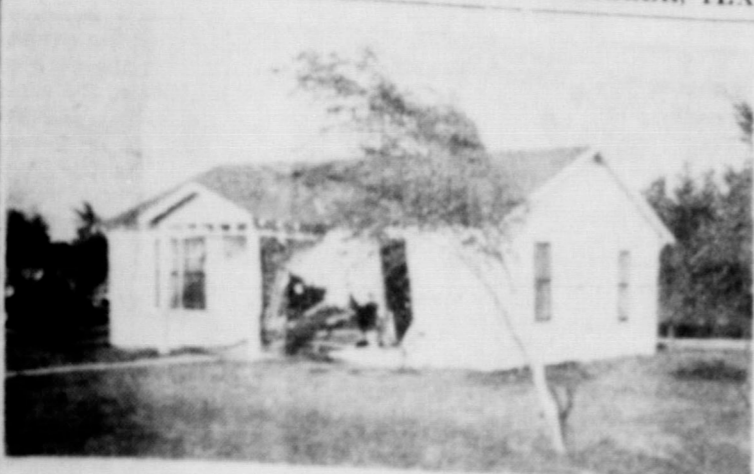

Picture above is the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Nixon in the edge of New Mobettie as it looked Monday afternoon after it had been hit by an automobile which was reportedly driven by John Geyer of Wheeler. According to reports, Mr. Geyer was driving toward Mobettie when a mowing machine which was mowing the shoulder of the highway turned around in front of him and caused him to lose control of the 1949 model Chevrolet which he was driving sending it squarely over the locust tree shown in the right foreground and squarely into the front of the house at a high rate of speed. The front door of the house was knocked completely off its hinges and some 20 feet from where it originally stood and other items were strewn all over the house. Damage to the house was estimated at between \$500.00 and \$600.00. Mr. Geyer was not seriously hurt and luckily some of the Mixons were at home at the time of the accident.

NO CASES OF TB REVEALED IN X-RAY SURVEY

Happy news concerning the results of the chest X-ray campaign conducted in Wheeler County last month, was received this week from Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Dr. Cox reported that the 3,668 X-rays made at Shamrock, Wheeler and Mobettie this year, there were only 27 films suggestive of tuberculosis and only 18 films showing evidence of non-tuberculous conditions involving the chest.

Not a single case of positive tuberculosis was reported. Last year out of 3,742 X-rays, 60 showed tuberculosis, 13 suspicious and 15 non-tuberculous diseases. In 1948, the first year the mobile X-ray unit was brought here by the State Health Department, there were 32 positive cases of TB found, 43 suspicious cases and 25 other diseases.

"This is great news," declared Wheeler County Sanitarian W. R. Ritter. "It seems to prove that those who had the disease have discovered it and had it corrected."

Those who had X-rays made during the local campaign are receiving cards regarding the results of their individual chest X-rays. In cases where the results were not negative, the individual's physician is also being notified. It will be up to each person to have his condition corrected.

Already plans are being made to bring the X-ray machine back to Wheeler County in 1951. All health officers in the county have signed a statement along for its return.

The contents of Dr. Cox's letter to Mr. Ritter are:

"I wish to express my appreciation to you for setting in operation the mobile X-ray survey in your county. I am glad to express my sincere appreciation to the various civic groups, public service agencies and the physicians of your county who contributed their time and services in a coordinated effort to make the mobile X-ray survey successful in Wheeler County.

"The files have been processed and read and the reports have been mailed. The following results were found: a total of 3,668 X-rays were made in Wheeler County; there were 27 films suggestive of tuberculosis which will be sent further available to determine the significance of the disease; and 18 films showing evidence of non-tuberculous conditions involving the chest.

"I suggest that each person get a copy of his report as soon as the report is available. It will be up to the individual to have his condition corrected as soon as possible."

MANY STUDENTS RECEIVE FREE INNOCULATIONS

Reports of the immunization program at the Mobettie and Allison Schools were received this week, the figures boosting the total number of students taking part in the county-wide health program to 1,131.

According to reports received by County Sanitarian W. R. Ritter, 104 students took part in the program at Mobettie, and 91 at Allison.

One hundred and eight pupils took the typhoid inoculations at Mobettie; 34 took the diphtheria inoculations and 21 smallpox. At Allison the count was 64 typhoid, 29 diphtheria and 40 smallpox.

Nine hundred and thirty-four children took part in the immunization program at the other schools of the county, Wheeler, Kellon, Kellon, Lela, Dethel and Shamrock.

The program, made possible by the State Health Department and Wheeler County medical doctors, and promoted by County Sanitarian Ritter, meant a saving of approximately \$15,000 to the parents of school children.

The vaccine was furnished free of charge by the State Health Department and the inoculations were given by county doctors, assisted by nurses.

Mr. Ritter this week expressed his appreciation to the parents, teachers and principals of the schools, the local doctors and nurses, and the general public for making the program successful.

WHOSE RAIN SHOULD RAIN MAKERS MAKE?

Into each life some rain maker must fall, it seems. At least a scientist has worked out the theory that the fellows who seeded the heavens above New Mexico with silver-iodide smoke affected weather conditions this year in the Mississippi Valley. Week after week, according to this scientist, rain fell a thousand miles from New Mexico—always right on schedule, allowing for the drift eastward of the silver

iodide. Moreover, the "seeding" process produced heat, the heat produced air currents and dry winds from the north and west came into certain sections—and there was drought. The rain makers finally cut down their operations to prevent flood in areas that the rain makers never intended to affect.

Obviously this presents a problem which can be handled only by turning rain over to the Department of Agriculture. Secretary Whatshisname will draw up the rain budget for the country and you will get rain according to how badly Washington thinks you need it. Of course, if giving you rain happens to withhold rain from neighboring regions, that means only that neighboring regions had better begin voting right.

Meanwhile, you realize, letting the Lord handle the rainfall is laissez-faire. Progressive-liberals will, of course, see that eventually rain falls only on the just. There never was a progressive-liberal who didn't know who was just and who wasn't.—Dallas News

PERON'S PRESS

They may speak in the language of Cervantes and Bolivar, but they sound mighty like another Vishinsky or Jacob Malik. They, in this case, are the two Argentinian mouthpieces of Dictator Peron that denounce the Inter-American Press Conference in New York as being in the hands of "criminals" and "journalistic gangsters." This is the kind of talk we are accustomed to expect from the potrooms on Pravda; it is no credit to Peron that his newspaper stooges write like equally half-witted guttersnipes.

On the same day Dr. Alberto Gainza Paz, publisher of Buenos Aires' world famous daily, La Prensa, was presented the "America's Foundation" award in New York for his work in the cause of freedom. His newspaper, like La Nacion, also in the Argentinian capital, has held steadfast to the ideals of a free press under the great pressures exerted by Peron's pounce state. Merely to have survived in such an atmosphere of brutal repression is a tribute to the stout hearts and courage of both independent journalists.

The apologists and propagandists for Peron are determined, apparently, to make us remember that totalitarianism of the right is fully as foul as that of the left.

SIX for supper and what to serve? Easy on the budget is Macaroni Meal-In-One. To 3 qts. actively boiling water, add 1 tsp. salt. Gradually add 6 ozs. elbow macaroni. Cook until tender. While macaroni is cooking, melt 3 tbsps. butter or margarine in top of double boiler. Stir in 3 tbsps. enriched flour. Gradually add 1 1/2 cups milk, stirring until thickened. Add 1/2 tsp. dry mustard, 1 tsp. Worcestershire Sauce, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1 cup grated cheese. Stir until cheese is melted. Add macaroni and blend well. Pour half of macaroni mixture into bottom of well-greased 2 qt. casserole. Cover with 2 1/2 cups cooked drained green beans (1 No. 2 can). Top with remaining macaroni. Arrange 6 strips bacon over top. Cover and bake in moderate gas oven (350°F) 15 mins. Remove cover and bake 15 mins. more.

No matter how clean your home, there's bound to be some dust in the air. An air filter, easily installed, on your forced warm air gas furnace screens out dust, keeps it from going through the house.

Emergency plumbing: A handful of soda and a half glass of vinegar poured down a stopped-up drain usually clears it.

A new control for automatic gas water heaters is marked Warm, Lukewarm, Hot and Very Hot to guide the householder to correct temperature hot water.

The equivalent of a 2 1/2-ton truck is lifted every year when women hang laundry on the line. An automatic gas dryer, controlled to any drying temperature, eliminates such laundry drudgery.

Quicker than a knife, and safer too, are kitchen shears for cutting up chicken, ham, salad trimmings and such.
