Santa To Visit Wheeler Next Wed.

Schools, Bands To Give Christmas Musical Program

Santa has decided to include Wheeler in his itinerary this year it was announced this week by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. He will stop off in Wheeler next Wednesday afternoon with sacks of candy, nuts and fruit for all the little boys and girls who come to town to see him.

Preceding the arrival of Santa Claus, students from the five schools in the north half of Wheeler County will participate in a program on the west side of the courthouse square beginning at 2:00 p.m. The program will include a number of Christmas Carols by the students from Mobeetie, Briscoe, Allison, Kelton and Wheeler.

Also participating in the gigantic Christmas program will be the Wheeler Band under the direction of Mrs. Patrick Boddy and the Briscoe-Allison-Kelton Band under the direction of Ed Chenette. The bands will accompany the carolers. A group of accordionists will also participate in the program.

The carol singing will be under the direction of William D. Wheatley, public schools music director in the Wheeler and Mobeetie Schools.

Arrangements for the musical program have been worked out by County Superintendent Jesse J. Dyer working with Supt. J. L. Wilmoth of Kelton, O. K. Henson of Briscoe, Noble Doughty of Allison, L. R. Reeves of Mobeetie and W. O. Carrick of Wheeler.

Arrangements for the visit of Santa Claus have been made by some of the merchants of Wheeler acting through the local Chamber of Commerce and it is hoped that every little boy and girl in this trade territory will be on hand next Wednesday afternoon to see Santa and tell him what they are expecting to find in their socks on Christmas morning.

Some of the Wheeler merchants will be offering special values on that day and all the Wheeler merchants are well stocked with gifts for every member of the family. They invite the residents of this vicinity to come early and do their shopping before the program is presented.

Arrangements have been made with the Wheeler City officials to rope off a section of the street on the west side of the square to allow a place for the program and give sufficient space for the children to gather around and see Santa Claus.

Children will be asked to form lines and pass by the truck where the gifts are being handed out so that all the little boys and girls will be sure and receive a package and there will not be as much pushing and shoving as there has been in the past. The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce and old Santa wants all the little boys and girls to have a gift but hopes that none of them will try to gather up several sacks as some of the older little children have done in past years.

Santa will not bring his reindeer to Wheeler but will be met in the edge of town by Fire Chief Jack Garrison and the new City Fire Truck.

It is almost too late, but many people should be thinking about cotton that they are going to plant next spring and about the seed that will be planted. Now is the time to get this seed and to store it in a well ventilated, dry place so that the germination will be kept as high as possible. Several varieties of cotton have proved to be very good for this area but there are two that seem to be the top varieties. These are Northern Star and Early Macha. Northern Star is a good producer that fruits up well and produces a good staple length of good grade. The Early Macha is the best storm proof cotton that produces a strict low middling grade of close to an inch staple. This cotton is one of the best varieties for machine gathering and since the bur hold, the cotton close inside it, there will be less damage from the carbon black that has been hurting some of the cotton these days.

TITO AND U. S. DOLLARS

The Yugoslav Government has approached the United States, and British and French Governments, on the subject of a loan, or grants, with which, it would complete its five-year industrialization plan. There is an interesting story behind this request. A few years ago, the Yugoslavs were accepting aid from the Soviet Union toward the completion of their five-year industrialization plan. However, when the break between Marshal Tito and the Soviet Union occurred, all Soviet aid was cut off.

The industrialization program in Yugoslavia was only partially completed and many huge buildings, destined to become industrial establishments, lay only half-finished at the time of the break.

A representative of this newspaper, recently in Belgrade, had occasion to observe these half-completed buildings—about which the Yugoslavs are so sensitive. In fact, many of the people in Yugoslavia believe the real reason work was halted on these projects was the discovery by Yugoslav builders that the earth was not suitable to support a structure of such weight.

Yugoslavs in Belgrade tell visitors the huge unfinished concrete buildings have cracks in them, caused by the sandy soil formation on which they were built. However, no cracks were visible to the eyes of American newsmen in Belgrade recently, and the story they were given was that the stappage in shipments of Russian equipment, and an end to technical aid, were responsible for the breakdown of this part of the Yugoslav industrialization program.

Thus, today, when the United States is already supplying Yugoslavia military aid, the Yugoslavs are asking for economic aid, also aid from the same West Marshal Tito in former years denounced so strongly. His Communist government once again is calling on the "capitalistic" West to bail Yugoslavia out of a situation in which statism seems to be relatively helpless.

ON AVOIDING THE DENTIST

Dentists were recently told in their mid-continent meeting in St. Louis that the patient who begs for a postponement of his or her "ordeal" should be given sympathetic consideration. By not postponing work a patient is jumpy about, a dentist might harm the patient's automatic nervous system, Dr. Edward J. Ryan, of Evansville, Ind., is reported to have said.

The doctor explained that anxiety is infectious, and that therefore a nervous patient might upset his dentist, while a fluttery dentist can quickly unnerv a patient. The principle of granting appointment postponements will appeal to many dental patients all over the country, who heretofore have spent a considerable amount of time trying to figure out a reason to postpone their appointments.

All these people can now find refuge in the principle advanced by Dr. Ryan, and need only make a clean breast of their nervous condition to gain approval of a proposed postponement. Those who succeed with this strategy for a period of over one year should be classed as exceptions to the rule, and submit in spite of the danger to their nerves.

Health Dept. Will Clamp Down On Bird Importation

United States and Texas health officials after December 15 will clamp down hard on the importation of parrots, love birds, parakeets, and all other birds of the psittacine family.

In a move designed to control the spread of psittacosis (parrot fever), the ban will be enforced throughout continental United States, its territories and possessions, and will apply to birds coming from any foreign country or from the Canal Zone.

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox predicted the new federal regulation will have the effect of "stimulating the bird industry, since breeders will have a better chance to avoid psittacosis infections" in their birds.

Under terms of the regulation birds may be brought in for medical research or for zoological parks in numbers prescribed by the surgeon general, if the quarantine officer at the port of entry is satisfied the birds are healthy.

The importation ban, published as an amendment to a long standing USPHS regulation on psittacine birds, said birds destined for medical research or zoological

parks could be brought in by individuals, "not to exceed two in number, if they have been in the owner's possession for four months, and appear to the quarantine officer to be in good health."

Dr. Cox said psittacine bird dealers would be required to keep records of all sales and exchanges for two years. The records must be made available for official inspection on request. Specifically covered by the regulation are parrots, Amazons, Mexican double-heads, African grays, cockatoos, macaws, parakeets, love birds, lorries, lorikeets, and all others which belong to the psittacine family and which are agents of parrot fever. After November 15,

interstate shipment of birds must be accompanied by a permit from health officials in the state to which shipment is made, the new order said, providing the state of destination requires such permits.

Dr. Cox said his department intended to exercise its authority to quarantine all aviaries implicated in cases of human psittacosis until a laboratory investigation shows these aviaries to be free of psittacosis.

THE FARMERS STAKE IN CONSERVATION

"Well, I've been thinking about doing something about the erosion on my place," said a farmer, "but I heard a fellow say on the street the other day that I had better not sign up with the District because the government might make me take out some land I've got in cotton and put it in grass."

The reply made to this statement was, "What we want you and every other farmer to understand is that you are not signing up with the government, but with the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District that has been formed for the purpose of putting conservation to work on the farms of the county."

The above statements may or may not have actually taken place, but it represents many farmers thinking toward the District Program.

Now let us study the background of Soil Conservation Districts to give us a picture of the job ahead and the work to be done.

In the early 1930's, the pyramid of mounting soil erosion, floods and land damage was topped by tremendous dust storms, sweeping from the plains over large areas of the country. This, together with the depression, forced

thousands of farm families to leave their farms and homes.

By the middle of the 1930's, the time for decision grew near. Conservation leaders studied the wind erosion districts in Texas, Montana, Ohio, and other places.

Everywhere it was apparent that soil conservation work was done faster and better where farmers took an active part in getting the job done. Where government men did the job, farmers did not understand the what and why of the job. When the government men left, the farmers didn't maintain the work.

Out of this experience, the Soil Conservation District idea was born. Men most concerned with conservation realized that if proper land use was practiced, no agency of government could bring it about. The farmers themselves would have to carry a large portion of the job.

With these ideas in mind, on February 26, 1937, President Roosevelt wrote the Governors of all states. He asked that each State Legislature pass enabling acts permitting, but not enforcing, local land owners and occupiers to join together legally into Soil Conservation Districts.

The same general lines were followed in organizing the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District. This district is composed of local people who have banded themselves together for the purpose of combating erosion and improving depleted farm land through proper land use and treat-

ment. After this district was formed via legal procedure, application was made to the Soil Conservation Service for technical help to the District on the basis of an agreement with the governing body of the district.

The people of the District wrote their own program for soil conservation. The Supervisors signed one agreement with the Secretary of Agriculture whereby the Secretary agreed to furnish Federal assistance to the district. The control of this program rests with the people of the District. The farmer must apply to his Board of Supervisors by way of the local SCS office to get this assistance. Your present supervisors are: Clarence Zybach, Dusan Pakan, Willard Rogers, Clifford Waiser, and Billy Cantrell. This Board even has the power to discontinue the Soil Conservation Service in the county if the people in the District desire it.

The District furnishes assistance to the farmers who may desire it. This may be done by the agreement of the farmer to use his land within its capabilities and treat it according to its needs.

Following this agreement, the farmer then signs two copies of a cooperative agreement form which,
