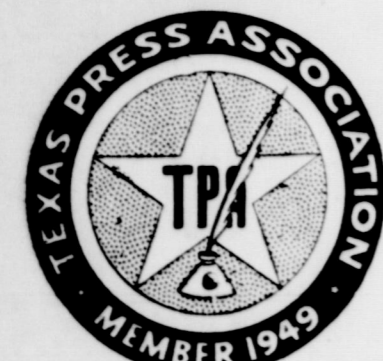

Editorial

TRIAL VERDICT POINTS TO OPEN SEASON ON REDS

It is being widely stated that American Communists are in for tougher sledding as a

result of the conviction of 11 members of the Communist Party's national committee in New York City last week.

The conviction in New York of the 11 leaders sets a precedent for prosecution of other Communists on the charge of conspiracy to teach and advocate the violent overthrow of government. It is uncertain whether the federal government will pursue that course or await final appeal of the New York case.

A problem of outlawing the Communist Party, which under the New York verdict is a vehicle of violent revolution, intrudes itself on Congress. Many of its members, however, are in a bigger hurry to get home to build political fences for the 1950 elections than to prolong the ordeal of legislation.

The New York verdict should give more impetus to the CIO purge of radicals at the national convention in Cleveland, opening October 31. Eleven CIO unions under asserted domination of Communists or sympathizers are under attack by President Philip Murray and the right wing of the CIO.

The 11 defendants at New York are a sorry, offensive lot whose contempt of law and justice as democratic processes denied in Russia stripped them of any pretense of decency and self-imposed martyrdom. For such recalcitrance and exhibitionism in court, the ducking stool should be revived to cool off synthetic ardor in icy water.

The procedure of punishment of individual offenders who conspire to overthrow the United States government is a proper, practical one. Outlawing the Communist Party, which could not be punished, could drive the same movement underground or give rise to a new name.

In addition to the useful lessons of the New York trial, the government might study British methods of dealing with radicals who have been a negligible force despite the stress upon Britain's democracy. So long as there are courts in America to convict apostles of violent revolution, there is no occasion for a wave of hysteria.—Ft. Worth Star-Telegram

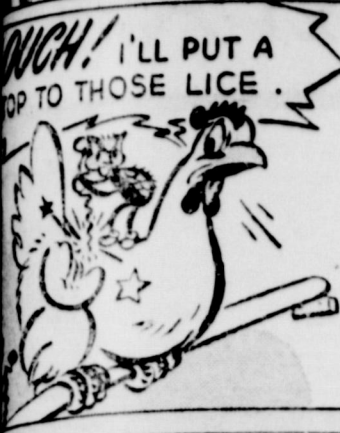

G. Whitener Visits Purina Research Farm

Gordon Whitener returned from a visit to the Purina Research Farm, Gray Summit, Mo., near St. Louis, where he saw practical feeding and management operations designed to help farmers produce more meat, milk and eggs.

On the farm of 738 acres, new rations and new methods of feeding were explained to those on the tour. Some of the accomplishments of the Purina Program of feeding, breeding, management and sanitation which were pointed out, were dairy heifers raised on dry feed that were ready for breeding at 12 to 15 months; sows from which an average of well over 17 fat hogs a year were farrowed, weaned and raised to market age;

and broilers that grew to an average of 3 to 3½ pounds at 11 weeks of age on 10 pounds of feed.

A banquet was held at the Ralston Purina Co., St. Louis in honor of the visitors. They were also taken for a tour of the Purina Chow Mills and Purina Research Laboratory.

Mr. and Mrs. Zeigler made a trip to Ruidoso, El Paso and points south. They are making their home at 615 South Madden Street in Shamrock.

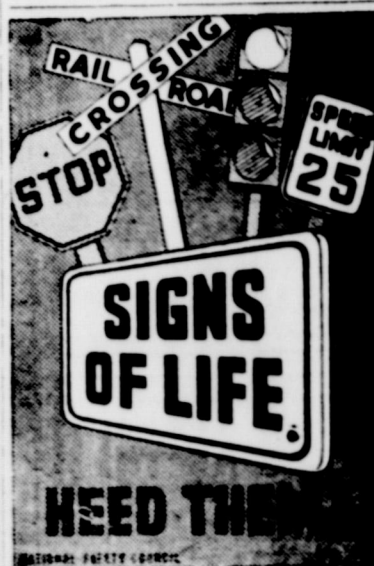

KITCHEN MEMO BY JEAN CLARKE

When you're entertaining and want to be free of pot-watching, serve *Hamburger Goulash*. It's full of savor, combines nicely with a tossed green salad and suffers no damage if it must stand and wait for late guests' arrival. Fry 4 slices bacon and add 1 lb. cubed beef, 1 lb. cubed pork, 1 cup chopped onion. Brown lightly. Add 4 slices tomatoes, 1/2 tsp. paprika, 1/2 tsp. caraway seed, 1/2 tsp. marjoram, 1 tsp. salt, 2 cups stock. Simmer over low flame until beef is tender (about 2 hrs.). Yield: 6 portions. Place the goulash in a ring of fluffy white rice or mashed potatoes.

**TETANUS IS
A DANGEROUS AIL**

Tetanus, or tetanus, is a very serious disease caused by a tiny germ that looks like a stick with one end—something like a microscopic lollipop, says Dr. W. Cox, State Health Officer. This germ is called a spore. The seed of the germ. Lockjaw is found in the soil, especially in manured soil of the

barnyard or garden; in blank cartridges; etc—in fact, just about everywhere. These germs grow best in wounds where there is considerable tissue destruction and in which chips of glass, wood splinters, or grains of dirt have been embedded. Every accident seen by the physician must be considered from the lockjaw angle; and whenever there is any question, tetanus antitoxin should be given, for it is the antitoxin that has helped to keep the incidence of lockjaw at its low level. Your physician will

advise you as to its use. Its disadvantages are that it gives only temporary protection; it does not get rid of the lockjaw germs in the wound; and it does sometimes cause hives and other disagreeable symptoms for a few days, particularly if the subject has had previous injections. Should lockjaw develop, it requires much antitoxin and entails great expense; and even then, not all cases can be saved. It is not possible to free the environment of lockjaw germs, but now there is a method of active immunization. The subject becomes his own manufacturing establishment for antitoxin to combat lockjaw poison.

One nice feature about the treatment is that it can be combined with diphtheria and whooping cough prophylaxis. The concurrent immunization is, preferably, carried out in infancy. Should a child already have had his diphtheria toxoid and whooping cough vaccine injections, he can take the lockjaw toxoid injection alone; and these can be given at any time with very little discomfort.

PROTECT YOUR CHILDREN BY VACCINATION

Now is the time to have your baby protected from whooping cough, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The Texas State Health Department recommends that vaccination against this disease be administered at three months of age with a booster dose of vaccine when the baby is two years old. There is many a child whose life could have been saved if he had been immunized in infancy, said Dr. Cox. "Whooping cough", said Dr.

Cox, "first masquerades as an ordinary cold, with running nose and eyes, followed by a slight cough. These symptoms develop about 1 to 14 days after exposure. Then in about another week the cough develops into a series of continued attacks, in an effort to expel the troublesome mucous. An attempt to breathe during the choking spell produces the characteristic whooping sound. In mild cases it may be absent. The whooping stage last 4 to 6 weeks and may then take another two or three weeks to decline gradually. Here are some facts about whooping cough:

1. The disease starts like a common cold, 1 to 14 days after exposure. In about another week

the cough develops and the whooping usually begins.
2. It is one of the communicable diseases children often catch at school. After a child reaches the age of five, fatalities occur less frequently. Children may carry this disease home to babies.
3. Most important of all is to see that infants are vaccinated against whooping cough, for most deaths occur among children less than one year of age.
4. Call your family physician at once if you suspect your child has whooping cough and follow his directions in detail.

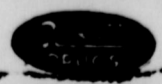

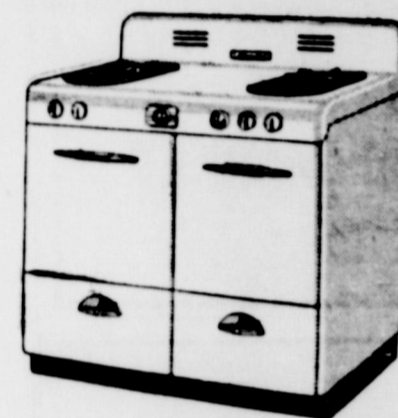
