CURING A SKIN DISEASE BY HYPNOSIS

Recently in the British Medical Journal was the report of a case of fishskin disease which was cured by hypnosis. Icthyosiform erythrodermia, commonly known as fishskin disease, comes in about twenty varieties. In all forms, one of the characteristics of the disease is that the skin is dry, rough, and stall.

The British Medical Journal reports that Drs. S. P. Hall-Smith and Alan Norton found that, in a special check of a group of people with unhealthy skin, psychic factors were envolved in 78 percent of the cases. Many physicians agree with the French saying that the skin is the mirror of the mind, and that certainly some skin diseases are the result of mental or emotional conflicts.






