E. T. COSPER LAID TO REST HERE TUESDAY

E. T. Cosper, a Wheeler County resident for 40 years, passed away at Wichita Falls, June 22, 1952 at the age of 80 years and 20 days. He was born in Shelby County, Alabama, June 2, 1872.

Funeral services were held here at the Methodist Church on Tuesday afternoon, June 24, at 3:30 p.m. with Rev. J. Edwin Kirby officiating, assisted by J. Waid Griffin, pastor of the Wheeler Methodist Church.

Mr. Cosper was a member of the Methodist Church. He took a leading part in organizing the Wheeler Masonic Lodge, being third worshipful master.

Survivors are only one son, Bill Cosper, of Wheeler, who was adopted in 1928, three grandchildren and a few other distant relatives. He was preceded in death by three children who died in infancy and one son who passed away at nine years of age and his wife passed away in 1938.

Masonic services were held at the graveside with about thirty masons attending.

Palbearers were brother masons and included: Harvey Wright, Albert Thomas, Arnold Jones, Archie Hibler, Grainger McIlhany and J. C. Howell.

Interment was in the family plot located in the Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Kirk-Mason Funeral Home.



SEN. HAZLEWOOD ANNOUNCES CAMPAIGN PLANS

State Senator Grady Hazlewood announced plans for his campaign for re-election and pointed out some of his accomplishments as a state senator this week in the article which follows:

At this critical time it is important that the people know the political theories of men who aspire to public office. We must return to Lincoln's philosophy of a government of the people, by the people, and for the people, which is dangerously approaching a government of the politicians, by the politicians, and for the politicians. I shall report to the people on my tenure in office through this newspaper and the radio in the next few weeks.

When I went to the Senate illiteracy in Texas was almost 33% above the national average and our school system was as low as 37th among the states. Our rural school teachers' salaries averaged only \$75.00 per month which we raised to a \$2000.00 per year minimum. We now spend approximately 30% more on education than the average of the states, and Texas has come from 37th place up to approximately 18th place in the national rating.

Our insane asylums were classed by the national association of hospitals as the worst in the nation. At the special session two years ago adequate appropriations were made to remove our insane and mentally ill from inhuman physical surroundings and environmental places of decency where mental improvement is to be expected.

We have increased old age benefits from an average of \$9.00 per recipient per month to the present average of approximately \$34.00 per month. I was the author of the present law which permits recipients of old age pensions to earn \$250.00 per year without having the same deducted from their pensions. However, the federal administration partially struck down the effects of this bill.

We appropriated money for our penitentiary system in order to separate first offenders from habitual criminals and moral perverts.

However, I think our increased spending has been wise and reasonable. Much increased spending was forced on us because of the great increases in the inflationary trends of our national government. We had no other course. But, in spite of our increased spending, we have never been close to voting a sales tax nor a state income tax. We are one of six states in the 48 that has neither a sales tax nor a state income tax, and we shall never have either one as long as I am a member of the Senate, if I can help it. Neither does Texas have a state ad valorem tax. The taxpayers will be interested to know that Texas spends 20% less per capita on state government than the national average. Our tax levies are 25% less than the average of any other state. At the same time, the average other state has three times the per capita debt as Texas. In fact, we have no debt and we pay as we go. We must have efficiency and economy in government—nothing is more important—but we have to invest in those things enumerated above for the good of everyone.

Two attempts have been made to take away the gasoline tax refund to farmers, which I opposed on both occasions, and, on one occasion, I was chairman of the subcommittee that killed it. I lent every effort to the defeat of the (Continued on last page)

BATTLE PLANNED AGAINST POLIO

A long-range battle plan against rampaging polio was outlined Wednesday by the State Department of Health.

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox recommended these eight points of action in combatting the disease which this year is striking harder at Texas than at any other part of the nation:

1. Spot spray insect breeding places after they have been cleaned up and destroyed. Spraying indiscriminately might kill a few insects on the wing, but it won't do the job. It might kill valuable plants and create a false sense of security.
2. Get rid of animal shelters in urban areas. They cannot be kept clean and consequently create a health hazard as fly breeders.
3. Get rid of dump piles, tin cans, old tires, and accumulated debris which breed flies and mosquitoes and provide harborage for rats.
4. Provide a properly operated sewerage system, and get rid of all surface toilets. Dr. Cox believes surface toilets constitute one of the major health hazards facing Texas.
5. Provide a source of pure water.
6. Protect food supplies in wholesale business houses, retail shops, and in private homes.
7. Make regular inspections of all premises to see that no possibility exists for fly breeding. If you have flies, somebody is maintaining a breeding spot.
8. Garbage should be placed in fly tight garbage cans until time of disposal. Tubs, boxes, idlers garbage cans, etc., are of no value.

He urged each home owner to assume responsibility for keeping his property clean inside and out. This will help protect you and your neighbor. More people have been struck down by polio this year than ever before.

He said it takes months and months to clean up a city, and it "takes forever to keep it that (Continued on Last Page)

Editorial

THE GOP IN THE SOUTH

The Republican situation in the South has recently come to light in several state struggles for control of the state Republican Party concerned. The Republican Party in many Southern States has long been a mere shell of former office-holders and others interested in becoming office-holders if the Republicans are elected.

Without attempting to moralize on the Republican fight in Louisiana and Texas recently, about which there have been widespread charges of Old Guard routing of the will of the majority, it is enough to say that the long-term working of democracy will best be served if a majority of Republicans in each state control the actions of the Republican machinery in each state.

Of course, some of the Republicans in control in some states claim that erstwhile Democrats have invaded the Republican organization in an effort to take over for General Dwight D. Eisenhower. This claim is discounted by some of General Eisenhower's supporters, who charge that Senator Robert Taft's forces have exerted control of the selection of delegates in some states even though they expressed minority sentiment within the Republican Party in those states.

The issue might finally be settled at the Republican Convention, when the National Committee will be called upon to make a decision as to which group of delegates will be seated from about seven Southern States.

The Credentials Committee and also the full Republican Convention might eventually get into the battle. Despite the outcome of this fight, it is interesting to see activity in Republican ranks in these Southern States and a continuation of such interest will bring the South a two-party system which must eventually become a reality in our Democratic form of government.

PERPETUAL MOTION?

Commander Ivan Monk, of the Navy's Bureau of Ships, has obtained a patent for a rotary engine, powered by atmospheric energy. It will run for years without fuel and requires only a small amount of water to operate. The engine draws its power from differences in temperature.

Sealed within the engine is a liquid with a low boiling point that alternately condenses (in a cylinder cooled by evaporation of water from a wick) and vaporizes (in a hollow wheel).

The uneven distribution of liquid in the spokes causes the wheel to turn.

Commander Monk kept a gadget like this in operation on his desk for over a year and now he is convinced that it might operate for many years at a time, as long as there is water. That is, perhaps, the nearest approach to perpetual motion yet developed by man, although the naval officer's gadget is of little practical use.

HAMMOND URGES SAFETY ON TEXAS RANCHES

J. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, chosen for a second term as chairman of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Committee at a meeting of the body in Waco on May 29, emphasized that "safety is everybody's business" and that most accidents are preventable. Apart from electing officers and committee chairmen for the year ahead the major objective of the meeting was to consider ways and means of making rural Texans more safety conscious.

E. C. Martin, state agricultural leader of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was re-elected secretary and Dr. F. C. Bolton, president emeritus of Texas A. and M. College, the youth training committee, while Arthur Loesch, master of the State Grange, will head a new committee on membership. Other committee chairmen include C. G. Sprague, associate editor, Progressive Farmer, publisher; Marvin Carter, organization director, TFBF, finance; John G. McHane, Extension Service, statistics; and Cal T. Johnson, Secretary, Roebuck Foundation, awards. The

Texas Home Demonstration Association will name a chairman for the women's activity committee. Committee members will be added by the respective chairmen and other interested groups will be invited to join the States Committee in their campaign to reduce farm and home accidents.

Plans were made for the observance of Farm Safety Week—July 20-26, but Chairman Hammond cautioned that every week must be safety week if accidents are to be prevented. He cited figures to show what happened last year when farm tractors were operated on highways after dark without proper lights. Reports on 19 accidents in the nation involving tractors and motor vehicles show that 15 farmers and one motorist were killed. These accidents could have been prevented had the tractors been properly lighted and operated, said Hammond.

Martin pointed out that farm labor is expected to be in short supply during the year and more than ever before the farm family must fill the gap. A serious farm or home accident could take from the family a laborer badly needed to produce and harvest the crops needed at this time. He, therefore, urges all farm families to plan together in starting program on the farm and in the home. He stated that last year in the United States farm accidents caused a loss in man days equal to all of the labor needed to produce and harvest the nation's wheat crop.

Such economic losses are terrific, he adds, but they in no way reflect the great hardships that are thrust upon the families as a result of accidents. In many instances, a serious accident may be the item that will determine whether the farm business is operated at a profit or loss for the year. Good farm or ranch management, he adds, certainly includes safety and that means teaching and using practices which are safe.

The Committee urges all families to remove from their homes and farms or ranches accident hazards and to join with their neighbors in a safety program that will make rural Texas a safer and more enjoyable place in which to live.

The next time we go to the theatre and one of those cute ushers asks us how far down we want to sit, we're going to up and tell her "All the way!"

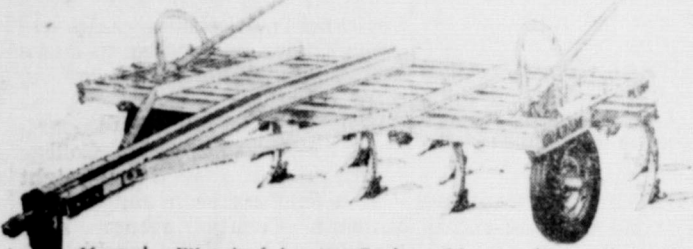

RANCHERS ARE CONDUCTING FORAGE DEMOS

Ranch operators by conducting demonstrations on their own ranches are finding that balancing range forage production and livestock numbers is a paying proposition. A. H. Walker, range specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says the results of 4,746 demonstrations conducted by adults and 4-H members are an indication of what can be done to improve the forage production of Texas rangelands.

Last year 737 stocking rate demonstrations were conducted in 111 counties. Many of these demonstrators, says Walker, are finding if they run only about three-fourths as many breeding stock as they think their range will carry, then fill the gap with steers or heifers in the good years, they make more money in the long run. The lower stocking rate

means less investment in breeding stock, little or no winter feeding and makes possible the use of practices that will increase range forage production.

He cites as an example a McMullen county demonstration in 1949. Clifton Wheeler, Jr. of Tilden cut 1,250 acres of rangeland that was stocked with 100 mother cows. That year 60 calves were produced and at selling time they averaged 300 pounds each—18,000 pounds of beef. In 1950 the stocking rate was dropped to 65 cows. This raised the number of acres for each cow from 12.5 to 20. The calf crop rose from 60 to 95.2 percent or 62 calves from the 65 cows. These calves averaged 425 pounds each at selling time and 26,350 pounds of beef were sold. In 1951, because of the drought, 74 cows were pastured and

the calf crop dropped to 87.8 percent. Their average weight, several months before the end of the demonstration period, was 340 pounds.

Ranchman Wheeler reports that over-stocking results in smaller calf crops, less beef from the same acreage, lower prices for the calves because of condition at marketing time, a ruined turf and poor conditioned breeding cattle most of the year. This pasture, despite the severe drought, remained in fair condition during the year.

Proper stocking demonstrations are but one phase of the coordinated range management program. A final tabulation of reports from county agricultural agents show that 968,825 acres of rangeland were involved in deferred or rotation grazing demon-

4-H club boys in 111 counties received training in plant or grass identification; 39 range demonstration teams were trained and 177 boys completed range management demonstrations.

Walker says county agents used many different teaching methods in conducting range improvement programs in the counties. Meetings held on the demonstration ranches were well attended as were the field days and tours. Personnel from other agencies and organizations cooperated to make the county and state programs more effective.

The Range and Forestry Department of Texas A. & M. College conducted for the fifth straight year a field course in range management. County agents and teachers of vocational agriculture were enrolled. Training received in these "schools on wheels" has been used by the agents in conducting the range improvement demonstrations in the counties.

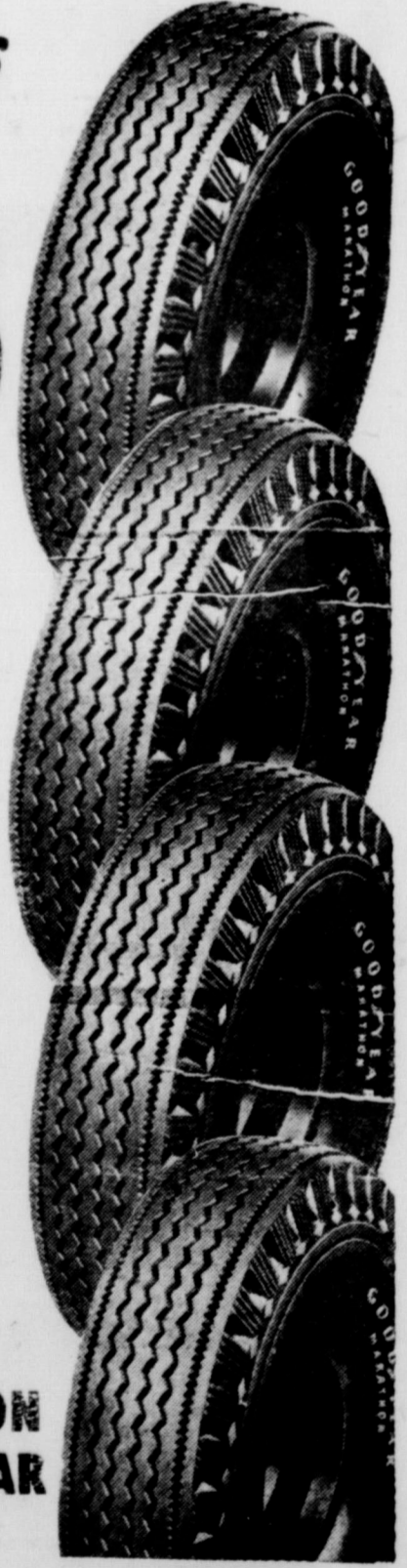

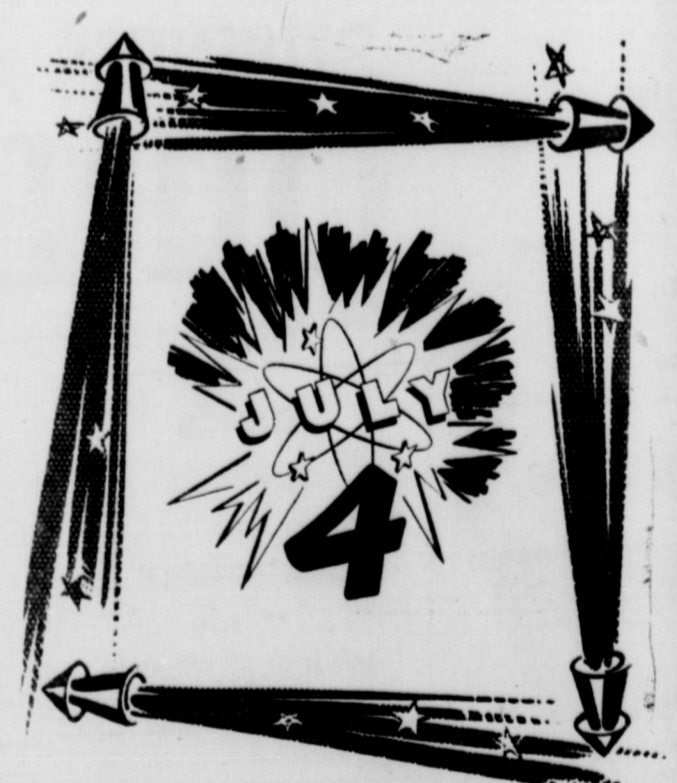

1/4 teaspoon almond flavoring. Place cherries in a saucepan, add water and the 1/2 cup sugar. Bring to a boil and cook covered, 5 to 8 minutes or until cherries are just tender.

Sift flour, baking powder, the 3 tablespoons sugar, salt, and nutmeg together in a small bowl. Combine remaining ingredients. Stir into flour mixture and mix lightly. Drop by tablespoons into the boiling cherries. Simmer, covered, about 12 minutes. Serve with whipped cream, if desired. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Besides being used in season while fresh, cherries may be canned or frozen. Try selecting a few choice clusters of fresh cherries, and place on a tray in the home freezer. FRESH FRUITS IN THE DIET

Now that we all agree that summer is really here, there is a desire for the natural goodness of summer fruits. They may be used as appetizers, main course salad or dessert. When used as a garnish fresh fruits make a meal look like a picture.

Fresh berries, cherries and cantaloupe are the leading fresh fruits of the season and are particularly important for ascorbic acid (vitamin C) which is an essential substance in cementing between cells to hold them together and in orderly arrangement. It is important for strong blood vessels, hard teeth and bones and firm muscles. Scurvy, a disease characterized by loose teeth, sore and bleeding gums, and sore, stiff joints, develops when the diet contains very little vitamin C.

In some communities of the county there seems to be lots of berries. In others cherries are grown.

Most of you have eaten apple dumplings, but have you ever tried cherry dumplings?

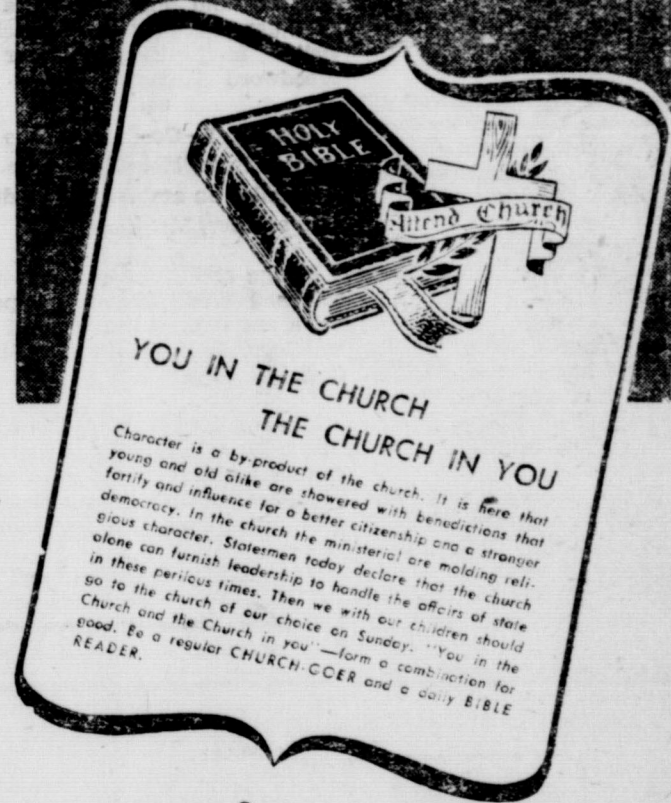
From the twelfth century children have been learning to repeat this prayer of faith. Back of that are the other centuries when families quoted the 121st Psalm from which it was doubtless taken...

water bill that would have made it necessary for every Panhandle irrigation farmer to have hired a lawyer for the purpose of obtaining permits in Austin in order to use water for irrigation purposes. I voted against the whole departmental appropriation bill this last session because of certain bureaucratic riders that delegated power and authority to individuals who were totally ignorant of the responsibilities given them. These riders have hampered soil conser-

vation work and crippled the efficiency of other governmental agencies. I was the author of the gas bill providing for the use of sweet gas in the manufacture of carbon black where the well owner had no sale or outlet for his gas. This has already increased the price of that gas 33%. I was the author of the minimum price bill for gas, which would give the farmers, ranchmen, and royalty owners a decent price for their gas. I was also the author of Senate Bill No. 240 in behalf of the Texas service station which passed the legislature, as well as the bill which exempted all veterans of the last war from the payment of tuition in our higher state educational institutions.

My legislative record is much too long to set out here and I again invite the people of my district to listen to my reports over

the radio from time to time, and, if elected, I pledge the same legislative performance as I have in the past.

Although I have a law office in Amarillo, I live on and operate an irrigated dairy farm in Randall County, north of Canyon, which makes it difficult for me to see and visit the people. However, I do expect to get around as much as I can, and I certainly will appreciate the vote and support of everyone.

way." The program must be continuous. "It will take from one to five years to really clean up our larger cities," Cox said.

"This is the same program we have followed and published for

the past ten years. People have got to get over the notion that spraying alone will keep their city fly-free," Dr. Cox declared. "The only way to kill flies is to do it methodically, block by block, by eliminating their breeding places."

"They carry many diseases—diarrhea, typhoid fever, cholera, trachoma, just to mention a few. I firmly believe that if this 8-point program is invoked, we'll see a lessening of polio incidence in the future."

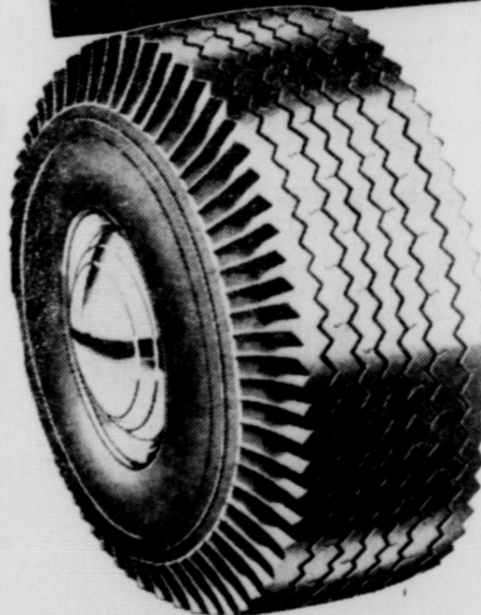

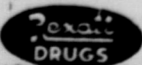
