Entry in the rodeo is open to all youth who have not passed their 20th birthday before the opening day of the rodeo.

The Board convened into Executive session in accordance with the Open Meetings Act Article 6252-17, Texas Revised Civil Statutes, at 6:45 p.m.

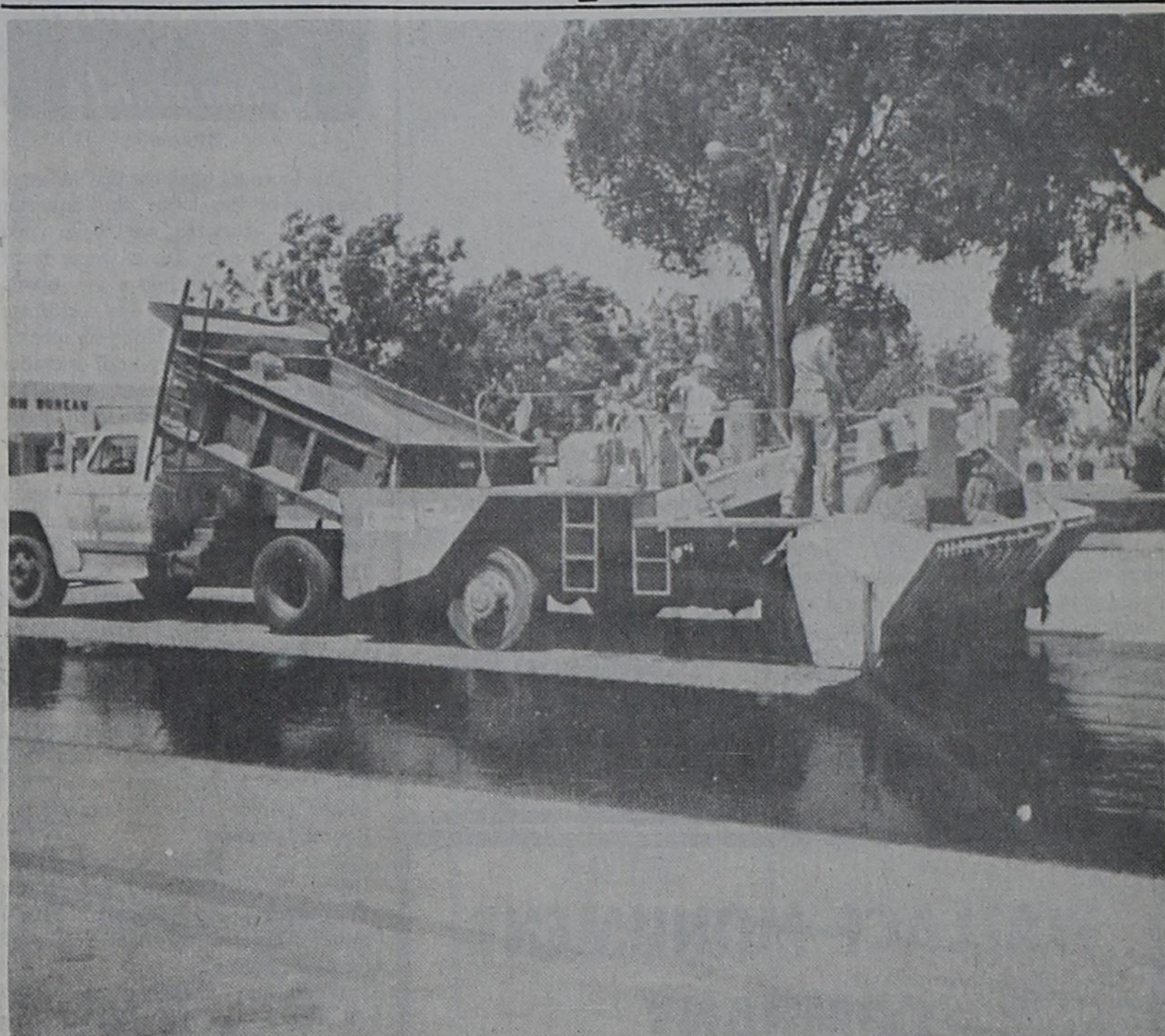
The Board reconvened into open session at 7:02 p.m.

1. Motion by Mr. Gill Seconded by Mr. Wills. To employ Dianna Johnson as Special Education teacher for the 1988-89 school year at state base plus \$1,500.00 without previous career ladder or evaluations to be considered and subject to place assignment. Motion carried unanimously.

2. Motion by Mr. Gill. Seconded by Mrs. Hennard. To employ Mrs. Christine Atherton as cafeteria manager for the 1988-89 school year at a salary of \$9,586.32. Motion carried unanimously.

In order to scrutinize the proposed 1988-89 budget, a workshop was conducted with Board members.

3. Motion by Mr. Morrison. Seconded by Mr. Ware. To adjourn. Motion carried unanimously.



SEAL COATING: "Your tax dollars at work." The seal coating of a portion of Wheeler's streets is drawing to a close. The city annually checks the 100 plus blocks of paving in Wheeler and determines which need protection. Approximately one-third of the paving is treated each year. However, the city had to increase the proportion this year, due to the severe winter weather and it's effect on the paving. The seal-coating project cost \$42,000.00

after the council voted to extend the treatment in the 100 blocks of east and west Texas from curb to curb. The blocks of paving in Wheeler does not

count the south end of Main Street which is a Farm-to-Market road or Highways 83 and 152; these are maintained by the state.

Sheriff's Department Makes Four Arrests: Solves Four Incidents

Wheeler County Sheriff Lonnie Miller notified the "Times" Tuesday of the solving of several crimes in Wheeler.

In the early hours of Sunday, July 2, the city was notified of the loss of water pressure. It was discovered at this time that two fire hydrants had been turned on the water tower was empty. As was stated at the time the crime was reported, this was beyond the "prank" stage; it was a crime. The same two youths were charged with the breaking of the windows at Wheeler Lumber Company and the hanging of the stop sign on the "horse" at Cut 'n Shoot on July 20. The youths had to bear the cost of replacing the window at the lumber yard.

Following the "street dance" on Texas Street on the 4th of July, damage was suffered to the lawn on the courthouse square. "Donuts" were cut on the southeast corner. Two men were responsible for this incident. Each individual in this case was required to donate 20 hours of community service. One worked at "Tom Britt Memorial Field" and the other worked on the courthouse lawn.

This clinic is conducted by Agape Home Health Service and it is sponsored by the Wheeler Senior Citizens and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

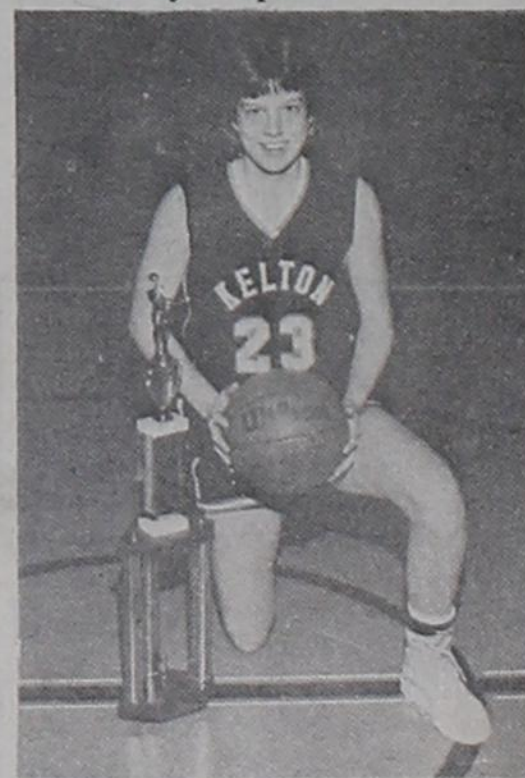

To believe that strict and arbitrary restrictions are always best for children is erroneous. It is true that parents should train children with an absolute standard of conduct that is based on Biblical truths. But it is also true that they should train them with a relative standard of conduct that is based upon common sense and logic.

When parents are too strict in the training of children, the children will often rebel, demonstrating the libertine and licentious lifestyle that their parents sought to prevent. Like nuts and bolts, children can be tightened up too tight. And when they are, there is a point where the tighter becomes looser.

There is no greater art than the development of children into independent adults. And like any other art, this art takes time -- time that is devoted to Biblical and logical training.

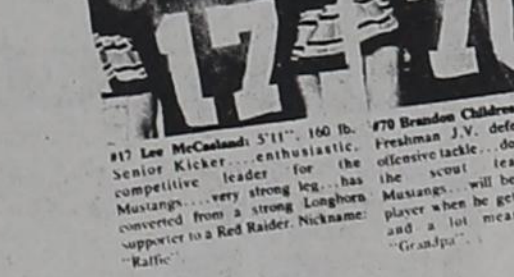

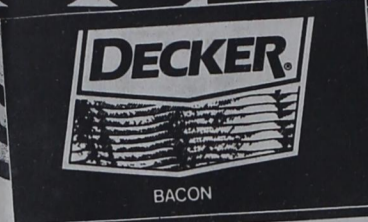
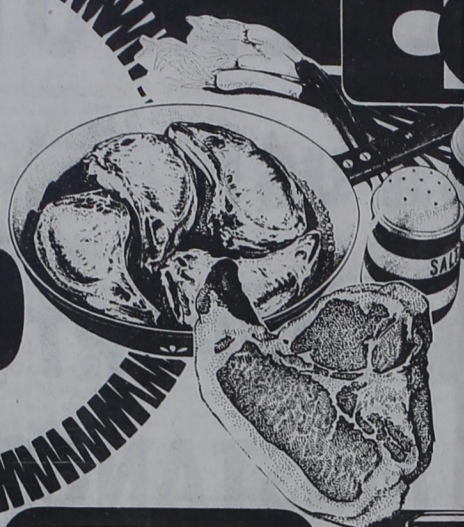
