## Wheeler Whisperings

The fans really got on us at a ball game Tuesday night when we attempted to show one of the high school boys how to pitch according to the rules as stated in the "Official Softball Rules" for 1952. We weren't trying to harm the boy or his team's chances, but we do believe that he or anyone else who plays the game should play according to the rules.

The Kiwanis Club built the softball field and lighted it so that young people might have something to do during the summer months that they would enjoy and something that would be worthwhile to them and is endeavoring to help them, and we, as a member of the Kiwanis Club and a manager of one of the other teams in the league, were only trying to help.

For the benefit of players who have not had access to an "Official Softball Rules" book and for the benefit of fans who are interested, we are reprinting herewith Rule 9—Pitching Rule:

Sec. 1. Preliminary to pitching, the pitcher shall come to a full stop, facing the batsman, (with both shoulders in line with first and third base, with the ball held in both hands in front of the body, and with both feet squarely on the ground and in contact with the pitcher's plate, for not less than one second before taking one hand off the ball at the start of the wind-up or back-swing.)

Note—The body, feet, arms and hands must come to a full and complete stop at the same time before taking one hand off the ball at the start of the wind-up or back-swing.

Sec. 2. The pitcher shall not be considered in pitching position unless the catcher is in position to receive the pitch.

Sec. 3. In the act of delivering the ball to the batsman the pitcher shall not take more than one step, which must be forward and toward the batsman. The step must be taken simultaneously with the delivery of the ball to the batsman.

Note—The pitch starts when one hand is taken off the ball. The pitch is completed with a forward swing of the pitching arm and a step toward the batsman.

Sec. 4. A legal delivery shall be a ball which is delivered to the batter underhand and with a follow through of the hand and wrist past the straight line of the body before the ball is released. The pitcher may use any windup he desires providing that in the final delivery of the ball to the batter, the hand shall be below the hip and the wrist not farther from the body than the elbow.

Sec. 5. At no time during the progress of the game shall the pitcher be allowed to use tape, or other substance, upon the pitching hand or fingers; nor shall any foreign substance be applied to the ball, provided that, under the

#### LIVING IN YOUR HOME TOWN

In a recent issue of the Rotarian, Arthur Gordon has some advice for young people who feel cramped at home and who yearn to plant their flags along new frontiers. In his article "Stay Put, Young Man," Mr. Gordon points out that when a young man, he feels that he made a mistake in leaving his home community.

The brighter financial prospects, if any, are not worth the emotional strain, social dislocation and diminished opportunities for service that breaking new ground usually

entails." He observed that "the real opportunities were precisely the poverty and apathy and wasted human resources that I was running away from."

While it is certainly true that any young man who plans to conduct a symphony or discover a cure for cancer will have to move from Wheeler, the average person who wants to be a good doctor, dentist, merchant, or lawyer will find that he will function best in the general vicinity of his home town. . . in the vicinity that he knows best and among the people he knows best.

## DEADLINE FOR INSPECTION OF VEHICLES NEAR

Not more than 25 per cent of the motor vehicles in Wheeler County have been inspected under the new Motor Vehicle Inspection Law.

That is the estimate of Alan Johnson, Captain of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, Amarillo District, Department of Public Safety.

The per cent of vehicles inspected runs higher in the larger cities. Johnson said he reminded local residents of the following licensed inspection stations in Wheeler County:

Shamrock: Tadal Buick Co., J. C. Daniels Mercury Agency, Montgomery Chevrolet and Holmes Motor Co.

Wheeler: Ware Chevrolet, Nash Appliance, Perry's Garage and Thomas Garage.

Mobeetie: Simpson's Garage.

In stressing the importance of the inspection, Mr. Johnson stated:

"There are over 77,000 people killed on our streets and highways in the United States every year. Nearly 2,000,000 people are injured on our streets and highways every year."

"Let's compare these casualties with our United States Army. An infantry division is composed of approximately 18,000 men. With 27,000 people killed every year, this would mean that two entire infantry divisions would be annihilated every year. With 2,000,000 people injured every year, this would mean that the entire personnel of 111 divisions are injured every year. In war it is extremely doubtful if our country could withstand such casualties as these every year."

"In Texas alone last year we killed 2,546 people, injured 70,000 more and suffered an economic loss of 98 million dollars."

"This is a deplorable situation and is the reason why the 52nd legislature passed HB 223 which requires every vehicle registered in the state of Texas, excepting small trailers, be safety inspected at least once a year. The first year of this inspection program will be over on September 6 — which is the deadline for the first inspection."

"It is not contended that the inspection law is a cure-all to our traffic problem, but we do believe the inspection program will reduce accidents to a certain extent."

"Accident records reflect that 13 percent of fatal and personal injury accidents are caused by motor vehicle defects. If the state of Texas can do as well with an inspection program as some of the other states, this 13 percent can be reduced to 2 1/2 percent — a saving of over 10 percent. Ten percent of 2,546 would be a saving of 254 lives."

"Here is a good indication that we should have an inspection program. In states requiring vehicle inspections, the death rate per hundred million vehicle miles traveled is 6.4 deaths. In states not requiring vehicle inspections, the death rate per hundred million vehicle miles traveled is 12.8 deaths. This is 1.4 deaths higher than in states requiring motor vehicle inspections."

"Basically there are three causes of automobile accidents. These are faults of the driver, faults in the roadway and faults in the vehicle itself."

"Sandy everyone will agree that motor vehicle inspections have a place in our over-all traffic control program along with education, enforcement, engineering and driver's license."

"The biggest objection to an inspection program is that it gives the garage owner too much of an opportunity to gouge the public. Actually there is no opportunity at all. Each inspection station has been thoroughly instructed to make no repairs or adjustments unless they have been authorized by the owner. The owner of an automobile is under no obligation to the inspection station other than paying \$1.00 for the inspection. If any defects are disclosed, he may take it anywhere he chooses for repair or he may do the work himself."

"There is nothing hard about this inspection. Here are the details:

1. Motor number - obtained off the block or frame merely to identify the vehicle as having been inspected.

2. Brakes (foot brakes only) checked for two things only - stopping distance and equalization.

3. Headlights - both high and low beam must burn and they must be aimed properly. Minimum candle-power of 3500.

4. Tail-lights - one is sufficient. May be either on right or left side.

5. Stop-lights - required on passenger cars from 1948 models on up. 1947 models on down are not required. All trucks and pickups are required to have a stoplight.

6. Horn - checked for audible signal only.

7. Steering - must be in reasonably safe condition.

8. Wheel alignment - toe-in only.

9. Windshields - inspected to see if the vision of the driver is seriously affected. Vehicles not having any windshields are not rejected.

10. Windshield wiper - inspected only if the vehicle is equipped. If equipped, the wiper on drivers side must be working. Manually operated wipers are permissible.

11. Rear view mirrors - inspected only on commercial motor vehicles.

12. Muffler and exhaust system - inspected for serious leaks and straight pipe. Smithy mufflers are not cause for rejection.

13. Signal devices - are inspected on commercial motor vehicles where the body or load extends more than 24" to the left of the center of steering wheel or where the hand and arm signal cannot be seen.

14. Clearance lights and reflectors - are inspected on commercial motor vehicles.

**LEGAL NOTICE**

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20, proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952 at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon for signature using voting machines the said machines shall provide for the following:

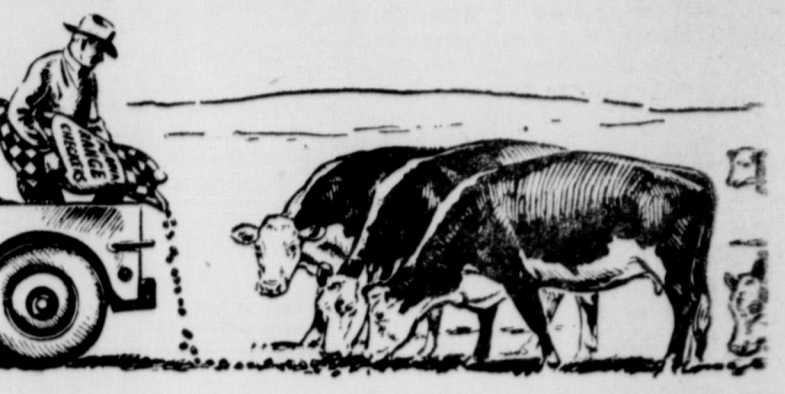
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

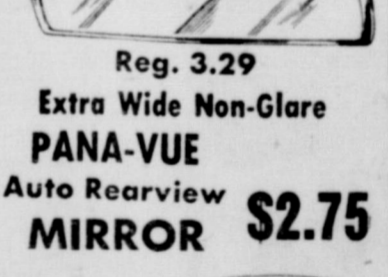
