 The seniors are glad to report that we won the King and Queen contest. The other candidates, by the way, were Sue Lester, Carlton and Elaine Barker, Bob.

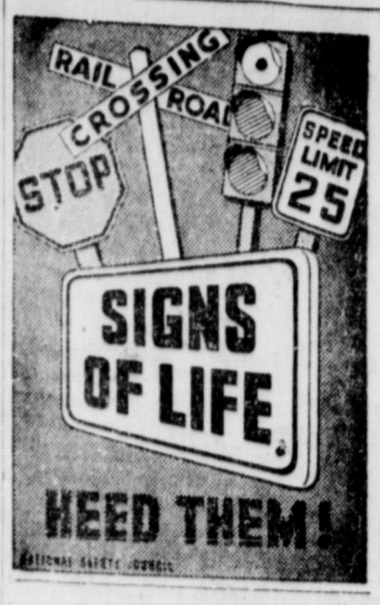

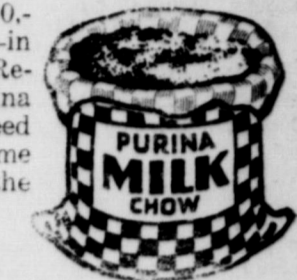

**5TH GRADE NEWS**  
The fifth grade science class has completed a unit on wind and water. They have learned that among the things that make the climate are wind, water, and the altitude, or height of a place above the level of the sea.  
The winds distribute heat and moisture by carrying the heat and moisture from one place to another.  
The heat causes water to evaporate, that is, to change from a liquid into air. When the water vapor or gas is cooled, it changes back to a liquid again and falls to the earth in the form of rain.  
Mountain ranges affect the climate by acting as a wall, shutting off moisture from the land beyond the mountains.  
When the air rises to go over the mountains, it cools, and some of its moisture is condensed and falls as rain. As the air passes over the mountain and travels down the other side, it gets warmer. The moisture left in the air moving down a mountain is not often condensed, and there is usually little rain.  
Deserts are sometimes caused because mountain ranges act as walls that hold back the moisture brought by winds from the ocean.  
The class has completed a unit on rocks. The interesting study on rocks has convinced the members of the class that there are ways to tell one kind of rock from another.  
In health the class has made a study on burns. They can be caused by fire, by hot water, or by electricity. The burns may be classified as first, second and third degree burns.  
In reading the students have found that the Revolutionary War was won with the aid of the French. The Americans had to fight three more years; the British General Lord Cornwallis, surrendered his troops at Yorktown, Virginia to General Washington. Seven years the Declaration of Independence, the English agreed that the thirteen colonies were to be the new nation of the United States.  
Many of our civil and criminal laws are coded after the Roman laws of long ago.

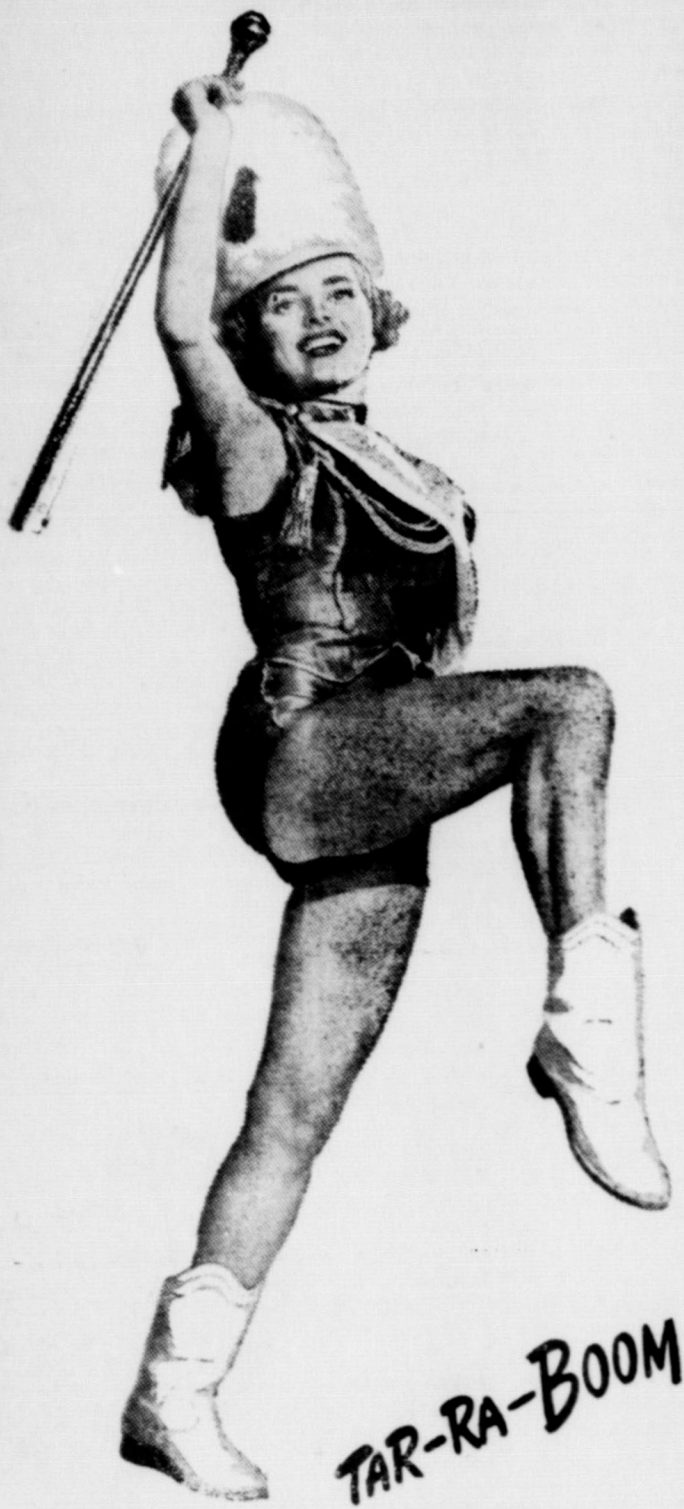

## NEWS FROM— County Agent's Office

(Written for Last Week)  
The warfarin that will be used in the rat killing campaign during the month of November is in the County Agent's office and being sacked and will be ready for the campaign. A demonstration on how to put out the bait and a period for questions and answers will be held at the following communities at 9:00 in the morning: Wheeler, Tuesday, Nov. 6; Shamrock, Wednesday, Nov. 7; Lela, Thursday, Nov. 8; Kelton, Friday, Nov. 9; Twitty, Wednesday, Nov. 14; Briscoe, Thursday, Nov. 15; Allison, Friday, Nov. 16; Pakan, Tuesday, Nov. 20; and Mobeetie, Wednesday, Nov. 21.

A demonstration farm will be selected at each of these places. Veteran Vocational Agriculture teachers will select farms in the following communities: Kelton, Wheeler, Shamrock, Allison and Mobeetie. If anyone in the community of Lela, Twitty, Briscoe, and Pakan want their farm to be used as demonstration farms, please let us know at the County Agent's office.

People from these communities will gather at these demonstration farms and be able to buy bait while there. The cost of the bait will be 25c per pound and \$1.25 per five pounds.

This warfarin bait is the safest and yet the most effective method of controlling rats and mice on the farm or in the home.

Since this is a county wide rat and mouse campaign, every farmer is urged to attend the demonstrations whether or not he intends to buy any bait. When you come to the demonstration place, stop by for your neighbor. Every demonstration will start at 9:00 in the morning and will be over in an hour so you won't lose much time from field work.

Rats and mice destroy much grain and feed and also carry disease so let all get busy and see if we can control them as much as possible.

The rat control demonstration in the Kelton community will be

at the Buster Walsler farm which is at the intersection of Highway 152 and the Kelton Farm-to-Market Road.

There will be a county-wide Farm Bureau Membership drive in Wheeler County starting on Nov. 12 and lasting all that week. The Wheeler County Farm Bureau is going to work on the crow problem again among other things. This organization needs your membership and cooperation so remember them and join the Wheeler County Farm Bureau between Nov. 12-17.

The Wheeler County Farm Bureau will also open its service office in Wheeler on Nov. 1. George Richardson will be service agent and the office is located south of the bank in Wheeler. This office will offer the following services: car insurance, fire insurance, and health and accident insurance to its members. Later on this office will try to help its members on income tax returns and other problems. Drop by this office for a friendly visit.

The Wheeler Soil Conservation District 141 has received five one yard capacity carry-alls this week and they are ready to be used to make terrace fills, dams, and any other dirt moving jobs. Each subdivision of the district will have one and should you want to use one, contact a supervisor in your area or community. Supervisors are: Cliff Walsler, Mobeetie; Willard Rogers, Wheeler; Billy Cantrell, Twitty; Clarence Zybach, Briscoe; and Dusan Pakan, Rt. 2, Shamrock. The charge for these carry-alls will be \$2.50 per day and they can be used with any size tractor with a hydraulic lift.

Plans are being put down for some prairie dog control work in Wheeler County later in this year and anyone who wants help or wants to cooperate in this work, please leave your name at the County Agent's office and information as to the approximate size of prairie dog town you will want treated.

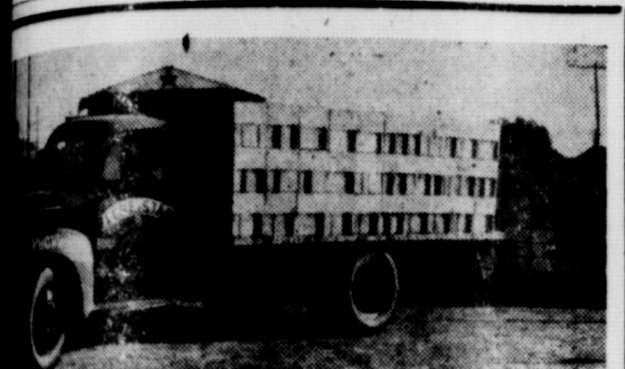

On this the 13 day of Aug., 1951, the Commissioners Court of Wheel-er County, Texas, convened in Regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Wheeler, Texas, with the following members of the Court, to-wit:

G. W. Hefley, County Judge, W. L. Erwin, Commissioner Precinct No. 1, W. E. Mason, Com-missioner Precinct No. 2, Sam McMurtry, Commissioner Precinct No. 3, L. L. See, Commissioner Precinct No. 4, being present, and, among other proceedings had by the Court were the following:

Commissioner See introduced an order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Com-missioner Erwin. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the order, prevailed by the fol-lowing vote:

AYES: Commissioners Erwin, Mason, McMurtry, See;  
 NOES: Commissioners NONE;  
 The order is as follows:

WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitu-tion, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in

Section 9 of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total taxes exceed Eighty (80c) Cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be sub-mitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified prop-erty taxpaying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified prop-erty taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allo-cate the county taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDER-ED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF WHEELER COUNTY, TEXAS:

That a special election be held in said County on the 13th day of November, 1951, which is not less than (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following propo-sition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying vot-ers, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"Shall the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in

each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said elec-tion, county taxes as follows:  
 Not exceeding Fifty Cents (50c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;  
 Not exceeding Thirty-Five Cents (35c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;  
 Not exceeding Five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and  
 Not exceeding Five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15c) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be, author-ized by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Com-missioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Con-stitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Con-stitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."  
 "AGAINST RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leav-ing the other as indicating his or her vote.

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this order at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLO-CATION OF COUNTY TAXES," at the Courthouse door of said County, and in each of the elec-tion precincts of said County for thirty (30) days prior to the elec-tion, which notices shall be posted by the Sheriff or a constable, who shall make return on a copy of such notice, how and when he executed the same.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication thereof in a newspaper published in Wheeler County, once each week for three consecutive weeks, the date of first publication being not less than twenty-one (21) full days prior to the date of said election.

Good workers are represented by 23 standard unions. By mutual agreement, 20 of these unions—comprising about 1,200,000 men, or more than 90%—are working under wages and rules agreed to by them and the railroads. But leaders of three unions—with only about 130,000 men, or less than 10%—still refuse, after more than a year of negotiations, to accept similar wages and rules agreements. These are even more favorable than the terms recommended by the Emergency Board appointed by the President.

**Time to settle...**

**END THIS QUIBBLING!**

On July 15, 1950, an Emergency Board was appointed by the President under the Railway Labor Act—an Act which was passed by the unions themselves to make their recommendations on certain wages and working conditions ("rules" in railroad language) which had been in dispute between employees and the railroads.

**More Than 90% of Employees Accept**  
 Under the terms of the agreement, yard engineers, firemen and conductors would now be receiving a wage increase of \$3.44 an hour (\$2.72 a day) and road engineers, firemen and conductors would now be receiving an increase of 19½ cents an hour (\$1.56 per day). Large sums of retroactive pay have already accrued and if the agreement is carried out, will be paid promptly.

**What About "Cost of Living" Increases?**  
 The White House Agreement includes an "escalator" clause under which wages will be geared to changes in the Government's cost-of-living index. Two such increases—April and July, 1951—have already been paid to the 90% of railroad employees covered by signed agreements.

**What About the 40-Hour Week?**  
 The White House Agreement calls for the establishment of the 40-hour week in principle, for employees in yard service. The employees can have it any time after Jan-uary 1, 1952, provided the manpower situa-tion is such that the railroads can get enough men to perform the work with reasonable regularity at straight time rates. If the parties do not agree on the question of availability of manpower, the White House Agreement provides arbitra-tion by a referee appointed by the President.

**What Else Do the Union Leaders Demand?**  
 The continued quibbling of the leaders of the three unions has to do principally with

rules changes, which have already been agreed to by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. Of these, the principal one seems to be that having to do with so-called "interdivisional service"—runs which take in two or more seniority dis-tricts.

The union leaders would bar progress and efficiency in the industry, and better service to the public, by maintaining a situation where they can arbitrarily stop a railroad from establishing such inter-divisional runs. The carriers propose that if a railroad wishes to set up an inter-divisional run, the railroad and the unions should try to agree on such run and the conditions which should surround its estab-lishment, and if the railroad and the unions can't agree, the matter will be sub-mitted to arbitration.

But the three union leaders still refuse.

**Rules Can Be Arbitrated**  
 The railroads have not only offered these three unions the same rules agreed to by the BRT and covered by the White House Agreement, but have even agreed to sub-mit such rules to arbitration.

**The Industry Pattern Is Fixed**  
 With the pattern so firmly established in the railroad industry, it seems fair to sug-gest that the leaders of BLE, BLF&E, and ORC stop their quibbling and take action to make the railroad labor picture 100% complete. Certainly today's eco-nomic and international situation calls for a united front. And certainly no good reason has been advanced why these three unions should be preferred over all other railroad employees.

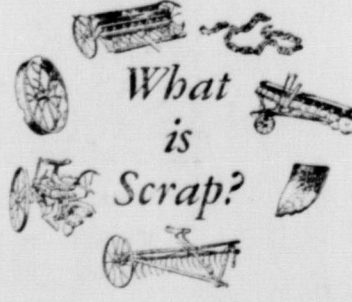

- Q. Why is iron and steel scrap a matter of importance to farmers?

- Q. Why not use pig iron instead of scrap?  
 A. Every ton of scrap conserves approximately 2 tons of iron ore, 1 ton of coal, nearly 1/2 ton of limestone and many other vital natural resources—to say nothing of transportation facilities. Besides, there are not enough blast furnaces to produce the iron needed to maintain production.
- Q. How can more scrap be furnished?  
 A. By everybody pitching in—as we always do in every emergency—and searching out all possible sources of scrap. Manufacturers of all kinds of products are conducting scrap drives. Old ships are being salvaged... scrap is being obtained from countless sources including farms.
- Q. What is farm scrap?  
 A. It is any worn out, obsolete, unrepairable equipment, tools or other objects made of metal. It may be resting and rusting in fence corners, in the fields, the barnyard or the tool shed.
- Q. What should be done with farm scrap?  
 A. See that every bit of scrap gets to the scrap dealer located nearest to you. He will break it up into sizes used by the steel mills and foundries. He'll classify the metals then ship the scrap in carload lots. If you do not know the name of your local scrap dealer, consult your local implement dealer for this information.
- Q. What else can I do about farm scrap?  
 A. Support the scrap drive organized in your locality. Work with your local Scrap Mobilization Committee in getting the scrap started back to the steel mills and foundries through the local scrap dealer.

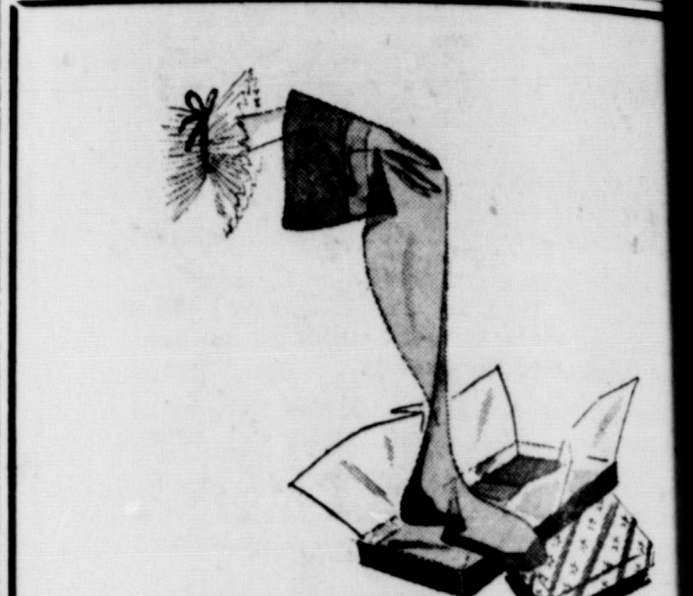
