## Wheeler Whisperings

We left town last Friday afternoon shortly before five o'clock and returned Monday morning to learn that shortly after we left a hail storm hit town and during this hail storm Thomas Daugherty and Mrs. C. B. Kirk had the misfortune of having an auto mishap at the corner of main and sixth streets right at the height of the hail storm as both were rushing home to get their vehicles out of the hail. We understand that neither Mr. Daugherty nor Mrs. Kirk were seriously injured; however, this is the second mishap which has occurred at an intersection right here in town within the past few weeks and calls our attention to the fact that some- thing should be done about the traffic regulations, markers placed at intersections or something done that would help to make driving in Wheeler less hazardous.

We received word today in a round-about way that Rebecca Jo, small daughter of Jack and Nellie Crout, who lived here until last fall, has been stricken with polio and was confined to the hospital in Houston for three weeks. Mrs. I. Q. Sewell who wrote us concerning little Rebecca Jo's condition states, however, that the little lady has now been released from the hospital, but is paralyzed in her left leg and her left hip is weak. Nellie informed her though that there are still live muscles in the leg and there is a lot of hope that she will not be permanently crippled from the attack. We certainly hope that the little lady recovers completely and is not permanently crippled from the attack.

To the softball fans and players who are interested; here is Rule 10—Illegal pitches which were promulgated last week would appear in this week's edition of the Times: An illegal pitch, entitling the base-runners to advance one base, shall be called by the umpire as follows: and in each of the cases cited a ball shall also be called in favor of the batsman:

1. Any delivery of the ball to the batsman without previously taking position as defined in Sec. 1 and 2, Rule 9.
2. If the pitcher takes more than one step before releasing the ball.
3. Final delivery of the ball to the batsman with the hand above the hip; and the wrist of the pitching arm farther from the body than the elbow. Sec. 4, Rule 9.
4. Failure to follow through with the hand and wrist past the straight line of the body. Sec. 4, Rule 9.
5. Rolling the ball along the ground or dropping the ball, by the pitcher while the pitcher is in pitching position. Sec. 3, Rule 12.

Note—A distinction must be made between a deliberate attempt to prevent the batter hitting the ball, and a poorly executed legal delivery. An illegal pitch is not called under this section unless, in the opinion of the umpire, the ball was rolled, dropped, or bounced to prevent the batter from striking it.

6. Holding the ball by the pitcher more than 20 seconds.

7. Making any motion to pitch without immediately delivering the ball to the batsman.

Note—This bars the so-called "rocker" action of a pitcher who, after having the ball in both hands in pitching position, separates the hands making a backward and forward swing of the pitching arm bringing the ball again into both hands in front of the body, or any type of wind-up in which there is a stop or reversal of the forward motion. This also bars more than one revolution in the so-called "wind-mill pitch." This does not bar a wind-up in which the motion of the pitching arm is continuous even though the hand taken off the ball may again touch and travel with the ball in the course of such wind-up.

8. Delivery of the ball to the batsman when the catcher is outside the lines of the catcher's position as defined in Rule 3, Sec. 6, Rule 28.

9. If the pitcher continues to wind-up after taking the step, before releasing the ball or continues to wind up after releasing the ball.

10. If the pitcher takes pitching position on or near the pitcher's plate without having the ball in spirit.

Mrs. J. A. Montgomery, mother of Arval Montgomery one of the co-publishers of the Wheeler Times, passed away at her home at Shamrock at 2:30 a.m. Wednesday. She had been ill for several weeks but her death came suddenly.

Funeral services for Mrs. Montgomery are to be held at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon (Thursday) at the First Baptist Church in Shamrock. Rev. James O. Todd, pastor, will be in charge, assisted by Rev. Frank Beauchamp, pastor of the First Methodist Church. Interment will be in the Shamrock Cemetery under the direction of Clay Funeral Home. Pall bearers will be grandsons and grandsons-in-law: Calvin Montgomery, Bill Joe Montgomery, Harlan Pool, Troy Pool, Ralph Wells, Kenneth Rascoe, Melvin Wall and Marvin Montgomery.

Mrs. Montgomery passed away suddenly at 2:30 o'clock Wednesday morning as a result of a heart attack, at her home 1106 North Kentucky, Shamrock. She had been ill for several weeks but her condition was not considered critical, and she had talked of going to Amarillo Wednesday on the advice of her physician, to consult an eye specialist. She was 74 years old.

The mother of six children, the grandmother of 11, and the great grandmother of 19, Mrs. Montgomery's life revolved around her family. Her devotion to her husband and children was so deep she insisted on ministering to their happiness even after her own health was failing. She lived a Christian life, filled with unselfish service to all those about her.

Mrs. Montgomery's maiden name was Willie Ann Flanagan. She was born on February 28, 1878, in Lawrence County, Alabama, and married J. A. Montgomery on April 14, 1895, in the county of her birth. The young couple moved to Wise County, Texas, a few months later, and then moved to Indian Territory in November, 1899, residing near Comanche, in Stephens County, most of the time until September, 1915, when they moved back to Texas, settling in Hall County.

Mr. and Mrs. Montgomery moved their family to Wheeler County in January, 1917, residing on a farm in the Twitty Community for almost 30 years. They moved to Shamrock in 1946 when their health started failing.

Mrs. Montgomery joined the Baptist Church in 1895 and her membership was in the Twitty Baptist Church at the time of her death.

She is survived by her husband, J. A. Montgomery, one daughter, Mrs. Barney (Alma) Pool; five sons, Tom, Claude, and Arval of Shamrock; Harry of Phoenix, Ariz.; and Herschel of Dallas; two brothers, W. R. Flanagan of Dennis, Miss., and Jim Flanagan of Town Creek, Ala.; 11 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren.

## SCOUTS TO HAVE SPORTS MEET

Over fifty Boy Scouts and Explorers from the Units in the Southern District, Adobe Walls Council, are expected to meet at Shamrock this Friday and Saturday, August 15-16, to compete in a Sports Meet, Marshall Adams, Chairman of the Meet announced this week.

The meet will start at 2:00 p.m. Friday, with the Rifle and Archery events for Boy Scouts and Explorers. The Swim Meet will be held Saturday afternoon at the Shamrock Municipal Pool starting at 2:30 p.m.

Boy Scouts will shoot from 20, 30, and 40 yards in the archery events, while the Explorers will shoot from 30, 40, and 50 yards. This event will be under the direction of the Magic City Archery Club.

Murry Tinsley and members of the Shamrock Rifle Club will be in charge of the Boy Scout and Explorer rifle events. Boy Scouts will fire from 50 feet, while the Explorers will fire from 50 yards.

Events to be held in the Swim Meet, for both Boy Scouts and Explorers will include: Freestyle, Back Stroke, Side Stroke, Breast Stroke, Medley Relay, and a Stunt Relay. Boy Scout diving will be from the low board, and each competitor will do three dives for the judges—a plain front, a back, and a swan dive. Explorer diving will be from the high (3-meter) board, and each contestant will do five different dives. Four of these dives must be chosen from a given list, and the fifth may be any recognized dive chosen by the contestant.

Mrs. Carver was 72 years old. A native of Morgansville, Ala., she had been a resident of Wheeler County since 1907. She was the widow of J. R. Carver, who died in January of 1949.

**NEW CARS FOR 1953**

Reports from Detroit indicate that the automobile industry is getting customer-conscious and will make a strong bid to attract buyers in 1953. It is beginning to look as if the big automobile producers will make more changes in next year's models than in any year since the end of World War II.

Chrysler is expected to put its new cars on the market in October and it is understood that there are major changes in the body designs of all four: Plymouth, Dodge, DeSoto and Chrysler. Dodge is expected to come out with a new V-8 type engine, 140 horsepower.

General Motors is offering air-conditioning units in the new Cadillacs and Oldsmobiles. Both Buick and Chevrolets are expected to change to the V-8 type engine.

Ford expects to introduce new cars in November. While extensive body changes are not expected for the new Lincoln, Mercury and Fords, the Mercurys and Fords may have new and more powerful engines.

Hudson expects to offer a new body and also a new car in the light, six-cylinder field. Studebaker bodies are to be re-designed completely. Packard is offering power-steering and power-brakes.

In other words, it looks as though there will be plenty of competition as the 1953 season approaches. The accent, which has been on power in recent years, is turning toward comfort and the prospects are that there will be plenty of cars to go around.

**OUR WIDENED OUTLOOK**

There was a time, not very long ago, when the people of Wheeler County were not much interested in what happened outside of the United States and, if you go back some years, there was a time when nothing much mattered except what happened within gun-shot range of their homes.

Times have changed and with them, the outlook of our people. Whether we like it or not, we cannot remain insensible to what happens in the world, because the economic consequences are felt in the sale of our products and the state of our business.

The development of rapid transportation through the means of the automobile and the airplane, has done much to widen our outlook. The dissemination of news, through the newspapers, the radio and television, has heightened our interest in the happenings beyond our local borders. Today, as never before, there are well-informed people every hamlet and crossroads in the United States.

This does not mean, of course, that, as a people, we have what one might call an intelligent, world viewpoint. Our thinking, expressed in national action, often continues to be local. There is a vast number of people who believe that the United States is not yet a part of the big world in which they and so many other people live. Yet, there are signs that a new understanding is becoming manifest.

Despite what some people say, most of us want to do the right thing, even though we don't do it.

You can always get somebody to agree with you if you say what he likes to hear.

**LEGAL NOTICE**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20**

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electors; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held on the Tuesday day after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon for in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamations for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**THE CANNING SEASON**

Prices never go up on the food you can today. August is the month when homemakers are canning the surplus garden produce for later use. These homemakers are eager for the latest methods to safeguard the results of their canning efforts. As in any undertaking, the first step in canning is to get ready. To get ready to can do these things:

1. Check gauge on your pressure canner for accuracy. Your home agent has the master gauge for testing.  
 Run a pipe cleaner in channel to make sure there is no obstruction. Check indicator to see that it rests against pin and arrow points to zero.
2. Examine jars and covers to make sure they have no nicks and cracks and are in perfect condition.
3. Check rest of equipment as knives, tongs, etc. Then above all gather the food when it is at its best.

Successful canning is based on an understanding of the important causes for rapid spoilage of fresh foods and on methods of preventing same. Two agents that cause food spoilage are enzymes and micro-organisms, including bacteria, yeasts and molds.

To prevent undesirable changes due to enzymes, fruits and vegetables should be canned as soon as possible after they are gathered. Two hours from garden to can is a good rule.

The second and more important cause of food spoilage is the action of the minute organisms present in air, soil, and water, in fact on everything. They are yeasts, molds and bacteria. Yeasts and molds are easily destroyed by heat in canning.

In killing bacteria by heat, both the degree of temperature and the length of time it is to be applied must be considered. While bacteria are growing actively they are easily destroyed at the temperature of boiling water (212°F). But some bacteria go through a dormant stage in their life cycle and in that stage are very resistant to heat. It may take 6 hours or more at boiling temperature (212°F) to kill these spores, by canning under pressure (240°F) they may be destroyed in 30 minutes.

Whether foods are acid or non-acid also makes a difference in the rate at which bacteria may be killed. With the non-acid foods, such as meats and corn, beans, and practically all vegetables except tomatoes, these heat-resistant bacteria can be killed with speed and surety only at high temperatures obtained in the steam pressure canner.

The types of bacteria vary with different foods, also with the year, the locality and conditions under which produced. For example, some of the most heat-resistant forms of bacteria are in the soil. Types of spoilage caused by bacteria are fermentations, flat-sour, putrefaction and botulinus spoilage.

Regarding botulinus bacteria, the United States Department of Agriculture states:

"When the spores of botulinus bacteria are not destroyed in the canning process they may grow later and produce a toxin in the food. Since a number of cases of botulinus poisoning have been traced to inadequately processed food, the botulinus bacteria have been studied in order to find the temperature and conditions necessary for destroying them. They are destroyed by processing at 212°F. for 6 to 10 hours or even longer, but the time may be decreased very much if the higher temperature of the steam pressure canner is used."




