Editorial

CONTINGENT FUND FOR LEGISLATORS

Members of the Texas Legislature ought to draw more pay than \$10 a day. As measured in prevailing living costs and living standards, the present parsimonious \$10 is

far less than the \$5 allowed by the frugal writers of the constitution in 1876. It is far less than the \$10 that was allowed by amendment in 1930. At the moment this amount was closely equivalent to the 1876 \$5 but by 1940 it had declined appreciably in buying power.

But the present contingent expense fund proposed by Rep. H. A. Hill of Fort Worth will not set well with the public. The reason for this is illustrated in the words of Representative Hull himself. First, he contends that his \$10-a-day expense fund is valid because it merely provides for administering funds already appropriated for the expenses of the House. Then he says: "I'll frankly admit this is an attempt to raise Representatives' pay to a level we can live on." With this frank honesty, Representative Hull undoes his own finespun argument to the contrary. And that is exactly what the public will think of it.

Pay of legislators has been fixed by Article III, Section 24, since 1876. The writers of the constitution included only mileage and per diem. They said nothing about contingent expenses. The Fifty-first Legislature should submit to the people a constitutional amendment providing better pay for legislators. If it is reasonable, they will adopt it. But they will not consider it reasonable if it includes a "back-salary grab" such as was contained in the amendment submitted and defeated in 1945.—From Dallas News

WHAT IT COSTS

The Federal Government will spend nearly 42 billion dollars the next fiscal year. Perhaps more, for Mr. Truman requested that sum "plus."

That means the average cost per person—widows, children and all—will be around \$283. But that doesn't nearly tell the story.

Virtually all the cost will be borne by those over twenty-one years of age—a total of \$94,000,000. That means an average cost of \$446 a year. If we take the estimated 60,000,000 who are working—ranging all the way from Henry Ford II down to a ditch-digger—then the average cost is \$700 per workingman.

That in turn means that 20c out of every dollar goes to the Federal Government. If we add local and state taxes, all government is taking a fourth of the average income per person.—From Dallas News

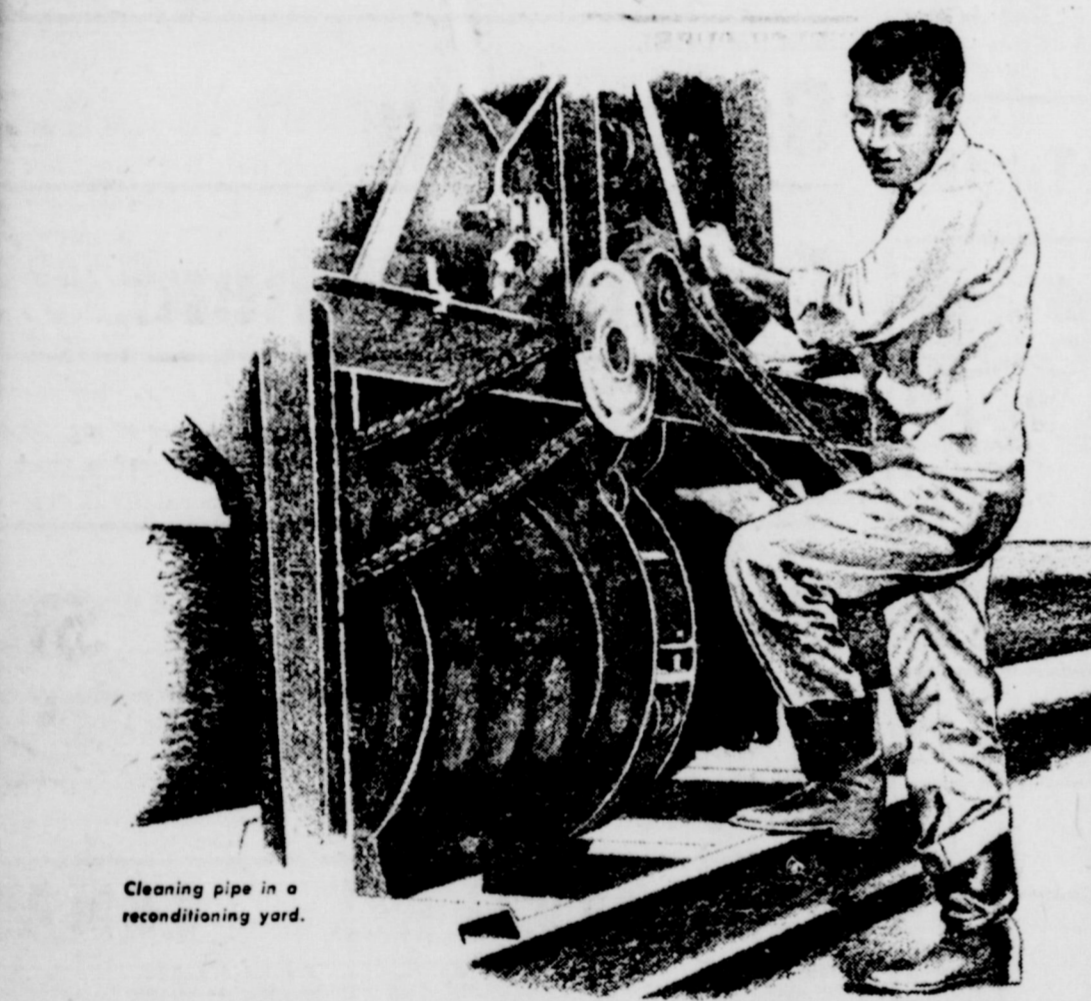

Mr. Hobbeltzelle heads the annual cancer control month in Texas, the month of April. It is set aside by act of congress for a special educational and fund raising effort.

Accepting the chairmanship, Mr. Hobbeltzelle said that the Texas society's program is in itself proof of a job well done.

"In the brief life of this humanitarian organization we have seen it develop into one of the state's most worthwhile endeavors," he said. "Through the activities of its members more and more cases of cancer are reaching the doctors while in earlier, and very often curable, stages."

"I shall urge upon every Texan the necessity for membership in the American Cancer Society, and for donations of effort and of money in order that true facts about cancer may be placed within the reach of everyone in our state."

The cancer society seeks to control cancer through programs of education, service, and research. Sixty percent of all money raised for it in Texas remains in the state for use in local and statewide projects, Mr. Braniff said.

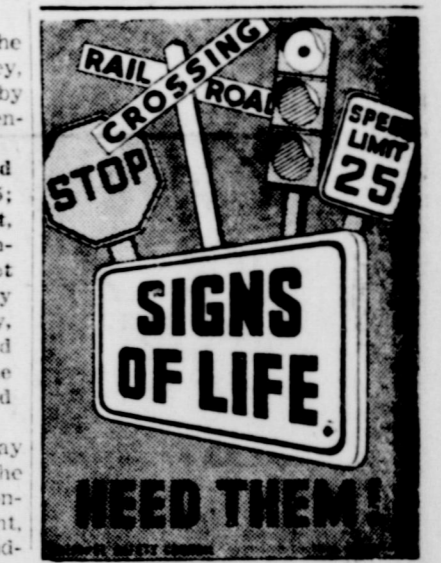

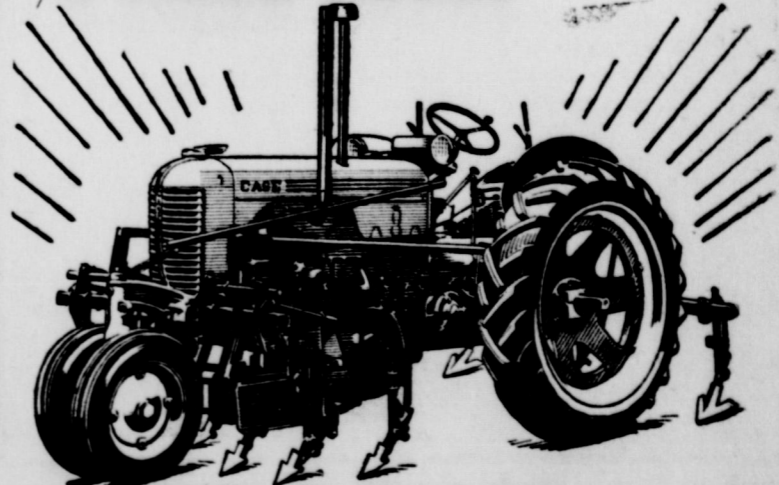

and remain on the air until 6:30 p. m.
Expressing appreciation of the entire KEVA staff for the enthusiastic welcome paid the new East Panhandle enterprise. Manager Kennedy said public response overwhelmed him. He said he did not believe a 250-watt station anywhere in the world had ever received a greater ovation. His staff received so many complimentary messages the first week they scarcely had time to handle the programming.

The KEVA manager explained his staff hit the air at 7:45 a. m. on January 20, after receiving FCC authorization only a few hours before. He said a few weeks time would be required to smooth out the programming but that KEVA's equipment and personnel are equal to any radio station located in a city of 25,000 in the nation.

Kennedy said the local station's programs can be heard easily for a distance of 75 miles in most directions, and that the signal carries two or three times that distance in some directions, depending on altitude, topography, weather conditions, and the proximity of other stations which broadcast on frequencies adjacent to 1580.

KEVA will be known as the "5 town station," since its programs will be beamed to Shamrock, Wheeler, Erick, Wellington and McLean. It is the hope of station owners to serve the religious, educational, entertainment, and day-by-day economic needs of the people of the Eastern Panhandle and Western Oklahoma. This large area is presently served by a dozen small newspapers. Five weekly newspapers presently serving the primary market of KEVA.

comment them to the public.
Current indications are that flourine is effective as a decay preventative when present in proper quantities in the drinking water or when topically applied to the teeth. Work on flourine however, is still in experimental stages.

Frequent dental visits (at least twice a year) give the dentist an opportunity to care for early defects in the teeth before they develop into major dental problems. The patient who visits his dentist early often has less dental disease and discomfort and also spends for less time and money on dental care than the patient who goes to his dentist only at frequent intervals.

Fillings that save teeth cost from 10 to 20 times less than replacement for teeth that have been neglected and lost. Remember, dental neglect is expensive; timely dental care is not. On behalf of the dental personnel out of Austin, W. R. Ritter, County Sanitarian wishes to express appreciation of the wholehearted support and assistance given by all school students, officials and teachers that participated.

mation and knowledge obtained at this school would be highly educational.

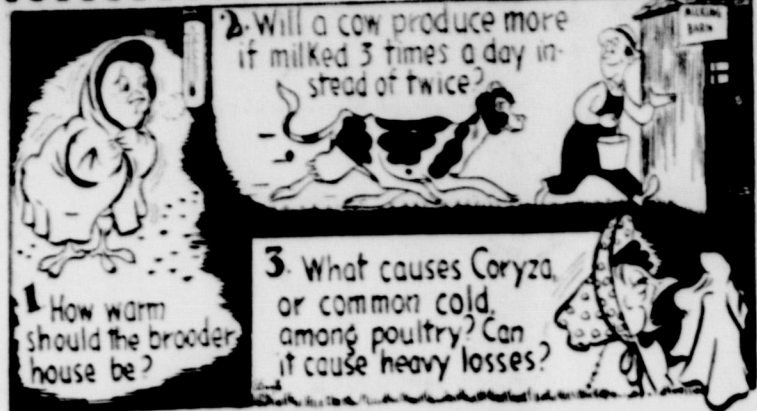

Farm Facts



1. The Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company has found that chicks do best when they are started at a temperature of 90°. This temperature should be dropped 5° a week until it is down to 60° where it should be held as long as the chicks need heat.
2. Yes, provided that the cow has inherited the ability to produce large amounts of milk. Milk secretion is continuous, and when the udder is filled to capacity the nutrients for making milk return to the body. By milking more often, more milk is made.
3. A germ, Hemophilus gallinarum, which gains entrance into the nasal chambers is considered the primary cause of this disease. In the milder form the disease may be unnoticed. In more severe cases, accompanied by sneezing and gasping, there may be numerous deaths, and affected birds may go off feed and gradually "waste away."

was designed so it can be adapted to any farm conditions in the state, and to cut down on the time and effort needed to keep a good set of records.

The record book is full of inventories—inventories of nearly everything on the farm. There are inventories of land, farm improvements, machinery and equipment, livestock, crops and feeds on hand, farm sales and expenses, farm products used at home, and last of all, a summary of the year's farm business.

Inventories are check-ups on what farmers own and owes at the start and finish of each year. Farmers who prepare income tax statements—and that gets nearly everybody—find they have a number of deductions after keeping a farm inventory.

After the inventory has been recorded at the first of the year, all that's left to be kept from day to day is the farm sales and expenses—a five or ten minute job after supper.

Texas Farm Record Books can be had from the county agent, or by writing the Extension Service at College Station, says McHaney. This is a good time of year to start keeping the record.

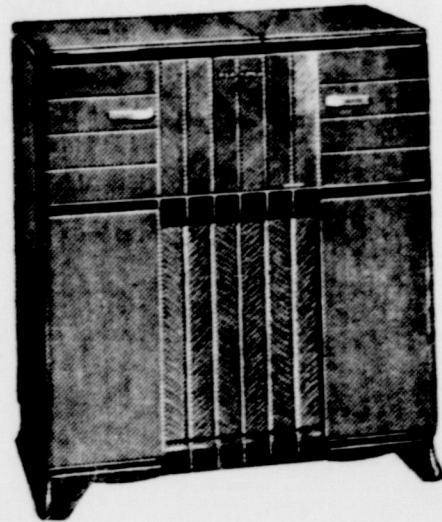
