## Editorial

### VA TRYING TO REVIVE ECONOMY EFFORT

With but a few minor exceptions, federal agencies have no money to spend for any purpose other than that previously authorized and appropriated by Congress. Agencies as a rule ask for more and more

money year after year. The traditional watch of the Treasury to make a show of resisting such requests, but in the end they usually are granted.

It is almost unheard of for a federal agency to ask Congress to give it less for one fiscal year than it was given the previous year, or to amend the law in such a way that the agency would be required to spend less than it had been spending. But that rare occurrence is taking place in Washington at the moment, and the agency involved is the Veterans Administration.

Veterans Administrator Gray reported to Congress the other day that the government is spending huge sums of money for the education and training of veterans for which no honest value is received. He also reported that certain types of business men have made veterans' education "an extremely lucrative and profitable enterprise." He cited some specific examples:

1. A luggage factory which had failed was converted into what its owners claimed was a school. This institution's assets totaled \$3,375, but it took in 129 students who were charged \$2,626 tuition each for a 51-week term. VA was billed for \$306,000, a return of 951 percent on the investment in less than a year.

2. A linoleum-laying school with assets of \$8,180 took in 176 veterans who were charged \$1,457 each for tuition for the 51-week term. VA was billed for \$225,000, a return of 266 percent on the investment in less than a year.

Mr. Gray also revealed in his report that some school owners have set up dummy corporations owned by their relatives, from whom the school buys supplies in wholesale lots but at retail prices—with VA footing the bill. Other schools, the administrator reported, have sold their real estate to dummy corporations controlled by their relatives. The property then is rented forward to VA. Still other schools have found it profitable to extend their courses and thus keep students enrolled as long as possible.

All of these and the other abuses reported by Mr. Gray apparently are within the law—as the law is now written. Several months ago VA sought, by administrative order, to tighten up training qualifications for veterans. It was estimated at the time that \$100 million a year could be saved in this manner. But members of Congress protested so vigorously that the order was rescinded.

Mr. Gray is now trying to revive his previous effort to limit enrollments in vocational schools. His report to Congress was a part of his effort. Its outcome should indicate whether Congress is really serious about economizing, or merely talks about it for political effect.—Ft. Worth Star-Telegram

### FARM FACTS

WORTH KNOWING

**1. Question:** How much time should it take to milk a cow properly?  
**Answer:** Actual farm figures have shown that the milking machine is left on cows an average of 6.3 minutes. But close studies show that cows can be trained to milk in 5 minutes or less, and some cows can be milked in 3 minutes.

**2. Question:** At what age should pigs be weaned in order to have the sow bred in time to raise two litters in one year?  
**Answer:** At the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company where the two litter a year program is followed, all pigs are weaned at 9 weeks of age. In weaning the pigs, remove the sow from the litter allowing the pigs to remain in the same lot until they are completely weaned.

**3. Question:** We have been getting watery eggs from our hens. What causes this?  
**Answer:** Watery eggs may be caused by the storage place being too warm, or this may be an inherited condition which can be corrected only by culling the diseased birds.

### HEALTH SERVICE FORMS NEW UNIT

Public Health in Texas has received another boost with the February 1 formation of the Fort Bend County Health Unit.  
 State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, in announcing the commission of the Fort Bend Unit said Dr. John R. Turner, a public health man of long experience in Texas and elsewhere, had been named as director. The budget is set up to include a director, a sanitarian, a public health nurse, and a clerk. Their operations will cover Fort Bend County in its entirety.  
 Texas now has forty-nine units, some of them serving more than one county. Altogether, fifty-seven counties within the State have protection of full-time health units.  
 "We've come a long way toward our goal of raising the standard of public health in Texas to a high plane," Cox asserted. He cautioned: "But we still have a long road ahead of us."  
 Ideally, a local health unit is designed, according to Cox, to promote better health among Texans it serves by performing these functions:  
 1. By investigating cases of communicable diseases and tracking down, if possible, the source of the germ.  
 2. By teaching people, through meetings and personal visits, how to prevent smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, and other diseases that spread, and how immunization and sanitation will prevent their spread.  
 3. By making studies of venereal diseases (mainly syphilis and gonorrhea,) tuberculosis, poliomyelitis, etc., and providing for patient education concerning the illness affecting them.  
 By making home visits to expectant mothers referred by private physicians, and by holding well-child conferences which are designed to keep children in top-notch health.  
 5. By making periodic inspections of food-handling businesses like dairies, slaughterhouses, grocery stores, and cafes to make sure the operators are sticking close to sanitation laws.  
 The Boy Scout Movement is organized in 43 different lands and its world membership is 4,306,010 boys and leaders. More than half of this total are enrolled in the Boy Scouts of America.

The first Chief Scout Executive of the Boy Scouts of America was Dr. James E. West, who served in this capacity for 32 years.

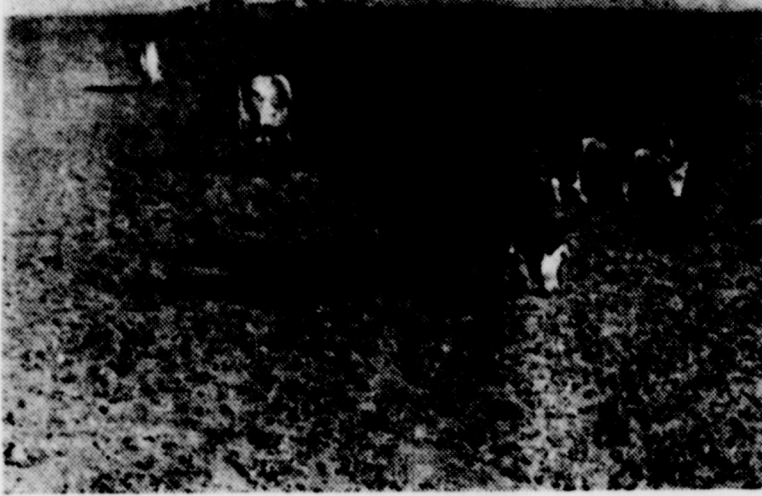
