FIELD DAYS IS CANCELLED AT WOODWARD

The fourteenth annual range and crop improvement field days, scheduled by the U. S. Southern Great Plains Field Station, Woodward, Okla., for October 6 and 7, 1950, have been cancelled, according to an announcement by D. A. Savage, station superintendent. The field days were cancelled in the interest of war-time economy which is expected to result in a ten percent cut in funds for all non-military Government agencies.

Plans are to hold the next major field day in the fall of 1951. In the meantime the general public is reminded that they are always welcome to call at the station and study the research in progress. Advance notice of such visits will be given to station personnel in planning their work.

A nine-year progress report of the station's grazing, feeding, and range improvement work will be prepared this fall and distributed to all those who request it. The 600 head of Hereford steers now used in these tests will be replaced with a new herd, obtained from the Jack Mansfield ranch of Vega, Texas, will be furnished through a cooperative agreement with J. C. Farris of Sentinel, Okla.

The station's new office-laboratory building will be completed and occupied in September from special funds allotted last year. This building provides adequate office space for the station staff and facilities for conducting fundamental studies on plant breeding, physiology, and soil problems.

Skillet Peppers

September 2, 1950

1/2 cup finely cut celery
1/2 cup finely cut onion
1/2 cup finely cut green pepper
1/2 cup finely cut tomato
1/2 cup finely cut mushrooms
1/2 cup finely cut carrots
1/2 cup finely cut celery
1/2 cup finely cut onion
1/2 cup finely cut green pepper
1/2 cup finely cut tomato
1/2 cup finely cut mushrooms
1/2 cup finely cut carrots

Peppers in halves, lengthwise; remove seeds and fibers. Mash lunch with fork. Mix in the bread crumbs, milk and celery. Divide up pepper halves. Cook onion 1/2 min. in hot shortening in skillet. Add soup. Put filled peppers in pan, meat side up. Cover; cook over low heat 25 min., or until peppers tender. Makes 4 servings.

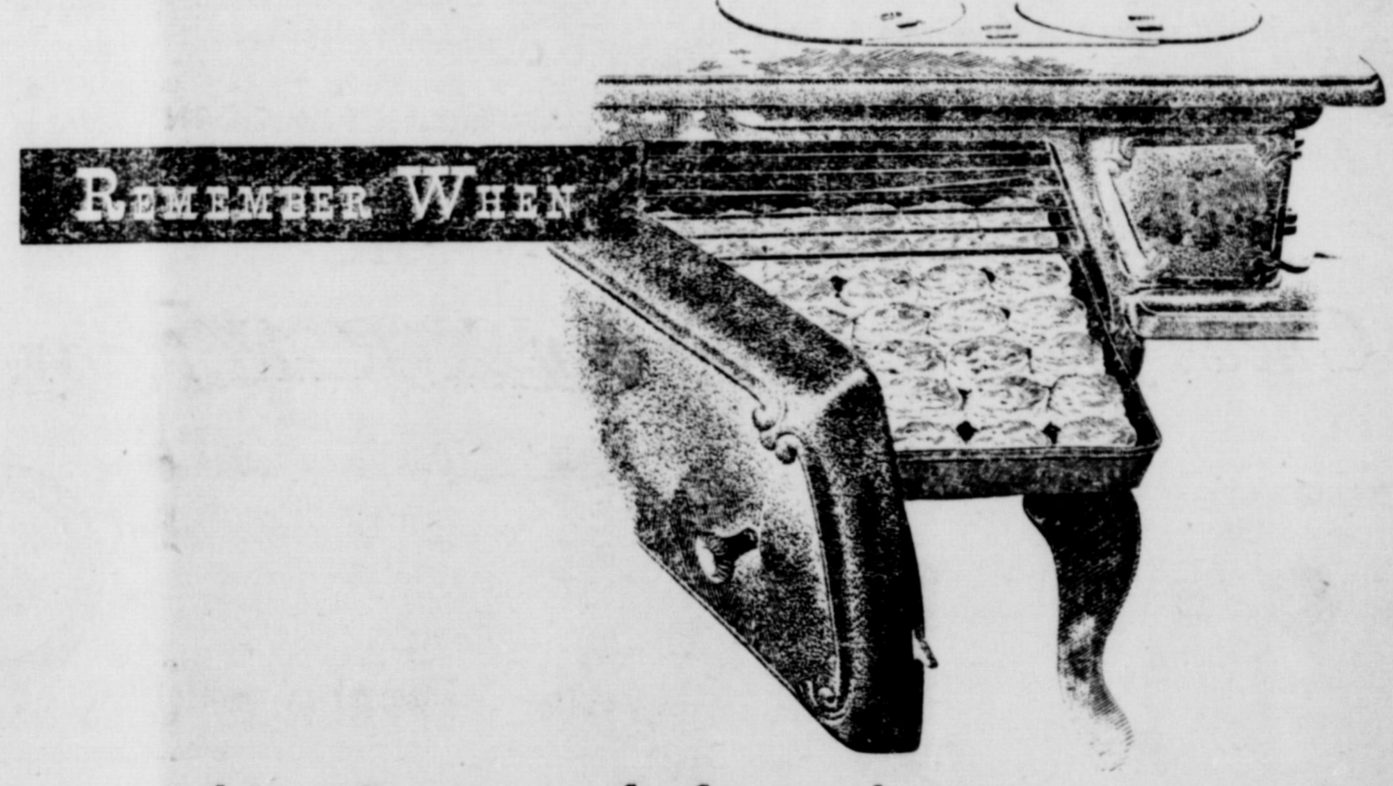

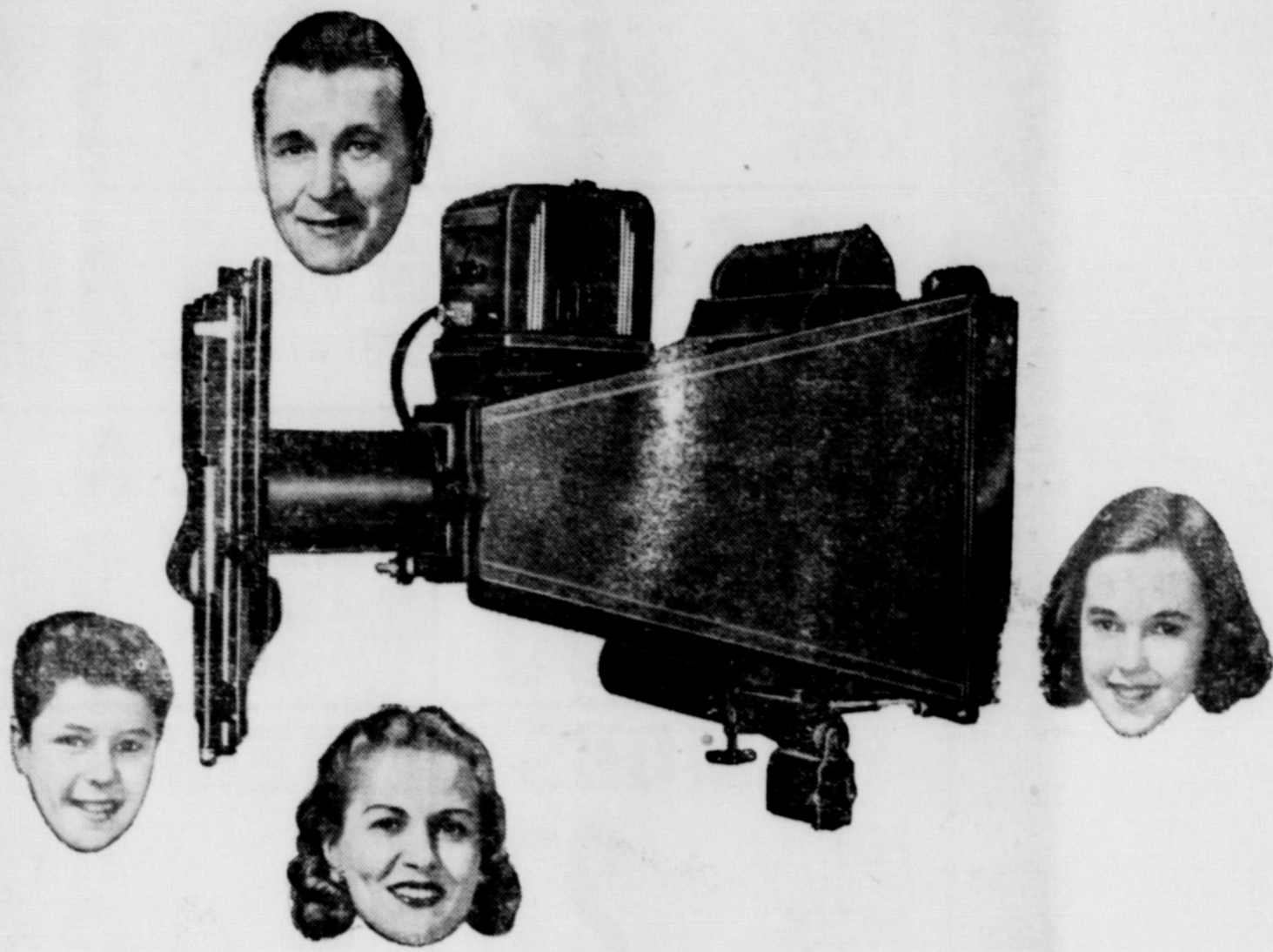

HEALTH DEPT. RECEIVES GIFT OF DEAD FLEAS

You wouldn't ordinarily consider a boxful of dead fleas as very much of a gift. But entomological workers—specialists who study insects which spread disease—at the Texas State Department of Health, recently were "thrilled" by a gift of Pacific Northwest fleas from R. C. Andresen Hubbard, formerly head of the Biology Department at Pacific University in Oregon. He

has made similar gifts, collected during a lifetime of studying disease spreaders, to 20 of the world's outstanding institutions in biological sciences.

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, acknowledging the gift, said it was "something of a compliment" to be classed as a leader in biological studies along with the British Museum, Canada's National Museum, Brazil's Escola Nacional de Agronomia, the Parasitological Laboratory in Sevastopol, Russia, Pakistan's Malaria Institute, the American Museum of Natural History in New York, and "many others of equal prominence."

The Texas Health Department

was the only health agency in the nation to benefit from the presentation. Its disease vector collection is reputedly one of the finest in the world. Dr. Cox says the entire assortment, including ticks and mites as well as fleas, is open to study by graduate and advanced undergraduate students in Texas colleges and universities.

Departmental entomological studies are described by Dr. Cox as a "determination of the specific types of insects of medical importance in the state, their distribution, seasonal abundance, and how they can best be controlled."

Department entomologists conducted a two year investigation of typhus fever in Lavaca County in

1944-46. Step by step, they traced out the process by which rodent fleas spread typhus from rat to human beings.

In 1949, they finished a study which showed bubonic plague—the Black Death of the Middle Ages—was infecting wild rodents in four South Plains counties in West Texas.

"Our entomologists are disease detectives," Dr. Cox says. "The gift from Dr. Hubbard will help them run down insect culprits."

PHYSICAL IS ONLY EXEMPTION TO ACTIVE DUTY

Physical disqualification is the only basis for exemption from active military service of members of the Army Organized Reserve Corps when called to active duty in time of national emergency. Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Chief of the Texas Military District, stated here today.

However, delays may be authorized for compassionate or occupational reasons when applied for by the individual or, in case of occupational reasons, by the employer of the reservist.

Deferments, or delays for compassionate reasons, may be authorized by the Texas Military District headquarters up to a maximum of three months. Requests for deferment for a longer time must be forwarded on to higher authorities for final decision, Colonel Abbott explained.

When requested in writing by his employer, a reservist will receive consideration for deferment if his civilian occupation or activity is critically necessary to the maintenance of national health, safety or interest.

However, recall to active duty of a reservist engaged in a critical civilian occupation will not be delayed:

- (1) If there is need for him in a military assignment which will make full use of critical civilian skill.
- (2) Unless the firm or agency by which employed is principally engaged in production of items or services obviously essential to national health, safety or interest.
- (3) Unless urgency of the civil pursuit of the reservist outweighs the need of the armed forces for his services.
- (4) Unless written request from the employer for delay to active duty of the reservist is submitted when the reservist is informed that he is to be ordered to extended active duty.

The initial delay, if granted to reservists with critical skills and not considered immediately replaceable in the industry, will not exceed a period of six months. An extension of the delay may be authorized for a like period but will be subject to a more rigid application of above requirements.

In addition to delays that may be granted for compassionate and occupational reasons, graduates of the advanced course senior division Reserve Officers Training Corps and reservists enrolled in or who have been accepted for admission in recognized schools of medicine, including internship, theology or divinity, may be delayed in call to active duty until the end of the fall quarter or semester of their college or university.

Request for deferment for compassionate reasons must be initiated by the individual. Request for deferment of an employee for occupational reasons must be initiated by the employer. Both must be forwarded through the reservist's local Organized Reserve Corps Unit Commander or local Unit Instructor if he is not a member of an organized unit. Documentary evidence sufficient to support the deferment must accompany the request.

Each request submitted by reservists or their employers for deferment from extended active duty will be considered on an individual basis—there will be no blanket deferments, Colonel Abbott declared.
