

Editorial

INFLATION LESSON

Dr. O. B. Jessness, head of the University of Minnesota department of agricultural economics, delivered a little homily on inflation the other day which was directed at farmers but which applies with equal force

to every other group in the nation. Basically, he pointed out, inflation and rising prices are caused by an excess of spending power over supplies of goods and services. Thus as individuals or groups scramble to increase their spending powerthrough higher wages, higher profits or credit which make future income available for current spending-they help to defeat make them more wasteful by the imposition

still higher, the process has to be repeated in order for these individuals and groups to maintain their relative position.

Dr. Jessness warned farmers that they would be ill advised to try to profit from inflation. For as they do so, they only add to inflation, which damages and may mean the ultimate ruin of the whole economy. When the economy goes into a decline, the well-being of the farmer collapses with it.

There is a lesson in this not only for farmers but for all groups who seek to gain special advantage in a time of inflation. The prosperity of all the people depends upon the health and stability of all the elements of the economy-commerce, industry and agriculture. Actions which jeopardize the stability of any of these elements jeopardize the prosperity of every citizen.

Especially is there a lesson here for government, whose actions-or failure to act-affect the whole economy and the whole citizenship. Unless government does its utmost to bridle inflation, it is playing fast and loose with the national welfare and stability.-Ft. Worth Star-Telegram

FEDERAL FARM AGENCIES

Too many agency mergers under Roosevelt and Truman have meant discarding two taxeaters and hiring three. The net result in some instances has been more political domination rather than less.

One item in the merger plan will have general approval from farmers. That is the proposal to put county offices of the Soil Conservation Service and the Production and Marketing Administration in the same building wherever possible. At present, farmers who come to see men in both agencies often lose much time in going from one end of town to the other. Whether the whole merger plan would result in economy and in greater efficiency depends on the means used to put it in operation.

The SCS has been one of the best of invited to attend each service. the federal agencies. No merger should be made unless all of these SCS advantages are clearly retained. This will certainly curtail further industrial developcraft of the latest and most effective type and design to properly guard the State of Texas, particularly the area or belt thereof one hundred miles wide along the coast of the Gulf of Mexico from the Sabine River to the Rio Grande." I call particular attention to the one hundred mile belt referred to because that belt is adjacent to the tidelands that the Federal Government has stolen from the State of Texas, and it occurs to me that since the Federal Government has stolen these tidelands from Texas, it should certainly be its obligation to defend them as requested in this Resolution. And while defenses are being prepared in this respect. I might further suggest that such defenses be set up on behalf of Texas, not only against Alien enemy attacks, but against further encroachments by the Federal Government."


