Miss Hatfield suggests that you give them a special drink; one prepared by mixing commercial fertilizer and water. She calls it a starter solution and says it is very good for giving the newly set flowers or those just coming up the right kind of start in life.

To make the solution, mix one pound of 4-12-4 or 5-10-5 fertilizer in five gallons of water. She says to mix it thoroughly and when the fertilizer has dissolved,

it is ready for use. About one good cup full of the solution is sufficient for a single treatment for a plant. A watering at 10 day intervals, during the spring, with the solution, she says, will keep the plants growing and in a thrifty condition.

Miss Hatfield says the same liquid fertilizer is also good for the rose garden, trees, shrubs, and for the perennials that have been separated and transplanted. Ten pounds of fertilizer mixed in a

**Don't Get Suntan Too  
Fast, It's Dangerous**

Summer weather is just around the corner and many Texans will try to acquire a sun tan as quickly as possible. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer today released a statement concerning the danger of over exposure to the sun.

"Sun Stroke is not thought to be due to the heat of the sun, but to certain direct effects of the sun on the human brain. It is likely to occur after the sun has shone excessively on the back of the head. This can be prevented by protecting the head and back of the neck from the sunshine," he added.

Dr. Cox asserted that exposure of the skin to the sun has some virtue since the action of the sunshine tends to kill the germs of

the skin. Further sunshine produces vitamin D from the fats in the skin and this product is absorbed and used by the body.

"In general the good effects of sunshine are not due to the heat rays but ultraviolet rays," Dr. Cox stated. "It must be remembered, however, that it is these same rays which burn the skin and extensive application of direct sunshine to the skin may produce painful and severe burns which actually may endanger life."

The State Health Officer advises those who wish to obtain an extensive suntan to get it by slow degrees. Expose small portions of the skin to the sun for a short period of time. When tanning is established, exposing a greater area for a longer period of time should prove safe and comfortable.

**Piano Symphony To Be  
Presented At Pampa**

On Monday and Tuesday evening May 8 and 9, the Piano Symphony of Pampa, under the direction of Mrs. May Foreman Carr will be presented in concert at the Junior High Auditorium. There will be 60 performers using 30 pianos furnished by the Tarpley Music Store, the largest ensemble ever to have been assembled in the Panhandle of Texas. It is probably the third organization of its kind in the United States, the other two being professional organizations according to John Briggs, editor of the Etude Music Magazine.

### LIVE VIRUS MAY SPREAD HOG CHOLERA

Dr. V. C. Banks, Extension Veterinarian, Texas A. & M. College, who has had years of experience with livestock diseases, says the use of live Cholera Virus has kept cholera going in Texas and has made the disease more widespread instead of controlling it. "Texas hog producers would be better off not to use anything except sanitation, rather than to use the live Cholera Virus". He said "Sure, some hog producers have done a good job of preventing losses in their own herds. But, they will have to keep on from now until doomsday vaccinating with live Virus, or they will lose all they don't vaccinate". "Then, too," he said, "Those who are using the live Virus are endangering their neighbor's herd of hogs unless the neighbor can immunize his herd".

These statements were made in answer to questions put to him at a meeting at Canadian recently of County Agents of this area. What is the best method of handling the problem? In answer to this question, Dr. Banks said "We recommend the use of Crystal Violet, which is a dye that kills the virus, and when this Virus-containing dye is injected, it gives protection for a year. Other similar vaccines are the vaccines containing the killed virus, such as BTV, and other similar tissue or blood origin vaccines that give immunity

for a year, and do not put the live VIRUS on the farm to menace all hogs that have not been immunized.

"Sure," Dr. Banks said, "the disease will always be with us until a law is passed forbidding the use of the live virus, or until we get wise to the fact that we are costing ourselves many hundreds of thousands of dollars annually by using live virus".

Dr. Banks stated that of the many thousands of cases of diseased hogs brought to the Veterinary Department of Texas A. & M. College, over half of them were CHOLERA cases, and that of these, over half of them were caused by the use of VIRUS.

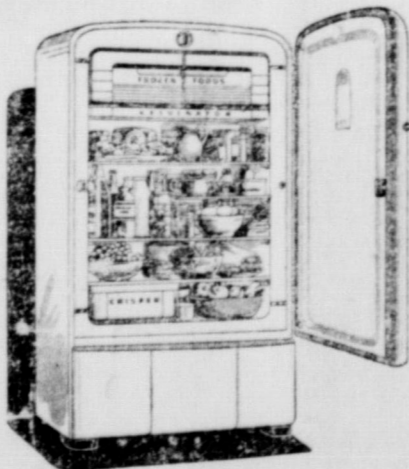

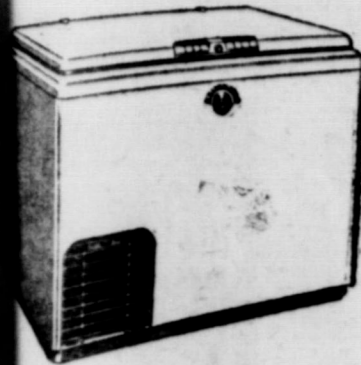

Captivating dessert for springtime is this fluffy cake-strawberry-and-whipped cream combination called a "trifle."

When you want something superlative for dessert, strawberry shortcakes, or variations on that theme, are the answer. Shortcakes are a nutritious dessert, too, since enriched flour is used in the shortcake base and provides essential food values.

Fluffy cake is often used for shortcakes, and individual ones are made by baking batter in muffin pans. Use either a conventionally mixed two-egg or quick-mix cake, or sponge cake recipe. If you do not have time to make them buy plain cup or sponge cakes from your baker's to make this excellent springtime dessert.

When ready to serve, cut tops off cupcakes and spread with whipped cream and berries. Put top back on, and then cover with more berries and whipped cream. The result is delectable.

### STRAWBERRY TRIFLES

2 cups sifted enriched flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup shortening  
2 cups sugar  
2 eggs, beaten  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
3/4 cup milk

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, beating well. Add vanilla extract. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with milk. Fill greased three-inch muffin pans one-half full. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) about 25 minutes. Cut off tops of cup cakes, and spread with whipped cream and halves of strawberries. Replace tops of cup cakes, garnish with more strawberry halves, and top with whipped cream and one whole strawberry. Makes about 14 three-inch cakes.

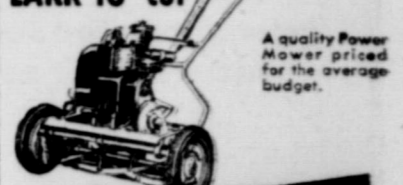

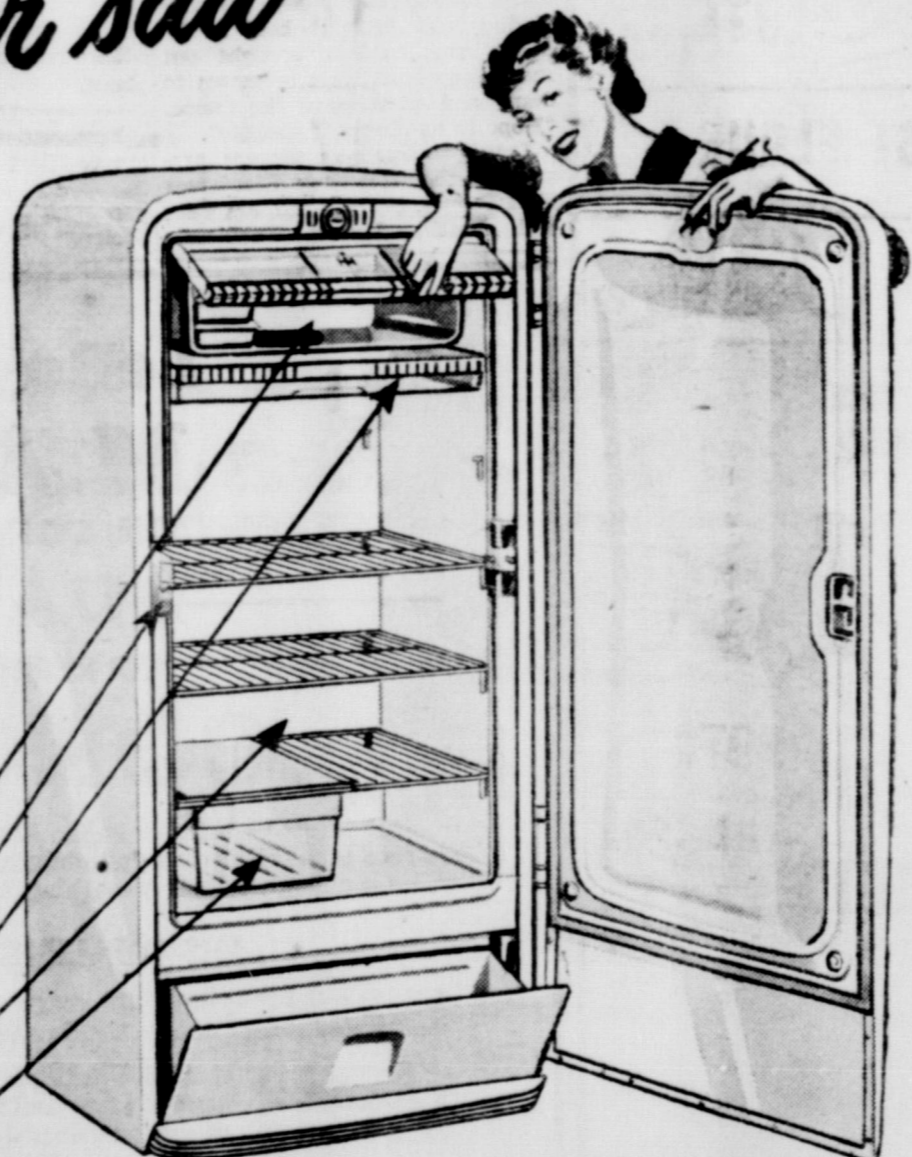

### Screw-Worm Is Threat To Cattle Industry

A recently completed survey shows that the screw-worm fly survived this winter in a much larger area than ever before. This situation creates a real threat to the livestock industry of the state, says J. A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. and M. College.

He says the survey made by entomologists of the USDA Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine at Kerrville, shows that in Texas the area where the fly was found to have survived the winter extends at least 300 miles further north, 150 miles farther northeast and 200 miles farther northwest than during any winter since 1943 when the survey program was started. Three of the affected counties — flies were found in 134 Texas counties — border Oklahoma just east of the Texas Panhandle. Records show that during previous winters, the screw-worm fly survived in less than 30 counties in southern Texas and usually in no other states west of the Mississippi. This year they were found in 3 southwestern New Mexico counties, 9 southern Arizona counties and 3 counties in southern California.

Deer says that it now appears certain that the migration of the fly will be earlier and that it will probably migrate much farther

northward than usual. He says the possibility of transporting screw-worm infested animals from the southern zone to northern states is greater this year than ever before.

Livestock owners, he says, should be on guard and should watch for early screw-worm infestations, especially in animals that are to be shipped to the northern states. He points out that dealers of livestock supplies should also be ready with plenty of Smear 62 should serious outbreaks occur in the state. Weather conditions during the next few weeks may be a determining factor in the seriousness of the situation he says. Moisture will increase the possibilities of serious outbreaks.

In conclusion, he says, livestock owners should treat all wounds promptly with Smear 62 whether screw-worms are present or not. It is a surgical dressing as well as a worm killer and its use is just good insurance against screw-worm infestations.

Farmers and ranchmen should be on the alert for the next few weeks for the early hatches of grasshoppers. Control measures are most effective when used before the young hoppers leave the egg bed areas.

### Grasshopper Hatching Need Watching Closely

Weather conditions during the next few weeks, may well determine the seriousness of the grasshopper infestations for 1950. More moisture will bring on a big hatch, however farmers and ranchmen should be watching for the early hatches and if and when the young 'hoppers become numerous enough to warrant control measures, action should be taken.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has just released a report covering the grasshopper control work done by J. C. Gaines and H. A. Dean, professors in the department of entomology of Texas A. & M. College System, during the past two years.

They say that over a long period of years the poison bait method has not been effective in central Texas but that they are effective and are still recommended for use in the more arid portions of the state where there is a scarcity of vegetative growth to compete with the poison baits as grasshopper food.

Control tests were conducted during 1948 and 1949 to evaluate several organic insecticides applied as dusts and sprays for 'hopper control. The dusts were applied in the early morning when the air was calm. The spray emulsions, made by diluting oil miscible concentrates, were applied later in the day with a compressed air

sprayer equipped with a valve to regulate the pressure to 40 pounds. The treatments were made early in the season when the 'hoppers were small, less than one-fourth grown.

They say that toxaphene or chlordane applied either as a dust or spray emulsion will give good control of young grasshoppers. Either of these materials applied at from a half to a pound and a quarter per acre as a spray em-

ulsion, or from one pound and a half per acre should control young grasshoppers but heavier applications may be necessary after they get larger. The dosage may be applied without causing injury to dairy cattle. To protect from migrating adults from 2 to 3 pounds per

The union claim that a second fireman is needed on grounds of safety is sheer hypocrisy. Safety has been dragged into this dispute only in an unsuccessful effort to give a cloak of respectability to vicious feather-bedding demands.

After a careful study of the first demands of this union, a Presidential Fact Finding Board on May 21, 1943, reported to President Roosevelt that there was no need for an extra fireman on diesel locomotives.

Again, on September 19, 1949, after a second hearing on the union leaders' demands, a second Board reported to President Truman that: "there presently exists no need for an additional fireman... upon either the ground of safety or that of efficiency and economy of operation."

Safety Record of Diesels is Outstandingly Good

Although the railroads accepted the Board findings, the union leaders have brazenly rejected them. They represent that an

extra fireman is needed for "safety" reasons. Here's what the Board had to say on that point:

"The safety and on-time performance of diesel electric locomotives operated under current rules have been notably good..."

"Upon careful analysis of the data submitted on safety, we have concluded that no valid reasons have been shown as a support for the Brotherhood proposal under which a fireman would be required to be at all times continuously in the cab of road diesels. The proposal must be rejected."

The real reason behind these demands is that the union leaders are trying to make jobs where there is no work. In other words, a plain case of "feather-bedding." The railroads have no intention of yielding to these wasteful make-work demands.

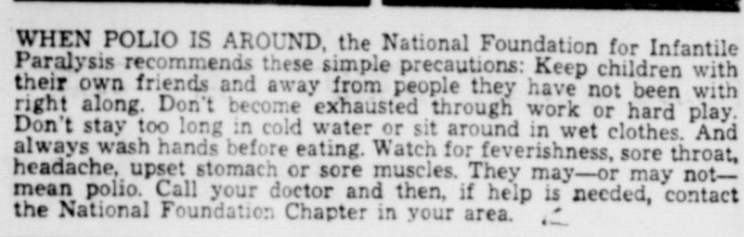

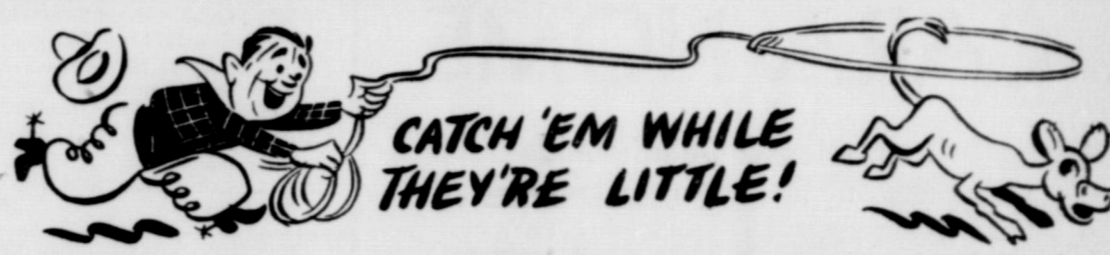

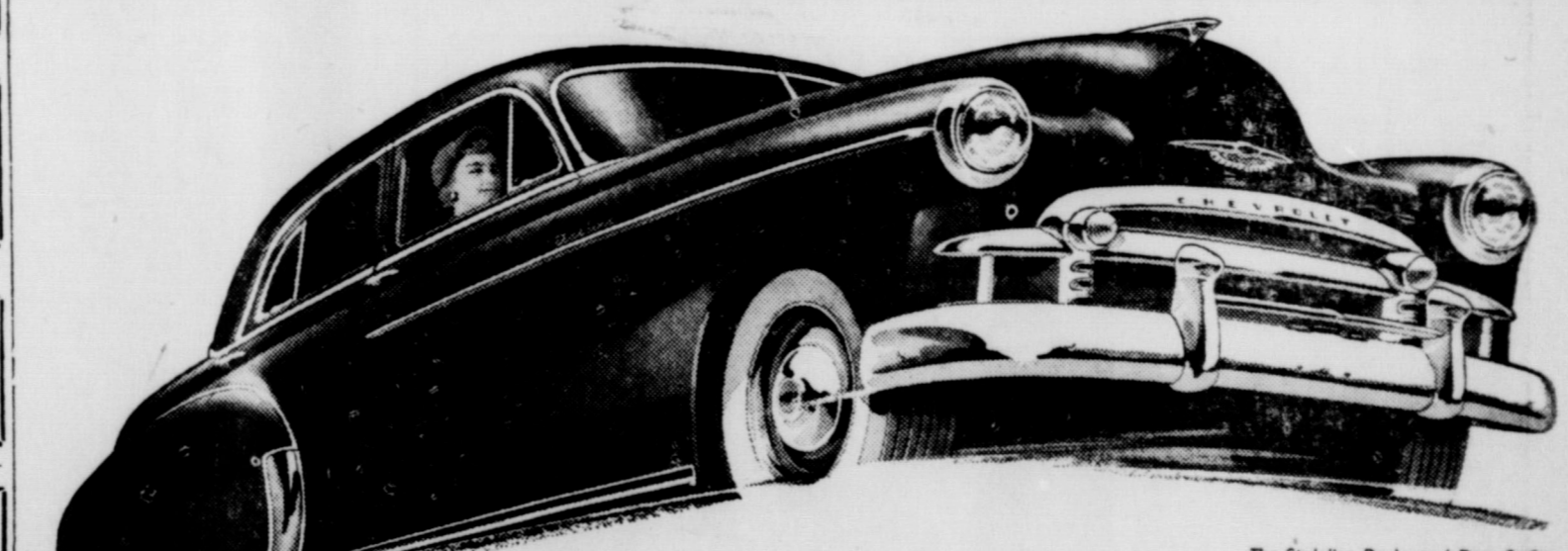
