The women's convention will open at 10:30 Monday morning, October 22, in the Music Hall of the Sam Houston coliseum. Beginning at 7:00 p.m. the same day, the men's meeting will be held in the main building of the coliseum.

Both will close out Tuesday afternoon before the opening of the general convention sessions at 7:00 that night in the coliseum. Speakers for the W.M.U. meeting will include Mrs. George R. Martin, Northern Baptist W.M.U. president, Norfolk, Va.; Mrs. H. H. Grooms, Birmingham, Ala.; Dr. Duke K. McCall, president of the Southern Baptist seminary, Louisville, Ky.; and missionaries representing Baptist work in Africa, North America, South America, Asia and Europe.

## MAGIC CITY BRIDGE IS NOW OPEN TO TRAFFIC

County Judge G. W. Hefley this week announced that the bridge which spans the North Fork of Red River at Magic City has been repaired and is now open to traffic.

The County Judge pointed out the fact that an 80-ft. span of the bridge, has been replaced and other repair made which made the bridge safer than it was before it was washed out during the heavy rains early this spring.

The bridge was washed out the same time the Highway 66 bridge was washed out at Sayre and many other bridges and dams were washed out during the torrential rains which fell in the Panhandle during the latter part of May.

## COUNTY BOYS CAN REGISTER AT POSTOFFICE

Boys who reach the age of 18, required to register with the nearest draft board, can register in Wheeler county with Virgil Jamison, Jr. and W. A. Goad at the Wheeler postoffice.

The nearest draft board is Local Board No. 52, Pampa, which has jurisdiction over Wheeler, Gray, Donley, and Roberts counties.

Services of these registrars enables Wheeler county boys to register in their own county without having to go to the expense and trouble of traveling to Pampa. A local board is maintained for the four-county area because one board can take care of it under present circumstances and thus help keep down the cost of government.

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said today that "people should appreciate the services these gentlemen are rendering to the people of Wheeler county. They do this job without pay as a patriotic service to the country."

All males are required to register under the draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.

## 3 CO. FARMERS TO BE HONORED

More than four hundred Texas farmers, who a few years ago were tenants, will be honored October 10 with a day at the State Fair of Texas. These farmers borrowed money through the Farmers Home Administration to buy family-type farms, and paid off 40-year farm mortgages more than 30 years ahead of schedule. Of this number, those who paid their debt from returns from the soil will receive certificates of achievement for having paid their loans in full this year from agricultural income.

Ceremonies of awarding certificates signed by President R. L. Thornton of the State Fair of Texas, and Texas FHA Director L. J. Cappelman will be held in the Hall of State on the State Fair Grounds at 1:00 p.m., October 10, County Supervisor Homer H. Lynch announced this week. The number will include two farmers of Wheeler County; the Supervisor said. These farmers are Mr. G. Eugene Shaffer of the Kelson Community and Mr. Eddie J. Pannell, formerly of the Briscoe Community.

Congressman W. R. (Bob) Poage, Chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the House of Representatives, will deliver an address covering the progress of Farmers Home Administration in the five-year history of the agency. He will be introduced by Dillard B. Lasseter, National FHA Administrator.

Farmers who have paid up their farm and home loans and others whose operations are financed by the Farmers Home Administration have been invited to attend the ceremonies and see the State Fair (Continued on last page)

## ALLEN FAMILY TO BE HONORED AT STATE FAIR

The John E. "Jake" Allen family has been selected by the State Farmers Home Administration Committee as one of the two families of the state to be given special recognition during the Farmers Home Administration Achievement Day Program at the State Fair in Dallas, County Supervisor Homer H. Lynch stated today.

The Allen family will receive a three-day trip to the Fair and be an honored guest at the program in the Hall of State at 1:00 p.m. on Wednesday, October 10. They will be interviewed by Murray Cox, Agriculture Director of Radio Station WFAA on a statewide broadcast direct from the Fair Grounds at 1:20 p.m.

The Allen family was selected because of their outstanding work done in the planning and carrying-out of soil improvement practices, production and conservation of food in carrying out a live-at-home program, and participation in community activities. The state committee placed particular emphasis upon pasture improvement work in which Mr. Allen has done outstanding work, not only on his own farm but has pioneered the way for other farmers of his community.

The Allens will also have a ticket for the drawing for the Ford tractor that will be given away.

### Editorial

#### CHEMISTRY MAY SOLVE WORLD'S FOOD PROBLEM

The efficient application of present knowledge of agriculture all over the world will provide nutritious food of high quality for four billion people, or nearly twice the world population, in the opinion of Professor Artturi I. Virtanen, a noted Finnish chemist

and winner of a Nobel prize for contributions to agricultural biochemistry.

The Professor's opinion is interesting because there have been rather ominous predictions in the past that the population of the globe will outgrow its food supply. While the Finnish chemist may be entirely correct, everybody knows that there are millions of human beings, scattered in the undeveloped regions, who lack an adequate diet. Obviously, the perfection of crop yields opens a way out of the recurrent starvation in undeveloped areas and the development of new sources of food through the application of chemistry may solve the problem.

Professor Virtanen points out that crop yields are very low in many areas of the world. He says that in the United States the yield of wheat is 400 kilograms an acre, whereas, in some countries of Europe, it is as high as 1,000 kilograms. "Only in Denmark, Holland and Belgium are the yields per acre relatively high," declares the Nobel prize winner.

Dr. Wendell M. Stanley, of the University of California, another Nobel prize winner, points out that at the present only a fraction of a per cent of the sun's energy is utilized by plants, whereas methods are known for increasing this utilization by forty or fifty per cent. He points out that experimental work is doing this on a small scale in the cultivation of algae, single-celled plants.

Somehow, we have never been able to worry over the possibility that the world's population may outgrow its food supply. Faulty distribution may produce areas of starvation, but, in the long run, the pinch of hunger will spur mankind to develop adequate food supplies.

#### AN IDEA ABOUT BREAKFAST

We see where an expert in home management suggests that breakfast should be a time for the "give-and-take" criticism and encouragement that work to the development of "emotional serenity."

This is an interesting theory but our observation, in relation to "give-and-take criticism" is that most people put the emphasis on the "give." It rarely develops "emotional serenity."

Our own idea is that the modern rush to gobble up food and get on to work is a bad habit, detrimental to the development of good manners and culture. A good meal is something to be handled with leisure, interspersed with intelligent and pleasant conversation.

It might be an idea, sometime, for those who dispute this theory to try it.

**CAMERA TOPICS**  
By T. T. Holden

**GO ANIMAL HUNTING WITH YOUR CAMERA**

If you're out of new picture ideas and bored with the subjects close at hand, why not go big game hunting with your camera. If there is a zoo nearby, that is an ideal place. If you enjoy hiking and camping, the woods offer many opportunities to stalk game with a camera. Even a farm can be a happy hunting ground.

Pictures which merely say "this is a cow" are not very exciting. You should strive for photographs that say something funny, interesting, unusual or dramatic. A shot of a mother lion romping with her cub has much more appeal, for instance, than one of the two of them just standing together. Close-ups are usually interesting too.

Needless to say, your first consideration in photographing any animal should be for your safety. An angry pig can hurt you badly and even the most docile creature can be aroused to violence if scared by a camera poked through the bars of his cage or cornered in the woods. Use common sense in not getting too close and in making sure that your vantage point is a safe one. Obviously, it is impossible to pose most animals. Your best bet is to pick a camera angle that

gives you proper lighting and a clear view, focus on the area in which you expect the animal to be or move, stop down your lens as much as possible to secure maximum depth of field and then shoot when you see the picture you want. If the animal's attention is distracted by something other than you and your camera, the problems of focusing and achieving an interesting shot are simplified. In zoos, you can often secure the cooperation of a keeper to help you set up a desired shot.

Since most animals move swiftly and are seldom perfectly still, you will need a fast shutter speed to freeze action and prevent blurring. You must also be quick on the trigger to get the shot you want in the best split-second of the action. As in photographing humans or any other subjects, the success of your pictures will depend not only upon your technical skill but also on the amount of interest you can pack into your composition.

Whether you stalk elusive deer in the woods, shoot the wild animals in the zoo or make portraits of neighborhood cows, you will find animals are challenging photographic subjects.

**UG SELLING ITS PROPERTY IN WHEELER CO.**

United Gas Corporation and its subsidiaries, United Gas Pipeline Company and Union Producing Company, are filing application this week with the Securities and Exchange Commission for approval of the proposed sale of various pipe line, producing and distribution properties which these companies now operate in North Texas, it was announced here by M. A. Abernathy, vice-president.

The proposed purchasers of the properties are Martin Wunderlich, of Omaha, Nebraska and Lee Aikin, of Corpus Christi, Texas. Acquisition of the pipeline system is subject to approval of the Federal Power Commission.

The proposed sale covers United Gas Corporation's natural gas distribution system in 17 North Texas towns, United Gas Pipeline Company's gathering and transmission lines in 15 counties in Texas and Oklahoma, and Union Producing Corporation's wells, lands and leases in Wheeler and Young counties.

Application to be filed with SEC will state that United Gas desires to sell the properties for the reason that they are not connected with the main pipe line system operated by United Gas in other portions of the south and southwest, and are not capable of economic inter-connection because of their geographical location.

United employees operating the various properties involved have received individual letters advising them of the proposed sale. Those who desire to maintain their connection with United have been assured of transfers to other portions of the system.

The Distribution Division of United Gas Corporation has been serving customers in the following communities: Childress County, Childress, Kirkland, Loco; Collingsworth County: Dodson, Lutie, Samnorwood, Wellington; Hall County: Memphis; Hardeman County: Acme, Chillicothe, Quannah; Wichita County: Burkburnett, Iowa Park, Wichita Falls; Wilbarger County: Vernon; Young County: Jean, Newcastle.

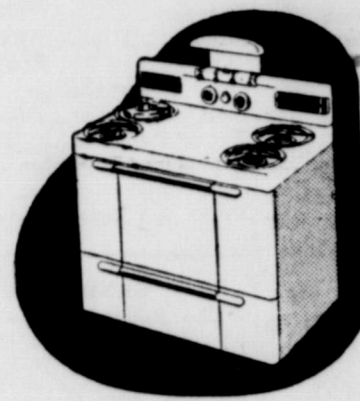

1 stalk celery, chopped  
1 cup white sauce  
Salt, pepper, pinch thyme  
2 onions, sliced fine  
Mix ingredients and place in greased baking dish or casserole. Bake in 350° oven for 40 minutes or more.

learning to find the subjects and predicates of a sentence.

The 7th grade is spending several days reviewing the use of capital letters. They are also learning some new rules for capital letters.

### FIFTH GRADE NEWS

The Fifth Grade health and science students have learned to define the meaning of play and

recreation, the best place to make camp, what a good camp shelter is, why food should be in cans and packages, what activities can be carried on in the camp, and why children should not drink water before it is boiled or treated with chemicals.

The science class has learned that insects destroy plant life, that insects are helpful and harmful to man and plant life, how to distinguish the differences between young and old insects, we have more than one kind of insect, the differences between annual plants, perennial plants, what evergreens are, and how the age

of a tree can be determined by counting the number of rings it has.

At this present time the fifth grade students are developing concepts which will help to build a background of understanding of the colonists' struggle for freedom, and the events in this struggle.

They are learning why the colonist wanted their freedom, what the continental congress was, and the important work which it did and the difficulties encountered in raising, equipping, and maintaining the army.

All the students in Mr. Jones' classes are working hard and learning valuable things which they will need later on, if not any later than six weeks test and mid-term test.

### SIXTH GRADE NEWS

The sixth grade reading classes have studied about primitive man at home, mammoth, buster, the life of man and Big Nose Horn, stone age man in North America, how the pharaoh ruled in Egypt, and they are now in the process of completing their study about the Egyptians.

The students have learned what sunlight does, how people see, eyes which need help, the nature of sound, the kind of homes plants have, the difference between a hurry-up plant, take your time plants, what is air, what ways the human body is like a furnace, what we do with the air we breathe, what is good air for breathing and the important gases which help to make up the atmosphere around us.

### SEVENTH GRADE NEWS

The seventh grade health and science students have completed a unit on "What It Means to Grow Up", "Childhood" and "The Teen Age." They have studied about the nature of water, how water supports life, how to trace the trail of the raindrop, how water does

work for us, how water helps us to keep clean, evolution of the earth, how the earth was made ready for living and how running water changes the land.

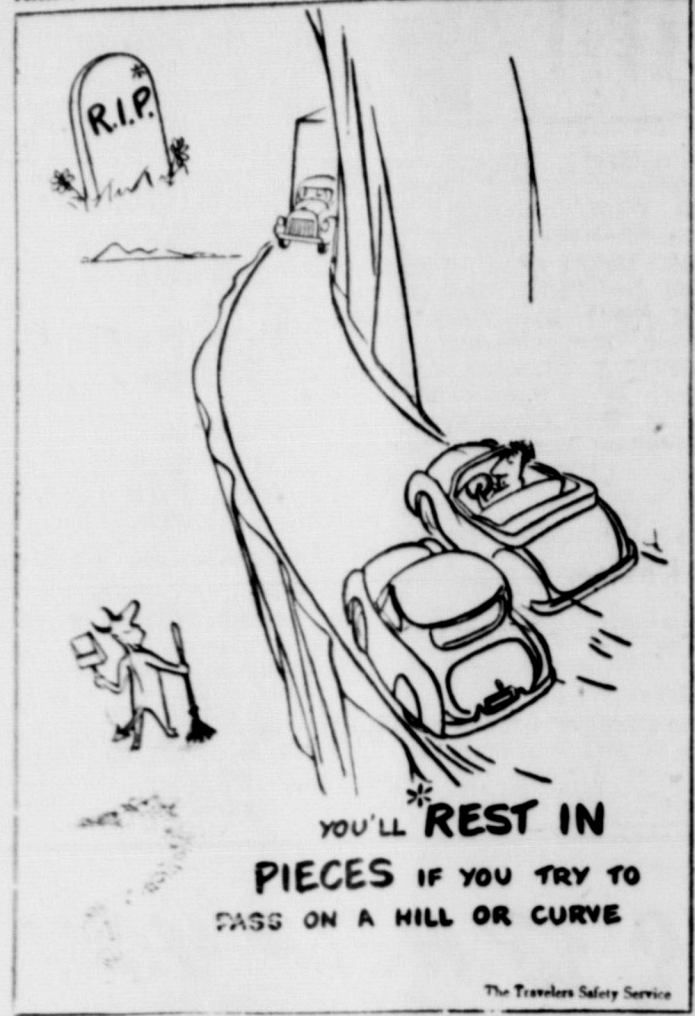

**"SMALL BUSINESS"**

By C. WILSON HARDER

For the second time in less than six years the eyes of the world are turned toward San Francisco, as Japanese peace treaty sessions convene.

On the first occasion, the charter for a presumed unity of nations was drawn. But less than five years later world monopolies made it impossible to shut off supplies of war materials to those breaching the peace.



Again in San Francisco, C. W. Harder empty gestures prevail.

Before the present meeting occurred in San Francisco, Douglas MacArthur was removed.

Before the war and until MacArthur took over occupation duties, 90% of all business, financial and commercial enterprise in Japan was controlled by the "zaibatsu" the eleven family monopoly that was linked with monopolies all over the world.

Under MacArthur's direction, the Japanese monopoly stranglehold was broken. Small business was encouraged; the spirit of economic independence came to Japan for the first time.

Long before the MacArthur matter reached headlines, a few big monopoly minded American corporations who had profitable relations with the Japanese super-monopoly before the war, were opposing his policies.

In the few short months since MacArthur left, Japanese monopolists, aided by these American corporations, have been working to destroy many of the anti-trust regulations that were set up to encourage free competitive enterprise in Japan.

Regardless of the oratory pour-

ed out in San Francisco, Japan could be headed toward one of two directions.

As it did at the time of Pearl Harbor either the "zaibatsu" will drive the country back to fascism, or underprivileged people will drive Japan to Moscow.

And so, the mass of the Japanese people may revert to feudalism because their champion of economic freedom was, unfortunately, subject to orders influenced by those desiring monopoly.

Unlike the average American, the average Japanese has no opportunity to protect himself from predatory monopoly.

In America the situation is different. There are champions of economic democracy seeking to protect the American way of life. All they need is the support of the people.

That is why today, the work of such groups as the Senate Small Business Committee headed by Senator John Sparkman of Alabama, is so vital.

Peace can only be a stranger in a world, where monopolies are permitted to ruthlessly grab control of all business.

In this nation, there are anti-trust and anti-monopoly laws. The same sinister forces of greed that are working to deprive the Japanese people of economic opportunity seek to destroy these laws.

So all the high flown oratory coming over the airwaves cannot gloss over this fact.

The biggest stride to world peace that can be made today is the restoration and protection of the health of American small business. Monopolies eventually offer nothing but bloodshed and death. There is no room for monopolies and democracy. One must perish.

He is the son of Mrs. J. I. Johnson, who lives at Mobeetie.

Chanute, one of the Air Force's pioneer bases for technical training, today teaches over 50 specialized courses. Schools on the base train weather observers and forecasters, many specialists in the fields of aircraft maintenance and most of the trades needed to keep a modern air arm operating.

Founded in 1917 to train combat pilots for World War I, the base is named for Octave Chanute, Illinois resident and aviation pio-

neer. The base is located in central Illinois, approximately 120 miles south of Chicago.

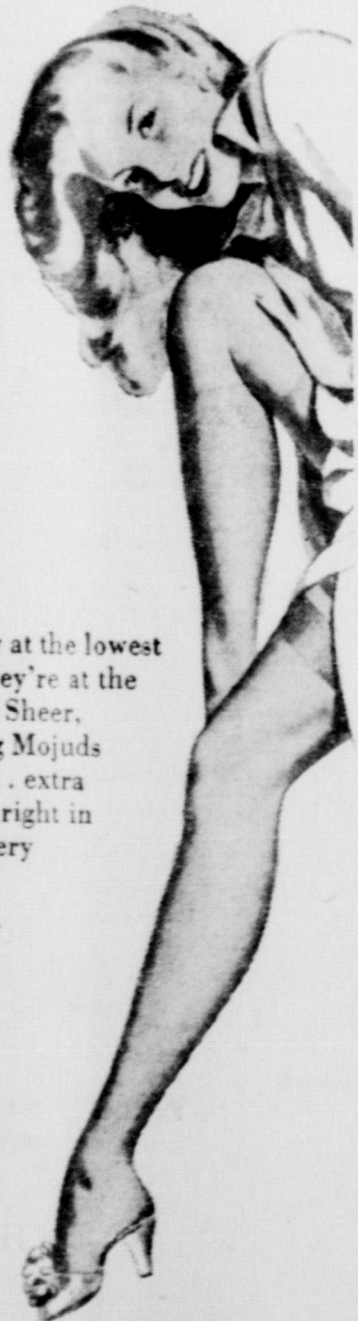

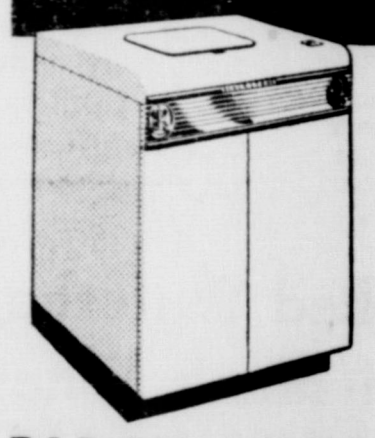
