The Motor Age is most to blame. Its blessings outweigh its disadvantages. But before we became a nation on wheels, the Fourth of July was a truly historic occasion. Today the patriotic program is almost extinct. Occosionally little groups gather, pledge allegiance to the flag, hear thirty minutes of talk and go home. The great majority who observe never give the meaning of the observance a thought. And everybody who ventures from the safety of his cottage does so at the risk of life and limb.







4-H Safety Workers in All-Out Attempt PROSPECTS FOR to Reduce Accidents on Farms in 1949



MR. FARMER, has the FH Clab member in your family checked your farm and home for accident and fire hazards lately? If not, you can expect him to do so any day now. 4-H'ers are making an all-out attempt to reduce the annual cost of accidents affecting farm folksproperty damage - which totals more than one billion dollars, or also trying to cut down the number f accidental deaths, which kill 51 farm residents in the U.S. every day in the year.

Your 4-H'er doubtless will caution you to drive carefully on highways, and use proper signals when turning or stopping (top right). More than 7,300 rural people are killed annually in motor vehicle accidents. In fact, more fatal automobile accidents occur in rural areas than in any other location.

Falls rank second in farm accident causes. So watch your step when carrying a clothes basket, like the girl shown in right photo. Your 4-H safety worker probably will suggest you tack down throw rugs or put them on non-slip matting, and keep stairways unlittered. Are your lightning rods properly grounded? The 4-H'ers shown at

The entomologists say that, on the average, about 15 percent more cotton can be harvested in fields where a good job of insect control has been practiced. For a farm producing 200 pounds of lint per acre, insect control means an extra 30 pounds. Speaking in dollars and cents, that's \$8.50. On more productive land, the increase will be larger still.

Cotton growers need to control the bugs this year as never before for profit sake, Bates says. If a dollar invested in control measures will protect the crop investment and return \$1.50, insect control is a paying-off proposition.



Almond Orange Puffs

Kaisin-filled and almond-topped, these feathery yeast puffs "make the meal." Fresh cherries add bright color to the accompanying fruit salad.

Early on a cool summer morning, you may be inspired to make fragrant yeast-leavened puffs.

Almond puffs are made from a basic batter that does not have

to be kneaded, and that can be varied in a number of ways. When batter is dropped into muffin pans, these puffs get a crunchy topping of sugar, grated orange rind and slivered, blanched almonds.

To blanch the almonds, pour boiling water over them and let them stand for about three minutes. Drain water, then slip the skins

off each nut. While still a bit warm from their hot bath put the nuts on a slicing board and, with a sharp knife, cut into shreds lengthwise.

Almond orange puffs are excellent with the salad type of luncheon or with creamed dishes. They are equally good as a coffee hour bread or as a simple dessert. Count on these puffs made with enriched flour, eggs, and milk to supply a good share of vitamins, minerals, and protein on your menu

> ALMOND ORANGE PUFFS Basic Batter

3½ cups sifted enriched flour ½ teaspoon vanilla extract (optional)

For Almond Orange Puffs teaspoon grated orange rind % cup slivered blanched almonds

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Bring milk to boiling point. Add sugar, salt, and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Add one cup flour and beat well. Add eggs. Beat Add softened yeast. Mix Add more flour to make a stiff batter. Add vanilla extract. Beat thoroughly until smooth Cover and let rise until bubbly

(about one hour). When batter is light, stir in raisins. Drop by spoonfuls in greased muffin pans. Sprinkle with mixture of sugar, grated orange rind and almonds. 




