Mr. Barry was a familiar figure around Wheeler before he became ill late last fall having worked in the AAA farm program, then with the Wheeler County Rural Health Service and later at the Holt Brothers-Lumber Co. Failing health caused his resignation from his position as bookkeeper at the lumber yard. Prior to moving to Wheeler, he had engaged in farming near Briscoe and prior to that he had been employed in farm and ranch activities the greater part of his life.

Funeral services for Mr. Barry were conducted from the Wheeler Baptist Church this morning (Thursday) at 10:30 a.m. with Rev. M. B. Smith, pastor, in charge assisted by Rev. Darris Egger, pastor of the Methodist Church and Rev. Gene Hudnall, pastor of the Nazarene Church here.

L. R. Barry was born in Bosque County, November 11, 1884 and passed away at his home in Wheeler, April 15, 1952, at the age of 67 years, 5 months and 4 days.

NEWS FROM— County Agent's Office

I don't know if it was the fault or the good work of the "rain makers", but Wheeler County certainly did enjoy the nice rains and we could use more of the same. The freeze hurt some of the remaining fruit crop, but I examined some peaches that will be okay. Those of you who have peaches left should realize that they will probably bring premium prices this year and it would be money well spent to spray those peaches for brown rot, scales, and worms. Use the following to control the above: orchard lime 4 lbs.; zinc sulfate 2 lbs.; wettable sulphur 3 lbs. lead arsenate 1 lb. per 50 gallons of water. Repeat 10-14 days later and again for the 3rd time 10-14 days after the second spray.

I feel very proud of the excellent job of dairy judging that Jerry Hays, Gene Haddock, Junior Haddock, and W. L. Williams did at Plainview last Saturday. They won first and will go to the State 4-H Roundup at College Station in June. These boys have worked hard and they were close to perfect last Saturday. Jerry Hays and Gene Haddock, dropped only 11 points as they judged six classes of Jerseys, Holsteins, Guernseys, Brown Swiss and Milking Shorthorns. Both the team and I regret that we could not compete for banners and medals at this contest, but we were in Extension District I and only teams from Extension II could compete for those awards.

The meeting of cotton farmers at the community building in Shamrock at 7:45 p.m. on April 24 will be very important. There will be two outstanding cotton experts at the meeting and they will discuss problems of insect control along with any questions that you may have. Sure would like to see a full house that night as I believe the information will be of help to you.

BOBBY GROVES KILLED IN BLAST AT ANDREWS

Funeral services for Bobby Groves, former Wheeler High School football star, were conducted from the First Methodist Church in Shamrock Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock with Rev. S. M. Dunnam, pastor in charge.

Groves was one of five employees of the Martinpool Gasoline Co. who were killed in an explosion at the company's gasoline plant at Andrews Monday morning. The other four men who were killed were Carl Gilmore, superintendent of the plant, Keeton Hensley, Dee Arnold and Dick Davis.

The plant was completely destroyed by the fire which followed the blast. The plant was located 16 miles west of Andrews and the blast was felt in Andrews.

The explosion resulted when one of seven tanks in a rack outside the plant containing butane and propane blew up. Too much pressure was reported to have caused one end of the tank to blow out.

Bobby Groves was born at Tishomingo, Okla. October 3, 1919 and died at Andrews April 14, 1952 at 6:00 p.m. of injuries received at 8:16 a.m. the same day. He lived at Magic City for many years until about three years ago and since that time has resided at McLean and Borger before moving to Andrews.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Nora Groves, a daughter, Bobby Lee, a son, Sebern Dell, his mother, Mrs. Minnie Groves, and a brother Douglas Groves. His mother and brother live at McLean.

Interment was in the Shamrock Cemetery with Richerson Funeral Home of Shamrock and Clayborn Funeral Home of McLean in charge of arrangements.

DAIRY JUDGING TEAMS WIN

Wheeler F.F.A. and Wheeler County 4-H Dairy Judging teams competed in the big Panhandle Plains Dairy Show held in Plainview last Saturday, April 12.

The F.F.A. team took first place with a score of 1,184 points compared to the Plainview team with 1,105 points. Bob Weatherly was 4th high man in top scoring individuals in the contest and received a medal.

The Wheeler County 4-H Dairy Judging team from Briscoe, which competed with four other teams of this district to go to Texas A & M in June to the State 4-H Dairy Judging contests, won first in this contest with a score of 950 out of a perfect 1050 and also won over nine other 4-H teams in the same contest. Jerry Hays of Briscoe was high point individual in this contest with a score of 324 out of 350 and Gene Haddock, of Briscoe, was second high individual out of 56 boys with a score of 322.

Thirty-two teams from all parts of the Panhandle and New Mexico were competing for top honors.

The judging contest consisted of six classes of dairy animals with questions on three classes. The animals judged were Holsteins, Jersey, Guernseys, Brown Swiss and Milking Shorthorn and one class of Jersey Heifers.

Editorial

LEE AND GRANT

In the month of April, 1865, General Robert E. Lee surrendered the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia to General Ulysses S. Grant, with a starving army, had evacuated Richmond and was moving South, when his retreat was cut off by General Phil Sheridan, on April 8th, and he decided

to surrender. He awaited a message from General Grant under an apple tree, about which there were later many legends.

A number of Union soldiers have professed to own souvenirs made from the wood of that tree, but George H. Bates, who was master of transportation in Grant's Army, discredited their claims. He said he was taking a wagon train of provisions to Lee's Army and on the way he saw a lot of Confederate soldiers hacking at the stump of the apple tree under which General Lee had stood. They told him they were seeking souvenirs of the surrender.

Mr. Bates dismounted from his wagon and cut a piece from the root of the tree and insited later that he was the only Northerner who had an authentic fragment. General Grant himself was not prepared for the surrender, and, in his own words, wrote an interesting summary of his meeting with General Lee. Said he:

"When I had left camp that morning, I had not expected so soon the result that was taking place and, consequently, was in rough garb, I was without a sword, as I usually was when on horseback on the field, and wore a soldier's blouse for a coat, with the shoulder straps of my rank to indicate to the Army who I was. When I went into the house (the McLean house), I found General Lee.

"We greeted each other and after shaking hands, took our seats. General Lee was dressed in full uniform, which was entirely new and was wearing a sword of considerable value—very likely the sword which had been presented to him by the State of Virginia; at all events, it was entirely different from one that would ordinarily be worn in the field. We soon fell into conversation about old army times. He remarked that he remembered me very well in the old army and I told him that as a matter of course, I remembered him perfectly."

General Grant goes on to tell of his decision to send most of his supplies to the starving men in Lee's Army, to allow Lee's men to retain their personally-owned horses and side-arms and relates other details. The two generals sat and talked of old times and their spirits, even in the heat of that war, are an example today—eighty-seven years later. Unfortunately, today, wars—such as that in Korea—are not fought between gentlemen.

Immediately following the ceremony the couple left for a weekend wedding trip.

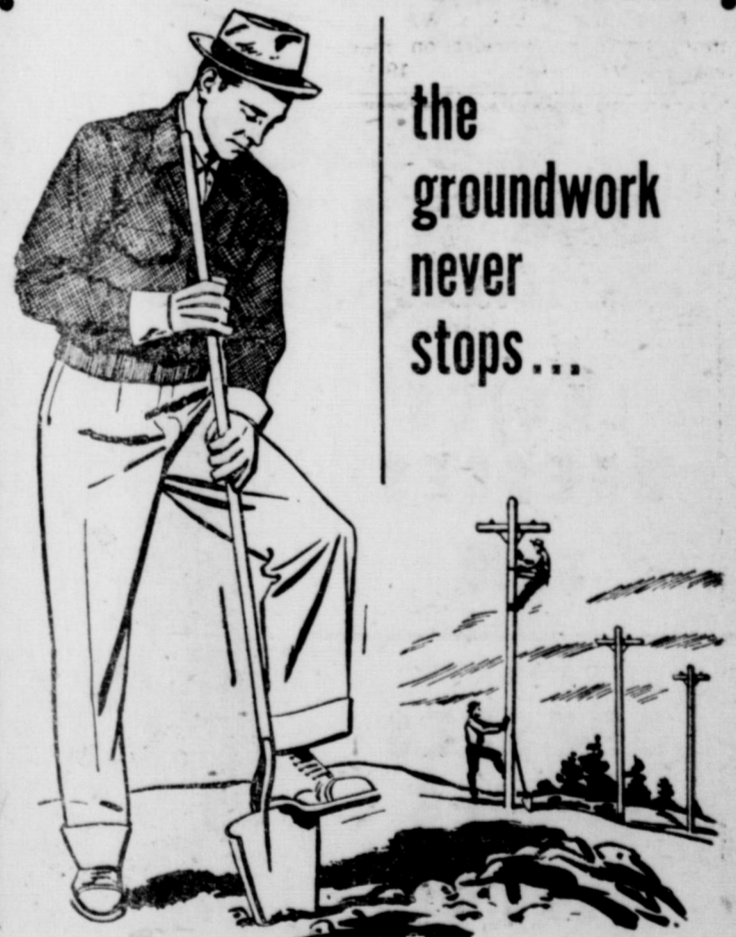
Mrs. Frye graduated from the Wheeler High School in 1950. She is now presently employed with

URGE FARMERS TO PLANT MORE GRAINS

The State Agricultural Mobilization Committee last week discussed the problem of getting more acres of feed grains planted. The situation was pointed up by figures recently released by the Crop Reporting Board of the USDA's Bureau of Agricultural Economics. These figures indicate that farmers' tentative planting plans for the nation will fall about nine million acres short of the 1952 goals for the principal feed grain crops. It was indicated that corn plantings alone would be more than five million acres below the goal level.

B. F. Vance, chairman of the State Committee, pointed out that Texas farmers have indicated they will plant about 92 percent of the state's corn goal and only about 83 percent of the grain sorghum goal.

In view of the large number of livestock and poultry on the farms and ranches of the state and na-

tion, Vance said such curtailments in feed grain production pose a real problem in maintaining these herds and flocks. Information received by the committee on the national situation points out that with current feeding rates and last season's short production, feed grain stocks may be as much as one-third less by harvest time than one year ago. If the presently indicated corn acreage produces average yields, the reserve above normal working stocks could be virtually exhausted during the next 18 months.

Without plentiful supplies of feed grains, it will not be possible to maintain the production of meat, eggs and milk that will be needed by our increasing population, says the committee. They urge farmers to re-examine their planting schedules and where possible, make every effort to increase materially their plantings of feed grain crops. The committee fully realizes the seriousness of the drought situation in Texas but at the same time suggests that farmers obtain planting seed or at least line up prospective seed supplies of grain crops for immediate planting should rains come.

They also urge farmers to use the best known methods of pro-

duction in order to save time and labor. The farm labor situation is expected to be tight especially during the harvest season. This is an item that farmers should consider before all planting is completed. Crops that can be machine produced and harvested may prove to be more profitable than those requiring lots of hand labor, believe the committee members. And they add, price supports have been announced for corn and grain sorghums.

They urge farmers who live in areas where fertilizers can be used to use them liberally to increase yields. And finally, they point out that local agency representatives are ready to assist farmers in every manner possible to help get more acres of feed grain crops planted.
