Hog cholera has broken out in the Twitty community, and several hundred dollars worth of hogs has been lost to the disease in that community in the last few days, County Agent Wayde Frey reported this week.

Hog cholera is a highly infectious disease of swine, and is caused by a filterable virus. The disease is more prevalent during late summer and fall, but occurs at any time of the year, and since swine of all ages and breeds are susceptible, and since there is no sure way to keep hogs from coming in contact with hog cholera infection, proper vaccination of pigs will give practical, inexpensive health insurance.

The use of hog cholera virus and anti-hog cholera serum will put the disease on the premises, and then every pig brought onto the farm, or every pig farrowed on the farm will have to have the same treatment, according to the ty had contributed an even \$80.00.
