There now are 2,070 districts in the mannamental manna self-evident. United States, and roughly they embrace most of the arable land. That impressive progress in organization suggests that the undertaking of conservation and regeneration has gone a long way toward a final goal.

Actually less than 10 percent of the land embraced in the districts has been given adequate treatment. The Association of Texas Soil Conservation District Supervisors estimates that 796,748,000 tons of precious topsoil are lost annually by erosion, water and

Farmers are paid special premiums under the federal production and marketing program and the extension service for specified soil conservation practices. Otherwise, the districts receive only nominal aid for expenses of the supervisors, not more than \$80

a year per supervisor. The PMA federal aid is insufficient to enable the small farmer to hire private contractors to terrace and otherwise improve his land, as the larger landowners are able to do. As a result these neglected tracts with their drifting soil cause damage to adjoining tracts and often nullify conservation work on such tracts. There are community drainage and other control problems which only can be handled by districts, not by individual landowners.

In Central Texas, a farmer improved his land with the aid of the Soil Conservation Service, which renders only engineering advice and assistance. An adjoining farmer with more elevated land neglected his property, and siltation from it washed down on the other farmer's land, nullifying his conservation work. Wind erosion in West Texas has caused the same result under similar circumstances.

Such instances are cited by conservation sponsors as the reason for state aid for the districts. They counsel against delay that would lead to federal aid with its controls over the landowner. These sponsors contend that districts must have machinery and materials, not now available, for coping with the problems of a community nature and of the small farmer.

The important fact, which all the people must consider, is that conservation has been carried out on only 10 percent of the land embraced in the districts. #### Fresh Rhubarb Pie



Folks won't need to guess what this pie's all about, for tart, roay rhubarb gets a chance to show its virtues with individual pastry wedges baked atop the pie.

"Pieplant" is an old name for rhubarb, but a very appropriate one. Crisp rhubarb stalks, rosy or cherry-colored, make a spring pie that is pleasantly tart and sparkling.

"Tis a pity to hide such an inviting filling, so cut five or six tri-

angles of pastry to arrange on top the pie, one for each serving. Cut the wedges with a pastry wheel to get the pretty scalloped effect, and place pastry over filling before baking.

Since this is a juicy pie, the favorite crimped edge is the one to use to hold in the juices. Make this by pressing dough together between thumb and finger of left hand and forefinger of right hand. Pie is a favorite dessert, and a satisfying one. That's reason enough to make fresh rhubarb pie a luncheon or dinner pastry treat often this spring. often this spring.

RHUBARB PIE

1½ cups sifted enriched flour ½ teaspoon salt

1/2 cup shortening 2 to 3 tablespoons cold water Roll out remaining pastry to circle one-eighth inch thick. Cut

into five or six triangular wedges.
Arrange evenly over rhubarb fill-

Sift together flour and salt. Cut or rub in shortening. Add water gradually. Mix to a dry. crumbly dough. Toss out on lightly floured pastry cloth. Press dough together. Roll two-thirds of the dough to a circle one-eighth inch thick. Line nine-inch pie pan with pastry. Fill with rhubarb filling. ing. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 10 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate (350 degrees F.) and continue baking 45




