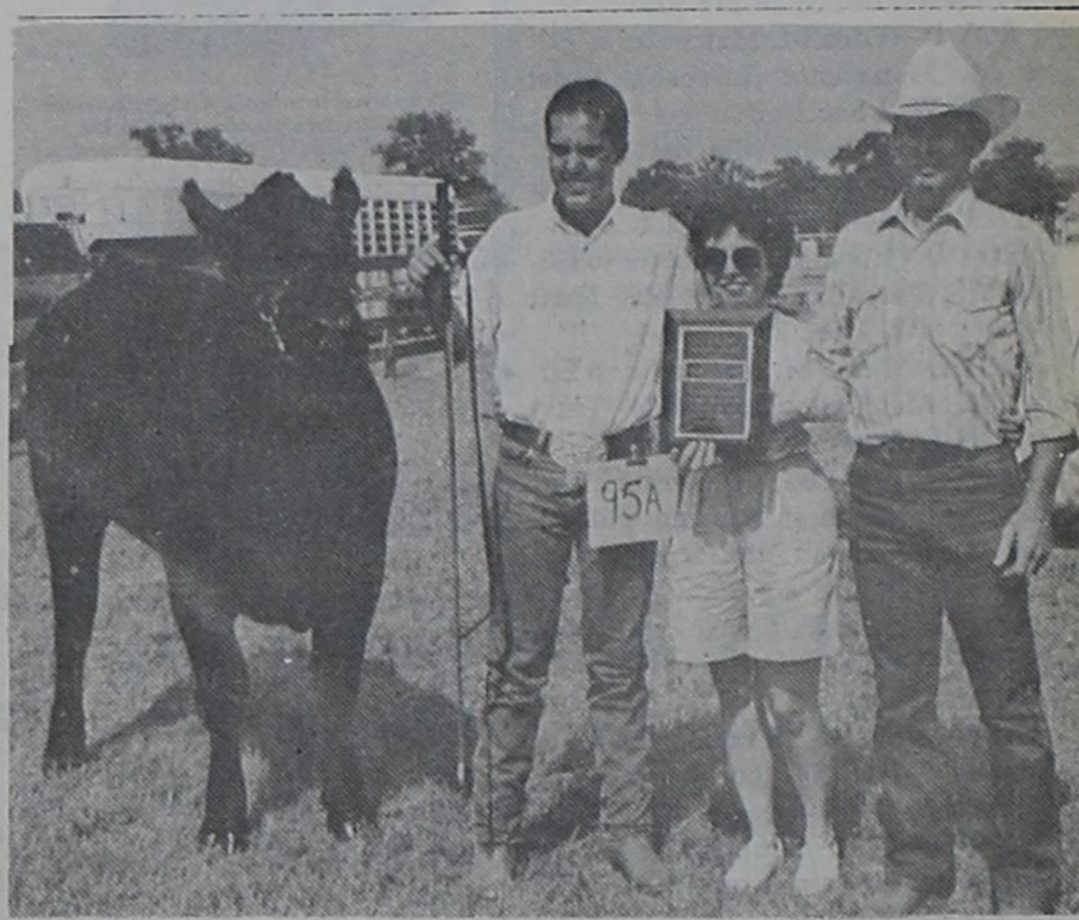
The 8th Blue Grass Festival was enjoyed by approximately 3000 people who attended.
