STANGS LOSE IRISH, PLAY KEY FRIDAY

Wheeler Mustangs dropped a tight battle to the Shamrock Irishmen Friday night by a count of 12 to 9. The contest was played at Shamrock gridiron.

The Mustangs journey to Turlock for their second conference contest before knocking down the Shamrock Irishmen in a tough aggregation. They have 12 returning players and defeated the Class A team by a touch-down on Friday.

Friday night's contest was held at the Shamrock Irishmen's home ground. The Irish completed the game early in the second period to gain a 7-point lead which they held until half-time.

In the second period the Mustangs advanced to the Shamrock 10 before losing the game. This was the closest advance to the goal; however, J. T. Johnson scored the second half kick which returned to the Irish 44 yards, getting tangled up with his own interference and pulled down from behind.

The Irish scored their second goal in a 22-yard end sweep by Ed Lee about midway in the period to bring the count to 12-9. Ed Lee kicked goal after the Irish counters.

Members of the Mustangs squad got into the line-up of all of them looked pretty good in defense but it was quite clear that their offense needed a deal of polish before they could display any championship.

Line-up of the Mustangs standing considering that the most of the boys are new hands. The Mustang backs are good but due to nerves and the fact that they are asking wet lost the ball on several fumbles.

The Irish gained 181 yards running and lost 7 for a total of 196 while the Mustangs gained 98 running, 27 passing and 21 for a total of 104. The Mustangs made 9 first downs against the Irish.

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Mobeettie Firms And Organizations Backing Chest X-Ray Campaign

Mobeettie businessmen and organizations are boosting the campaign to get every resident of the Mobeettie area to be X-rayed on September 30 1949. Last year many Mobeettie people were X-rayed by the state health department but the pictures did not turn out good due to power failure of some sort and it was thought for a while the unit would not return to Mobeettie this year but the power has been regulated and the health department has been persuaded to set up its unit for a full day at Mobeettie.

The State Health Department Chest X-ray unit will be set up at the Mobeettie Gymnasium Friday, September 30, all day, and the business men along with other organizations are making a concerted effort to get everyone in that area out to be checked for tuberculosis.

County Sanitarian W. R. Ritter points out the fact that it is a simple process to be X-rayed and takes less than two minutes to complete, and it is not necessary to undress to be X-rayed.

Mobeettie residents and those in communities surrounding Mobeettie are urged to mark September 30 on their calendar as the date they will take a few minutes off and be X-rayed for TB.

The X-ray unit will be in Wheeler at the High School Gym on September 27 and 28.

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ALLISON SITE OF GAME SUN.

The second game in the final round of play-offs in the Texas-Oklahoma League will be played at Allison Sunday afternoon beginning at 3:00 o'clock. The Mobeettie nine will furnish the opposition for the Allison lads.

Mobeettie defeated Allison by a count of 13 to 7 in the first game of the final round of play-offs at Mobeettie last Sunday. Mobeettie scored 11 of its 13 runs in two big innings, 6 in the first and 5 in the eighth. Allison caught up about the sixth inning but their pitchers could not hold the Mobeettie hitters.

The Mobeettie-Allison series is a 2 best out of 3 games for the championship of the Texas-Oklahoma League. Site of the third contest will be determined after Sunday's contest in the event a third game is necessary.

Allison reached the finals by winning 2 out of 3 over Wheeler and Mobeettie eliminated Miami in the first round play-offs.

Don Anglin To Build Tourist Court Here

Don Anglin reported this week that he is beginning construction of a modern tourist court on his place in the west edge of Wheeler. His place is located on Highway 152.

Mr. Anglin states the cottages will be located just east of his home and will consist of three double units and three single units all of which will be modern. The buildings will be of frame construction with asbestos siding.

Work on clearing of the site has already begun and Mr. Anglin stated that actual construction of the courts would probably begin the first of next week.

Parents Warned To Check On Attendance Of School Children

Supt. W. O. Carriek this week issued an appeal to school children and their parents to make it a point to avoid any and all unnecessary absences from school this year due to the fact that state school funds are allotted on the basis of average daily attendance rather than the number of scholastics enumerated in the district as has been the case in the past.

Patrons of the Wheeler Schools are warned that if the children are absent from school unnecessarily their absence may curtail state support for local schools to such an extent that it might become impossible to carry on a full program for the fall year.

Carriek stated that as long as the average daily attendance of the pupils now enrolled in the local schools stayed at a high level there will be sufficient funds to operate the system according to the highest standards.

Carriek stated that the faculty and local school board would greatly appreciate the cooperation of the parents of children who attend Wheeler Schools in this matter.

EMERGENCY POLIO FUND DRIVE STARTS

Confidence that the entire community would give whole-hearted support to the Polio Epidemic Emergency Drive was expressed today by Harry Wofford, chairman of the Wheeler County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The Drive, announced last Wednesday by Basil O'Connor, National Foundation president, is being held as a last resort because "in no other way can the National Foundation continue to aid increased numbers of polio patients without slowing up scientific research and professional education," he said.

It is the first emergency drive in the history of the fight against polio in the United States.

"Although we've been spared the scourge of polio this year, all of us are eager to join in providing help for those who are now feeling its impact," Mr. Wofford said. "So far, our Chapter has not had to spend any money for new cases here. Our March of Dimes funds have been paid out for treatment of local patients afflicted in previous years. If new cases developed, we'd have to request additional funds from national headquarters, as so many other chapters now are doing. We want to be sure they would be forthcoming."

"Everyone in the country is supporting the fight against polio so that full help will be available wherever it is needed."

Contributions from Wheeler County to the Polio Epidemic Emergency Drive are one way of returning the generosity of other givers throughout the nation whose help has made or will make it possible to take care of polio cases here, Mr. Wofford said.

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New Law Modifies Acreages Allowed On 3 Commodities

Important changes affecting cotton, wheat, and peanuts are provided in the amendment to the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, approved by the President on August 29, according to B. F. Vance, Chairman of the State Production and Marketing Administration Committee.

In general, the new legislation modernizes and makes more flexible the acreage allotment and marketing quota provisions of the 1938 act which affect the three crops, taking into consideration recent trends in farm production and practices.

Editorial

IMPORTANT ELECTION

It is good news that interest in the State Board of Education election is increasing, as Lois Sager of The News staff writes from Austin. The election on November 8 is of great importance, for two reasons. First, ten amendments to the State Constitution

are submitted, the greatest number ever submitted at one time. Second, there is peculiar and pressing need of electing the right kind of members to the State Board of Education. For special reasons, the success or failure of the school program under the Gilmer-Aikin law will depend upon the kind of board that initiates it.

The recommendations to the Legislature from the Gilmer-Aikin committee were fairly definite and consistent. But the legislative mountain labored and brought forth something that looks more like a monster than a mouse. No great criticism of the Legislature is meant in this statement. The Gilmer-Aikin school program attempts so much school reform in a single act that a lot of compromise was inevitable. This means that the new board is going to be pulled and hauled by the advocates of the various theories that lie beneath the surface of the written statute.

There is another angle. The fight over the new act has already made a political issue of who the new State Commissioner of Education will be. He will be appointed by the new board. So it is being asked in connection with announcements of candidates for places on the board: "Whom does he favor for commissioner?" This should not be the issue. The people should elect informed but impartial men and women who will go over the entire list of eligibles and select the one best qualified. Election of a board whose members are previously committed will be putting the state's school system in politics at the start of the new program. Dallas News

FARMERS ARE SOUND

Last week the annual meeting of the American Bankers' Association produced some first rate political ammunition, whether intentionally or not. The association issued a statement saying that the position of American farming and farmers was financially sound, with individual savings in cash and bonds at record high levels.

Administration congressmen immediately seized upon the statement to bolster several bills pending on Capitol Hill. In the Senate, supporters of the Reciprocal Trade Act, now being debated, said that the trade agreement with foreign nations was largely responsible for the condition of farmers. And the Farm Bloc, with its advocacy of high support levels, followed along with similar observations.

With huge surpluses of grain and cotton piled up, and with trade dollars becoming scarcer abroad, it might be wise to extend the present act, since it allows the State and Commerce Departments to negotiate separate treaties apart from the restrictions of a blanket tariff law.—Amarillo Daily News

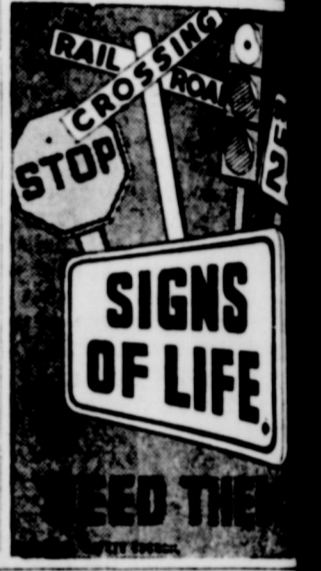

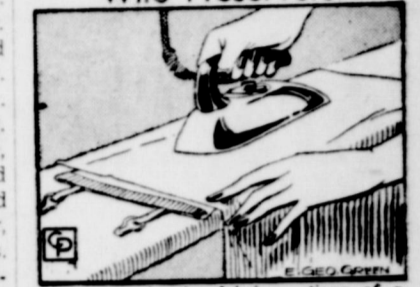

Now, lots of normally considerate folks have their "blind spots."

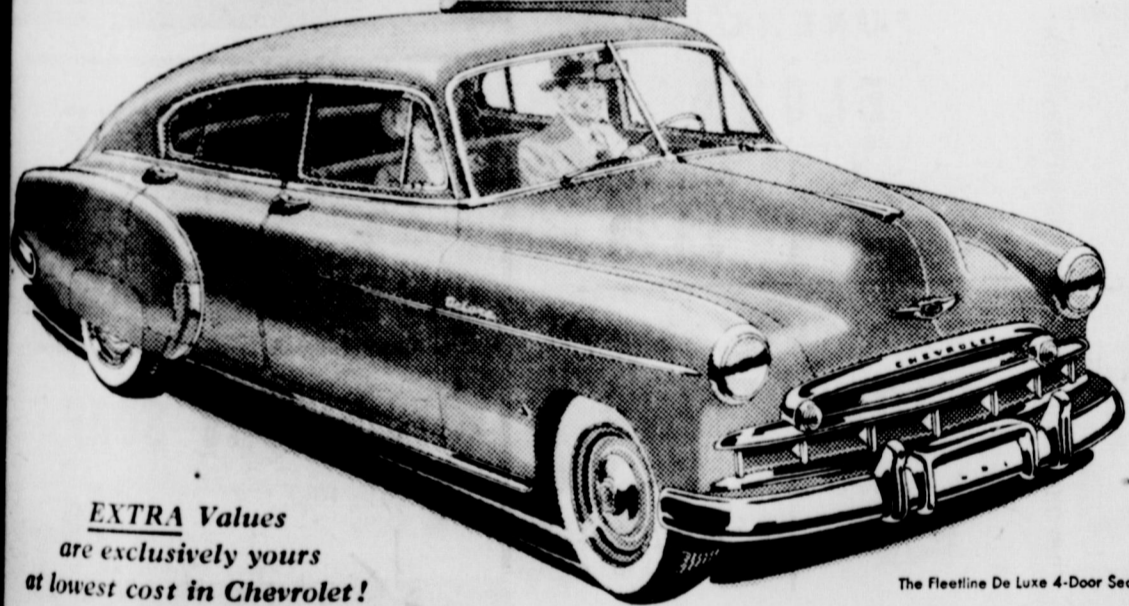
It could be anything from day-dreaming while driving a car to humming out loud at the movies.

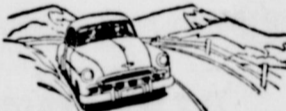

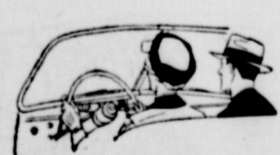

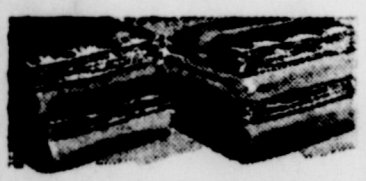
