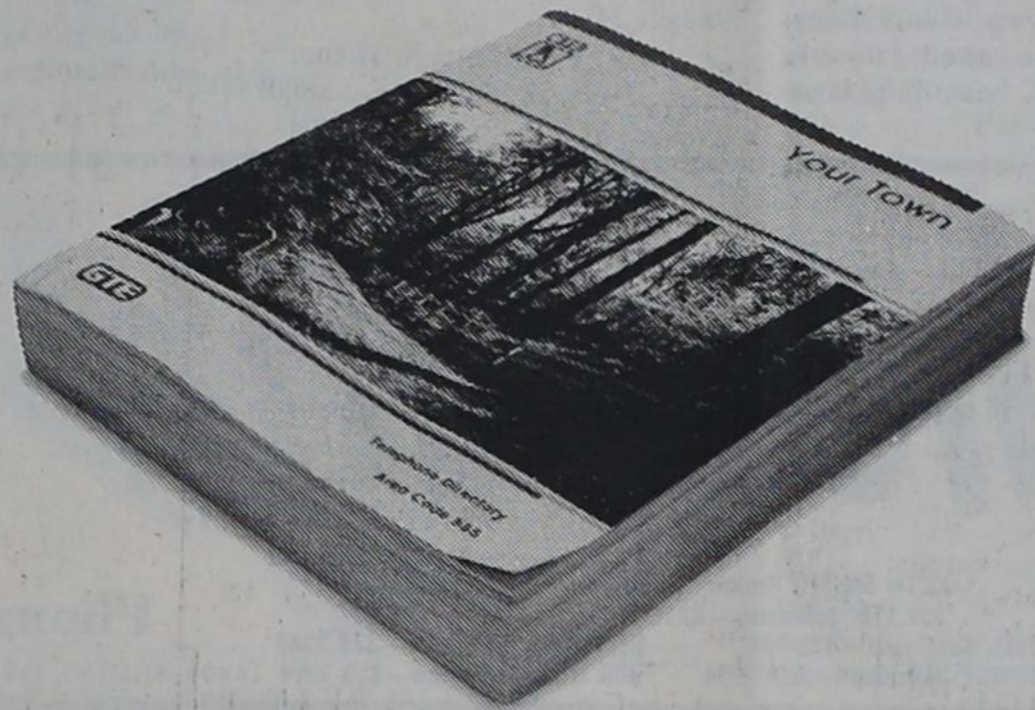

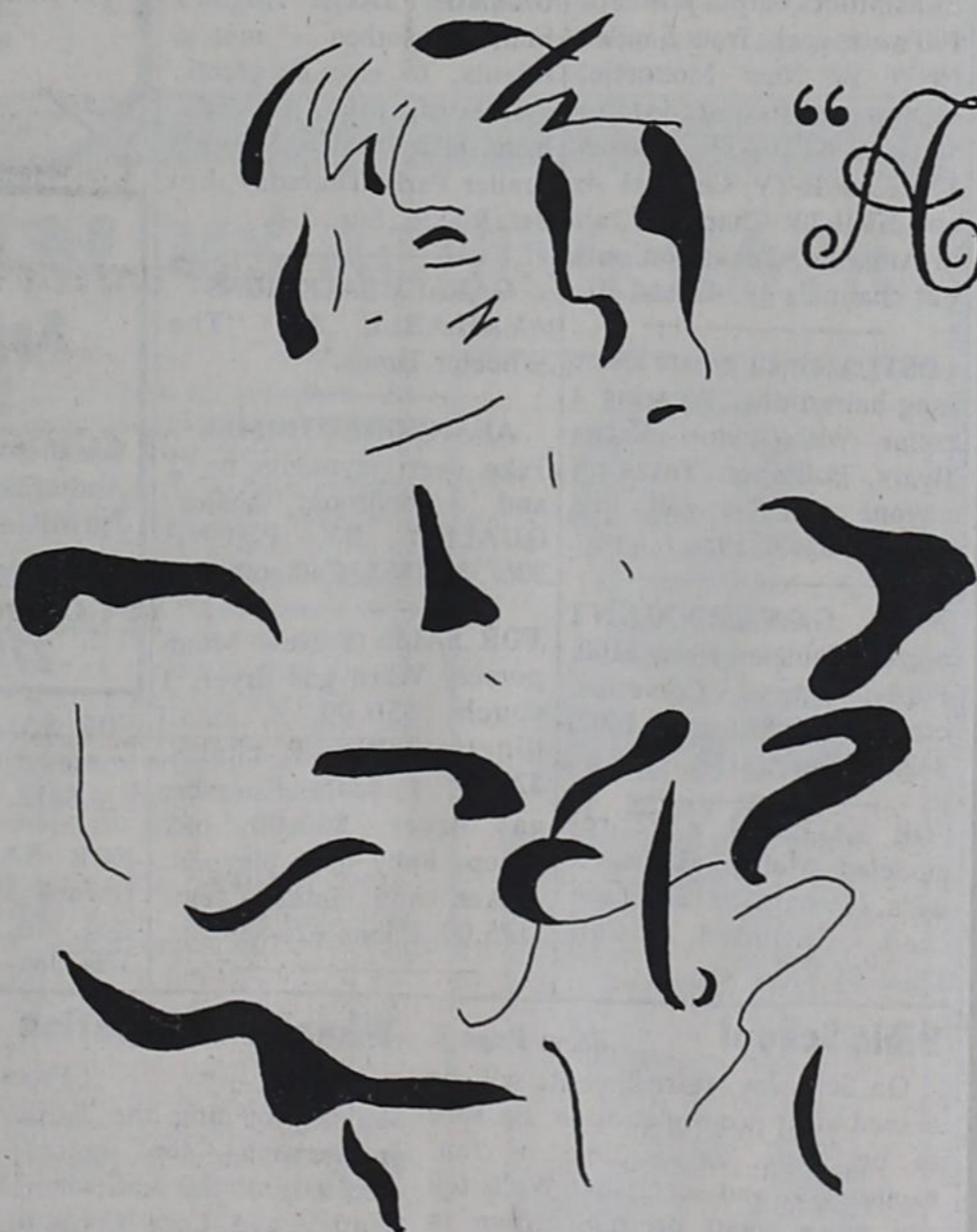

Points are distributed in the following categories. 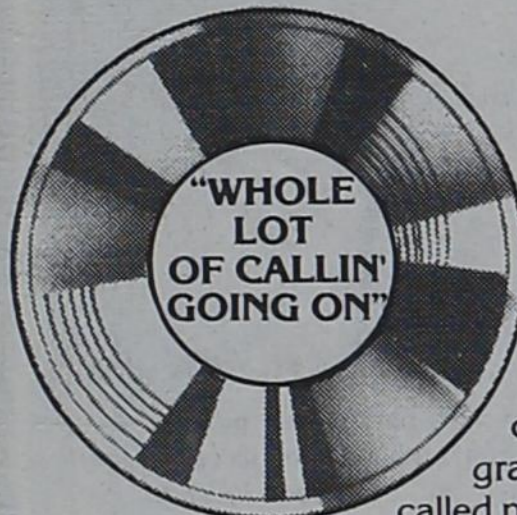

TEXAS BEEF COOK-OFF WINNERS NAMED

Lines From Linda
A not-your-regular contestant named her recipe Not-Your-Regular Brisket and came up with the winner of the 1988 Texas Beef Cook-Off.

Her fork-tender brisket, simmered in brown sugar sweetened soy sauce laced with apple slices and raisins, earned Dr. Miriam M Kaye, an Austin psychiatrist, \$500 and a trip to Jackson, Mississippi, where \$32,000 will go to winners in the National Beef Cook-Off to be held September 20-22.

Second place in the 11th annual state contest sponsored by the Texas Cattle-Women was Joel Allard of San Antonio, with Beef Loaf Florentine, a ground round steak loaf with a spinach and cheese filling. His prize was \$300 in beef gift certificates.

Gini Bouzard of San Antonio placed third and was awarded \$100 in beef gift certificates for Indian Beef Curry Festival using cubed round steak cooked with zucchini, green pepper, raisins and pineapple and served with topping choices of bananas, green onions, peanuts, chutney, coconut and hot chili sauce.

Honorable mention and \$50 beef gift certificates were awarded to Gayle Evans of Dallas for Tenderloin Tip Salad with Raspberry Vinaigrette and Kathleen Setiz of Pasadena for Filet of Beef Bohemian.

Typically, this was Dr. Kaye's first time to enter a recipe competition. And she may be the first contestant ever to have spent five years in a reform school.

She tantalizes with this information before explaining that it was her first five years and that it was because her father was resident medical director at a New Jersey reform school. Her medical training was at the University of Pennsylvania and the New York Psychoanalytic Institute in New York City. She has been in practice 24 years and has lived in Austin since 1974.

During the last 20 years, while practicing medicine and mothering two sons, one now a medical student and the other a business school graduate, she has found time to cook at least one or two briskets a month and maybe a ton of pot roasts.

Practice made perfect. The judges agreed her dish made the best use of the chosen cut of beef, that it was cooked to just the right degree of doneness and she managed a happy marriage of the beef with the supporting ingredients.

All five of the final recipes were well within the guidelines of the American Heart Association for a healthy diet: relatively low in calories, sodium, fat, and cholesterol and high in protein, iron and other minerals.

So what made Dr. Kaye's recipe the winner and what tips can an aspiring beef cook glean from eavesdropping on the judges?

First, and maybe foremost, don't overcook the meat. Tenderloin, for example should still boast a bit of pink. Overcooking tends to toughen.

Keep the recipe relatively short. Too many ingredients and complicated preparation discourage a prospective cook and dismay contest judges.

Preparation shouldn't take longer than today's busy cook is willing to spend. Cooking time is less important if it frees the cook while a great dish gets itself ready for the table.

Beef should dominate the finished dish. Don't let other ingredients overwhelm the meat.

Season judiciously. Underseasoning makes for a bland and boring dish. Overseasoning jars the taste buds. Garnish with a light touch. It's a good idea to use an ingredient that's been cooked in the dish in its fresh form as a garnish. And remember that a little bit of parsley goes a long way.

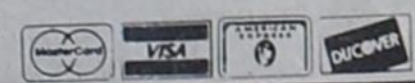
