The "Old Mobeetie Jail" will be the site of the 8th Annual Bluegrass Festival. The Panhandle Blue Grass and Old tyme Music Association sponsors the event each year. The dates for the activity this year will be July 22, 23 and 24, Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

A number of bands and/or groups have been scheduled to perform. 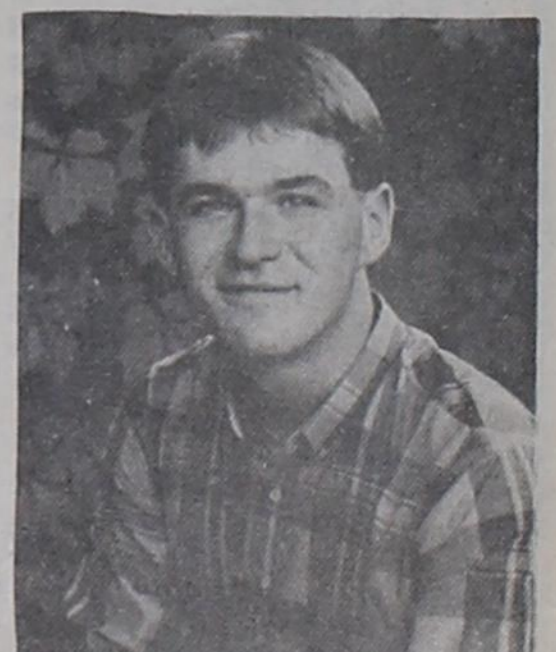
Brett Buckingham Is Named Star Farmer

AREA MARIJUANA FIELDS SPRAYED

Paraquat Used In Six Local Areas

Wheeler County once again made the national news Tuesday when the Drug Enforcement Administration used paraquat on six fields of marijuana. This was the first time the federal government has used the herbicide on privately owned land. "Operation Crop Stop" was the wording on t-shirts worn by several of the individuals at the spraying.

Tuesday's work was only the first. The spraying of paraquat in Wheeler County is a part of the nation's "War on Drugs." "We're not just going to stop at Wheeler County," stated Phil Jordan, Dallas DEA agent in charge of federal district including Wheeler County and Amarillo.

The six locations have been a "sore spot" with County Sheriff Lonnie Miller during his administration. Each year the sheriff's department and volunteers has visited the locations and made an effort to destroy the crop by spraying and pulling, but the weed continues to grow. Miller has been asking for help and finally got some response Tuesday.

The spraying was under the direction of Washington, D.C. special agent Jim Seward. Each of the property owners in the county had been visited and permission obtained to use paraquat was obtained.

Following the spraying signs was posted; the signs read: "Danger, Do Not Enter Area Being Treated With Pesticide. In Emergency Contact Panhandle Biological" and "Caution: This Area Was Treated With Paraquat 7/19/88. For Further Information Call 826-5537"

An estimated 51,000 plants were sprayed on 16 acres of land. Panhandle Biological of Amarillo was hired to do the spraying.

After contacting landowners, livestock was moved from the area and efforts to keep the animals away from the uncultivated weeds which had been sprayed. Livestock do not eat the plants; they do not need to be exposed to the herbicide.

If the Wheeler spraying is successful, the pesticide will be used in other states. The spraying will be done twice this time and a 60-80% kill is expected.

"Operation Stop Crop" is the title of the effort by U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese III to destroy domestically grown marijuana.

The "fields" were sprayed by workers wearing backpacks as opposed to aerial spraying.

Environmental protection.

The size of the plants ranged from 2' to 15'. Each plant is capable of

producing an amount of marijuana worth \$500 on the street. According to Steward, the complete eradication would mean \$25 million of marijuana has been destroyed in Wheeler county.

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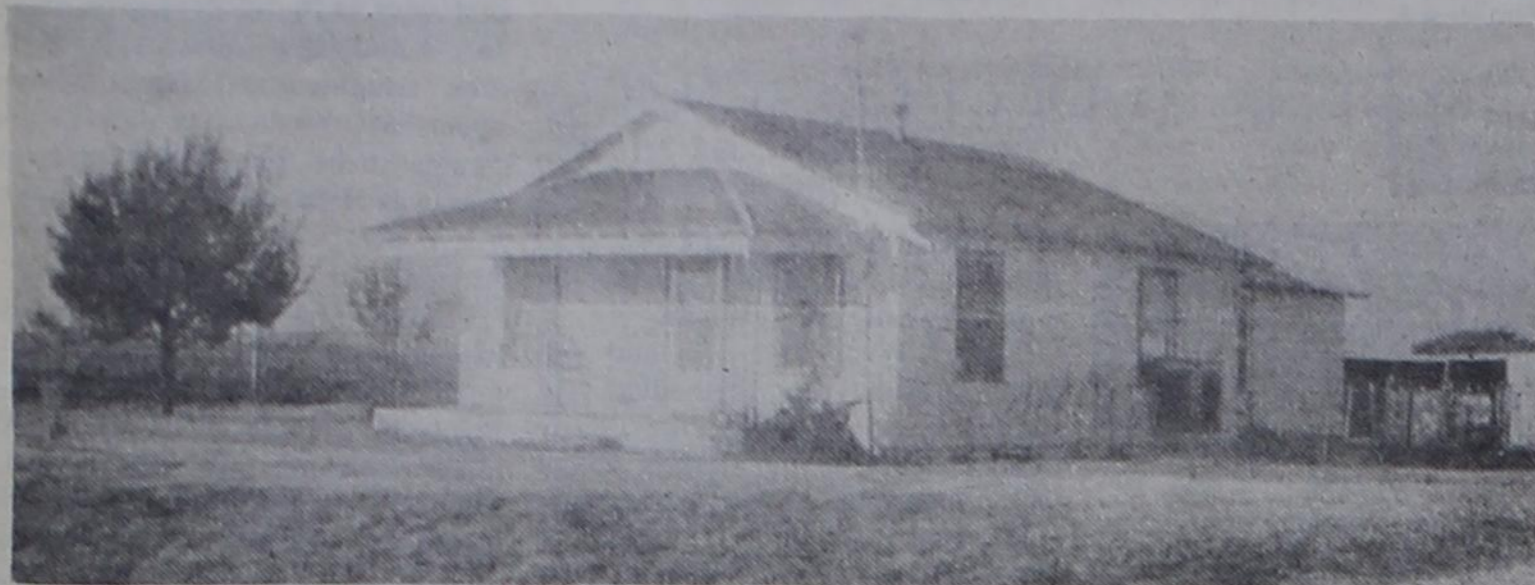
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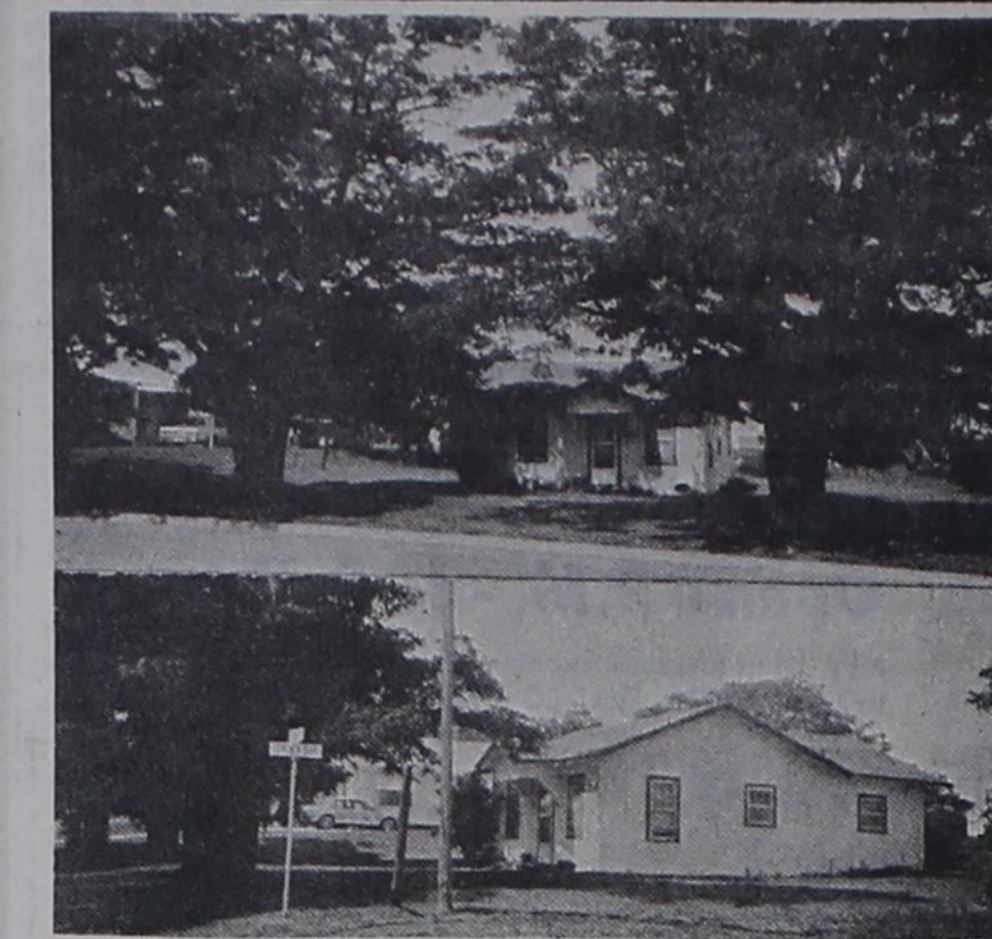

Electric-Rate Decrease For Texas SPS Users

Customers in Texas cities served by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) soon should receive their second electric-rate decrease of the year. Also, SPS's rural customers should have their rates lowered to match rates within city limits, SPS announced today.

The decreases in effect and proposed total \$20.6 million, or 4.3%, and reflect lower SPS expenses resulting primarily from federal tax reform, said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research.

The proposed decreases were agreed to Friday, July 8, by SPS, the staff of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), the state's Office of Public Utility Council, the Texas Industrial Energy Consumers and the U.S. Department of Energy.

Details of the agreement are being worked out, and once approved, the reduction would be considered effective as of July 8, Hunter said. Approval from city and state regulators is expected within 35 to 60 days. A customer's first bill on which the reduction is calculated would include a credit recognizing the effect of the lower rate since July 8.

"This timing allows our customers to, in effect, receive lower rates even before the regulatory process is complete," Hunter said. "We worked out this arrangement between SPS and the Texas cities it serves, customers within city limits received a 3.1% decrease effective March 28. Upon approval from the cities, these customers will receive an additional 1.2% decrease, Hunter said, to match the rural reduction of 4.3%.

In Texas, cities have original jurisdiction over rates within their city limits. The PUCT regulates rates in rural areas. SPS will file with the PUCT for approval of the rural rate decrease and with 74 Texas cities it serves for approval of the rate decrease within city limits.

The percentage of rate decrease varies slightly among types of electric customers. Residential customers will receive a net 5.2% decrease compared to rates in effect at the first of the year.

A monthly electric bill for a rural residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours would drop \$4.09, from \$73.51 to \$69.42. The bill for a customer within the city limits using 1,000 kilowatt hours dropped \$3 on March 28 and should decline another \$1.09, resulting in a bill of \$69.42.

Elk City Hospital Added Ultrasound

A new concept in ultrasound has been added to Community Hospital's expanding capabilities for serving western Oklahoma. This new \$105,000 equipment is called color flow mapping and doppler wave form analysis of an ultrasound image, or "Color Flow Echocardiography" for short.

This ultrasound unit provides community hospital with the ability to image the heart and major blood vessels in the body without invading either the arterial or venous systems with needles, catheters or any contrast material. It also allows internal investigation without risk of a reaction to foreign materials.

This machine can also detect a blockage of the carotid arteries in the neck, which is one of the major contributors to strokes.

Complete echocardiographic studies, including 2-D, M-Mode, doppler and color flow analysis can be ordered through the X-ray department.

CRP Producers Need Weed Control

Most of Wheeler County has been blessed with rainfall in recent weeks. This is good for CRP producers who have invested money planting grass. The rainfall is beneficial for newly planted grass, but it is also beneficial for weeds. CRP producers need to check their fields and control weeds as the need arises.

The two most common methods of weed control are mechanical and chemical. Mechanical weed control involves cutting the weeds by either shredding or swathing. This is not as effective as chemical control except when the weeds are mature or in a stressed condition, such as drought.

Chemical control consists of applying a herbicide such as 2, 4-D or banvel. Chemicals can be applied by a ground rig or by airplane. A ground rig has the advantage of applying a larger volume per acre, thus getting better coverage. With a ground rig there is also less chance of a chemical drifting.

An airplane has the advantage of applying herbicide to more acres per hour. An airplane also has the advantage of being able to spray rough ground. On land where there are large rocks or rough ground, an airplane may be better suited to

Government Undertakes Marijuana Control

Attorney General Edwin Meese III, chairman of the National Drug Policy Board, today announced a new comprehensive national strategy for ridding America of domestically grown marijuana.

Operation Stop Crop 1988, the name for the first year of this long-term plan, is currently underway within the United States.

The Attorney General was joined at the news conference by Earl C. Gjelde, Under Secretary of Interior; George S. Dunlop, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture for Natural Resources and Environment; John C. Lawn, Administrator of the Drug Enforcement Administration; and Lt. General Herbert R. Temple, Jr. chief of the National Guard Bureau.

Operation Stop Crop 1988 is a cooperative effort of the Drug Enforcement Administration and the Departments of Justice, Agriculture, Interior and their various agencies including the Bureau of Land Management and the Fish and Wildlife Service. Its purpose is to apprehend and prosecute individuals involved in the cultivation of domestically grown marijuana.

The National Guard will also provide support in conjunction with their training and normal operational activities.

Attorney General Meese stated that the effort could be successful only with the cooperation of state and local governments and the general public.

He pointed out that DEA statistics for 1987, compared to 1986, showed an alarming 72 percent increase in the number of high-potency sinsemilla plants eradicated (3.1 million vs. 1.8 million) and an increase of 59 percent in cultivated plains eradicated (7.4 million vs. 4.6 million.)

Approximately 255,000 cultivated marijuana plants were eradicated in 1987 on National Forest Service lands and an additional 110,000 cultivated plants destroyed on Department of Interior lands.

"The criminals who are growing this crop have become increasingly sophisticated, and much more vicious in recent years," the Attorney General said.

Meese noted that innocent parties, such as hunters, hikers and families enjoying the outdoors, are threatened by armed confrontation and injured each year by "booby traps" hidden by marijuana growers to protect their illicit crop.

"Growers also damage the environment and wildlife," the Attorney General said. "As I recently saw in California, marijuana growers destroy wildlife, indiscriminately cut down trees, dump pesticides in waterways and build harmful dams on creeks and streams to irrigate their illegal crops."

In an earlier briefing with Gjelde, Meese was told by the Interior Under Secretary that while growing marijuana is a problem on some public lands, steps have been taken to ensure the safety of park visitors. He referred to a recently announced program to rid the park and public lands of illicit drugs by encouraging an awareness of illegal drug activity; educating employees to tell-tale signs of illegal drug activity; conducting drug identification training; and law enforcement training for more than 11,000 employees, including park superintendents, pilots, surveyors and other non-enforcement personnel.

The Interior Department hopes to increase the pressure on marijuana growers and traffickers and foster a new public awareness program to enable visitors to assist enforcement efforts, Meese said.

At the earlier briefing, Meese heard Dunlop note that a key aspect of Agriculture's successful domestic eradication strategy is an effective program of law enforcement activities and investigations directed at criminal indictments, prosecutions and convictions of persons involved in using these lands for illegal drug production. Dunlop further indicated that Agriculture's documentary film, "guardians of the Forest," had received wide acclaim and is being shown nationwide on public television as part of their educational outreach to make citizens aware of the illicit activities in national forests.

The Attorney General said that federal prosecutors will use the recently enacted provision of Title 18, U.S. Code 924 (c) which requires mandatory sentencing for those using an explosive device or firearm when committing a federal narcotics violation.

He praised the work done by state and local agencies in their eradication efforts and the support given to all enforcement agencies by the National Guard Bureau.

"I have today written to each of our state's governors to ask that they personally support this program and their state's National Guard participation," the Attorney General said.

The long-term strategy to rid the country of domestically grown marijuana is outlined in a 32-page document "Domestic Cannabis Suppres-



sion, A Comprehensive National Strategy."

DEA released individual toll-free numbers for the public to provide information and tips about the location of marijuana crops. Most of the numbers are those of state police departments. (In Maryland the

number is 1-800-492-8477, in Virginia, 1-800-553-DOPE.)

The Department of Agriculture will soon announce a nationwide toll-free number for similar public tips about marijuana grown in the national forests.
