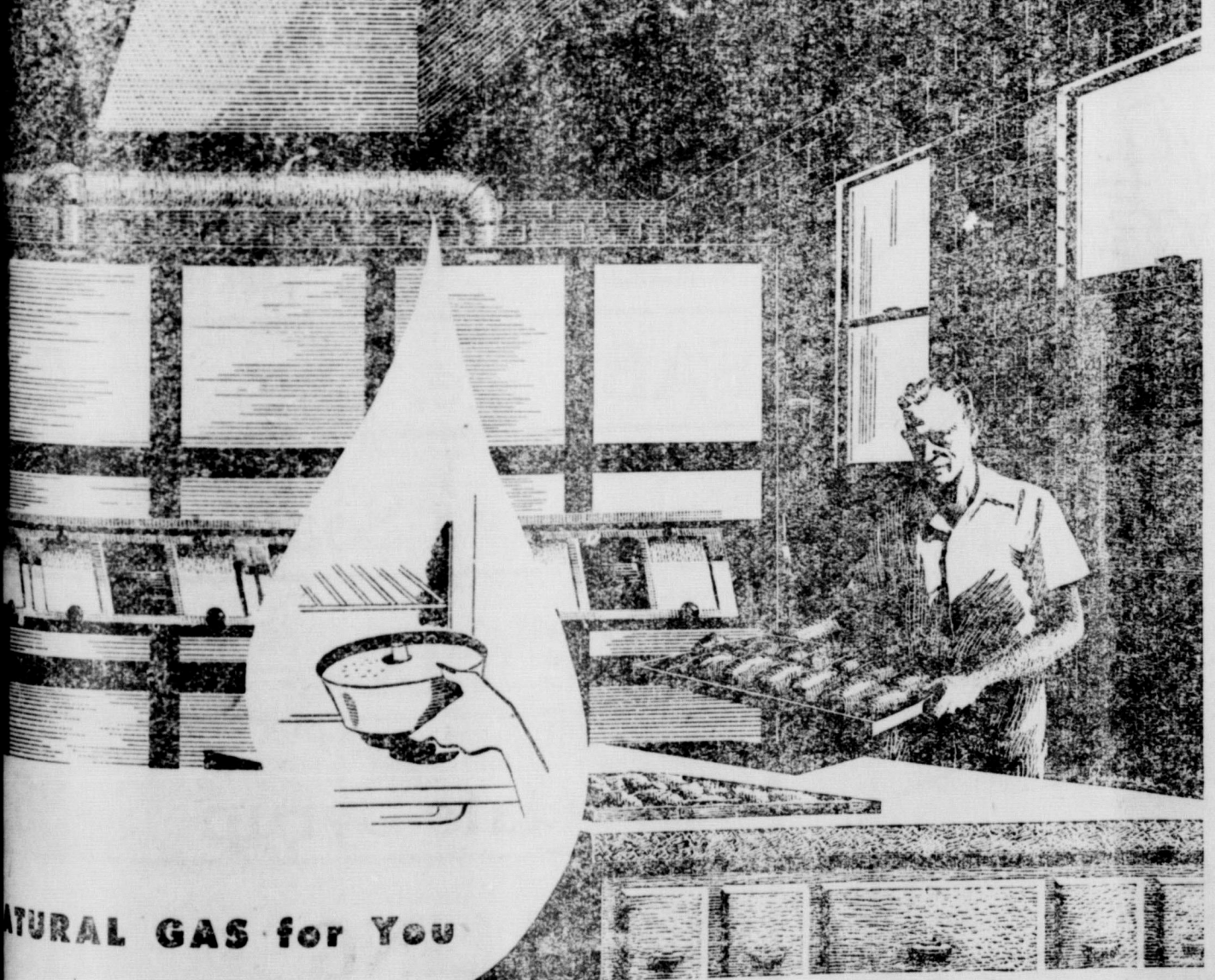

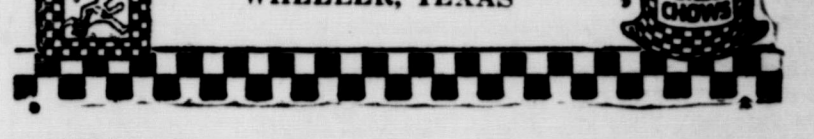

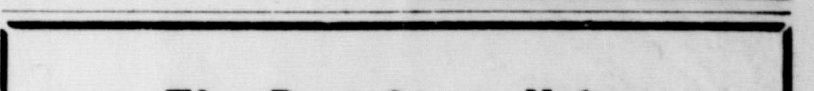

**Roast Chicken With Savory Stuffing**

1. Cook slowly until tender. . . . . 2 tablespoons finely cut onion  
in 2 tablespoons shortening  
2 1/2 cups bread cubes  
(2 days old)
2. Remove from heat and add. . . . . 1/2 cup finely cut celery  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 teaspoon powdered sage
3. Moisten with. . . . . 1/2 cup Pet Milk
4. Sprinkle inside cavity of. . . . . 3 1/2 lb. roasting chicken  
with 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
5. Fill cavity with mixture; sew together or secure with toothpicks laced with string.
6. Rub over outside of chicken. . . . . 1 1/2 tablespoons shortening
7. Place chicken on side in shallow roasting pan. Do not cover. Bake in slow oven (325) about 2 hours.
8. After baking 1 hour, turn chicken on other side and finish baking. Remove to warm platter. . . . . 4 servings.

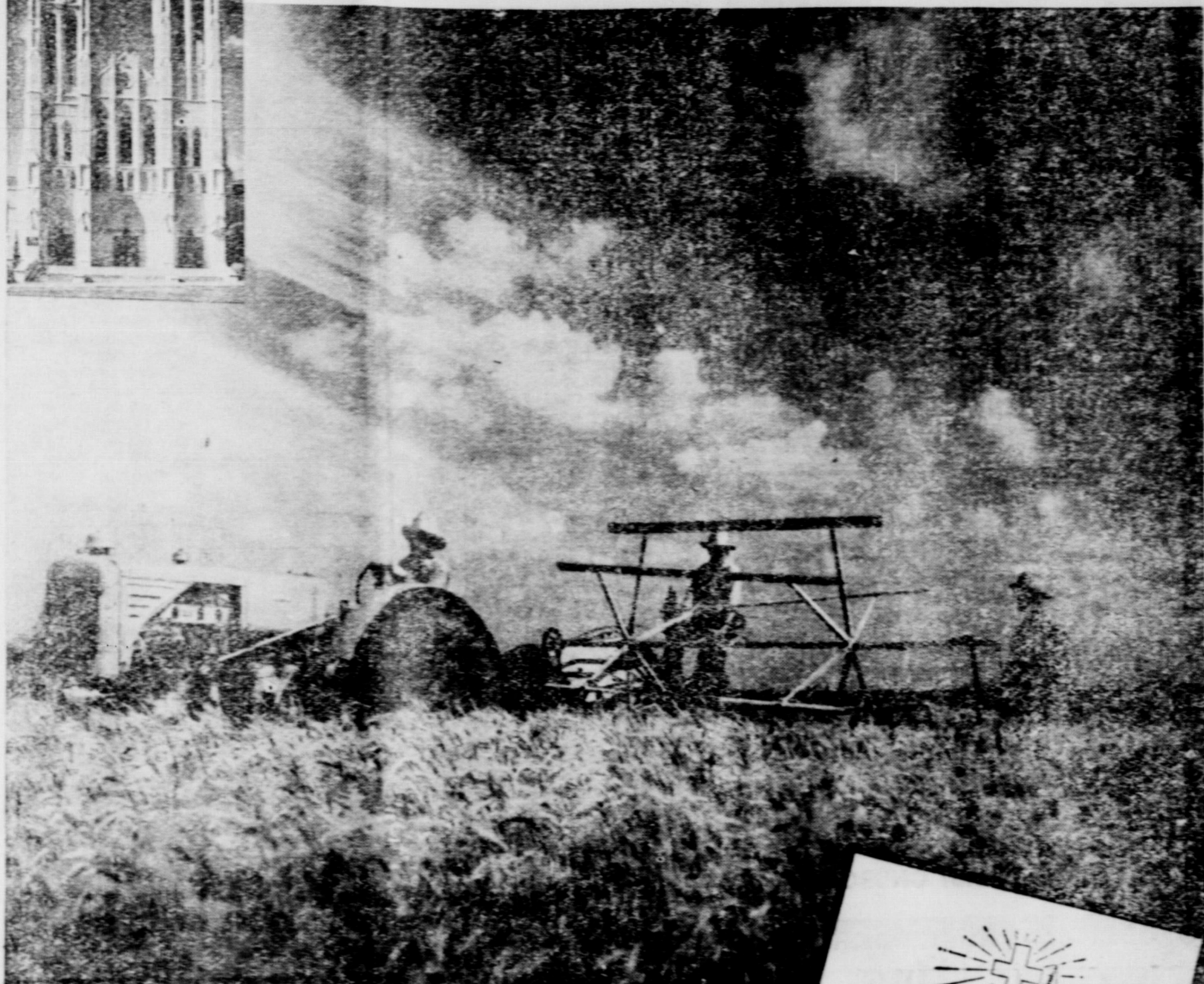
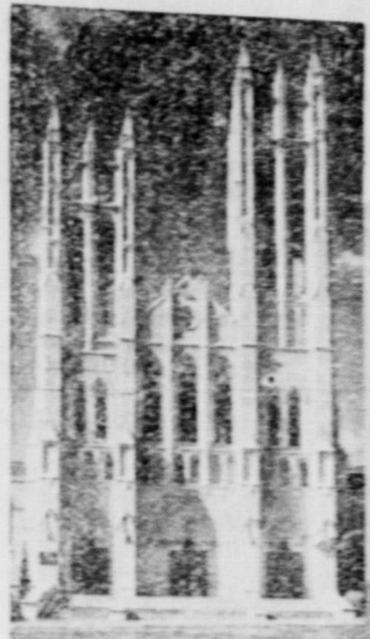
