Editorial
SUMMER AND FLIES

With summer weather at hand it is a good time to think about the threat of the common house fly. In too many American towns and cities today citizens live among filth carried by flies and fail to realize that the house fly is one of the most deadly threats to health and happiness in America. It is true that the fly in the United States has been more nearly controlled than in any other country in the world. It is true, however, that consumers must still buy their food, in many areas, in stores where edibles are displayed on an open counter and with-

out any protection whatsoever from the filth of flies. Medical science has still not discovered all of the diseases transmitted by the common house fly, but the list of serious diseases so transmitted is very long. The Rockefeller Foundation recently discovered, in Egypt, that even though clean water and sewage disposal were provided on sanitary standards this had little effect on the tremendous disease rate as long as fly control was not effected. The Rockefeller Foundation was able to reduce the infant death rate in Egypt from three hundred per one thousand live births to one hundred per one thousand live births through control of the Egyptian house fly.

The heart breaking-part of the story is that the chemicals used in the battle are now inadequate because the fly has developed an immunity to these drugs. The Foundation sadly announces that the death rate has now climbed back to the high rate which was normal before the fly-control program was begun.

Though the problem is not as serious in the United States as it is in Egypt and most other countries of the world, Americans who are tolerant towards the ordinary house fly and who make little effort to keep down the number of flies in their community, must be impressed with the urgent need to control these pests. Those merchants who do not protect food from flies should not be patronized. The battle against the fly is a battle of life and death between you, your friends and family, and that filthy germ transmitter, which too often ends in death for human beings.

STAYING ALIVE

With the peak of the travel season near at hand, this is a proper time to remind readers that vacations are enjoyed most when the vacationers return home alive. Each year thousands of Americans start out enthusiastically on summer vacations and never return to their homes, having become victims of their own carelessness or some other drivers' carelessness on the highway. This is one of the great tragedies in the American scene and the death toll resulting must somehow be cut down. The annual death rate on the highways exceeds the rate in Korea.

Before leaving on your 1952 vacation, it is suggested that you determine not to hurry, even though your time may be limited. Haste, carelessness, and defective automobiles cause most highway tragedies. If you will practice patience and courtesy on the highway, carefulness, and be sure your car is mechanically sound, chances are you will return from this year's vacation sound and refreshed.

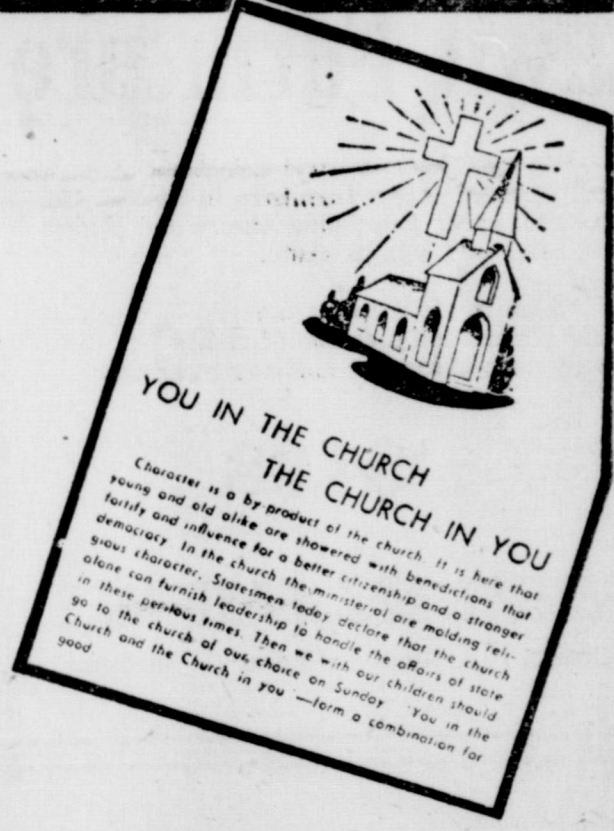
STRONG HAND of the LAW
