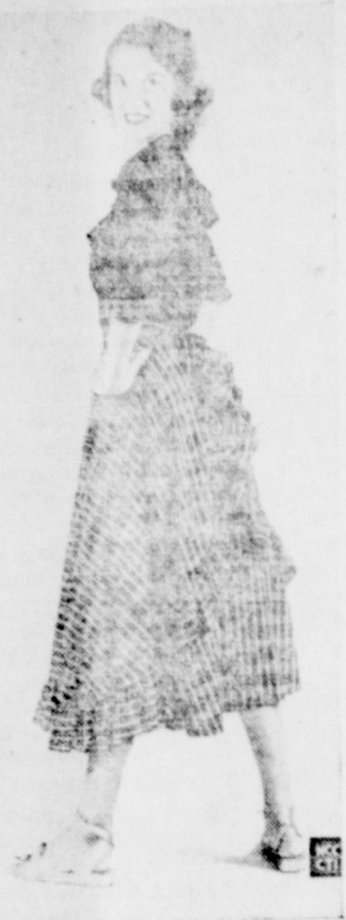

Indiana, with broad Democratic gains chalked up in Illinois and Pennsylvania.

The Democrats gathered in Senate seats held by Republicans in Minnesota, Delaware, Oklahoma, Illinois, Iowa, West Virginia and Wyoming. The losers in these were Ball, Black, Risley, Brooks, Wilson, Revercomb and E. V. Robertson, respectively. All but Risley are incumbents.

Republicans elected 7 senators to add to their 33 holdovers.

Democrats also were leading in Kentucky and Louisiana Senate battles, with Republicans ahead in Massachusetts and Michigan and fighting to stave off further losses. The Idaho Senate race was a saw-saw affair. The Kentucky, Michigan, Massachusetts and Idaho seats were held by Republicans in the present Congress.

The Democrats entered the fray for congressional control needing a net gain of four Senate and 31 House seats for control. Late Wednesday their net gains were 68 House and seven Senate posts.

Besides dropping seven Senate seats, Republicans lost 69 House races. With contests still out, they had elected 154 House members.

food handler in Wheeler County will avail themselves of one of these schools and to attend these classes.

Dr. Cox states that when any food establishment has at least 80 percent of its personnel receiving certificates and where its sanitary standards meet with city, county and state requirements, the establishment will be awarded a placard of approval, signed by the

State Health Officer which will be suitable for framing and public display.

Dr. Cox further states that every food handler in Wheeler County, in order to earn a certificate as a trained food handler, for their individual attendance must attend four out of the five classes.

Both classes each day will cover the same material and as those of you know, who attended the last food handlers school in Shamrock, the course was most instructive and a truly education in food handling.

The week of February 14th, Monday through Friday, classes will be held in Wheeler in one of the rooms of the Wheeler County Court House, with morning classes being from 9:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. and from 4 p. m. to 6 p. m. in the afternoons.

The instructor for the food handlers school this coming February will be Mrs. Tom Warren, out of State Headquarters, Austin, Texas who is highly recommend-

ed as being well versed in food handling as high a plane as possible by all concerned establishments throughout the county will help make a square meal for their employees to take advantage of this better instruction so they will be better prepared to serve the public and lessen the spread of disease.

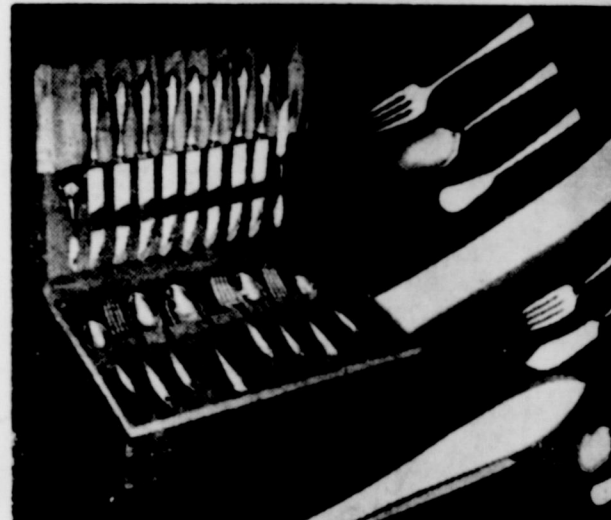

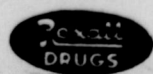
