MRS. IVY CLOSE FOUND DEAD IN SHAMROCK HOME

Funeral services are pending for Mrs. Ivy Close, loveable pioneer Wheeler County resident, who was found dead in the bedroom of her home at Shamrock about 8:00 o'clock this morning (Thursday).

Mrs. Close's body, fully clothed, was found reclining on her bed when Justice of the Peace J. H. Templeton and physician C. R. Chaffin forced entrance into the residence after a housekeeper had reported peering through a window and seeing Mrs. Close lying motionless in her bedroom.

The physician said Mrs. Close, 71 years old, had apparently died between 11:00 o'clock and 12:00 midnight Wednesday. There was a bullet wound in her left breast, which Dr. Chaffin said, had caused instant death. An old model pistol was lying on the foot of the bed with two empty shells in it.

Investigating officers said they found one bullet embedded in the floor as if it had been fired from a sitting position on the bed. The bedroom was in perfect order, they said, and there was no indication of a struggle.

Mrs. Close's body was lying across her single bed, her feet on the floor and her hands raised above her head. All doors and windows were locked.

Justice of the Peace Templeton said final verdict in an inquest he is conducting will not be announced until reports from finger print and ballistics experts are received.

Mrs. Close had lived in Wheeler County 48 years. She is survived by six sons who are: Harvey of Wheeler, George of Shamrock; Oscar of Macon, Georgia; Edgar of Oacoma, South Dakota; Vernon of Miles City, Montana; and Elmer of Waldport, Oregon.

Mr. Close and three children preceded her in death. She was a member of the Advent Christian Church of Lela.

Harvey Lewis Helton was born at Wheeler, May 18, 1949 and passed away at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, October 22, 1949 at the age of 5 months and 4 days. After a few days illness, Harvey Lewis was rushed to Amarillo in a Kirk-Mason Coach but died shortly after arrival there.

Survivors include the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Oral Helton; four sisters, Jaunell, Christine, Peggy Ruth and Martha Louise; and one brother, Francis; the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. N. F. Young of Amarillo; and the paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Helton of Wheeler.

Serving as pall bearers were: Clayton Satterfield, Clyde Dukes, E. O. Kelly and M. B. Eiland. Flower attendants were: Jo Ann Helton, Loretta Helton, Billie Ann Helton and Dolores Helton. Interment was in the Zybach Cemetery, arrangements being with Kirk-Mason Funeral Home.

One of the best football contests of the current football season was reeled off under the lights at Nicholson Field here last Friday night when the Wheeler Mustangs and the Panhandle Panthers fought to a 20-20 tie in a conference contest.

Immediately following the contest, officials who were supposed to have kept the statistics reported that Wheeler won the contest on penetrations by a count of 3 to 2, but after some argument from Panhandle coaches and fans reversed their decision and decided penetrations were all tied up at 3 and 3 and first downs were 15 to 6 in favor of Panhandle thus giving them the contest on first downs, officials stated.

However, it was learned that Panhandle had been using an ineligible player all season and a protest was lodged with the district committee which met Tuesday night at White Deer and ruled that the player in question was ineligible, officials of the league reported. Panhandle was then asked to forfeit all games played to date and to refrain from using said player, B. Slater, until he became eligible, thus giving Vega, Claude and Wheeler wins over them.

PMA ELECTION TO BE NOV. 12

Farmers are urged to keep in mind that on or before November 12, they can vote on committee-men who will administer the PMA program in their communities in 1950.

Any producer and his wife, who have participated in the 1949 Agricultural Conservation Program, Commodity Loan Program, Federal Crop Insurance Program, or any other program administered by the PMA committee is eligible to vote in these elections. Ballots are being mailed out now to these eligible farmers. These ballots can be filled out and returned by mail before November 12 or the farmer can go to his community polling place and cast his ballot on November 12.

This is a very important election as the men selected will set up allotments, marketing quotas, conservation practices, and also administer the Commodity Loan program. Every eligible farmer should be sure and cast his vote.

Editorial

STATE SOIL PLAN

One of the more important, and we should add, praiseworthy acts of the 51st Legislature was the adoption of a long-range soil conservation program. To inaugurate and carry on the work, the Legislature appropriated ten million dollars one of the largest such allocations of money any state government has ever set aside for a similar development. To the uninformed, this may on the face of it, look like money down the well-known rathole.

But such an opinion on investigation will not stand up. Soil is our greatest asset and any failure to protect it is a blow to the life of us all. Any failure to protect the land in its productivity, indeed to add to that productivity wherever that is possible, is an in-

vitiation to the creeping paralysis of ruin. In its broader implications, good soil conservation practices lead inevitably to greater fertility and productivity of soil, benefits which spread throughout the social structure dependent upon any given soil.

In adopting the program, the Legislature designated five districts, each with its peculiar problems of conservation. In District One, comprising the Panhandle and lower Plains, there are 51 counties, all but half a dozen or so having advanced into the program.

Under the state program, all the authority rests with the landowners. Being a political subdivision of the state, supervisors in the conservation districts may enter into agreements for assistance from the state or federal governments, or from any other available sources. The district provides the local organization through which farmers and ranchers can use to best advantage the state and federal agencies in the work for which they are trained, and to which they have been assigned.

The main point is that we must all remember that it is just as necessary to have men specially trained in good soil practices as it is in having doctors and trained nurses to safeguard human health.

To the uninformed, agriculture may seem very simple—planting the seeds and a few months later harvesting and selling the crop. But to experienced farmers and students of agriculture, the processes are far more complex. First and foremost comes soil textures and adaptability to the many types of vegetation, all requiring different growing conditions. After this, climate and rainfall must be considered.

As a result of organized soil conservation districts, farmers and ranchers, working co-operatively, are learning better methods, and using to better advantage the natural resources at their disposal. In all this work, from the planning stage right on down through the growing season to harvest, the services of state and federal agencies are at their command.

The program and work plan prepared and used in any given soil districts are based on actual conditions and needs as they are found in the district. The program is developed by the citizens of the district, assisted by trained men and women, and becomes the workshop through which the people who depend upon the land pool their resources and knowledge for the benefit of all.

The fact that landowners themselves have the responsibility for petitioning for and voting in a district, formulating its program and work plan, administering its business and entering into cooperative agreements with their fellow landowners and operators, makes of the state soil conservation districts a splendid example of democracy in action.

TO THE PUBLIC

Recently a number of worthless checks have reached our respective offices for proper action against the givers.

In a surprising number of instances these checks have been found to be the work of professional forgers or worthless check artists with long criminal records. Frequently they have posed as farm laborers and in some instances as truck drivers. In a number of instances the checks are forged upon some local person of un-questioned solvency and are purportedly given for wages. In some instances identification cannot be established at all and usually nothing or very little is known locally concerning the giver of the check.

Though we receive the helpful cooperation of both the FBI and State Department of Public Safety our efforts are frequently embarrassed because of insufficient identity made locally in addition to the check itself, concerning the giver. In some instances one of these departments assist in identifying the subject but frequently he or she is on the want list of several counties or states. We could have disposed of his case first had the accused been apprehended before leaving the county.

The cooperation of all business men and clerks is most welcomed in the following particulars, and in fact the State Department named requires such, where at all possible, where they help us in apprehending the offender.

Demand and receive, where possible, satisfactory pocket or purse identification, such as social security, driver's license, etc. and place this on the check or other notes.

Also retain as much of a mental picture as practical, such as: hair, eyes, height, weight, age, sex, race; marks; scars; tattoos; deformities or physical characteristics, and also, type of clothing worn, occupation of passer (if mentioned), which are suggestions of The State Department mentioned, in the order named. It is also required by the latter, that we submit a form containing this information.

As soon as you learn that you have received such a check please secure one of these forms from the Justice of the Peace, if in Shamrock or the county attorney, if in Wheeler, fill it out and send or cause it to be sent, with the check, to the county attorney's office as soon as can be conveniently done.

A number of transient check givers are apprehended and tried each year with the help of such information, but the best precaution is undue caution by the takers of the check which might result in apprehension before the subject has made his departure from the county.

If possible follow subject to car and get car license and description of car.
