W. J. Greenhouse was born October 28, 1873 in Birmingham, England and departed this life November 18, 1949 at the age of 76 years and 21 days at his home west of Wheeler.

Mr. Greenhouse came to Canada with his parents at the age of 12, from there he came to Dallas County and later moved to Vernon where he was married to Beatrice Maud Rowe in 1903.

In 1917 the Greenhouses moved to Kelton where they resided three years, then moved to their farm 3 1/2 miles northwest of Wheeler, later moving to their present home 1 mile west of Wheeler.

### COUNTY PMA COMMITTEEMEN ARE NAMED

Twenty-five of the county's farmers were elected by their neighbors last week to serve as community Production and Marketing Administration Committeemen for the coming year.

Each of the county's 5 agricultural communities also selected a delegate to represent them in a county convention scheduled for November 23, in the local office.

These are the men who will be responsible during 1950 for the local administration of such Federal farm programs as Agricultural Conservation, price supports, acreage allotments, marketing quotas, the sugar program and Federal Crop Insurance.

### All Wheeler County Gins Participating in C. C. C. Seed Buying

Every gin in Wheeler County is at the present time operating under agreement with the County PMA Committee. This agreement is guaranteeing the farmers \$49.50 per ton for cottonseed which is 90% of parity less \$3.00 per ton which is used in handling, transportation, and storing of the cottonseed.

This type purchase plan was first announced by Secretary of Agriculture, Brannon, about six weeks ago, but the cottonseed prices on Wheeler County held at a state high level until November 9th, at which time the County Committee with the cooperation of the ginners, put the purchase plan into effect.

### Poll Taxes Must Be Paid If You Intend To Vote Next Year

Tax Collector T. J. Daughtry reminds persons who didn't pay their poll taxes this year, because they thought they wouldn't have to pay to vote under the proposed amendment recently voted down, that the amendment didn't pass and, if they want to vote next election year, 1950, they will have to pay by January 31.

Abolishment of poll taxes was proposed in November 8 election but voters of Texas chose to retain the tax and did not back the movement.

Very few people paid their poll taxes, Daughtry said, because they believed the amendment would carry.

The taxes may be paid at the office of the tax assessor-collector in Wheeler or at the J. B. Zeigler Insurance office in Shamrock.

Many counties in Texas failed to buy poll tax receipts this year with the belief that the amendment would be approved. Those counties are in bad shape now with the deadline so near. Daughtry purchased the receipts for Wheeler County and poll taxes may be paid at Shamrock or Wheeler at the present time.

## Editorial

### A CITIZEN'S DUTY

Fires probably will kill 10,000 Americans  
in the next 12 months. In addition,  
fires will damage or destroy property valued

at \$700 million. These are the figures for the  
United States and the whole  
world.

You or your neighbor may be one of the  
10,000 fire victims. Your home or your neighbor's  
may be among the buildings destroyed.

Three-fourths of these deaths and more  
than that much of the money loss could  
and should be prevented.

It is estimated that three-fourths of all  
home fires are due to carelessness, and these  
certainly should be eliminated. Children playing  
with matches and adults who toss away  
lighted cigarets cause 30 per cent of all home  
fires. Fires due to either of these causes are  
inexcusable.

Defective heating equipment is the second  
most common cause of home fires, and  
this is the time of year to guard against this  
hazard. Stoves, chimneys and furnaces  
should be inspected now to guard against  
fire losses later.

Third in the list of fire causes is the  
misuse of gasoline and other inflammable  
liquids in home dry cleaning projects. Their  
fumes may be ignited by a flame as far away  
as 200 feet. Carbon tetrachloride, which  
is a safe liquid, should be used instead.

Misuse of electricity and carelessness  
with electric appliances rank next in the  
order of fire danger. Surely Wheeler residents  
who have read of recent deaths from  
electric shock should not have to be warned  
again of this hazard. But amateur electricians  
and forgetful housewives apparently do  
need to be reminded of it again.

And high on the list of other dangerous  
practices is that of setting fire to weeds and  
grass and then not tending the blaze carefully.

In the final analysis, fire prevention is  
the duty of every citizen. There ought to be  
some form of punishment provided for those  
who shirk this duty.

Thousands of pigs are lost each year because  
they are forced to depend entirely upon  
the sow's milk during the suckling period.

It is often possible to increase milk production  
of a dairy herd 10 to 15 per cent by  
increasing the number of times the cows are  
watered.

Irregular milking hours or sudden  
changes in time of milking will cause the  
herd to drop in production.

Milk alone is not a complete ration for  
young pigs, due primarily to the deficiency  
of iron and copper which causes anemia to  
develop in the pigs.

Flies are carriers of turkey diseases.

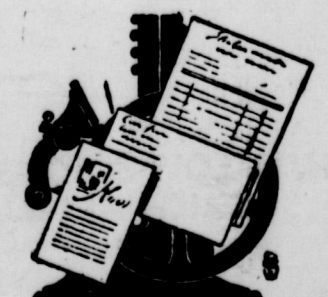

So I went to see him, armed with jokes about "second childhood" but forgot them fast when I got there. Hoot looked terrible and had quite a fever.

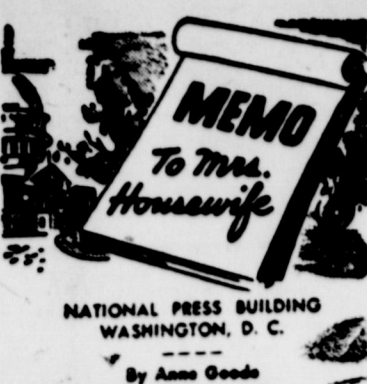

**Place Cards You Can Eat**

By ALICE DENHOFF

If there are youngsters in the house, what nicer way to greet the happy Spring season than by giving them a beautiful party? And it will be nicer still if they have a hand in it, making edible place cards, for instance.

A clever friend of ours has become enthused about wonderful instant frostings, quality tested for goodness and carrying out their promise of performance. So, to amuse her little brood, she had them help her in the pleasant task of using the frostings for their party. We liked her ideas so much that we would like to pass them on to you.

**Pussy Cat Favor**

A big hit with the little guests was a clever pussy cat favor, which, we confess, was gobbled up by us, pronto. Make up one package instant vanilla frosting as directed on package, and frost tops of 10 round cookies (about 3 1/2 inches in diameter). Make up strawberry frosting as directed, and frost 20 oysterette type crackers, placing 2 on each cookie for ears.

Make up chocolate frosting as directed, for piping, that is, adding less water. Using pastry tube or cake decorator, make eyes, nose and mouth on each "face." This is the part the children love, and they soon become adept at handling the tube

or decorator. Press a few shreds of cocoanut in place for "whiskers." Decorate outer edge of cookie with strawberry frosting.

**Carousel Place Card**

A carousel cookie place card should win applause, too. Make up vanilla frosting as directed on the box. Frost tops of 10 round cookies (about 3 1/2 inches in diameter). Make up package chocolate frosting as directed for piping. With pastry tube or cake decorator, outline or frost 20 animal crackers near edge, "animals" on each cookie near edge. Put upright toothpick, topped with tiny colored gum drop between animals. Write child's name on cookie and decorate outer edge with row of chocolate frosting.

Beautiful for a Spring luncheon would be a batch of flower garden place cards. Get 8 donuts (about 2 1/2 inches in diameter) and slice crosswise to yield 16 donut halves. Make up vanilla frosting as directed, and frost cut tops of donut halves. Make up package of vanilla frosting into tiny candies, color in pale pink, pale green, with vegetable colorings, and shape into tiny flowers with green stems. Press flowers on frosted donut near top edge. Make up chocolate frosting as directed, and write guest's name on donut near the bottom. Decorate outer edge of donut with double row of chocolate frosting.

And long-continued colds may pave the way for an attack of pneumonia, tuberculosis, or a chronic infection of the nose, throat, ears, or sinuses. So, do your best to keep from catching cold. And if you do catch one, take proper care of yourself so you can get rid of it.

When you have a cold:

1. Get as much rest as possible. Stay in bed or indoors for the first day or so if you can.
2. Keep comfortably warm and dry. If you must go to work, wear clothes that will protect you adequately when you go outdoors, and avoid drafts and sudden chilling when overheated.
3. Drink plenty of citrus fruit juices, water, and other liquids. Eat simple foods which agree with you.

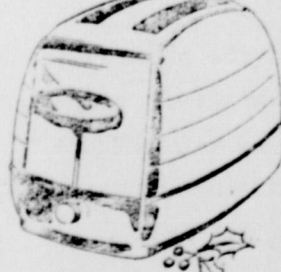

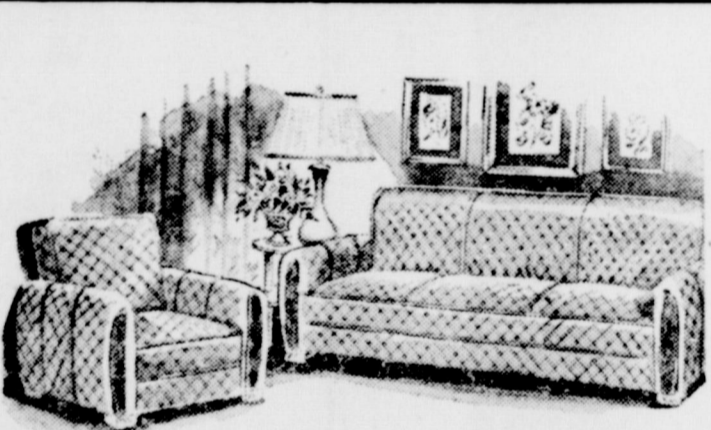
